Rector's Ramblings Before the Cross

aster is coming, as it does every year. What will it mean for you this year? What can I possibly write that will say more that Jesus spoke that first Easter?

How many Easters have there been? For me it's at least 40, and every one of them personal. I can't remember my first one, or what I thought or felt. It is hard to remember who I was then it seems so long ago, but I know that each year for more than forty, I have come to stand again at the foot of that cross.

I know that I am not alone in this; how many others have stood there over the years? Yet there is such a sense that each time it is just me and him. And, as I think about it, it is not just Easter; again and again, I find myself standing there. No matter how I may grow in this Christian life, in success and failure, there is always the cross and Jesus.

Paul's words to the Corinthians keep coming to me; "I have determined to know nothing among you but Christ, and him crucified". Sometimes they seem strange words, surely he would want to speak about his resurrection and living in the freedom of the Spirit. But more and more, I have come to see how right he was. EVERYTHING is here.

- + When I stand before him and his crucifixion, I am utterly empty, no matter what I may have achieved I bring nothing to him ... but, coming to him, I find that I have everything:
- + Where I have failed, I find unfathomable forgiveness, complete cleansing and release and limitless love.
- + In any experience of success or good, I find the sustaining source of all its goodness and meaning an unalloyed and unspoilt, childlike, joy.
- + When my life is shaken and seems to be falling apart, I find unshakeable ground to stand on and unfailing arms to hold me.
- + When I am accused and criticised (even when it is right), I find him arguing my cause with an incontestable defence.
- + When my responsibilities weigh too heavily and my abilities seem to meagre, I find one who bears all things and works all things.
- + When the suffering and needs of loved-ones or the world around me seem too much, I find a healing King to bring them to whether it means healing in this life or bearing safely through the valley of suffering to a greater life.

+ And, when I can't think what to write in an Easter letter, I find one who says it all; Jesus. Is it just me? I don't think so. Come and see for yourself. Around Christ on the cross there is plenty of room. In fact there is space reserved, just for you. You don't even have to wait for Easter and, when Easter is past an gone, this place still remains for you. Yours in Christ. Revd Peter.

NEWS FROM THE VILLAGE HALL

RUAN MINOR VILLAGE HALL Reg. Charity No. 225626

Hello again everybody,

What a wonderful change it has been to see some lovely sunshine and everywhere looks so much better for it, doesn't it? Despite all the dreadful weather we have suffered, the gardens have come through and are beginning to look good again. It's amazing how they cope! The better weather has encouraged our seasonal flowers to flourish which, in turn, also helped provide an excellent Spring Show in the Village Hall on 15th March.

Work in the Hall, as ever, continues at some pace and since I reported last time about the kitchen equipment we had to replace, we have completed the purchase of a new cooker, microwave and toaster. That leaves us with a new refrigerator to get and then we will be up to standard in the catering department! In addition to these purchases we have also completed the replacement of the rear door and fitted a new smoke alarm in the rear ground floor utility room.

One thing we have not been able to do is repair the roof. Despite numerous enquiries we have not been able to find anyone who is able or willing to do it. It is not a huge amount of work, so if anyone knows of a suitable roofing contractor who could do the job for us please let Dave or I know.

Last month I reported that we had received very little response to our request to hear from those who might be interested in taking part in a coach trip. We asked again for anyone interested to get in touch but we have not received a single contact so we must, reluctantly, recognise that this is a no-goer and remove it from our 2014 activity list.

The agenda for the Hall's March Management Committee meeting included the annual review of costs and donations for the use of Hall facilities. As we have said on many occasions, the Management Committee's policy is to keep any charges or suggested donations to an absolute minimum as we feel that this is an essential support to local people and activities. The majority of donations/charges have, once more, been kept at previous levels and the minority which have increased have only been changed to offset the effects of inflation. Some costs like metered electricity and Hall Fees have been kept at the same level as has been in operation for a number of years now. As I have already said, this is a way in which we feel we can best help our local community.

On a serious note and in the chance that the person/s responsible read this edition, we would like to draw attention to an incident of fly-tipping which recently occurred very close to the gate to the rear of the Hall premises. Whoever was responsible left 5 or 6 large sacks of household and decorating rubbish in a pile by the gate but, worst of all, on top of the pile was **a large tub of used rat poison**. This most dangerous substance was left just a few feet from an area regularly used by the Hall's Under Fives Group and in a place which is used as a daily thoroughfare for children walking to and from the Hall and the School and also by villagers out walking their dogs. Fly-tipping is a dreadful thing in any form but to leave such potentially dangerous rubbish about is particularly thoughtless. Fortunately, a call to Cornwall Council met with a quick response and the hazardous material was removed the next day. For everyone's sake, please dispose of all such rubbish in the safe and correct manner!

Gardening in April



I am hoping that the awful winter weather is behind us now. Some of the hedges and trees will take quite some time to recover from that salt burn. In some ways, I have not seen so much wind burn damage since the hurricane force winds of 1990. Our wind speeds may not have reached those of 1990 but it was just the sustained persistent gales which have done the damage. But the weather turned guite benign over the weeks preceding the spring shows and so there has been a lovely display of clean crisp daffodils everywhere in the hedges and in peoples gardens.

My sweet peas will be ready to plant out this month and the ground is prepared well. Open up a trench a spit wide and deep then fill it with well-rotted organic matter and top dressed with some general fertiliser. I then back fill the trench and erect a very substantial framework to train the sweet peas into. These are grown for exhibition but they are equally as good if you erect a wigwam in the flower border and train some up that. It also gives you instant height and structure; if used well you can frame a view or lead your eye through the garden. If you have not sown any seed yet there is still time for a late show of those fragrant blooms.

I am going to have a go at growing some more <u>exotic annual</u> <u>climbers</u> and now is the time to sow them. As they are more tender, they will be started off in the greenhouse and planted out later in a sunny sheltered spot. I have got some Thunbergias by David Endean

(Black eyed susan) Canary creeper, Mina lobata (Spanish flag) and Morning glory. The Morning glory is an unusual form with pink peony shaped flowers. These are all colourful fast growing plants so I will let you know how they do; some of them I have not grown before, so that will be fun.

Work in the flower borders continues with the on-going weeding and the use of a border fork to loosen the soil and work in fertiliser around the herbaceous perennials. The beginning of the month will realistically be your last chance to move and split those herbaceous plants if needed, but it is the ideal time to split and move those beautiful exotic blue agapanthus bulbs. Yes they are bulbs even though often they are evergreen. They can be tender and sulk when moved so doing it in the spring when things are warming up and active growth is about to occur increases your chances of success markedly.

I always include a bit each month on pruning and this month it is the turn of the camellia. These are lovely showy plants and once settled they need very little caring for. The best time to prune them is after they have flowered, but only do this to shape the bush as pruning does nothing to promote flowering. They also need very little in the way of feeding but if you find the leaves seem to be vellowing you are more likely to have some pH problems. If the pH is too high it locks up some of the essential trace elements. The effects of this can be reduced with the use of an ericaceous feed like Miracid.

Also, the application of sulphur chips will reduce the pH and so make those trace elements available once more.

The other group of shrubs that may need some pruning around now are those which flowered this spring: things like the flowering currants <u>Ribes</u> <u>spp and forsythia</u>. These you cut out a third of the old wood once again when the shrub is mature and at the size you require. If they are too big and overgrown, cut them back hard. You may lose the flower for one year but doing it now gives the most chance of flowers in twelve months' time.

The <u>lawns</u> should be growing away well now and I expect you are probably thinking of your third cut of the year. Now you are able to start to lower the blades on the mower. Moss is a big problem in many lawns after the wettest winter on record so the use of a weed



feed and moss killer may well be a good idea. Once the moss has turned black and the weeds are dying back get the scarifying machine to work; this will get out the dead thatch and get air in. The lawn will look a mess for a while but with a warm spring it will soon recover especially with the fertiliser.

Down in the veg patch, there is much to do: sowing and planting comes on fast from now on. It is time to plant out your maincrop potatoes, sow carrots and parsnips and get the onion sets in. There are loads of things to do in the greenhouse but I expect you will be thinking about planting out tomato plants. This can generally be done from the middle of April without too much trouble. Prepare the ground well and, if you are using pots or bags, be very generous with the amount of compost you give them because they are hungry thirsty plants and a good root run will reduce the effect of these problems.

I always like growing cucumbers and if you are going to grow them from seed I advise sowing at the end of the month, otherwise wait until May to buy some plants. Sow them in 3.5 inch pots of good compost - push the seed in edgeways, water and wait. For the best results choose a hybrid variety which is all female. These are temperamental plants and so need warmth to grow quickly and healthily. Any earlier and it would be wasted time and effort because the area where they will be planted will be too cold with the plants getting severely checked or even dying. Bear this in mind also: a good cucumber grown well will produce 50 plus fruit, how much cucumber can you eat?

Well good luck get out there and enjoy your gardening.

The Herbal Medicine Cabinet by Deanne Greenwood BSc (Hons) Herb Med

Sweet violets (*Viola odorata*) have been everywhere through March and should last well into April. They couldn't have arrived at a better time for me, as I had a chest cold and cough, and violets have wonderful demulcent and expectorant properties. There were so many in our garden, I didn't feel guilty gathering a

few handfuls of the flowers and leaves, and making a tea by infusing them in boiling water for 10-15 minutes, before drinking sweetened with honey.

I'll be gathering the ubiquitous chickweed (*Stellaria media*) later this month, as soon as it's looking really lush and vibrant. Chickweed is most commonly used externally to soothe inflamed skin – bites, stings, sunburn, swellings, you name it. I've also found it remarkably effective at relieving eczema, particularly in children. I usually make a cream with it, but you can use a strong infusion (as per Violet tea, above) and add it to your bath water to soothe inflammation. Some of my older patients find this helps relieve rheumatic aches and pains, too.

April is also the month I'll be harvesting the prolific Shepherd's purse (Capsella



bursa-pastoris) to make tincture from. It's one of my favourite and oft-used remedies for women with heavy menstrual periods, sometimes as a result of complaints such as fibroids and endometriosis, or thyroid problems. Herbalists also use it to help prevent heavy nosebleeds, as it contains constituents that constrict blood vessels and possibly speed up blood clotting.

Red clover (*Trifolium pratense*) is another plant that could start flowering by the end of April. It's used to help relieve a wide variety of ailments including coughs, eczema and women's hormonal problems – in fact, it's been promoted as the natural alternative to hormone replacement therapy (HRT)!

Cllr Rule reported that her Community Regeneration Fund is now closed for this financial year but, for anyone wishing to access grant aided funding, the Community Regeneration Team under Emma Ball is available to help on 01872 324807.

Cllr Green proposed that the minutes of 13th January 2014 be accepted with one amendment to insert 'per week' following '20p per household' in the minute headed 'Grass cutting at Glebe Place' Carried 5 votes to 0 with 2 abstentions

7. <u>Planning: PA14/00218 – White House Farm, Ruan Minor</u> The height of the new building was questioned, being 1m higher than White Cottage. However, the building will be obscured by the existing buildings on the adjoining site. Cllr Trewin proposed and Cllr Cooper seconded that the application be supported Carried 5 votes to 1 and 1 abstention

<u>PA14/00396 – Pen-y-Craig, Cadgwith</u> There were reservations on parking and drainage. Two parking spaces for the new dwelling were clarified. Cllr Cooper proposed and Cllr Fleetwood seconded that the application be supported subject to confirmation from South West Water that the drainage connection is satisfactory.

Carried 7 votes to 0

<u>PA14/00571 – Bodrigy Lodge, Cadgwith.</u> A detailed report was received from the County Tree Officer which supported the felling of two trees because of their age and condition subject to similar trees being planted in their place. Cllr Preston

proposed and Cllr Fleetwood seconded that the application be supported with an acknowledgement of the loss to the local amenity and of the replanting scheme. Carried 7 votes to 0

<u>PA14/00548 – Treleague Farm, Ruan Minor.</u> Cllr Green left the meeting for this item. Cllr Preston proposed and Cllr Trewin seconded that the application be supported. Carried 6 votes to 0.

Notice of an appeal against Refusal of Planning Permission was received for Trenoweth, Ruan Minor.

A letter expressing concerns about a Pre-planning Application for a dwelling at Ruminella View, Cadgwith was read out and noted.

<u>St Rumons Church, Ruan Major:</u> The Chairman outlined several actions that had been performed following the letter from the Church Commissioners received at the last Meeting:

• It was confirmed that the churchyard was closed (24.7.91).

- Health/safety concerns about public access have been logged with CC.
- The Chairman had contacted Cornwall Heritage Trust and had received application forms to apply for grant aid, to be forwarded to owners.
- He had also contacted the Churches Conservation Trust. Again, any application for 'help' would need to come through the owners.
- The Chairman has written to the English Heritage architect for advice.
- The Chairman has also spoken to Archdeacon Bill Stuart-White.

• The 'Closed Churches Committee' were due to discuss the matter on 18.02.14. Cllr Cooper offered contact details at Lambeth Palace for advice on grants and funding. She also suggested that the War Graves Commission may be able to help with the up-keep of the war graves in the churchyard. Cllr Freeman felt that the Parish Council should not become the owner of the church but could help with funding and repairs. The Chairman considered that the condition of the tower is the main cause for concern and he would confer with the Archdeacon as necessary. Cllr Cooper suggested that the church should be included in the Council's Right to Buy list.

Play Area: There had been no progress since the last meeting.

<u>New Road spring</u>: The Grade Ruan Community Trust have agreed to fund the cutting back of vegetation so that a trench can be formed to carry the water that is issuing from the spring to a highway drain.
