COMMUNITY UPDATE by Sue Cadman

Dog Fouling/Poo Bins

Firstly many thanks to everyone who has contributed to the cost of buying 2 further poo bins. It is very encouraging that so many people have been so supportive. Thanks also to the Parish Council who have paid for 2 bag stations. We have put 1 bin up at the cut-through between Higher Moor and Glebe Place and this has certainly been well used! It was felt that this bin serves the need of both Higher Moor and Glebe Place and, unless there are any objections, I am proposing to site the second bin and 1 bag station, at the Rec. (tennis Court end). It was very evident at the Bank Holiday weekend that dog-fouling on the Rec. is still a problem. I have spoken to the PC and there were no objections, indeed, their response was very positive. I understand that there is a telephone/electric pole being erected near the Tennis Court and this would be an ideal site for the Bin and Dispenser. This being the case we will wait until the pole is up rather than try to find an alternative site. If anyone has any objection or would like to discuss it, please feel free to call me.

Kennack

As most folk are aware, Cornwall Council withdrew all rubbish collection at Kennack as of 1st May. Natural England paid to keep 3 bins until after the bank Holiday but these have now been removed. Natural England has put up extensive signage asking people to take their litter home and we hope this will have a significant effect. As there was no interest in taking on the job of keeping the beaches clean, I have agreed to do it and I have now been contracted to clear the beaches and Towans and remove the rubbish I collect. I am working closely with the senior reserve manager from N E to monitor the amount still being left. It is very early days yet, but it is encouraging that I am not finding very much. Obviously this may well change during the peak season. I have decided that the best plan with regard to 'The Friends of Kennack' Beach cleans, is to only have an organised clean during the Autumn and Winter months. By this I mean October - April, when the rougher seas bring in large amounts of rubbish as opposed to litter being left. For any more information please feel free to call me.

Gardening in July

by David Endean

Well not that I wish to be the harbinger of

gloom but the year has now turned another corner and the longest day has passed, I have undertaken my annual pilgrimage to Wadebridge and the Sweet pea showing season is upon us.

Let's hope that we have some great summer months. May was very dry and lawns began to burn out in early June but the evenings were warm and calm just nice to be out in the garden with the swallows for company.

There is a gear change in the garden in July sowing and planting is greatly reduced and more goes into maintenance, ready for cropping. Watering is essential daily if not twice a day for all your pots, tubs and hanging baskets. This is rarely strenuous work but is time consuming. Rainfall is rarely to never enough for a containerised plant's needs and when you are watering take your time. Get the water under the foliage and do not waste it by letting it run off. Let the compost soak it up.

Add into your watering regime regular feeds for the plants as the nutrients soon get used up or leached out. I like to use a liquid type feed twice weekly, these often have the added benefit that they are also absorbed by the foliage but dry feeds sprinkled on the surface of the soil can work well also. Whilst you are doing this job you can also potter around dead heading to encourage more flowers and remove yellow or diseased leaves, this will make things look better and reduce

problems.

I would never advocate wasting water by watering a lawn as it will cost you a fortune if you are on a water meter and it will only encourage even shallower rooting, but it may well be worthwhile raising the height of the blades on the mower. This gives the roots extra shade from the hot sun and it will trap more moisture from any rain or evening dews and summer fogs. This is all assuming that we are in for a hot dry time.

Keep mowing the lawns as this tidies them and removes the seeding heads. By removing the seeding grass heads the plant does not waste energy and builds a stronger sward. Cutting the seed heads off the broad leaved weeds prevents them from seeding and reduces the weed problems in future years.

As spaces develop in the veg patch clear the ground and add a bit of general fertiliser and sow or plant some catch crops. It is still worthwhile sowing lettuce and other salads like radish, beetroot, kohl Rabi and finger carrots. Dwarf French beans are also quick to mature and so are worth a go, use varieties like Safari and Ferrari.

When sowing anything direct in the soil at this time of year it is worth watering the bottom of the drill before you sow the seed you will find this will help. I regularly sow some runner beans early this month also. Now many of you will find this a waste of time but my

garden is sheltered and I get away from those equinox gales which burn off the tender shoots in the more exposed Ruan gardens.

I would suggest sowing some spring green type cabbage but warnings say that this year all conditions have coincided for an influx of migratory, pesticide resistant super moths from Europe called the Diamondback. I fear the referendum will not solve this problem.

Get on with picking your soft fruit and use them because there is little better use for clotted cream than to accompany some raspberries or strawberries. Pick them every other day at least when they are ripe. If you have some good strawberry plants and want a few more, they will start sending

runners out this month. Get some small pots and fill them with compost, a new plant will form at the end of the runner, push this into the compost and peg it down with a loop of wire. Often the runner will send out another extension with a plantlet rather like a stone skimming off the water; trim those off along with any extra runners that you do not need as they will only sap the strength from the mother plants. Do not bother to take runners off old and diseased plants as they will never be very productive.

My advice is to get out there and enjoy your garden and get around and see some others as you may have some more time, to get some ideas. I am off now summer's here and I fancy a barbeque.

Spring into Life

St Mary's Cadgwith

s with all our church buildings, I am pleased that St Mary's is open for all to visit. And, indeed, the visitor book shows how many people love to enjoy its peace as a special place. Our church buildings can be special places, where people stop and seek God's presence; places with a sense of otherness unlike almost any other buildings in our communities; places to draw aside.

Part of this specialness, comes from their use over the generations in our communities. They are places where people have come for some of their most important events – marriages, baptisms and funerals – and they are rightly treasured by our communities. But, their greatest strength, what sets them apart from other community buildings, is that they are – and have been for generations – places of worship.

It is therefore sad to notice that the congregation at St Mary's for its monthly service (6pm on the third Sunday) has dwindled to the level at which sometimes (as in May) the only people attending are those who have come to lead the service. I am not sure that we can continue with the monthly service on this basis.

In July, I am not able to take the service and I am reluctant to ask one of my retired colleagues to do so if it seems that they may have no congregation. Reluctantly, therefore, I have cancelled the July service.

St Mary's will remain open, and special services, like the Nativity in December, will I am sure, continue to be supported. It is my intention to lead worship there in August and review the situation again after that. Perhaps the nature or timing of the service could be reconsidered (though there are limits as I have still not perfected the ability of being in two places at once), but it would be sad if the normal monthly services became unsustainable.

Who Remembers?

From Patrick Mitchell, now living in Hertfordshire

I have just read the March 2015 edition of the Gazette and was interested to read the article on Rutters Farm. I enclose a copy of a page from the sale brochure of the Johnstone Trewithen Estate, dated 1947 which dealt with the disposal of assets, land and property in Ruan Minor, Cadgwith and the Lizard. Most tenants were able to acquire their freeholds at the auction held at the Godolphin Hotel, Helston on 11th and 12th September 1947. The Johnstone family at the time, owned much of the peninsula and they also built the original Bodrigy thatched house.

Rutters Farm was originally Treworder Wallis Farm. The thirteen acres covered much of Mundys Field and down to the back of Chapel Terrace. There were also a few fields surrounding Braeside House. Braeside was built by the family of Mr. Roberts who was parson at Landewednack in the twenties.

Jimmy Rutter farmed throughout the 40s and 50s, and until his death, I think in the 60s. Jimmy had one son, Barnet, who is also gone. I think Barnet had daughters, but the Rutter name has now died out in Ruan. This is a pity as Rutter was a very old name in the Parish going back to the eighteenth century.

Jimmy's wife, old Mrs Rutter, was the fierce guardian of Duck Alley. As boys, it was an act of great bravery to ride a bike past her house. She was invariably out with her stick and the trick was to approach the farm both quietly and fast!

The accounts have been subject to internal audit and the report will be discussed at the monthly meeting that follows. I will recommend that the Internal Auditor's Report is approved. I would emphasise that your Councillors work hard to ensure that funds are properly managed and used for the benefit of the community. The accounts themselves along with the supporting documentation are available for public inspection from 16 June until 27 July.

The year has seen spending on Phase 1 of the playground project, which has given the playground a much-needed boost. The Parish Council has also contributed towards the cost of the new pavilion, which is well on the way to completion. The installation of 2 defibrillators in the Parish, bought as a result of extensive local fund-raising combined with contributions from both the Parish Council and Grade Ruan Community Trust, shows the extent of community support for worthwhile projects.

II would like to express my thanks to Councillor Rule of Cornwall Council who is a great supporter of the Parish Council and provides help and guidance on a wide range of issues. I would also like to give my thanks to PCSO Julia Berry who covers the parish as part of an ever growing workload but still remains readily available to contact.

These are extremely challenging times as the financial constraints which operate within Cornwall Council have led to further cuts in public spending and a continued push to localism. Pressures on spend within the Parish have generated the need for an increase in the parish precept which forms part of the Council Tax bill. The Parish Council remains extremely mindful of the need to keep any increases as low as possible.

The members of the Parish Council have continued to work as hard as ever for the benefit of the Parish. One new councillor has joined us during the course of the last year – Gary Pollardbut one vacancy still remains on the Parish Council. I would like to thank all the Councillors for the time and effort that they put into parish matters and in particular to the Chairman, Jeb cont. Preston, and the Vice Chairman, Nigel Green, for all the support they continue to give me. Thank you, Jan Castle, Clerk to Grade Ruan Parish Council

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT MAY 2015 to MAY 2016

There has been good consistent attendance at Meetings over the last 12 months and I would like to thank all 10 Parish Councillors for their commitment; furthermore, Councillors have been active between meetings and prepared to follow up issues. Every member has a contribution and a range of skills to offer.

During the year the Council noted two 'Pre-Applications (for housing) and was required to submit responses to 22 validated planning applications. The first of these was for the new Recreation Pavilion in May 2015, which is now nearing completion. The Council considers all its Planning responses carefully, especially in the environmental context of the AONB (Corn-wall's National Park) and the Conservation Areas, and it will always seek to engage and work with all parties to lessen or improve visual impacts. We are all aware of the pressures on our Cornish landscape, and we will continue to consider the benefits, or otherwise, of undertaking a 'Neighbourhood Plan' in the future.

The Council Finances are in good shape with allowances in the budget for national cuts and protection for projects. There has been a steady outlay of donations and support to local groups and charities, as in previous years. Dealing with Matters arising often comes down to good communication with agencies and stakeholders. We have shown a willingness to meet and discuss issues, especially in matters relating to Highways and Planning. The



pressure of financial cuts can be converted into new opportunities - not just for financial savings but for greater efficiency based on local knowledge and experience.

Part of being Chairman means keeping track and being aware of all the issues which bombard our community, and I believe in an open, swift and direct approach. But as volunteers, Councillors do rely on our paid employee, our Parish Clerk, to guide, record, file and respond on our behalf and my thanks go to Jan Castle for the work which she does for this Council.

Having written to Cornwall Council regarding their concerns, they were informed that the Planning Department had decided that their property was too far away to be affected. The response also stated that notices were now only being put up for certain developments.

The Clerk was asked to query the notification procedure with the Planning Department and also to ascertain the policy with regard to laminated notices. Following this, the Clerk was requested to query the particular concerns regarding this specific application. Action: Clerk

shortfall of £534. It was agreed that as well as approaching Cornwall Councillor Rule, an approach would also be made to the Maja Tham Trust. It was agreed that the Parish Council would underwrite the shortfall as the grant requests may take some time to be considered. The swing would be given the go-ahead and the deposit of 20% paid.

At the next meeting of the Finance Committee, a review of the allocation of project funds would be looked at as to whether a regular payment is made towards play equipment.

The annual playground inspection had taken place recently and, although there were some small items that require dealing with, the overall report was positive, The Play Committee would meet on site shortly to check these issues. **Action: Chairman**

- <u>Dog Poop Bag stands</u> it was agreed to go ahead with this purchase and the preferred colour is green. All the hard work being done by Sue Cadman on behalf of the community was noted and the Parish Council wished to confirm that she has its full support. In order to take any pressure off Sue personally, it was agreed that all future locations should come to the Parish Council to be approved. The Chairman would contact Sue to confirm the Councillors' support. Action: Chairman
- <u>School Bus Turning and Virtual Walkway</u> it was noted that the Chairman had not yet been in touch with Ben Dickinson but the School was putting together a list of possible works which would include the walkway and Maxine Hardy would explore possible grant funding. The School was also handling problems with drop-off.
- <u>Refuse collection, Kennack Sands</u> it was noted that the idea of consortium funding for emptying the bins had been abandoned in the short term. Steve Townsend has a budget of £2500 for beach cleaning £2000 from Natural England and £500 from the Tregothnan Estate. An advert has been placed for a part-time beach cleaner for 10 hours a week. All the bins would be removed and visitors would be encouraged to take their rubbish away with them.

Sea Acres has agreed to provide bin facilities for the beach cleaning and Ray Smith, Manager at Sea Acres, stated that they may be able to provide some funding in the longer term.

Steve Townsend has agreed to attend the next monthly meeting.
