Like last year we called on Jamie Fletcher who grew up in Cadgwith but now lives on the Islands to be a part of the men's crew. Unfortunately we were without club legend Diddy Holyer, who sadly came off his motorbike on his way to training and suffered a broken collarbone. Friday was spent hunting for 2 new rowers but thankfully all worked out well and the men were delighted with the result.

Saturday saw the amazing sight of all 150 gigs lined up at St Agnes to race back to St





Mary's. This race determines what heat you row in for the evening race from Tresco. We managed to field 2 ladies crews this year which was great to see. A huge well done to Ellie George, only 16 years of age who made her debut in the ladies A crew. Ellie rowed as stroke and she showed what a talent she has.

The other members of the A crew were Ellie Parsons, Sarah Rudd, Angie Richards, Emma George and Sharon Partridge. I was due to row but unfortunately got hit with the flu! Thank you to Angle for stepping up to the mark. Once again Stuart George pulled the ropes meaning that the crew consisted of 3 members of the George family! Our B crew was a mixed crew and involved rowers from Bridport, Salcombe and Cadgwith. It was great to see Gemma Bennett and Gwen Jane back in the boat ably assisted by Lauren Skewes and Anne Oliver. VILLAGE HALL AGM REPORT

The AGM of the Village Hall was held on 10 May 2016. The Chairman, David Endean thanked all those who freely give their time to support the Village Hall whether by serving on the Committee, helping at the Thursday Market or attending or organising events. The Village Hall was being well used and the Thursday Market had continued to be its largest source of income. Regular users include the Grade Ruan Under 5s, Short Mat Bowls, Yoga and the successful monthly quiz organised by David and Janet Gascoigne and Jill Thomas. The Snooker Room is used regularly throughout the year but there is still only one team from Ruan Minor playing in the league this year. Other users include the Spring and Autumn Shows and the Ruan Revellers as well as Carn to Cove who provide regular entertainment. The Village Hall is popular for one off fund raising events such as craft shows and private parties with special rates available for charities.

Financially it had been a successful year at the Village Hall with major expenditure which included completely redecorating the whole of the interior of the hall, repairs to outside storage facilities and upgrades in the kitchen including a new fridge/freezer. Unfortunately the flat roof above the toilets/kitchen area developed a serious leak and a new fibreglass roof has been installed. There have also been internal repairs and redecoration to put right the damage caused and this expenditure will feature in next year's report. Special thanks to Garvin Cadman for his help decorating the Under 5s store room which was badly affected by the leak and for work in the kitchen.

Health and safety has continued to be a priority and the premises and equipment are regularly checked including emergency equipment. All our regular kitchen users and stall holders serving food have completed or renewed their food hygiene certificates.

Organisational Represents were elected as follows:

Rector's Ramblings Spring into Life

ater this month – on Thursday 23rd – we as a nation will vote on our future relationship with the European Union (the EU). So, whether we like it or not, whether we're totally bored with the whole media coverage and party political spats or not, the EU Referendum will take place on that day.

How will *you* vote: 'Remain'? or 'Leave'? Or maybe you're a 'Don't know' – like a sizeable proportion of the population, according to a recent opinion poll (actually, have *you* ever been asked for *your* opinion? I know *I* never have. I wonder where they get their statistics from?).

Whatever the outcome, the result of the EU Referendum will have a farreaching effect on each one of us – whether we're farmers, fishermen, retailers, big or small businesses, or 'ordinary' people just trying to get on with their lives. The future of our country will hang in the balance on that day.

As a 'Don't know' myself, I tried looking at the pro's and con's of both the 'Remain' and the 'Leave' arguments, on a well-known news website, which claimed: 'Everything you need to know about the EU'. Except it didn't tell me everything I needed to know! And it certainly hasn't helped me come to a decision as to how to vote!

I looked to see if there was a decisive Christian slant: 'No man is an island entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main; if a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less' wrote John Donne, some 400 years ago. In other words, human beings do not thrive when isolated from others.

Meanwhile, Andrew Goddard, Senior Research Fellow at the Kirby Laing Institute for Christian Ethics, in his very balanced thesis, 'The EU; How Should we Decide?' writes: 'We should leave because the EU, despite Christian elements in its vision, and past successes – for example in relation to peace – is now failing and damaging members and others... increasingly captive to contemporary, particularly economic, idols as seen in the Euro, and is developing characteristics of an imperial project which do not adequately respect national integrity.'

Lawks! All this confusion; all this uncertainty! Of one thing we can be certain, though: 'The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.' *Lamentations* 3:22-23

So whilst we humans try to make decisions – often with 'self' in mind rather than what's best for the common good – God still loves us, to such an extent that He sent His Son, Jesus, into the world to die for us. And Jesus himself promises that, "I am with you always, to the very end of the age." *Matthew 26:20b*

People of faith prayerfully seeking the common good are found on both sides of the 'In'/'Out?' arguments. Whatever the outcome, we need to agree to disagree in such a way that we are able to work together, in love, to get the best out of it – whether or not it is the result we wanted.

The beers and ales that we produce are made from the very best ingredients and the liquor (water) drawn via its own bore hole from between two seams of Serpentine rock, thus the name of its first brew - Serpentine. It is the quality

Gardening in June

Everything has come to life now. The

cuckoo returned for Flora Day, the spotted flycatchers, whose exploits I told you of last year, returned again. This season we have had a pair of long tailed tits doing their thing around the garden: gathering cob webs and insects. The male keeps seeing his reflection in the window and attacking it, with his Misses standing back leaving him to it, like the female of most species thinking what is he doing, stupid Boy.

Who knows what the summer will bring, but June is the month when you realise that the garden has got away from you and you are not going to get it back and complete all those jobs that you had planned to. The weather is always an unknown, but this year it is marked that the Oaks are well out before the Ash trees so as the summer progresses we shall see if it will be a dry one.

This month, jobs are nonstop so my suggestions will by no means be an exhaustive list. Most of your spring flowering shrubs will benefit from a prune now. The reason for this is that they tend to flower on wood that has been produced the previous year. If you do not reduce the shrubs in size they will get ever bigger. Plants that I am thinking of are flowering currants, Forsythias, Weigelias. I like to remove all the flowered wood, then shape the bush nicely. Another plant to have a go at is the Clematis montana - once it has by David Endean

finished flowering, cut it back to a tight framework because this is a rampant grower and will take over if left to its own devices. Like the previously mentioned shrubs, it needs mature woody stems to produce the masses of spring flowers that it does.

Whilst you are in the borders, get in there and provide some support for those taller lax plants before they flop under their own weight or due to wind and rain. This will help to maintain structure in your borders. Many things can be used for staking, old twiggy material looks natural; canes and string have a place but be careful not to poke your eyes on the end of the canes. There are some really nice plastic coated wire hoops and supports which can also be used. The choice is yours but, if you get in there before you need to, the plants will soon grow through and hide whatever you use. June really is the month when everything goes mad. If you have any large gaps in the border or places where you had spring bulbs you can over plant these areas with some bright cheerful annuals. Often referred to as bedding plants they are relatively cheap and expendable but are bright and cheery and come in many forms.

Keep on sowing your salads. Many people sow their main crop carrots now to help reduce carrot root fly problems. Sow and plant out most brassicas like cabbage, turnips, swedes and Kohl Rabi I would strongly recommend with these to grow them

under a frame covered in a fine net this will help to stop damage from caterpillars and pigeons. I use hoops made from strong plastic piping. To stop problems with cabbage root fly grubs, you need to place collars made from old carpet tight around the stems from the minute that the plants are put into the ground. There is still time to sow a row or just a wigwam of runner beans; they should get away quickly with the warm soil and warm weather. Just make sure that they have plenty of organic matter underneath them and that you give them plenty of water. On the hot sunny days it is an ideal time to go around the garden, be it the veg patch or the flower borders, with the hoe. This will cut off the weed seedlings which will then shrivel and die plus put a little air in the soil which will help to retain moisture deeper down in the soil.

Your greenhouse can get like an oven really quickly now, so make sure you open the vents to get as much air in as possible. Consider if you need to put up some temporary shading, which may be a product called Coolglass or some netting. I have even seen old net curtains used. You may find that your tomatoes will appreciate this. The air will reduce fungal diseases and regular watering will do the same for blossom end rot.

Well I hope that that gives you a few pointers for June. I am off to cut silage from my lawn, tie in the sweet peas and plant out dahlias, enjoy your gardening.

Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 11 April 2016 from 7.30pm

Present: Parish Councillors: J Preston (Chair), N Green (Vice-Chair), J Clifton, P Collins, M Fleetwood, P Freeman, M Jones, J Lee, G Pollard, S Stephens, J Trewin and Clerk J Castle and 10 members of the public.

- 1. Absences and apologies: There were apologies from Cornwall Councillor Rule.
- 2. Declarations of interest: There were no declarations of interest.

3. Public time: Mr Charles Green of Charles Green Design spoke regarding planning application PA16/02168: the erection of a new dwelling at Malahat. The building will be located in an existing garden area. Similar garden developments have taken place in Cadgwith he stated. The existing access and hard standing for the garage (which is being demolished) remains. Only 1 tree is to be felled. He regards the proposed building to be a high quality contemporary design. There is no specified use of the property other than as a domestic dwelling.

There were a number of concerns expressed by members of the public regarding the proposed development:

- Environmental issues, in particular concerns about the disruption to wildlife in what is currently a wooded area
- Ongoing tree maintenance/ loss of trees with regard to trees covered by a Tree Preservation Order.
- The restriction of light to a neighbouring property
- That the development can be seen from the road
- Loss of existing parking space
- Inability of pumping station to cope with more drainage
- A design not in keeping with the existing properties in Cadgwith
- That Cadgwith is a unique village in a Conservation Area.

One member of the public expressed support for the project, in that a precedent has already been set by allowing houses to be built in gardens in the vicinity.

Mr Kevin Moseley (as agent) spoke with regard to planning application PA16/02224: the conversion of a building and alteration of vehicle access. He noted that there had been no objections from the public, the highways department, the Ramblers' Association or the Countryside Access Team. At present the building to be converted is classed as ancillary residential use and it is being converted to a single-bed property, involving fairly minor works.

4. Police report: The crime statistics for the Lizard Area for the year to January 2016 were displayed. The Clerk was asked to write to the local police support officer asking if more detailed information, as previously received, could be provided. **Action: Clerk.**

5. Cornwall Councillor's time: The Chairman read out the report that Cornwall Councillor Rule had provided in her absence, covering the following matters:

• The Homechoice register is currently being updated in order to provide a better idea of genuine need

- A Cornish Food store is being built alongside the new Waitrose in Truro. There will be a strong focus on fresh produce and great service.
- Community Fund there is a new pot of £2,000 available to give small amounts to local community groups, which can also be used as match funding.
- Code of Conduct Training the monitoring officer has agreed to come to the Lizard to deliver some training.

6. Minutes for acceptance: Having been previously circulated, it was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Freeman that the minutes of the meeting held on 14 March 2016 be accepted, subject to an amendment to include reference to PA16/0297/PREAPP. Carried 9 votes in favour and 2 abstentions.

7. Planning:

Planning Applications for consideration

PA16/02168 -Demolition of existing domestic garage and erection of a detached dwelling, Malahat New Road Cadgwith TR12 7JZ. It was noted that the Tree Officer does not support this application and concerns were also expressed about possible future applications for tree felling to protect the new dwelling. The elevated design makes it very prominent and the cedar cladding was viewed as inappropriate for the area. The definition of a Conservation Area was read out and noted. It was proposed

and seconded that the Parish Council does not support this application on the following grounds:

- It is an inappropriate development in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.
- The proposed design is of an inappropriate style and height for the location.

• There are concerns regarding protection of a wooded area which is covered by a Tree Protection Order and the strong objections of the Tree Officer were noted.

• There are particular concerns with regard to the possible removal in the past of protected trees in violation of the existing Tree Protection Order, which have necessitated planting in response to a Tree Replacement Notice.

• There were also concerns about possible pressure in the future to remove further protected trees in order to protect the new structure or to provide further space for domestic support buildings, for example a garden shed.

Carried 11 votes in favour.

- PA16/02224 Conversion of building into a one-bed dwelling and alteration of vehicular access, Linden Lea Ruan Minor TR12 7JL. It was proposed and seconded that this application be supported. Carried 11 votes in favour.
- PA16/02339- Non-material amendment Land at Ruminella View. This is in respect of rough painted render as opposed to granite quoins. It was proposed and seconded that this application is supported. Carried 11 votes in favour.

Planning applications decided by the planning authority since the last meeting

- PA16/00008 Erection of dwelling with artist's studio, Land adj to Moorlands Prazegooth Lane Cadgwith TR12 7LB. [Refused]
- PA16/0866 The Square Cadgwith Ruan Minor TR12 7JX discharge of condition [Discharged]

Pre-applications, consultations and appeals:

• PA16/00297/PREAPP - Pre-application advice for 2 x dwellings, Land adj Trepool Treleague Crossroads Ruan Minor Cornwall TR12 7JR [Advice given]

8. Finance

- <u>Financial Report</u> the bank reconciliation was noted, together with the statement of Income & Expenditure for March 2016.
- <u>Payments Schedule</u> the schedule was adjusted to remove the proposed contribution for the carpet repair in the Sunday School room until the actual cost of the repair is available. However, a sum of £300 for transportation of the marker stones under the AONB scheme was added. It was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Stephens that the payment schedule amounting to £1188.12 be approved. Carried 11 votes in favour.
- <u>Budget 2016/17</u> the budget for the new financial year was noted.

9. Matters arising from the minutes:

 <u>Play Area update</u> – it was noted that a grant of £3,000 had been given by the 100 Club (Cornwall Foundation Trust) via GRCT. Councillor Preston reported that he had still not yet received more detailed information from the contractor regarding the additions to the zip wire structure, which is needed to put the proposals for Phase 2 out for public consideration. It was hoped this would be available in the next couple of weeks. Councillor Preston suggested that a Play Area meeting is required and it was noted that some ground clearing is necessary. **Action: Chairman**

- <u>Dog Poop Bag stands</u> the Clerk was asked to speak to Sue Cadman regarding full costing for these stands and bring this to the next meeting for approval. Action: Clerk
- <u>School Bus Turning and Virtual Walkway</u> it was noted that Maxine Hardy is investigating whether any grant funding is available. The School has been made aware that the designated parking space remains a problem for the turning of the bus. The Chairman agreed to look at the possibility of extinguishing this space with Ben Dickinson. **Action: Chairman**
- <u>Refuse collection, Kennack Sands</u> it was noted that a further meeting had taken place that day, attended by Councillors Clifton, Freeman, Lee, and Preston. Although the agent for the Tregothnan Estate and the café owner attended along with a representative of Natural England (which is the tenant of the estate), not all the caravan parks were represented. The cost previously was £6,000 although this may be reduced by having fewer collections in the winter months and/or recycling. Natural England had agreed to contact the caravan sites who are major beneficiaries of the attraction the beach provides to tourists.

It was noted that there is a need for an immediate short-term solution, to be followed by a sustainable long-term solution. The Clerk was asked to contact Natural England for an update regarding engagement with the bigger businesses involved. **Action: Clerk**

- <u>Friends of St Ruan and St Grade Historic Church Buildings</u> it was agreed that a possible donation be included under Finance at next month's meeting. **Action: Clerk**
- <u>Support for café in Shop</u> it was agreed that the letter drafted by Councillor Freeman on behalf of the Parish Council, supporting the conversion of part of the shop to a café area, should be issued if acceptable to Claire Bollard.

12. Footpaths, environment and treewardens:

- <u>Todden & state of surrounding ground</u> it was noted that, in response to a query from a visitor regarding puddles round the benches, some scalpings would be put down. Action: Chairman
- <u>St Ruan Well</u> it was agreed that the thorn should be cut away from the building for now and then cut right down when the bird nesting season is over. **Action Councillors Pollard and Preston.**
- <u>Blocked drains</u>- it was noted that some work had been carried out. There still remains a problem with the surface breaking up at the bottom end of Barn Hill in Cadgwith.
