From the Euology given By John Spalding

Arthur Coupland, only son of Fred and Jo Coupland, brother to the late Jane Meek. He died on Wednesday 16th September 2020, on Saturday the 19th he would have been 74 years old.

When Julie and Chrissie asked me to give his eulogy, I felt honoured and privileged. He was my cousin and a great friend. People have given me their memories and stories, I had so many pages I could publish a book titled, "The Life and Times of Arty Coup". Now that would give us something to chat about !!

Arthur loved to have company and always had something to say. His biggest frustration with Covid 19 was that he was so isolated, visitors not allowed nor was he able to be out and about. Even though I and others spoke to him regularly on the phone, when he was saying cheerio we knew the loneliness was there.

As you know, over the last 15 to 18 months he had increasingly serious health issues resulting in numerous hospitalisations and two critical brain operations. Sadly he never returned to his beloved Ruan and Cadgwith. We, the family say thank you to everyone who gave the additional support which enabled him to continue at home for so long. To the home care support team who were there twice a day.

A special thank you to his doctors and nurses at the Ruan / Mullion practice who always put Arthur's wellbeing uppermost in whatever they did for him. To you all who are the Ruan/Cadgwith community, for visits and phone calls, grocery deliveries and help in so many ways. Your love and kindness meant so much to him.

Then there are the carers, nurses, doctors and surgeons at so many hospitals, Helston and Cambourne/Redruth Community Hospitals, Trelisk at Truro, Penzance, Plymouth where he had his brain surgery, Bude and The North Devon General at Barnstaple. Finally the staff and Doctors at the Tor Point Nursing Home which Julie managed to get him into, this side of the River Tamar so he was back

in Cornwall. We were told so often that he was near the end that we ended up calling him the come-back kid !!!

I must mention two special individuals who, not only in his recent illness but long before, made a difference to Arthur's life. Words cannot express our gratitude except to say Thank You Johnno and Thank You Joy Williams.

We all have our own experiences and memories of Arthur Coupland aka Art, Arty, Coup, Coupy and to so many Uncle Art. He was a life long supporter of the County Cornwall Air Ambulance service and he put his money where his mouth was by having a monthly direct debit to them. This is the chosen charity in his memory.

He was a great collector, with collections of buses, trucks and trains, some trains made from coal; fantastic collections of stamps, coins and even match boxes. He loved photography and with his camera out at sea has some fabulous sunsets and from Man-o-war, Cadgwith in the snow. He willingly gave slide shows to family and groups including pictures of his many travels.

He played tennis and snooker, sang with the St Keverne choir with which he did a tour of Canada, up and down the UK and was part of the first ever 1,000 Cornishmen voice choir to sing at the Albert Hall. This was such an important part of his life.

Chrissie remembers when they were all together at times like Christmas, they planned it so that Arthur wouldn't get the monopoly out, firstly it lasted so long and secondly he was sooo competitive that they would fall out with him ... not the spirit of goodwill at Christmas.

He came up country for holidays, usually staying with Chrissie. In her job she travelled to various towns and cities and Arthur would tag along to explore these exotic places, even Wolverhampton!!! Birmingham was a favourite destination with the fish, meat and veggie markets especially the big stores.... He went so many times that he should have been an adopted Brummie !!

I would take a days holiday and we would explore the beauty of the picturesque Cotswolds to the south and the hills and moorlands in the Peak district to the north. He enjoyed evening meals with Jackie and I, she was always delighted because he always left a clean plate. He came to worship with us at Chasetown Methodist Church where he became well known over the years. With coffee and biscuits after service there was lots of chat which he enjoyed. Through his troubles he has been on many prayer lists.

My sister Jenny and her husband Vish were great hosts to Arthur, living less than ten miles away they would also have him up for meals and days out. He probably knew the Midland better than we did. She always had a lump in her throat when saying goodbye because it didn't matter what words <u>she used</u>, Arthur would always say with his deep voice and Cornish accent his own unique **Cheerio then**, she will always remember him for that.

This Chapel here in Ruan was part of his life from birth until today. It has been part of our family for more than 100 years. From our great grandparents until the Cont....

present, Janes have sat in these pews and Arthur took strength from that heritage. He attended Sunday School and as an adult was a Sunday school teacher himself here. He was a good decent honest man and true to his faith and principles.

Fishing was in his blood, his grandfather, great grandfather and great great grandfather had all been fishermen. He started work as an apprentice carpenter, attending Cambourne Technical college to gain his qualifications. He was a man of repute, a good tradesman, more than that, he was a top man, a craftsman who took pride in everything he did and was appreciated and respected by all who knew him.

He fished form a young age, Grampy Jane taking us over Tubban and teaching us to Mully fish with a bent pin and line with a piece of limpet as bait. He went from that to a boat for proper sea fishing. He was a member of the Angling Club and participant in the competitions. He loved to win; again his competitive nature, but it brought out his dark side if he just missed out or thought something was wrongly judged..

Whether bassing in the evening at Kennack Sands or out at sea, his real pride and joy was his boat Er-An-Mor, He fitted her out completely using a lot of teak and with his carpentry skills, from the decking to the wheel house which was fitted with the latest technology, a scanner to find the fish and wrecks, sat-nav and short wave radio for communications. He spent so much time at sea and in Cadgwith that the visitors thought he lived there. Many visitors remember him and will miss him when they return.

I know that by now one or two of you will be muttering to yourselves ... he hasn't mentioned football ---- You are absolutely right! Uncle Fred, his Dad, was the secretary of Ruan club for years so Arthur was brought up with football as a normal part of his life. He was well suited as he was physically very strong and fit and it was competitive. He certainly wasn't an armchair sportsman. He was a fan of Preston North End. Why I hear you ask ??? By pure coincidence the famous Bill Shankly played for Preston North End 1933 – 1949 and in 1938 won the FA Cup with them. Coupy took his football so seriously. I

watched him once, he was playing left back and I shuddered at the body checks to the opposing winger and his sliding tackles to stop their forwards. Recently speaking to someone about Arthur's footballing prowess, they commented that he would be "awarded" a few yellow cards today. At half time we chatted about the game and I said some of his tackles were a bit brutal and he replied,"I'm not here to make it an easy life for them, ... I'm here to stop them and that is what I do" they went on for the second half and he did what he said he would stop them and defend the goal area. That was why he was know by his nickname '**THE WALL'**.

Arthur, you will not be forgotten. He will be there checking the facts of the one that got away or the goal disallowed when it wasn't actually off-side he hasn't said **Cheerio.** There are so many ways to say goodbye Art, I see you putting to sea with calm waters, a rising tide and gentle breeze to carry you to the safe harbour on the other side.

Rector's Ramblings

N ovember is a month for remembering. At the beginning of the month sees All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day - the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed – and there will be special services in some churches in the Benefice on 1st November, to remember loved ones who have died.

The following Sunday is Remembrance Sunday. This year is the 80th anniversary of the Battle of Britain – when the horrors of the Luftwaffe bombs were heavy over British skies. Most of us can only imagine the terror of living in Coventry, Liverpool and London during those months. It must have seemed like the beginning of the end of the world.

Eighty years on, it is a good time to stop and thank God that evil did *not* prevail. Hitler did not win the battle to dominate Europe. And we can thank God for the courage and endurance of our fathers and grandfathers, our mothers and grandmothers, in the midst of such towering darkness and destruction.

Sadly, many places in the world are at war today. Man's greed, arrogance and desire for domination have not gone away. There are also battles to be fought for our land, major problems to be solved: economic uncertainty; terrorism; climate warming, etc.

This year we are very aware of our own struggles with the worldwide Covid-19 pandemic. We face an unseen enemy, but the effects on our lives and society are almost as devastating as a world war. The threats are different from Hitler, but our need for courage, endurance and perseverance is the same.

So November is a good time to remember to pray for peace; a time to pray for our nation, for ourselves and for each other, to turn to God in repentance and in faith - remembering to 'love Him more dearly, follow Him more nearly, day by day' (*Bishop Richard of Chichester, 1197-1253*)

ZOOM FOR BEGINNERS!

If you haven't already received an email inviting you to a Zoom meeting, you probably will soon! Many groups are choosing to meet virtually, and Zoom is one of the most popular ways to do this though here are plenty of others.

Zoom is a computer program used to hold online virtual meetings on a smartphone, tablet, laptop, or desktop computer. Zoom uses your computer's or phone's microphone to let you talk to other meeting participants. If you do not have a device you can use a phone to dial into a meeting. This note only covers joining and participating in a meeting that you've been invited to.

You must first download the program from the Zoom website. The free version should meet all of your needs. If you've received an email invitation to a Zoom meeting, click the link that says, "Join Zoom Meeting." If this is the first time you've used Zoom, this link will take you to a website where you can download the program or app, depending on what device you're using.

After you install Zoom, there are different ways to join a meeting. You can click the link in your invitation email, go to the Zoom website and enter the meeting ID, or dial into the meeting on a phone. If you have an email invitation, click "Join Zoom Meeting" in that email. This takes you to the Zoom website. Go to the Zoom website and enter the 9-digit meeting ID from your invitation email. If the meeting requires a password, that will be in your email, too.

When Zoom opens it will show you a preview of your camera image. Then click either "Join with Video" or "Join without Video." If you use video, other people in the meeting will see you, if not, they will just see your name. Next, Zoom asks about audio. Click "Join with Computer Audio" so you can hear and be heard in the meeting. If you don't have access to a computer, tablet, or smartphone, you can use a phone to dial into the meeting. The phone number to use will be in your invitation email.

Once you've joined the meeting, you can see and hear other participants who are represented by a square that displays their face or just their name. If you're in a large meeting, make sure your microphone is muted. Your computer microphone is sensitive and can pick up background noise. The mute button looks like a microphone in the bottom left corner of the Zoom screen. If the microphone has a red line through it, you're muted. Click the button again to unmute yourself if you want to talk in the meeting.

Only one person in the meeting can talk at a time. Zoom indicates who is speaking by highlighting their image with a yellow square. There is also a chat feature in Zoom, where you can type messages to other participants. Participants can send messages to everyone in the meeting, or just certain participants. However, after the meeting, the host can view the transcript of all chats, so it's not entirely private. If there is a message for you in the chat, a notification appears on the Chat button, which looks like a speech bubble. Click that button to open the chat window.

To leave a Zoom meeting click "Leave Meeting" on the bottom right hand corner.



THE LIZARD LIFEBOAT VISITOR CENTRE NEWS

On 15th November 1955, the Cadgwith lifeboat 'RNLB GUIDE OF DUNKIRK' was launched to assist the Irish motor vessel 'mv CITY OF GHENT' and was able to save her entire crew of 17 in difficult circumstances.

Built in Lubeck, West Germany, in 1953, the motor vessel was owned by Coastal Shipping Ltd of Dublin and was on voyage from Dublin to Fowey in ballast. She ran aground on rocks off Black Head in poor visibility on a dark evening and, although she refloated relatively quickly, she began to take on water and was listing heavily to starboard. With her engines out of action she drifted southwards on a calm sea with her list increasing severely.

In response to her radio alarm, emergency services were called into action and, as part of this exercise, a coastal command aircraft dropped a flare to assist 'RNLB GUIDE OF DUNKIRK' which had been launched to search for and assist the stricken vessel. The lifeboat was able to locate the sinking vessel and take off her crew to safety. The 'CITY OF GHENT's' list increased further and she quickly sank.

This was the last life-saving service of the Old Cadgwith Station with just one more launch occurring on 7th August 1962.

As I explained last month, the unique location of our own Visitor Centre and Shop inside the lifeboat station itself creates additional corona-virus safety problems and it will be some time before we are able to welcome visitors once more.

However, considerable work has gone into other 'self sufficient' retail units and the RNLI has been able to re-open our shops at Looe, Fowey, Mevagissey, Falmouth, Penzance, Sennen Cove, St Agnes, Newquay, Rock and Padstow.

Operating 238 lifeboat stations on rivers and around our coastline and effecting, on average, 24 'shouts' per day takes a great deal of resourcing.

In an attempt to regain some of the retail sales income lost through Coronavirus regulations enforcing the closure of shops, the RNLI's on-line retail shop has been working at full steam to satisfy public demand.

They are proud and delighted to confirm that last month saw the achievement of $\pounds 1$ million banked sales income for this year – a tremendous achievement indeed given the circumstances! A big 'Thank You' is due to staff, volunteers and, especially, the general public for helping us reach this fantastic figure.

The Old Killing House, aka The Butcher's Barn

In response to my request in the last Gazette for information about this building in Poltesco Lane, Jeb Preston and John Williams both got in touch to fill in some of its history.

Jeb said that the first reference the building was when it was shown on an 1811 map. There used to be a Cornish hedge alongside which gave an impression that it was incorporated into the field and so it didn't used to stand out quite so prominently. It was prob-



ably used originally for storing hay or other farm items.

In more recent times, it was called The Old Killing House or, less gruesomely, the Butcher's Barn on account of its use by the Dale family of butchers for slaughtering pigs. The artist, Vince Tutton, bought it in 1989 and used it as his studio. He installed electricity and used to take a supply of water with him for his painting. Sadly Vince is no longer with us, but the barn is still owned by his family.

John Williams, who lives in Glebe Place, kindly sent me his memories of the building as follows:

"At first I assumed it to have been used as a barn, which at one time it may have been. It was two stories high, at the rear is a slope or ramp and a door, there must have been a wooden floor at the top which must have been removed many years ago, as now there is only the ground floor. I read in a book on the area that many years ago it was used by a butcher for slaughtering pigs; hence the building being out of earshot of the village.

Since then, it has been used for different things. It was left derelict for many years, but was possibly used by Mr Dick Rogers, who farmed Poltesco and Cargerrick farms, to store bales of hay or straw. When Mr Rogers retired and moved to the Redruth area, it was again left unused for a while, then Mr Albert Williams (no relation) who lived where Jeb lives now, used it to store odds and ends.

It was then used as an art studio by Mr Vince Tutton who used to live just down the road towards Poltesco in the little thatched cottage on the sharp right hand bend.

So, as you can see, the old building has had a long, useful and varied life and hopefully it will continue to so so for a good many more years yet.

I have lived in the area for some 60 odd years, having come from St. Keverne in the early 1960s, so I've seen a few changes, but glad to say that Ruan Minor has not changed much in all those years."

My thanks to Jeb and John, it's nice to know more about the building.

Gardening in November by David Endean

Well here we are again, it looks as if it is going to be a really long winter. This is not necessarily because of the weather but more because of the world health situation. Its looks quite possible that our little outdoor areas will be very important to us once again as in the spring. Unfortunately the clocks have now gone back and the days are rapidly shortening, this means that there is far less opportunity to be out in the garden except for weekends unless you have the luxury of retirement.

There are several deciduous shrubs which I like to prune now. They are plants like Berberis thunbergii, I do it now because they show some lovely autumn colours which are lost if they are cut back any earlier. When they lose their leaves they are generally dormant and then you can be much harder on the plant. Cut them back to a pleasing shape, doing it at this time of the year means that you do not notice any bare patches which may occur but they will readily grow in, in the spring.

This treatment is ideal for many deciduous trees and shrubs. This means that November is the ideal month to start the winter pruning of fruit trees such as apples and pears. Do not go to town on a mature tree right away as you will be rewarded with little more than lots of soft whippy growth and no fruit next year. Initially go in and remove only dead diseased and crossing branches. Leave major branch removal to a gradual process in future years. Young trees should be pruned back to encourage spur growth whilst keeping the shape required.

Now and all through the winter is a good time, and it will be necessary, to give your paths a good clean. There are many methods and products which can be used. The most low tech is the old fashioned broom but this is best used in conjunction with some kind of garden disinfectant/detergent product. Many people use bleach, this is important to lift and kill the slippery moss and algae. Be careful to make sure that there is no run off going into you flower beds or lawns as it will kill the plants there. Using a pressure washer will induce less sweat but you must be careful that your paths are in sound order as these are powerful machines and will soon dislodge any loose masonry and even take the top surface off concrete paths and slabs making them more porous.

If you want to have some bulbs flowering at Christmas and New Year now is the time to think about potting up and starting off those Amaryllis bulbs. They are really easy, put the bulb in a pot which is slightly larger than the bulb. Half the bulb should be above the soil surface, use compost or bulb fibre. Soak the compost and bring the pot into a warm bright spot and growth should soon start and flowering will occur in about 8 weeks (see picture below left).

Narcissi like Paperwhites (see picture below right) are even quicker and need less warmth, a sheltered spot will suffice, I often used an unheated greenhouse. These will be ready in four to six weeks so if you have quite a few bulbs spread out your planting over a few weeks. If you plant Soleil D'or narcissi at the same time these will flower in succession after the Paperwhites. I am struggling to get my mail order bulb consignment this year due to double the usual demand so, if you are leaving it to that, you may have to think about getting to a garden Centre to see what they have. Also now is the time to plant your Tulips and any other spring bulbs which have not gone in yet.

In the veg garden it is a case of tidying up finished crops like beans, courgettes, marrows and get them on the compost heap. Remove any weeds and if possible dig the ground over to give you a head start in the spring. Covering the ground stops winter weed growth but unless it is porous you will not get the benefit of the winter rains also the birds will not be able to root through it and eat the bugs and slugs which may well be a problem next year. Keep harvesting root crops like carrots and parsnips, and brassicas as needed, make sure that the pigeons do not get there before you use some netting to keep them off, I have some nice Brussel sprouts this year.

Well make the most of your garden and enjoy it.
