







A NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN -FOR GRADE-RUAN ?

Every year dozens of Planning Applications are made within the Parish of Grade-Ruan. In addition there are individual consultations and 'Pre-Applications' about development, Appeals about decisions, and the inevitable Enforcement cases about 'uncontrolled development'. The number of applications is steadily increasing.

The Parish Council are a 'Consultee' and can respond to and represent the local community, but the final decisions rest with Cornwall Council. which turn in is guided by adopted policies.



One way that local communities like ours can have more leverage and influence is to adopt a Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) which would effectively be an adopted local policy written by us, here.

Unlike the Parish Plan document we produced in 2002, an NDP would have real legal weight and would create new planning laws specific to our parish which developers and the planning authority must follow. NDPs can prevent building on specific greenfield areas, can insist upon principal occupancy for new houses (i.e. refuse building second homes), can set rules for affordable and local needs housing and can set settlement boundaries to prevent sprawl. The Parish Council are keen to submit to Cornwall Council a statement identifying the Parish of Grade-Ruan as a designated area wishing to start writing an NDP.

Developing a Plan is not within the remit of the Parish Council, although they will make the initial application to get started. There needs to be a separate 'Steering Group' for what is a long process of local consultation about what we do and don't want – so we can choose the right kind of development in the right places.

There is an open meeting on Wednesday 23rd March at 7pm in the Chapel meeting room, Ruan Minor. If the future of our area interests you and you feel you may wish to contribute, please come along; or please write to the Clerk to the Parish Council with any comments and expressions of interest. <u>clerk@grpc.org.uk</u>



Recreation Ground News

I'm writing as the tail end of Storm Eunice blows itself out! Fortunately, there has been only minor damage at the Recreation Ground there're a couple of slates come adrift in the gully above the changing room entrance (one has been loose for a while!) but nothing else

that I can see, other than one of the ash-trays rescued from a neighbour's garden! Repairs to the slates are in hand, and should be sorted out by the time you read this.

Now half-way through the 6-Nations rugby, we have had a few busy weekends. Also, we have been staying open later on Friday and Saturday evenings, so after a relatively quiet December/January things are picking up now. We've hosted our last darts match of the season and, I think, there's one more euchre match to host. There are no more league football matches scheduled now, but there will probably be a couple of cup matches - so maybe we'll see some "silverware" on the shelf soon?

There are a couple of other regular activities recently started - Mary Keeley runs a monthly Book Club on the second Tuesday of each month and Nicky Jose and Angela Agutter are organising an Evergreen Club on Wednesday afternoons starting on 16th March. Please contact the organisers for further details.

So, as we draw to the end of the Winter season we start planning for our May Festival and looking ahead to the Summer! As you will have probably noticed, the Late May Bank Holiday is actually in June this year and includes the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Also we have celebrations of our own as Jake and Emma are getting married on the 3rd June. So, on the Recreation Ground, the weekend looks like this:

- 1. Thursday 2nd June nothing organised by us, but the Rec is available if anyone wants to use it. We will probably open the bar in the evening unless that clashes with other organised events.
- 2. Friday 3rd June Jake and Emma's wedding. This is a not a "public" event.
- 3. Saturday 4th June This is our "One-Day" May Festival. The bar will be open and there will be live music in the afternoon and evening. Sideshows, food, and other activities are being arranged

- more information nearer to the date.

4. Sunday 5th June - Village Jubilee Celebrations, so nothing organised by us.

Obviously this is still at an early stage of planning so the details may change!

Also we are starting to look ahead to planning Summer events. The plan is to book bands for a few Saturday evenings in July and August, trying to avoid clashing with other events. Hopefully I will be able to report dates and bands booked in next month's Gazette.

Oh, yes, talking of advance planning - our Firework Display is booked for Saturday 5th November! Make a date in your diary!

We have a few projects on the go at the moment. We are still waiting to get the kitchen sink relocated (back to where it was originally!) so we can finally fit some new work surfaces and shelves. We are going to fit short sections of fences and gates to close off the space behind the Pavilion (it worries me when I see children running round the back - there are unexpected steps and other hazards!). We will be installing some low-level lights along the driveway, to make it safer to walk in the dark evenings. We are hoping to fit some swing-doors between the main room and the lobby in front of the toilets, and a sight screen in the "gents" loo. Also, a couple of notice-boards inside and a new sign-board by the main entrance (surprising how many people say they don't know how to find us! Although, the new "bar open/closed" sign helps). We have decided it's about time we got some new chairs - the ones we have were all given to us (half from Sea Acres and the rest from Mullion Golf Club) but they are looking a bit shabby now. None of these projects are particularly expensive, so no additional fund-raising is needed. A bigger project we are starting to plan is the completion of the surfacing of the patio in front of the Pavilion. We are also looking into covering it over with a temporary or permanent awning, so we can use it as an enclosed extension to the main bar for events in the Winter (or, indeed, all year round) - this will be an expensive project, so we will be looking for grant funding - but it's at a very early stage yet.

On the subject of projects - the Parish Council has kindly supplied a couple of cycle hoops - so if you wish to come to the Rec by bicycle, there is now somewhere secure to park them.

I think that's about all for the time being. many thanks for your continuing support,

Rector's Ramblings

w do we handle temptation? "I can resist everything but temptation" – so said Irish poet and playwright, Oscar Wilde. It's a good quote to remember as we begin our Lenten observance!

During Lent we remember Jesus' experience in the wilderness (*Matthew 4:1-11*), when 'he was led by the Spirit ... to be tempted by the devil.' Temptation is a test of obedience: whether we do things our way or God's way. After 40 days of fasting Jesus was tired, hungry and vulnerable. Like him, the Devil/Satan will attack us at our most vulnerable moments, especially during these past two years and this pandemic.

Satan's first temptation was for Jesus to turn stones into bread. Jesus' ministry, though, was not about meeting his own needs, but being nourished by God's Word. 'We do not live by bread alone but by every word that comes from the mouth of God' *(Deuteronomy 8:3).* Like Jesus, we are called to make God our priority and trust Him completely.

Satan's second temptation was for Jesus to put God to the test. Yes, for sure, jumping off the Temple pinnacle would have been a dramatic way for Jesus to gain popularity, but this is not God's way! 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.' (*Deuteronomy 6:16*). We too need to learn this lesson!

The third temptation was for Jesus to worship Satan, so the Devil took Jesus to a mountain to offer him worldly power. In contrast, Jesus' calling as the Messiah was to be marked by suffering and honouring God. 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve Him only' (*Deuteronomy 6:13*). This is often our experience in living for God rather than worldly 'idols'.

How to handle temptation? By letting Jesus stand with us in our temptations. As we claim the promises of Scripture, we will find strength in the power of the Spirit and the victory of the Cross.

'If you look at the world, you'll be distressed. If you look within, you'll be depressed. But if you look at Christ, you'll be at rest!' (*Corrie ten Boom; writer; 1892-1983*).

THE LIZARD LIFEBOAT VISITOR CENTRE NEWS

If, historically, New Year has been the busiest of periods for the lifeboats of the Lizard, then the month of March has, again historically, been the busiest of months.

Carrying over 400 passengers and crew as well as 12,000 tons of cargo valued at £400,000, the ss Suevic left Australia on 2nd February 1907 bound for Liverpool. On the 17th March, as the ship approached the Cornish coast, she became severely hindered by a violent gale, extremely rough seas and dense fog. Seeing the beam of the Lizard Lighthouse and thinking it was some 10 miles distant, the captain powered ahead at full speed and ran aground on the Maenheere Reef just off Lizard Point. After the engines were shut down, flares were launched and the alarm raised, starting a most incredible rescue operation that involved 4 lifeboats, lasted over 16 hours and which saved the lives of 456 people. Everyone



on board the stricken vessel (including 50 babies) were safely brought to shore - an incredible of skill. strenath and feat indeed. commitment The Cadgwith Lifeboat, 'Minnie Moon' rescued 227 people, the Lizard boat 'Sir George Back' saved 167, Coverack's boat 'Constance Melanie', 44 and the Porthleven lifeboat, 'John Frances Wright' It was a truly remarkable 19. rescue operation and still ranks as No. 1 in the RNLI's all-time list of lives saved in one 'shout'

On the 3rd March 1921, the (then) new motorised Lizard Lifeboat, 'RNLB Frederick H Pilley', was called for her first 'Shout' to assist Cont.... The Lizard Lifeboat Visitor Centre News cont....

the Admiralty Drifter, 'HMS Gloaming'. The vessel had run aground on the ledges off Lizard Point at full speed and the resultant impact threw those crew member who were asleep from their bunks to the cabin floor. Rocket lines were fired from the cliffs but the distance was too great and it was left to the lifeboat to rescue the entire ships complement of 15 and take them to safety. Later in the morning, the rescued crew members were taken out to their parent ship, 'HMS Pandora' of the First Submarine Flotilla, which was on passage from Pembroke to Portland.

A year later, on 13th March 1922, the 'Frederick H Pilley' launched shortly before noon in response to an SOS message picked up by the Land's End Wireless Station. The coxswain was informed that a vessel was in distress some 22 miles to the south and the lifeboat launched into an easterly gale and very heavy seas. After two hours of arduous searching, the lifeboat found the cargo steamship 'Depute Henri Durre' lying with a heavy list due to her cargo shifting in the storm. The ship's master asked the lifeboat to stand by but ignored the coxswain's advice to seek shelter and continued to steam up the Channel, rolling dangerously. After a short period of escorting the ship, the master just dismissed the lifeboat with a mere wave of his hand!!

On the 27th March 1935, the Lizard Lifeboat, Watson Class 'RNLB DUKE OF YORK', was tasked to support the French steam trawler 'Le Vieux Tigre' which was fishing out of Boulogne. The vessel had become stranded at Bass Point in dense fog with her stern wedged between rocks and the tide beginning to cover her. On arrival at the scene, 'RNLB DUKE OF YORK' immediately took off 13 crew and two dogs from the stricken trawler but 5 crew members would not leave at that time. The lifeboat stood by throughout the night in dense fog. When the five crew who had refused to leave finally decided to put off in their own boat, the fog was so thick that they were at once lost to view. After an extensive search, the lifeboat found the boat, took the five crew aboard and returned to the Polpeor Station at 0645 on the 28th March. By high water at 0900 that morning, the trawler was virtually submerged save for her funnel and masts. Salvage was impossible and the vessel was a complete loss with parts of her spread over a wide area of the sea bed.





The Lizard RNLI Lifeboat Station

Monday 24th January 2022 - RNLB Rose launched on service at 12.44pm following a mayday call. A lone kayaker had fallen from his vessel and was able to call for immediate help as he was very sensibly carrying a hand held VHF radio. The lifeboat launched promptly and was in the water within 10 minutes of the initial page at 12.34pm. A Merlin helicopter from RNAS Culdrose on routine exercise also heard the call and proceeded to airlift the casualty to safety where he was taken to hospital for precautionary checks. The lifeboat continued to the scene just off Coverack and recovered the kayak from the sea. Thankfully the casualty retrieved his kayak from the station later that day and is fit and well. An excellent prompt response from lifeboat, shore and helicopter crews with a very successful outcome.

We are always looking to seek new volunteers to join our Fundraising team and Visitor Centre situated within the station. Gardening in March by David Endean

As I write this article, we are between storms Dudley and Eunice, something that we are eminently used to, but we have come through an unusually benign winter this year, so this is somewhat an unwanted

departing gift from winter really. Luckily there is not much young growth breaking to get damaged in the winds.

Well March is the time I really get going for seed sowing in the greenhouse, this year more than ever before the great peat debate is rearing its head. With all domestic use of peat in composts set to be banned by the government by 2024 and commercial use to end by 2030ish and the usual compost harder to get hold of, what will you be sowing your seeds into this year? I have always been an advocate of peat based seed and potting composts and I wrote an essay and presentation on this subject back in my university days. A good peat-based seed compost is really hard to beat as a substrate peat is ideal as it retains moisture well and nutrients and is generally sterile which is vital for seed sowing. The alternatives have generally been coarse, very free draining and struggled to retain moisture, often poorly sterilised, but the biggest downfall and what generally rules life is that the alternatives have just been too expensive. Money is always the biggest driving factor in all walks of life, however good people's intentions are.


To this effect this season I am trialling a peat free alternative alongside my usual trusted peat-based compost. It must be said that some brands of regular compost are not great. The peat free compost I will be using is made by Melcourt and has an RHS accreditation and is sold locally. I understand that it is more free draining than my usual compost and I am prepared to have to feed the plants more in it as this is a known problems with the peat free alternatives. The companies are going to have to reformulate their plant food to accommodate this I feel. I will keep you updated how I get on, this change in compost use is not a new phenomenon: a generation or more back prepared composts were not so readily available and gardeners of old had their own mixes which were loam based and had leaf mould and other bits in. Some people still like this idea but they could vary a lot and making them sterile so you had no weed seed and diseases in them was not easy to the home gardener. The pre-prepared peat based compost in-Cont. creased germination success. I must say I have never advocated these peat-based composts to be used as soil conditioners, truly this is a waste of resources and expense when cheaper alternatives which in my opinion do a superior job exist. Using well-rotted farmyard manure, leaf mould or garden compost, is better as peat in its elf has no nutritional value to the plant and weed seed is less of an issue as there will be a natural seed bank in the soil that you are mixing up which you will have to contend with also. The only time to consider its use in this way is for ericaceous plants when you are looking to keep a low pH, but the use of sulphur chips can help with this.

Perhaps you read this more for jobs to do, so I will try to give you some before I run out of my allotted space. Now is the time to prune back shrubs like the dogwoods and willows which are grown for their coloured stems. These are most pronounced on the young growth so regular pruning helps to keep the bushes young and vibrant looking and also neatly contained as they grow fast and can sprawl around and smother some of your other garden goodies. Those winter flowering heathers will be sadly coming to an end soon now so as the flowers fade get the shears out and trim the bushes lightly to remove the old flowers. This will help to keep the bush compact and not too woody as they do not regenerate well from old wood. I really do like winter flowering heathers - they are good doers in my book cheerful over a very long period in the winter, robust as long as they are not shaded and more tolerant of a higher pH than their summer flowering brethren.

I will be sowing my tomatoes in the greenhouse this month as I find this is always early enough and some early crops of lettuce, cabbage, spring onions, beetroot radish and carrots undercover. Out in the veg patch, ground preparation will take place in earnest ready for my Sweetpeas to be planted out in April. Also, if I can I like to plant out my onion sets later in the month if the weather allows. This year I will be using my tried and tested varieties of Sturon and Red Baron once again. I have said it many times before, but you really have to take advantage of the weather windows in March as we normally get a spell when the soil becomes ideal then the weather changes and it can be a month before we get back there again.

Well, I better stop now before the editor cut me off. All it leaves me to say is enjoy your gardening and hope to see you at the spring flower show in the village hall.


