Blast from the Past: Balloons on the Beach

"Through the Letter-box" by Natalie Allen of Saltash, was published in 1988. The book was compiled from memories of Cornish postal workers and had a section on Cadgwith. The following extract, originally printed in the May 1990 Gazette, gives an account of an incident told to the author in 1987 by Hartley Tripconey's widow.

Mrs Tripconey told me of an incident in which a balloon was wrecked in the sea off Cadgwith in 1870. The balloon was one of 66 manned balloons which took off from the besieged City of Paris on 28 November 1870, during the Franco-German War. It was a brave attempt to keep in touch with the rest of the world and the balloons were loaded with various equipment, also homing pigeons and a quantity of mail. The balloon "Jacquard" with aeronaut "Prince" on board, drifted across the sea and fishermen reported a sighting of it eight miles south of Eddystone Lighthouse. The aeronaut hailed the fishermen in a language they could not understand, then threw out a quantity of ballast and rose again. That was apparently the last sighting of the balloonist for the balloon came down off Cadgwith. Wreckage was seen at Lankidden Cove and the man was assumed to have drowned. On 1st December, four bundles of mail were found by four different people at Cadgwith and taken to Falmouth. Postmaster Newberry Cox of Falmouth was instructed by the Postmaster General to go to Cadgwith to collect the mail washed ashore there. He collected some 1,500 water-logged letters, some for English addresses, but mostly for France, and these were dried out at Falmouth and dispatched. Some items mailed from Parish on 28th November were cancelled at Falmouth on 2nd December and arrived at their destination, St. Malo, on 6th December - remarkable in the circumstances. It is noted that altogether some 3,000 items were recovered from the sea near Cadgwith in the following week.

our main application, as their maximum grant is about £50k. We have to see if we can build our reduced plan within the budget that we can achieve using this size of grant, alongside our other funding. They were talking about getting our application in by the end of April, and being able to start in the Autumn. As we are not in a position to do this with the revised plan, we have asked to defer our application to the next round - in December. We will need to get some detailed costings for the new plans by then and check that SITA is still willing to provide some funds (up to £30k). If we decide that the reduced size pavilion cannot be built for about £100k (the amount we expect to be able to achieve with the backing of both these funds, plus local fundraising) - then we will have to concede that it will not be possible to build a new pavilion for the Recreation Ground.

Gardening in May



The swallows are back and that cold east wind has gone, so hopefully things will move on apace now.

If you have not managed it already, dive into your mixed borders and give them a thorough weed, taking special care to remove those perennial weeds. Work the soil between the plants using a trowel or border fork. You do not need to go too deep - just an inch or two, otherwise you will be damaging the roots of the plants. If you do this work now it will be easier, as the herbaceous plants will not have grown greatly yet but they will be sure to rocket away during May. Apply some slow release fertiliser between the plants not on them as this could scorch them, then work it in a bit. I would use something like Blood, Bone and Fish and add as instructed. Whilst you are rooting around in your borders, it is a good idea to stake those

plants like Achilleas, Astrantias, Alstromerias, Shasta daisies - in fact anything which is tallish and likely to flop with some heavy rain or one of our light airs which the rest of the country would regard as a gale. Staking now should help to prevent a mess later, keeping structure to your border. Things will grow fast at this time of year, so whatever you use to stake will soon be covered up. Now, what to use for staking? This all depends on what you have to hand but a cane and a loop of string are rarely satisfactory. If you have some twiggy prunings they are good, a dome of chicken wire can work or a network of strings between canes works well. I have even seen and used old hanging baskets or lampshades. Once you have done your staking, perhaps a mulch around your plants will help to retain the moisture and suppress the weeds if your mulch is weed/seed free.

Keeping in your borders: if you have any large spaces, you could sow some hardy annuals in the gaps. Things like Candytuft, Love in the mist, Cornflowers or Californian Poppies will happily germinate and grow from sowing in the open ground. Another convenient way is to sow some seed into modules; these then, when large enough, can be planted out and they are initially protected when young from pests and get a head start from the weeds. You could also plant half hardy bedding in those gaps later in the month.

May is the time to sow the more tender beans in you veg garden: things like the Runner Beans and French; be they dwarf or climbing they all need the extra warmth, even cold winds can check them. Last year was cold and wet and I heard of people sowing three or more times before they had any success and then the crop was light. Dig out a good trench and fill with moisture retaining organic matter, add some extra fertilizer and back fill. Put up your framework of poles, then sow the seed or plant the Cont...

plants if you have started them off in pots already.

Hopefully those carrots that you are growing for the show are going away nicely now. When they get large enough to handle with several true leaves you will need to thin them out. Remove all but the strongest plant in each point that you sowed them so each should be 7 inches apart.

May is a manic month with everything growing away furiously, weeds especially, so keep hoeing the newly emerging weed seeds off as they appear. The veg patch will have most things either sowing or planting, but not a great deal harvesting unfortunately. Keep on sowing lettuce, beetroot, radish, cabbage, squashes, marrows, peas, and the like.

In the greenhouse, many of you will be thinking about tomatoes. If you have not done so already, it should be safe enough to plant them out now. You will find the best flavoured and easiest to look after will be plants grown directly in the soil of the green-

house border if it is disease free. But many of you will have no border in the greenhouse, so large pots or grow bags are the answer. The biggest secret to tomatoes is water and feed. They like plenty of both, so I would recommend only planting two tomatoes per grow bag - and get good quality bags. Before you open the grow bags, bash them around a bit so that the compost inside has more air in it and is not too compacted. Then water liberally and feed once they are established and have the first truss of fruit set.

As your spring flowering shrubs finish flowering, now is the time to do some pruning. Best is to remove a third of the oldest stems and tidy up the rest. But, if the shrub is completely out of control, you can go in hard. The types of shrubs to have a go at are lilacs, weigelias, flowering currants and forsythias.

I hope that's given you enough to be going on with get out there and enjoy your gardening.



Rector's Ramblings

 S_{grey} and wet of winter, the wind is now (at the time of writing!) from the west / southwest and the air is milder and now there are visible signs of new growth – the promise of new life and colour.

Of course, daffodils have been blooming for several weeks here in Cornwall; and primroses and violets have already been gracing the grass banks, verges and hedgerows for a while. Yet how lovely it is to see the green (or sometimes bronze) haze of burgeoning new leaves on trees and shrubs, as they emerge from their winter incubation!

Then there's all the activity in the animal world that happens in Spring: hibernators wake from their sleep, perhaps going on a feeding frenzy to replenish their pre-snooze weight and to find a mate; lambs are born; birds begin to court and to build a nest so as to provide a home for this year's young. Seeds that were sown last autumn or earlier this year have now begun to sprout. Spring is definitely a time for new life and for new growth!

Jesus almost always used practical analogies for his teachings so that his listeners could connect and understand. And these analogies are still relevant to us today. Perhaps one of the best-known is that of the Parable of the Sower (*Matthew 13:1-23*). Some of the seeds the farmer scattered landed on the path and were quickly gobbled up by birds; some seeds fell on stony ground where the soil was very thin and although the seeds sprouted, when the sun came up they were scorched and withered because they had no depth of root; some seeds germinated and grew but were soon overgrown, choked by weeds and thorns. Yet some seeds fell on good soil. They sprouted and grew *– and grew*!

Spring can also be a time for our own spiritual growth. Perhaps the seed of faith has only recently been sown in *your* heart and mind? Or maybe you're still looking at the seed packet and wondering, "What? Me?"

Or perhaps you're like many committed Christians who have come to a point where your faith 'seed bed' needs to be turned over a bit – maybe it's become smothered by the busy-ness of life? If so, take time to turn over some of your entrenched 'soil'; cut back/out some of those things which are strangling your spiritual growth; let new life and air into your heart and soul; renew and regenerate your love of Jesus.

For those of you who *are* blessed to be flourishing in good soil: please nurture those around you who are not. Please give 'spiritual' nourishment to those who are struggling, those who are weak and those who are vulnerable – for the love of our Lord Jesus Christ.

News from Bolenowe Horse Sanctuary

There have been lots of changes at Bonaventure Farm the home of the Bolenowe Animal Sanctuary over the last couple of years. New Trustees have joined our committee and given a much needed burst of new energy together with new ideas and plans for the Sanctuary. There will also be a change of name to Bolenowe Horse Sanctuary which is more appropriate as we care for mostly horses and are unable to help with small animals such as rabbits & guinea pigs.

Last September 2012 we had our first Open Day which was a real success with Pony and Carriage Rides, a Dog Agility show, the Celtic Fidlers, lots of stalls and refreshments. This year will see two Open Days at the Sanctuary our first on Sunday 26th May and the other later in September 2013.

Over the last year we have taken on a few more rescue horses and ponies (not as many as we would like to have done) and some out on loan have been returned because of the owners' ill health and for other reasons. So we now see ourselves with a number of horses which could go out on a companion / loan horse basis which would free up space here for us to accept more horses in critical rescue situations. Currently we are very nearly at capacity with 70 horses and ponies to be cared for so we need people to come forward and offer a good and suitable home to one of our rescued horses.

Alternatively, we have an adoption scheme where horses and ponies living at the sanctuary for life can be adopted and where the adopter can come and see their chosen rescue horse on special open days. Adoption costs £10 per year.

Bolenowe sanctuary has a new kitchen (or very nearly) which will be open for refreshments as will the Sanctuary on Sundays only throughout the Summer months. Unfortunately we



do not have the staff or volunteers to look after visitors on other days but on Sundays visitors will be made very welcome.

May 26th 2013 – Open Day at the Sanctuary - 11am to 4pm with live music, fun dog show, shire horses, meet & greet the ponies paddock, refreshments and lots of stalls. See "What's On" for more details.

June 5th 2013 - Sunday Sanctuary Open Day - 10am to 4pm with the Bolenowe Kitchen open also for refreshments. This is the first of our Open Sundays and we will continue, hopefully, until the end of September 2013.

A little more from the Itinerant Seafarer ... By Simon Sugrue

While Sally and I lived In Western Australia, we liked to get away from the Perth area sometimes. During my first sea-going trip to Western Australia on the Shell Tanker TANEA years earlier we had also been to Cocos Island, then a fiefdom of the Klunys Ross family but now part of Western Australia. At that time, Cocos Airport was run by Australians and the boss there, Bill Dyson, became something of a friend. When we finally got to WA to live, we re-established contact with the Dysons and through them we met Arthur and Arla who were sheep farmers in Dumbleyung in the South West of WA.

We went to stay with them for a very long weekend. We were made very welcome, even when we turned on our bedroom light in the middle of the night and, by doing so, started up the farm's generator - we didn't realise that they weren't connected to the grid.

The first day we were there we helped isolate a ram that had reached the end of his useful life. We got the thing cornered and surrounded it, but it made a dash for freedom by charging at David, then aged about two. David had the sense to let it pass. It was cornered again, shot and hung in a barn. A few days later Arthur remembered it, and it was hastily dressed and put onto a revolving stake over the barbeque to cook for a few hours. The well hung and long cooked meat was by far the best we had ever eaten. The six adults and sundry children sat around with beer for the adults and pop for the children and plates of meat for all. By about midnight we had eaten the ram, all the ram. This remains one of the most memorable meals of our lifetime.





Sam Beattie

The Lizard Lifeboat Honorary Secretary who led the wartime raid on St Nazaire

Stephen Halden (Sam) Beattie VC RN (retired) was Honorary Secretary - now called Lifeboat Operations Manager - of the Lizard Lifeboat from 1973 until his death on 24th April 1975. At that time we knew not why he had been awarded the Victoria Cross (VC) and, as you would expect, he never talked about it. After his death however, we discovered that he was the Commanding Officer of HMS *Campbeltown* (an ex-American destroyer) which rammed the dock gates at St. Nazaire in France on 28th March 1942. The reason for this raid was to stop the German Battleship *Tirpitz* and U-boats from using the port from which to launch raids on Allied convoys coming from the USA to Britain with vital supplies.

A small flotilla of 16 motor launches carrying 260 Commandos, and escorted by a motor torpedo boat and the two destroyers -

Atherstone and Tynedale – and HMS Campbeltown packed with 3 tons of explosive, set out from Falmouth on the night of 27th March 1942. On HMS Campbeltown, which had been altered to give the appearance of a German destroyer, Lieutenant–Commander Beattie, together with 353 naval officers and ratings, were able to get within 2 miles of the docks before being challenged. HMS Campbeltown pressed on under heavy fire and rammed the dock gates at full speed. Delayed action fuses had been set and the ship blew up hours later killing almost 400 German troops. The British Commandos and naval personnel suffered

heavy casualties and only 3 of the launches returned to Falmouth. Lieutenant Commander Beattie and 214 of the raiders were taken prisoner for the rest of the war.

For this daring raid Stephen Beattie, together with 4 others, was awarded the VC. In addition there were 2 DSOs; 17 DSCs; 11 MCs; 4 CGMs; 5 DCMs; 24 CSMs; 15 MMs; and 51 Mentioned in Dispatches. Many of these awards were posthumous.

Stephen Beattie retired from the Royal Navy with the rank of Captain and lived his last years in Mullion; he is buried in Ruan Minor churchyard.

cornishchoughbrewery@hotmail.co.uk Tel: 01326 290670 or 290908 The sequel to this story is that 20 years ago on 30th May 1993, when I was a crew member of the Lizard Lifeboat, we were called out on that rough and wild night to a 49ft yawl called *Heptarchy*. My pager woke me at 2am. The wind was storm force with heavy rain and high seas. When I reached the lifeboat station I was told that the casualty was 40 miles out in the Channel (halfway to France) with 10 people on board; I knew that we were in for a rough ride! It took 3 hours to reach the *Heptarchy*, which had been trying to get back to Cornwall from France ahead of the storm. We were experiencing some of the biggest seas I have ever seen with rise and fall of more than 20 ft.

The *Heptachy* was in a sorry state with sails blown out, and the generator had failed during the night. We were about to pass a towline to them when we noticed an enormous wave coming towards us. We had to abandon the tow transfer in order to bring the Lifeboat around to meet the wave head on and climbed what seemed like the side of a cliff to the top. On reaching the crest, we looked down on the *Heptarchy* as if she was a toy in a tank. We eventually managed to connect the tow and took 6 hours to reach the calm of the Helford River.

Later we discovered that the 10 people on board the *Heptarchy* included Captain Beattie's son, daughter-in-law and grandson. So the story of Captain Stephen Halden (Sam) Beattie and his family had a happy ending!

Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 11 March 2013

Present: Councillors P Collins (Chair), J Preston (Vice-Chair), R Curnow, W Elliott, P Freeman, C Cooper, M Fleetwood, J Trewin, N Green and M Alford.

Prior to the Monthly Meeting the Parish Council was addressed by Helen Downing, Development Manager of Cornwall CLT Ltd at 7:00pm. Miss Downing gave a brief overview of the principles of Community Land Trusts, what they are and gave examples of Trusts that are operating locally. She emphasised that Cornwall Community Land Trust is an independent company that is independent from Cornwall Rural Housing Association. She then answered questions from Councillors.

Two members of the public joined the meeting.

The Monthly Meeting commenced at 7:50pm.

1. Absences and Apologies: no apologies were received, but Councillor Alford advised he had to leave the meeting at 9:00pm.

2. Declarations of Interest: no declarations of interest were made.

3. Public Time: potholes by the entrance to Ruan Minor village were raised. It was agreed to discuss this later in the meeting.

Councillor Alford had reported the non-working light at Long Moor which was now repaired and Highways had agreed to adopt it.

A copy of a letter from the Under 5s playgroup was read to those present requesting the Parish Council's support for the playgroup asking the Village Hall Committee to reconsider making the outside area the playgroup had been using safer as it had become unsuitable since alterations had been made to the Village Hall. The Village Hall had offered another area but this would significantly affect the operation of the Playgroup and was potentially in breach of the Ofsted requirements the playgroup had to observe. To be put on the Agenda for the next meeting and the Chair requested that Councillors inspect both areas to avoid confusion when the matter was discussed. It was queried whether any grants were available for a purpose built building for the playgroup.

4. Police Report: PCSO Berry sent her apologies but had forwarded a report to the Clerk as follows: During February there was one crime reported to the Police; the theft from a charity box within the church. There was very little of evidential value and this crime has been filed, however, crime prevention advice has been given. This figure compares with 4 crimes for the same period last year.

In the report last month it was reported the Police were investigating the rape of someone over 16 years of age. PCSO Berry advised that a full investigation was carried out on this crime and the reporting person has since been issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice for wasting Police time and that the rape has subsequently been no crimed.

5. Cornwall Councillor's Time: Councillor Rule had sent her apologies.

6. Minutes for acceptance: the Minutes of the January and February meetings, having been circulated, were signed by the Chair as a true and correct record.

7. Planning: PA13/01213 – Construction of dwelling at Pen Y Craig, New Road, Cadgwith by Mrs Christina Knowles. Councillor Cooper proposed the application be supported, Councillor Green seconded – all in favour. **Resolved: Grade Ruan Parish Council supports this application**

b. PA13/01395 – addition of front porch and larder extension to rear, changes to doors and windows, decking to front, east and rear elevations, roof light to rear and sides at Lethe Place, Cadgwith, Ruan Minor by Christine Brickman. Councillor Preston proposed the application be supported subject to concerns about the vehicular access, Councillor Fleetwood seconded – all in favour. Resolved: Grade Ruan Parish Council supports the principle of the development subject to concerns about the vehicle access. It is felt the width of the vehicle access is disproportionate to the development.

c. PA13/01398 - Demolition of garage/workshop and construction of studio/holiday let at Lethe Place Cadgwith Ruan Minor by Christine Brickman. Councillor Fleetwood proposed the Parish Council object to the application, Councillor Cooper seconded – all in favour. Resolved: Grade Ruan Parish Council objects to this proposal for development as it appears to be significantly larger than the existing building it is proposed to replace and would appear to form a separate dwelling.

d. PA12/08960 – change of land useage, erection of a single garage, installation of 4 Velux style windows and a sun pipe, skylight on pitched roofs, continuation of front wall and erection of gate for access at Ebenezer Chapel, Ebenezer Road, Ruan Minor. This was a resubmission with amended plans. The Chair proposed the application be supported with the same comments as submitted on the original application, Councillor Alford seconded – all in favour. **Resolved: Grade Ruan Parish Council supports this application on condition adequate screening is incorporated to the south and west boundaries of the property.**

e. PA13/01292 - Erection of annexe extension at Moorlands Cadgwith Ruan Minor. Councillor Fleetwood proposed the Parish Council object to this application, Councillor Freeman seconded – all in favour. Resolved: Grade Ruan Parish Council objects to the proposed development. It objects to the scale of the development which will be bounded by open countryside and will be visible from many aspects.

f. A possible unauthorised development where a building that has been erected on farmland <u>west</u> of the main route into Ruan Minor between 'Sunny Corner' and the Treveddon turnoff had been reported to Enforcement. The Clerk was requested to ask Cornwall Council that the Parish Council be notified of any planned maintenance to the planning website as some Councillors had been experiencing difficulties on a regular basis.

8. Finance: copies of the financial report. It was noted the payments received from Drs Cuff, Edge and Oliver needed to be amended to reflect the name of the new partnership.

b. Grade Ruan Under 5s heating allowance – the Parish Council's allowance to the Under 5s was 75% of the total heating costs. Councillor Elliott proposed the allowance be increased to 100%, back dated from January and to be reviewed in a year. Councillor Cooper seconded – all in favour.

c. A request for a donation was received from Victim Support. Councillor Trewin proposed a donation of £100 under s137, Councillor Cooper seconded – all in favour.

d. Approval of payments as per schedule

9. Matters arising from the Minutes: Play Area – the Chair and Councillor Elliott had met with Charles Mant. Prospective plans had been circulated to Councillors. An estimated price had been calculated and estimates now had to be obtained from two other companies. Councillor Fleetwood thanked the Chair and Councillor Elliot for their hard work on this project.

b. Code of Conduct – the updated version was circulated and the amendment to clause 2.6. Final version to be emailed.

c. Community Right to Bid – Councillor Freeman apologised for not producing a detailed list. To be carried over to the next meeting.

d. Highway issues – the following items were to be reported to Mr D Vincent of Cornwall Council with a view to him visiting the Parish to meet with Councillors:

- a) The road is very rough by the traffic calming at the entrance of Ruan Minor village from the main road side. An observation was made that as the traffic calming narrows the road, it receives double the wear than if it was wide enough for two vehicles to pass
- b) There are many potholes at St Ruan Bridge
- c) Top end of New Road, Cadgwith has a spring running across it which becomes a solid sheet of ice in cold weather. The Parish Council has been corresponding with South West Water in respect of this.
- d) Barn Hill, Cadgwith at the lower end of Barn Hill is a patch of tarmac from which water issues when it rains. It would appear there is possibly a blocked drain/void beneath the road.
- e) Poltesco Lane there are several issues relating to Poltesco Lane, most notably the blocked drains.

e. Potholes in Mundy's Field Car Park – Cornflower Garden Services had advised the Clerk they will inspect these on 14th March.

Methodist Week of Mission : Holy Well and Stone Crawl

As part of a busy week of Mission, the Methodist Circuit wanted to be seen as Christians out in the countryside, walking the lanes and footpaths and meeting people. On Monday 25th March, a Holy Well and Stone Crawl was organised.

Starting in the field in which John Wesley preached on Angrouse Farm at Mullion, The Rev. Danny Reed and his father Pastor Bill took a group, including Canon Steve Wild, Bishop Tim Thornton and Father John Gilbert, on to the Celtic Prayer Cross at The Lizard village. The ancient Stone Cross is thought to have been used to mark the boundaries of Glebe property. Everyone was given coffee in The Lizard Chapel. We were very pleased to welcome a Community Mini Bus of 11 people from Liskeard, who were all particularly interested in Holy Wells and Shrines.

No-one was disappointed. When arriving at Ruan Chapel, the fast growing group - by now approximately 50 people with the Rev. Deirdre Mackrill, Associate Priest from the Parish Church, also joining us - walked down on the footpath to St. Ruan and up the hill to the St. Grade and The Holy Cross Well. The Well has been beautifully kept over the years by Mr

Paul Greenhill (decd.) and Mrs Jessica Cheong. Jessica would very much appreciate, and needs, volunteers to come forward to help her, particularly with some strimming during the grass growing season. A white rose called Rambling Rector has been planted, and it would be a shame to see it grown over. The water from the well is taken to St. Grade Church for Christenings. It was used when Mr Noel Cliff, and probably many other local people, were baptised there. We had prayers and hymn singing around the well with several candles being lit and left.

We then went back down the hill, and on to the footpath to St. Rumons Stone. The stone is in what is now Mrs. Jill Pollard's garden. Before any houses were built, this was a little meadow called Parc an Grouse. Jill allowed us to tramp from the little back gate off the footpath up across her garden to the stone, which is thought to be on a ley line. Pilgrims used to sit and rest their backs against the stone. They were then energised to continue their pilgrimage.

The present day pilgrims were energised! and entertained to a soup and pasty lunch in Ruan Chapel, during which the Rev. Gordon Cleaver gave a short account of the life of St. Rumon and his arrival in our parish. The main group then carried on to Helston, eventually

finishing at Chapel Rock overlooking St. Michael's Mount. The day Photo by A. Coupland ended with a shared tea with the Marazion folk.

It was a day of happy memories: a wonderfully organised, happy, event with the congregations of the Methodist and Parish Church all working together.
