Rector's Ramblings

ow do *you* receive up-to-date news of what's going on around the world? The radio? TV? Newspapers? Social media? Turn the clock back 80+ years and you would have been able to tune-in to the BBC Home Service on the wireless: *"This is the BBC Home Service; here is the news....."*. Now, on the BBC's website you can have 'Breaking' or 'Live' news.

Television, of course, was something of a game-changer: events happening around the world were brought right into our homes - for better or for worse. Meanwhile, newspapers were still an important outlet to people who didn't have a TV or weren't home for The News on the wireless. *"Eeev'nin' Stan'ard'"*, was the cry from newspaper sellers on street corners across London, as office workers left their places of work to return home. The Evening Standard might have been several hours out-of-date in terms of news, but it gave commuters on trains, buses and tubes a chance to have some idea of what was going on in the world.

The Good News of Jesus' birth was told first to some shepherds on a hillside outside Bethlehem. Not for them the Internet, e-mails, social media, mobile 'phones. The Lizard RNLI Lifeboat Station



Saturday 12th November - Our crew were paged at 12.33pm to immediately assist the Cadgwith fishing vessel "Crig A Tana" in a position of 6 nautical miles south east of Lizard Point. An EPIRB (Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon) alert had been identified by Falmouth Coastguard indicating that the vessel was in immediate distress. Following a prompt launch and under the command of Second Coxswain Darren Thirlaway, RNLB Rose proceeded to the position given by the coastguard. Upon arrival on scene a search of the area began and within a few minutes the crew had sighted a red flare in the distance. RNLB Rose went straight to the position of the flare and it was then that a life raft was sighted. Thankfully the raft contained the two crew of the "Crig A Tana" who had been forced to abandon their vessel prior to its sudden sinking. Sadly there was no sign of the stricken vessel on scene. Following transfer from the life raft to the lifeboat it was ascertained that both crew were shaken but unharmed and in no need of medical assistance. Relieved family and friends were at the station awaiting the lifeboats return. HM Coastguard rescue helicopter and the Mullion Coastguard Rescue team were also in attendance. A difficult service for our station as the crew of the "Crig a Tana" are also members of our lifeboat crew. We are so very grateful for Brett and Callum's safe return.

Monday 14th November - RNLB Rose launched on service at 11.25am to go to the assistance of a passenger carrying vessel just off Lizard Point which was on passage from the Isles of Scilly to Falmouth for a winter refit. The vessel had developed a problem with its prop shaft and was taking in a small amount of water. RNLI Lifeboat 17-27 was on passage from St Mary's, Isles of Scilly and was standing by prior the RNLB Rose's arrival on scene.

Following consultation with the skipper, it was ascertained that the vessel was still able to make its own way and it was not necessary to attach a tow. The amount of water coming in to the vessel was closely monitored and the

lifeboat crew were ready with their salvage pump if the need had arisen. Under the command of Coxswain Dan Atkinson, RNLB Rose and her crew very slowly escorted the vessel in to Falmouth, arriving there shortly before 4pm. The Lifeboat arrived back at her station in Kilcobben Cove just after 6pm and was made ready for service again when required.

Dog Ban on the Rec

In a recent meeting the Rec Committee voted on a resolution to ban dogs completely from the recreation ground and pavilion bar. This has been an ongoing problem for many years. Well who knows what this winter will bring? They tell us that we are still desperately short of water and basically it needs to rain every day from now

until next summer to get back to where it needs to be. We have had about a foot so far so who knows the ground is far from sodden but it is beginning to get muddy out and about.

Well we have 2 months of jobs in one issue here but due to lack of day length and impending poor weather we are likely to have less than the usual month to do it all in, so luckily very little of it is really pressing. Any time over the next couple of months is fine to trim or prune deciduous trees shrubs and hedges. Things like beech or field maple hedges can be cut back and neatened up. Apple and pear trees can be pruned. I do not advise pruning for pruning sake. It is important in young fruit trees to get a structure but with mature specimens they will have got into their own rhythm and will need very little more than the removal of dead, dying or damaged branches. Now is the time to do some major surgery if really necessary, like branches in the way or crossing and beginning to rub. On the young trees aim to have an open centre to the bush and shorten all the remaining growth back to three of this year's buds.

If you have any spring bulbs which you have yet to plant, it's best to get on with it, as they will not keep if they are not planted and they will just be wasted. Plant them in some good soil so that the top of the bulb is covered to a depth at least twice as deep as the depth of the bulb itself. So if the bulb is 2 inch from top to bottom you will need a hole six inches deep so that 4 inches of soil will cover it. I know a few years ago I found myself planting daffodils on New Year's day, they may have flowered a little later but who really cares about that.

Late December is the traditional time to plant your shallots, planting on the shortest day and harvesting on the longest, but truth be told they do perfectly well from a later planting. If you are going to try it I suggest starting them off in pots under cover in the greenhouse or cold frame, not to protect them from the cold but more from the winds and getting too sodden. Talking about getting a head start you can sow some broad beans at any time over the next few months; once again I suggest undercover using an autumn sowing variety. You will need to give them some protection from vermin - those little mice are veracious eaters and truly the best answer is a little nipper mouse trap. In January I like to tidy up the indoor grape vines. This is a good job to do even if the weather is poor, but keep out of the greenhouse if it is windy - it is not worth the risk. The main job to do is to prune all those whippy growths from last year right back to a single bud - this will form your fruiting spur off your main rod (this is the main stem which you have trained along the supports in the greenhouse). It is often advised to remove as much of that rough pealing papery bark as possible to expose and remove any lingering pests. Then go around the greenhouse and collect up the debris, which makes ideal fuel for a bonfire. This is the time to use a garden disinfectant to wash the glass of the greenhouse and help kill off any lingering bugs. Doing it in January makes sure that the vine is dormant so that very little damage is likely from the disinfectant and there will not be any sap bleeding from the cut stems.

Your lawnmower is less likely to be needed for a while so why not take the opportunity to get it serviced, which could well save a lot of swearing next year when it does not start .

I am off to put my feet up by the fire, peruse a catalogue and dream of summer days enjoying gardening.

THE LIZARD LIFEBOAT VISITOR CENTRE NEWS

Inevitably, this time of the year brings with it, busy, difficult and often dangerous conditions to challenge all lifeboats and crews at the 238 RNLI Stations located around the British Isles. As a timely and stark reminder of this, we shall, of course, shortly be marking the 41st anniversary of the tragic loss of *RNLB SOLOMON BROWNE* and her crew on the 19th December 1981. Our thoughts on the 19th will be with Penlee and all of those affected by that awful tragedy.

The potential for difficult operational and climatic conditions are accepted as the 'norm' by all of our crews. Over the years since the Lizard Lifeboat was established in 1859, the boats and crews of the local lifeboat stations have had their share of the challenges that these emergency situations bring with them and they have become a way of life to all crew members.

A tragic 'shout' occurred further afield on 10th December 1886, whilst the Hamburg barque 'Mexico' was en route from Liverpool to Guayaquil, Ecuador carrying a mixed cargo. She was caught in a violent gale and, amidst very heavy seas and snow showers, she ran aground on the perilous sandbanks in the Ribble Estuary. Lifeboats were launched from Lytham, St Annes and Southport in an attempt to rescue the stranded crew.

RNLB EMILY FERNLEY from Southport and RNLB LAURA JANET from St Annes were the first boats to launch but, tragically, they both capsized in the dreadful conditions and 27 of the 29 crew perished. The third boat, RNLB CHARLES BIGGS, was launched from Lytham on its maiden rescue and, after rowing $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles through the most awful waters, shattering three oars and filling with water numerous times, was able to save the 'Mexico's' 12 crew members.

This rescue remains the worst loss of crew in a single incident in RNLI history and left 16 widows and 50 children without fathers. A public appeal was launched to support those tragic widows and orphans which attracted, amongst many others, donations from Queen Victoria and Kaiser Wilhelm. Building on this support, an 1891 appeal in the north of England raised £10,000 in just two weeks and, in the same year, Sir Charles Macara and his wife Marion organised the first LIFEBOAT SATURDAY. Taking place in Manchester, this was the first recorded charity street collection and raised over £5,000 for the RNLI. Marion Macara formed a Ladies Guild to help organise street collections and within 10 years more than 40 Ladies Guilds had sprung up around Britain and Ireland. As a consequence of this, the RNLI's income doubled; the forerunners of today's fundraisers and fundraising activities were established and part of the operation of the RNLI had changed for ever.

The scheme is run by volunteers, is open to all, and currently operates locally in Helston, Mullion and Ruan Minor (although the Community Larder is a national initiative). **CONSIDERED** the Council's involvement and potential partners/facilities that could be of use to the initiative. **RESOLVED** to support the initiative and allow the group to make temporary use of the former bus shelter when in Ruan Minor for distribution (it is unsuited for use as storage). It was made clear that the Council have a project to make improvements to the bus shelter and it was understood that any use of the shelter should not hinder the development planned. Cllrs Scolding/S Collins. Unanimous.

PA22/07842: Application for conversion of two redundant barns into two residential units with a single storey extension to unite the barns around an existing central courtyard. Associated landscaping works including resurfacing and planting to courtyard, the reinstatement of existing stone walls around a new open air swimming pool and pool house. Elizabeth Norris. Redundant Barns Gwendreath Farm Gwendreath Ruan Minor TR12 7LZ

The Council supported the previous application on this site which used the existing footprint and existing buildings in, what was essentially a sympathetic renovation of derelict agricultural barns around a central courtyard. The Council, however, objected to this current application on the following grounds: the additional buildings /development constitute a threat to the local environment as habitat will be lost to the new buildings, and trees will inevitably be under threat of felling - firstly because the felling of trees will open up a sea view and it is felt this is likely to be pursued, and secondly because excavation work for the new forms, particularly the swimming pool, presents a significant risk to roots. Further, the aesthetic considerations within the AONB are not properly considered or mitigated by the development. It is felt the development is simply a step too far and would appear as an alien intrusion in this coastal landscape. There is confusion within the application as to whether this is for residential or holiday use, and also how many families will be occupying the buildings. Multiple families on holiday would have significant impact of other neighbouring properties not only through noise generated but also vehicular movements in this guiet location. Proposed, seconded. Unanimous.

From the Gazette Archives 30 Years Ago - December 1992 / January 1993

A reference in a previous Gazette to the "Watch House Trading Post" being a tea-shop before the war stirred **John Drew**'s memory, as follows.

The proprietor, the late Miss Nita Cohen and her friend from the The Lizard ran the tea room under what must have been rather spartan conditions, hardly meeting the present EEC regulations where rules regarding hygiene are concerned! My job was to call around the back after school to pick up the buckets of "slops", carry them down through the "steamers" house and tip them into the incoming sea. Of course, I was always glad when the tide was high! I would have to return at 6 o'clock to do the same thing and my reward at the end of my 7 day stint was 2/6d! Cream teas were very popular, especially at week-ends, but I used to find Saturdays a bit of a chore and sometimes I would turn up late and Miss Cohen would be very cross. I didn't like going after Sunday School in my best clothes either, and one Sunday "Jarvis" Stephens, Gladys Bennett's father, gave me a good telling off because of the pollution I was causing on a Sunday. I looked across at he river with the smell and flies and wondered what all the fuss was about, but he had made his point. My second call on a Sunday had to be well before 6 o'clock so that I could get to chapel on time. Unfortunately

Miss Cohen had competitors in the Cream Teas business. Up around the Todden corner Olive Rogers and her sister Gertie Lamrick sold milk, cream etc., and served teas at Kinsale Cottage. Their balancing scales were an archaic museum piece and any container was balanced the other side with weights, pebbles, bits of vegetable etc. before the delicious farm cream from their own cows at Ledra Farm was measured out to the correct weight. If Miss Cohen ran out of cream I had to go to Ledra Cottage, as it was called then, and say it was for my "mother". Of course, the inevitable happened and one day my pretence backfired and my mother also sent me for a ¼ of cream. There were ructions and Olive and Gertie were furious. I would never have believed that a bit of cream could have caused such trouble!!

l daresay it was the war which put an end to those "Halcyon" summer cream tea days but they are good to recall.

Sadly, the last of the 95-year old Macrocarpa trees in Prazegooth Lane has come down. It happened on Sunday 23rd September at 9.15 a.m. I didn't hear it, but Paul Racey opposite did, and Steve Holyer heard it in Ledra Close.
