



Brilliant news - we can announce we have reached the half way point in our appeal to rebuild the roof of St Grade Church. Since the Appeal started cost estimates have risen from £100,000 to £140,000 but we are thrilled to be able to announce that the current total of funds raised or pledged is now a fantastic £70,800.

This will still be an uphill struggle as average grants awarded for projects such as this are not high. News from easyAccessibility Ltd.

RoomMate®

I am often asked how RoomMate® is coming along since my wife, Helen, suddenly passed away over 18 months ago. Helen was the driving force behind RoomMate®, which is an audio descriptive device for visually impaired people to help them navigate their way around a disabled public toilet. Since we won Top Customer Excellence in the 2019 National Rail awards, we achieved much interest and orders came in from rail companies across the country.

I had always taken a back seat with the business and after losing Helen, her daughter Sarah decided to take the business on. Sarah is a full-time nurse in the Accident and Emergency department at Derriford Hospital so this was a real undertaking for her, but she was very keen to keep RoomMate® going as a tribute to her mum. She was having serious health problems herself at the time, so it was extremely brave of her to take it on. We had to try and get into Helen's laptop, without knowing any passwords, but with help from some very clever friends locally, this was achieved and the business continued. RoomMate® does not need any advertising as it seems to sell itself, and the orders have continued to come in. The units are manufactured in Falmouth, and we are currently developing and testing a new sensor which triggers the unit.

HuJu All Terrain Cane Tip

I have recently started a new project, mainly to keep me busy in the winter! As most of you know, I am totally blind and use a white cane, and I've always had problems with the available tips. The bottom tip of the cane scrapes along the ground, and takes the place of your eyes as it is your only real contact with what you are about to walk over or into. I rely entirely on what I feel and hear with the cane tip, so the tip must have very good audible feedback to recognise what it is in contact with.

All the available tips on the market seem to me to have a restricted use, the main problem being that they dig into anything like a pothole or gap between paving slabs etc. I came up with a new design which looks a bit like a ski tip. I had some prototypes made so that I could have them tested before possibly having them manufactured to sell. I selected about 20 visually impaired people around the country to test them and the feedback was very encouraging. One well-known visually impaired blogger tested the

tip for over 400 miles of walking over all different terrain and called it "an awesome game changer".

I decided to have the first hundred tips manufactured and found a small company in Leedstown who would do it for me. I began to sell it on my website, but in the meantime sent a few examples to the Royal National Institute for the Blind for testing. After extensive and exhaustive testing by them, they decided to start selling the tips for me on their website. The tip is marketed under the name HuJu All Terrain Cane Tip. The name comes from my two grandsons, Hugo and Jude.

Although these tips are manufactured for me on a CNC milling machine, each one has to be bent to the right shape with heat. I made up a wooden jig and currently bend each tip, using a kettle and a heat gun! I soon realised that I needed help with producing the packaging and posting off orders, so I enrolled my daughter, Sammy, and she has taken over this job and now basically runs the business for me.



In November, the RNIB ordered 30 tips, followed a week later by another order for 25 and then just before Christmas another 75! As I write this in early January, they have just ordered yet another 75 so presumably the HuJu is proving to be in demand.

So, every time it rains, which is very often at the moment, I get out my kettle and heat gun, and get bending. I just need to make sure that it doesn't interfere with my fishing in the summer!

The Lizard RNLi Lifeboat Station

Monday 2nd January - Our first service launch of 2023 came on Monday 2nd January at 2.58pm when our crew pagers sounded. Under the command of Coxswain Dan Atkinson RNLB Rose launched on service to go to the assistance of a 23ft angling vessel suffering from complete engine failure. With two people on board and in a position of 3 miles south east of Coverack, RNLB Rose arrived on scene and an assessment of the best course of action was carried out. As the vessel was becalmed it was decided to attach a tow and take it back to its mooring in St Mawes. Arriving there shortly before 5pm the vessel was safely placed on its moorings and RNLB Rose made the return journey home arriving back at the station just after 6pm.



Thursday 12th January - Our crew were paged at 7.25pm on Thursday 12th January following a Mayday call received by Falmouth Coastguard. A prompt launch saw RNLB Rose proceeding to a Newlyn based fishing vessel with 5 persons on board in an approximate position of 30 nautical miles south of Lizard Point. The vessel was taking in water and its bilge pumps were not working. Coastguard helicopter 924 was also tasked and was making its way to the scene.

With sea conditions described as poor, RNLB Rose steadily made her way to the position until it was confirmed that the fishing vessel crew had repaired their bilge pumps and were able to manage the ingress of water themselves. This allowed the lifeboat and Coastguard helicopter to be stood down to return to their respective stations. Arriving back at Kilcobben Cove shortly after 9.15pm, RNLB Rose was rehoused and made ready for service again when required.

- If the volunteers behind the bar are run off their feet, grab a few empties on your way up to the bar
- If you notice the toilet roll has run out then notify a volunteer, or even better replenish from the cupboard yourself
- If you or your children make a mess somehow, then give the volunteers a hand cleaning it up
- See something that needs fixing then tell a volunteer or consider how you could help fix the problem.
- Be patient. Remember this is not a business and people who are volunteering are doing it in their own time and will step away if it becomes too difficult.

We know you spend your hard-earned cash in the bar and deserve to relax and enjoy it, but in the end this is a

community building run by volunteers and the more the community can take ownership of this asset and help out, the better it will be.

As I mentioned earlier, a recent financial review showed that the Pavilion costs just under £500 per week minimum to run.

The committee are trying to find ways to reduce this by cutting energy consumption where possible. However, in the next few weeks the committee will be reviewing bar prices to keep these in line with the rises in the cost of buying our products.

With all that said, we have lots to look forward to. The Cornish Food Hub will be serving food from our kitchen every Friday evening for you to enjoy at the

Pavilion or in your home. With a varied menu and a kid's option it is well worth sampling their delicious food.

On most Saturdays from now until the end of March, we will also be hosting the Smashed Tomatoes Pizza Van (from 5:00pm to 8:00pm or later depending on demand). This is great timing as the Six Nations start at the beginning of February. The perfect way to enjoy the rugby with a beer and a pizza!





Gardening in February

by David Endean



As I write this bit of informative nonsense the first snowdrops have dripped and the first of the snow for 2023 has dropped. February is an odd month, a good job in many ways that it is the shortest. It is a month to either finish off those winter jobs that you haven't had either the time or the inclination to do, or it is a time to try and get a bit of a head start with the first of the spring jobs.

This month I am going to sow my Sweetpeas, I pre-germinate these on damp tissue paper before potting them individually to grow on. They are germinated in an old ice cream container in the warmth of my bedroom before they are moved to the cold greenhouse once potted up. This is absolutely fine as a few years ago the top half inch of the pots froze solid but the seedling were fine. Your biggest worry is from mice and the only real answer is a little nipper mouse trap or a dozen. If you use a non-lethal trap the mice only return, poison is not instant so they still may eat your seedlings and you're not sure if you have got them and what else may be affected if they eat them. As with all seeds it is vital that you label the pots as you will invariably fail to remember exactly which varieties are in which pots.

I still have greenhouses to clear out and wash down as well as more pots to clean to start the seed sowing season off. Generally, for the flowerpots they are washed in hot soapy water, but for the greenhouse and staging I use hot water and Jeyes fluid. I also use a finger of plastic cut from a shampoo or washing up liquid bottle to get between the sheets of glass. Then this is followed by a sulphur candle which is lit and left over night.

I plan to start off my shallots in pots in the greenhouse, they will be planted in 4in square pots using multipurpose compost, I have two varieties this year, a French long shallot which I have grown for a few years now, from stock that a friend gave me originally. Plus some other standard shallots which looked good in the supermarket ,grown in the UK, so they should be suitable to grow here. I will also make the first of my successional sowing of broad beans using the variety superaquadulce. This will also be in pots in the cold greenhouse. They will take 2 or 3 weeks to germinate and once that happens I will make the next sowing.

I also hope to get a head start with some salad sowings, a pinch of lettuce seed in a pot of fresh compost for pricking out a few weeks later plus I will make some broadcast sowings of lettuce in boxes for some quick salad leaves. For these broadcast sowings I will

fill boxes with spent compost which I will add some fertiliser. At this time of year it will take around 5 weeks to get a crop. I plan to do a similar thing for some radish. I will also sow some spring onions in modules and some pointed cabbage in pots to be pricked out later.

Now is a really good time to plant shrubs especially evergreens. They should get away quite quickly as the warmer days appear and we have cut out a lot of the days of damaging salty winds which dehydrate and burn the plants, sometimes they even rip the leaves off the bushes. The damage is done because the plants cannot draw up water fast enough as the root system has not developed well enough. I have a place where the old escallonia is shot and needs replacing. I would never recommend planting escallonia now as it suffers from a fungal disease which after a few years sees it off. I fancy putting a yew hedge there so now is the time to get on with it.

I have some weeding to do around the daffodils this will help to deter the slugs and snails I don't want any damage as they will be destined for the Spring Show in March. There are some chrysanthemum cuttings to take plus some perennial bedding cuttings to take from stock plants that I have managed to over winter.

I hope that this has given you a few ideas for jobs in the garden, enjoy your gardening. Oh, by the way happy New Year!


