have undertaken similar work locally including St Keverne Church. They are a family firm with over 50 years experience of high quality building and joinery services based in Truro. CADGWITH FISHING COVE TRUST

The main news this month is that we have had extensive discussions with Crowd-funder about the large amount of £20,539 that had been deducted from the the proceeds of the fundraising campaign which I mentioned in the last edition of the Gazette. After writing them a detailed letter I managed to speak to the Chief Executive, Mr Rob Love, who agreed to refund us the 3% platform fee which had been deducted. He was as good as his word, and the resulting sum of £11,025.36 was refunded to us within a few days. Mr Love said that Crowdfunder are 100% behind our campaign, and the trustees are very thankful for the huge refund received, which goes a long way towards our building repair costs.

During the last month we have also been collecting in the monies pledged at the

auction, and I am pleased to confirm that we have now collected all the money for every single lot. A 100% success rate is fantastic. Thank you all so much for all your support for this fundraiser, and special thanks to Sarah Stephens also for the many hours she put into chasing payments and queries, and for organising the whole thing.

As this goes to press we are still looking forward to the Sea Shanty Festival being held by Redruth Rugby Club on 30th May 12pm to 9pm with all funds raised going towards our fundraising appeal. The line up is now confirmed as The Oggymen, Acapella Moonshine, Jack Kessell, Rum and Shrub Shantymen, Mo' Slim, Louella Jade Eke, The Strays, Devils Hatband and Figurehead. There are a lot of stalls, bars and catering vans too. It promises to be a really great day out, and I think there is at least one minibus planned from Cadgwith

To comply with Covid safe procedures there was staggered arrival times, hand and contact details taken for Track and Trace. Masks were worn.

Approx 9 black bin bags of rubbish including recycling has been collected in total since the last FoKS report. Some of the items included:

- Fishing net, rope and small plastics.



Rector's Ramblings

ne of my grandsons is named Matías. It's the Spanish equivalent of Mat-

thias or Matthew. The name means 'a gift from God'. Matías is the third of five siblings and I remember when, as the rest of the

family were loading-up the car to return home after their summer holiday several years ago, Matías was looking really down. Thank the Lord that he and I had a chance to sit down together, whilst all the busyness was going on around us, and that he was able to 'off-load'

He told me that he felt his elder sister and brother were valued more than he because they were the first and second children - one of each; the pride of Mum and Dad. His younger brother and sister were valued, he felt, because they were the 'babies' of the family - and therefore rather spoilt. Meanwhile he, Matías, felt a bit 'piggy-in-the-middle', without a clear identity in the family structure and (heartbreaking for me to hear) feeling that he was not valued.

As he was saying all this, an image came to my mind: that of a see-saw. A see-saw depends on a fulcrum to keep the balance. Matías, I suggested to him, was that fulcrum: at one end of the 'see-saw' were his two elder siblings; at the other end were his two younger siblings. He was the one who keeps them in balance; without him they would collapse. He was important. He was special. He had a vital role to play in his family. I do hope that he felt encouraged by my analogy.

Gardening in June

by David Endean

Well what a spring it has been, all a little topsy turvy. Very dry for the second year in a row but also unusually cold especially at night. I lost count of the overnight frosts that we had in April. I found this really noticeable in the germination of various things, normally a cold greenhouse would be fine for various seeds but they did not come up. I blamed it on old or duff seed, but as May appeared germination started. The lesson here is that I should have used my heated propagator more.

The cooler times did have the advantage that the spring flowers which have looked beautiful have lasted longer as has the |Lych Gate in the Church thanks to the Spring Show Committee.

Also have haven't the birds been busy? Whilst in the garden this past weekend I have seen great tits, blue tits robins, green woodpeckers blackbirds and a blackcap, all busy gathering materials and food for their young. The song thrushes have already fledged and a cuckoo is busy calling in the distance on the downs.

Hopefully everything is looking good in your garden. I always think of roses now they require little work at the moment other than dead heading, tying in of any long whippy shoots that develop on the climbing roses and sticking your nose in the bloom for a good sniff, check for any occupying bees first!

Also look out for greenfly catch it quick and a finger and thumb squish will suffice otherwise a quick spray with soapy water is often as good as anything. While you are there pick up any dead leaves which have fallen due to blackspot, this will help reduce its spread.

It should be truly safe for all your tender bedding and hanging baskets now especially seeing how cold this spring has been. I know many have had theirs out for weeks but it will have done no harm waiting as often before August has arrived those same people are ripping there plants out as they are spent. Also many of the spring flowers are sacrificed to get these early bedders in.

If you have some gaps why not fill them with something bright and cheerful. Begonias have been good doers over the last few years as they have

tolerated the damp and the New Guinea type impatiens are not susceptible to the diseases that the standard Busy Lizzies have had in the past. If you make sure the areas that you see most are bright and colourful whatever the weather is you will feel better. Prepare your ground well and make sure that it is in good heart with a liberal sprinkling of balanced fertiliser. Water the plants in well and you should be amply rewarded. This does lead me on to saying all your flower borders will be aided by dressing of balanced fertiliser now to keep things healthy and growing well.

June is the traditional time to sow your biennials, just as they are beginning to bloom in your garden it's time to think about next year. These plants are the Wallflowers, Sweet Williams, Foxgloves and Canterbury Bells tradition dictates that find a patch in the vegetable garden. Make sure that it is weed free and work the ground down to a fine tilth then sow the seed in shallow drills a foot apart. It is often good to water the bottom of the drill before sowing to aid germination. Once they have grown on they can be lifted and spaced out so that they are six inches or so apart. They can grow on from there until they are required in late summer or autumn to bed out or fill gaps.

The veg patch is rapidly filling up now. I have got an early row of runner beans in the polytunnel, another row outside, and I plan to plant more early this month and a final sowing early in July.

All are prepared in the same way, I dig out a generous trench and fill it liberally with homemade garden compost, back fill with some added general fertiliser then erect a frame work of very robust poles to support the plants.

In recent times I have taken to pre-germinating the beans. This involves putting the precious beans in a plastic bag with some damp multipurpose compost then put it in a warm room after three or four days the little radicle begins to emerge and you are ready to plant the beans out.

Well what else will I be doing? The first of the harvests are coming in like the salads, lettuces, radish, spring onions, beetroot, Kohl Rabi are all ready to gather but also there is still time to sow more along with some winter cropping brassicas like kales, Savoys and cabbages. Lifting of the early potatoes will start and planting out of the leeks will happen.

The Sweetpeas need tying in and the first of the blooms will appear for regular picking. The daffodils will be tidied up as the leaves have died back ready for next spring and hopefully a spring show next year if circumstances allow. The dahlias need weeding and staking ready for a fine display later in the year.

That should be enough for you to be getting on with but do not forget to sit down and enjoy your garden.

THE LIZARD LIFEBOAT VISITOR CENTRE NEWS

8TH MAY 1945

THE ROLE OF THE RNLI IN WORLD WW11

The 8th May 2021 saw the celebration of the 76th Anniversary of VE Day. Despite the obvious dangers to all varieties of shipping throughout the period of the Second World War, the RNLI continued to go about its work with bravery and commitment. In addition to its 'normal' duties of providing aid and assistance to shipping in distress,

RNLI crews also:

- Towed vessels laden with explosives and top secret information
- · Navigated minefields
- Rescued downed aircrews
- Ferried food to remote villages
- Brought doctors to the sick and injured
- Took priests to the dying.

Fortunately, unlike the lifeboat fleet of 1914, the majority of lifeboats available to RNLI crews during the Second World War had been modernised to give them the strength and power to cope with the extremely punishing demands made of them. Over the course of the war, and excluding those saved at Dunkirk, RNLI CREWS SAVED 6,376 LIVES BETWEEN 1939 AND 1945.

Many of the incidents attended by RNLI crews were perilous and life-threatening. Among them were:

The Chebogue Rescue

Whilst on convoy duties in October 1944, the Canadian frigate 'Chebogue' lost her stern after being torpedoed by a German submarine. Stranded in dangerous waters, she was towed some 900 miles to the apparent safety of Swansea Bay. Unfortunately the weather took a significant turn for the worst when a 40-knot gale quickly became a 70-knot hurricane and the Chebogue was dragged stern first on to the infamous Port Talbot Bar. The Mumbles Watson Class lifeboat, RNLB EDWARD, PRINCE OF WALES, was given the 'shout' and the crew knew that they were going into a place of extreme danger. The lifeboat was launched into darkness and worked hard to reach the stricken vessel through sleet and enormous waves. The enormity of the problem was realised immediately on reaching the Chebogue and Coxswain William Gammon saw that it was too

dangerous to come alongside to rescue the crew. In an extraordinary feat of seamanship and bravery, Coxswain Gammon drove full speed over the bar to reach the seaward side of the wreckage and then held the boat steady long enough for some of the crew to make the dangerous leap on to the lifeboat. Coxswain Gammon repeated this remarkable manoeuvre 12 times, rescuing all 42 of the frigate's crew, with only relatively minor injuries resulting from the perilous leap each one of them had to make. The fact that the Mumbles crew had an average age of 55 with two members over 60 and two more over 70 made the rescue all the more remarkable.

Battle of Britain

As the war continued, RAF and Luftwaffe crews repeatedly entered into dogfights over the Channel. It became a common call-out for lifeboat crews to be launched to rescue both Allied and Axis aircrews that had been shot down into the sea. In one such incident, RAF Pilot Officer Richard Hillary (later to be the author of 'The Last Enemy') parachuted into the sea off Margate after his spitfire was shot down. In bad visibility, Margate lifeboat RNLB LORD SOUTHBOROUGH was launched and eventually found the airman very badly burned and nearing death. The crew pulled him aboard, bandaged his wounds and made him feel comfortable with a generous supply of brandy which, according to the original incident report, had 'wonderful results'.

Business As Usual

Not all rescues during the war years were the result of enemy action. On 23rd January 1942, two Whitby steamers, 'SS Runswick' and 'SS Saltwick', collided in

poor conditions near Portishead Bay, off the east coast of Scotland. Peterhead lifeboat RNLB JULIA PARK BARRY OF GLASGOW went to their aid and escorted them both to the safety of the bay to await better weather conditions. Here they were joined by SS Fidra, which had also come to seek shelter from the storm. Unfortunately the gale soon became a hurricane and drove the SS Runswick inshore. Having only had a few hours rest, the lifeboat crew returned into the darkness and snow to rescue all 44 of the Runswick crew. The hurricane was now blowing directly into the harbour, destroying the breakwater and driving the Saltwick and Fidra onto the rocky foreshore. Coxswain McLean, with great skill and bravery, turned head to sea and, despite the terrible conditions, managed to keep alongside the Fidra for 50 minutes to rescue 26 of the crew and take them to the shore and safety. He then returned to the Saltwick, made it to the sheltered side of the wreck and was able to rescue the 36 survivors on board. All told, the lifeboat saved 106 lives that day and RNLI bravery awards were made to all of the crew.

Our local crews were kept extremely busy throughout the period of the conflict with a heavy load of dangerous and challenging 'shouts'.



From the Gazette Archives

30 Years Ago - June 1991

There was a comprehensive report by John Trewin of the coach trip to London to watch Cornwall compete against Yorkshire in the County Championship. It tells of there being a sea of black and gold in the stand and the exciting game with Cornwall coming from behind to force the game into extra time and going on to win 29-20. There was much singing and much celebration, taking in London's nightclubs still in kilts, with Danny Phillips showing one bouncer what he had under his.

Sarah Legge wrote about a day of great excitement in the Cove when a large shoal of Mullet was spotted. She described how all the boats were readied and rowed round towards Kennack, surrounding the shoal in their net. Loading the haul onto the boats took quite some doing but they managed to get back to Cadgwith where men and women gathered to load the boxes ready for market.

John Bourne reported on the World Gig Championship. The weather wasn't the best, but four crews from Cadgwith and 41 from other Cornish Clubs made it to the Isles of Scilly. The "World" element consisted of two crews from the USA, one of which borrowed "Buller". The Veterans found success, coming first out of five. Ralph Bird, who built Buller, was in the crew and was delighted to have won a race in a gig he had built for the first time.

The front cover featured a photo of the "Matthew", tied up on the Lifeboat buoy at Cadgwith. The Matthew is a replica of the ship that was sailed to Newfoundland by John Cabot in 1497. She did the same voyage in 1997 to mark the 500th anniversary of that journey.

The Matthew is now based in Bristol.

207/20 Update: Cadgwith Fishing Cellars

Council reviewed progress on fundraising and loan sanction and **CONSIDERED** the funding of the Winch House purchase. Approval for the Council to borrow is expected to be forthcoming imminently, and Cornwall Council have also offered temporary financial assistance, should it be required. The matter of ownership was raised and Cllr Green suggested that ownership of the three fishing cellars buildings – Fort York, Steamers, Winch House – could be jointly owned by the Parish Council and the Cadgwith Fishing Cove Trust. This would ensure none of the buildings could be sold without the permission of both parties. Another route may be to add a restriction in the land registry that CFCT must give consent to sell the Winch House, but that the Council retain 100% ownership. **RESOLVED** to proceed with the purchase of the Winch House, exchanging contracts by 17th May 2021, and on completion register a restriction on the title to require the written

consent of Cadgwith Fishing Cove Trust upon any future sale or transfer of the property. Cllrs Green/P Collins. 11 in favour, 1 abstained: Cllr Freeman. Cllr Green and the Clerk to pursue

208/20 Footpaths, Highways; Tree report

- a) **NOTED** the need for FP6 widening and approved to spend £65 on the work.
- b) **NOTED** need for repairs to a bench on Common land at Cadgwith. Ownership of the bench needed clarification before expenditure was made.
- c) **CONSIDERED** other reports: A request to make enquiries about registering the link path between FP6 and New Road as a PROW. Concern was expressed about waste disposal and litter at Kennack Sands. An issue was raised about sunken verge edges at Gwavas. 
