# THREE OLD MEN IN A BOAT ......

David Henn, Dave Bray and Tony Halliday did very well to win the Men's Cornish Randan at the Veteran's Skiff Championships held on Sunday 17 May at Stithians Lake organised by Cornwall Rowing Association. All three are from the village and Cadgwith. To qualify as a veteran you need to be over 40 years of age - David (Chick) Henn is 64!



#### We are pleased to have had a response in relation to last month's Blast from the Past about laying cables at Kennack.

John Williams of Glebe Place has confirmed that the cables were being laid from Goonhilly to Portugal in 1971. Apparently the pipeline was trenched and laid by civil engineering contractors Conoley. Work commenced at the Goonhilly Earth Station via Dry Tree in the late 1960s. The line then crossed the moorland, eventually crossing the main road between the Leach Pool and Traboe Cross, continuing alongside the road on the grass verge towards Kuggar and Kennack. The pipeline continued under the road just above No. 1 Council House ending at Kennack Sands. The actual cables were then laid inside the pipes by John Duncan, Tim and Mike who were employees of the Post Office Telephones, as they were known then.

Mr Williams also remembers the cableship (the Ariel). The Aerial anchored some distance offshore and although not large it was quite a spectacle. He remembers a photo in a local newspaper of Mr Maunder, the Headmaster with a group of school children with the cableship in the background. The cafe car park (run by Miss Speake) was full of Post Office Telephone trucks and vans. Tom Roberts had a JCB digger and crawler bulldozer on the beach at work hauling and burying the cables. There was also an x-ray unit towed behind a Land Rover to examine the cable for damage or joins. There have been two more cables laid alongisde since 1971, most recently only a few years ago. Unfortunately he's unable to identify anyone in the photographs in last month's issue of the Gazette.

#### **Great news!**

# At last, we have confirmation of sufficient funding to build a new pavilion at the Rec.

We have been awarded the following grants:

- £100,000 from SITA Cornwall Trust (SCT) under their Flagship Funding stream. The money comes from taxes that SITA has to pay to operate landfill sites. "The mission of SITA Cornwall Trust is to award and distribute funds generated through the Landfill Communities Fund to projects that will provide essential social and environmental benefit to communities throughout Cornwall." The New Pavilion Project is closely aligned with its mission. (Under the rules of the scheme, the grant will be reduced by £8,000 before the first payment is made.)
- £75,000 from Sport England under their Inspired Facilities funding stream. Inspired Facilities is a £110 programme that funds the renovation and modernisation of local sports facilities to encourage more people to take up sport at the grassroots level. The aim is to leave a lasting legacy from the London Olympics.
- We have pledges of smaller grants from the **Parish Council** and the **Grade Ruan Community Fund**.

These grants should be sufficient to enable us to build and fit out the pavilion. The plans were in the May Gazette, but do contact me if you'd like to take a closer look or have any questions.

## **Recreation Ground News**

The result of our Planning Application should be known by mid June and we will then be in a position to move forward at all possible speed. Come the autumn, you should be receiving an invitation to the grand opening, and what a day that will be!

We would like to buy some games equipment such as pool table, dart board, card tables, etc. and so the fund raising goes on. We are very grateful to **Judith Green and the team** for donating the profits from *"The People's String Foundation Trio"* event towards such equipment.

By the time you read this, the **May Festival** will be over and we hope you all enjoyed it and that we have added a good sum to our funds.

The Ruan Rascals will continue to use the existing pavilion until it's knocked down, but probably everyone else has used it for the **last time**. It's hard to be sentimental about it and we *are* looking forward to replacing it, but thanks are due to the people who worked so hard to erect the pavilion all those years ago. The fact that it is still standing is testament to their workmanship.

Finally, the Grade Ruan Recreation Ground **AGM** will be held on Wednesday 1st July, 7.30 p.m. at New Thatch. Now that the pavilion project is definitely going ahead, please do come along and provide some input into how the Rec will be managed in future. You'll have a chance to look at the plans in more detail and discuss the details with the Committee.

#### Nature knows best

Each and every month the Lizard presents me with a new vista of healing medicinal plants, and reminds me how lucky I am to have this living herbal dispensary on my doorstep. The fact that these plants reappear every year, with renewed beauty and vigour and promise, speaks volumes. They exude a powerful healing energy that makes me want to collect and bottle them, and use them for what they are surely intrinsically intended: to help heal, promote growth and improve quality of life.

The majestic foxglove: Herbalists such as myself have used plants in this way for thousands of years, and in the 18<sup>th</sup> century, medical science latched on to plant potential and started identifying what it saw as the active constituents in plants, and synthesising them into pharmaceutical drugs. One of the earliest was the heart medication Digoxin, from the majestic foxglove (*Digitalis spp.*) that reigns supreme all over the clifftops and coastal paths, from June hereon into the summer. Which is what prompted this month's train of thought...

Goat's rue and the opium poppy: here are many other plants that have been used, either directly or indirectly, to create medicines still in use today. These include white willow (*Salix alba*) for aspirin, goat's rue (*Galega officinalis*) for the diabetes drug metformin, the opium poppy (*Papaver somniferum*) for morphine and codeine, and the yew tree (*Taxus brevifolia*) for the chemotherapy drug paclitaxel, to name but a few. All of these plants may be found growing in Cornwall, by the way.

More plant-based drugs: There are many more drugs that have their origins in plants. To give you some idea up to 50% of pharmaceutical drugs approved in the last 30 years stem directly or indirectly from plants, and 11% of the 252 drugs on the current World Health Organisation list of essential medicines are exclusively of plant origin. Despite having their 'roots' in plants, many of these drugs are either not very effective, or associated with unpleasant and harmful side effects, this is because it is not any one individual constituent within a plant that gives it its healing properties, but the collective action of all its constituents.

Red clover and St John's wort: Nature does indeed know best, and so this month I will be following my head, as well as my heart (symbolically represented by the foxglove), searching for and collecting plants such as fumitory (*Fumaria officinalis*) for liver and gallbladder com-plaints; Heartsease (*Viola tricolor*) for ailments as diverse as eczema, rheumatism, cystitis and bronchitis; red clover (*Trifolium pratense*) for chronic skin disorders and menopausal symptoms; couch grass (*Agropyron repens*) for urinary disorders including kidney stones and prostate problems; and St John's wort (*Hypericum perforatum*), as this reputedly flowers on St John's Day, June 24<sup>th</sup>, and is often not far off in my experience. Although best known for its antidepressant properties, it has many more uses, including being one of the best herbs for treating shingles as it is antiviral and pain-relieving.

#### Rector's Ramblings Just Coasting

n the news as I write, the PM has announced a challenge to schools that are 'coasting'. Without commenting on his policy, it made me think about coasting. Personally, life is usually pretty busy, with frequent spells of hectic, but that doesn't mean that I am not coasting. Coasting seems to me to suggest a lack of direction or progress and I think I can be very busy and still, in a very real sense, coasting.

There can be all sorts of reasons for this. Perhaps we are too busy to even think about where we are going, or we haven't even noticed where our busy living is leading. In his book, 'The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People', Stephen Covey points out that efficiency isn't everything, without the right goals in life we may just be moving faster in the wrong direction.

Or it may just be we have not found any life-goals significant enough to demand our attention and commitment. We just seem to keep going at what seems urgent or necessary: personally, in looking after your family, or at work. I suspect that for many people this is what life is about. If it is not exactly 'coasting', it has a sense of being carried along by the wind and currents and steering a course mainly to avoid any reefs.

And it may even be that Jesus has become part of this for you. Perhaps you have found in him a Good Shepherd who will take care of you. The good news of Easter is that he has overcome all the evil that was done to him, and become a powerful saviour for all who put their trust in him. He is a friend who will hear your prayers and help you.

But what if there is more to Easter, and more to Jesus, than this? What if Jesus is about more than being your saviour and friend, to get you through this life, safely to heaven? What if Jesus, himself, had something greater in mind – when he came to us, teaching, healing and dying ... and rising again – a purpose and plan worth living and dying for?

The Gospels, and what we read of the early church in Acts etc, seem to suggest that Jesus did indeed have a purpose in mind that is greater than merely helping those individuals who would believe in him. Jesus speaks of a heavenly kingdom, and he gathers disciples together in a new community, learning to live in a new way together and welcoming others into this new life with them, and living it out in loving service amongst their neighbours (like salt and light).

Are you coasting? Are we coasting in church (if you come to church)? We can be very busy at it, or merely joining in when we can. But Jesus is inviting us to catch a new vision, to give our lives together for a cause, a goal that is worth living for; worth living for with all that we have, worth even suffering for. Perhaps you haven't thought of Church like that, and admittedly it doesn't often look much like the sort of cause you would want to give your life for, but this is what Jesus is calling us to be.

Let's not just coast and waste the life we have. Let's be part of what Jesus is doing. His first church turned the world upside down and, with Jesus, we can do it again.

## Gardening in June



The other morning, I realised that the deadline for this article would soon be looming and that ideas of topics at that point were scarce. As you may realise penning this article often starts three weeks before you read it. I was looking out of the window and saw that the spotted flycatcher had returned once again this year. Last year they stuck around all summer and had a brood. Now they are back from a spot of winter sunshine in Africa. I know summer is here along with the swooping visits of their avian cousins.

June, what a busy month in the garden, it often comes as a big shock as you realise things have got away from you especially the weeds and staking of plants. I will be planting out my dahlias early on this month, that way you will be sure to miss a late May frost! I have a large patch of several rows but most of you will probably have planted before and have odd plants in borders which can look very effective. I like to add liberal amounts of well-rotted organic matter to the planting area when setting them out plus a generous amount of fertiliser. Water them in and protect them from slugs and snails whilst the shoots are young and tender. When the summer begins to close you will be rewarded with a blast of colour up until the first frosts or severe gales whichever is first. If you keep dead heading the show will go on for weeks.

Those of you growing sweet peas should find that they are romping away now. My sweetpeas are for exhibition and so are grown in cordon fashion, this means that a single stem is grown

up and all the side shoots and tendrils are removed and this has to be tied into a framework at least weekly. This job has taken me more than half a day a week in previous years, but this year I have purchased a new machine called a Max Tapener to aid in the tying process. Talking to other growers it has cut their tying-in time by half, let's hope that this is the case. What a faff I hear you say, this is for the best quality blooms but for general garden culture just let them scramble up some netting, keep them well watered and keep cutting all the blooms for vases indoors. Make sure no pods are left on or otherwise the plants will soon pack up to set seed.

Wimbledon will soon be here and along with the tennis there is the obligatory strawberries and cream. If you are growing some strawberry plants a little work now will be beneficial. Make sure your plants are clear of weeds and places for little nasties like slugs and snails to hide. Tradition dictates, as their name suggests, a mulch of straw to lift the berries off the soil to keep them clean. This is not essential and if you grow your plants through a membrane the need for weeding is vastly reduced. Next if you want to eat more strawberries than the local bird population you will need to erect some kind of netting over the plants. The net needs to be relatively fine, 20mm mesh or so, and erected in such a way that it is well clear of the plants otherwise those canny avian friends just land on the net and eat the berries through it. Make sure the strawberries do not dry out as they need plenty of moisture to swell those luscious

fruits. Another option is to grow them in a dedicated fruit cage with all your other soft fruit such as blackcurrants, raspberries, black-berries, gooseberries and the list goes on. Make sure you have got your net over it now and that it is secure with no holes, otherwise the little birds will soon find a way in.

Another problem that you may find on your fruit bushes, especially gooseberries and the different currants, are sawflies. These come along and strip the plant of all its leaves. It survives but does not crop and the plant is weakened therefore if this happens for a few successive years the bush gives up. Sawflies are actually caterpillars they eat the leaves, drop to the floor and overwinter there only to emerge again next year and reinfect the bush. The only answer is to keep a close eye on the bushes and employ the finger and thumb squishing technique to get rid or a regular suitable insecticide sprav programme. These blighters can strip a bush in a couple of days!

Still working in the productive garden most of your main crops will have been sown by now but there is still time to sow more, if space allows. Nearly all the veg is worth a go but Runner beans and French beans as well as all the salads are more than worth a try. If you are on trend with the cookery shows and baby veg is your thing then you still have several months of productive sowing time left and these can be packed into small spare spaces in the veg plot. The soil is often much drier at this time of the year so to hasten germination it is a good idea to water the drill into which you will sow your seed. If you water the whole area after sowing you result in more weed seed germination and most of the water is lost through evaporation.

Time is here to lift the first of the early potatoes, it is best to lift as you need them to get the full advantage of their flavour. The less time out of the soil the better their flavour will be. The only time I would advise lifting more is if you have suffered an attack of blight. Then more often the answer is to cut the tops off and burn them but continue to dig the tubers as required. Digging these little treasures will free up some space in your plot and I always favour planting leek or brassica plant there. The choice is yours as to which brassica, cauliflowers, cabbage or sprouts are but a few choices.

Back out in the flower borders if you have any gaps get a few bedding plants to fill the voids. Gardening styles have changed from the mass bedding schemes to more mixed borders now but there is always space for these bright beauties. Bedding out gets earlier year on year but I think you miss out on the beauty and fragrance of the spring bedding often as this is still going strong in May. Another reason, apart from frosts, why traditional planting out used to take place at Whitsun so early June is not too late by far.

Your hanging baskets, tubs and pots will be well established now. You must remember that you are growing far more plants in that confined space than you would in the open borders, therefore daily watering is a must and feeding with a liquid feed twice a week is advisable, the results are well worth it.

What else have I planned for this month? Well I hope to get my biennials sown like Wallflower and Sweet William. The lawns need to be kept mown and the tomato plants will need regular sideshooting. Whatever you find to do this month enjoy your gardening.

Although the accounts are not yet available, he confirmed that the hall remains on a secure financial standing with fundraising covering the ever growing expenses. The decision has been taken not to alter the fees or charges for the forthcoming financial year.

Gig Club: a report was not available.

**Recreation Ground:** Councillor Fleetwood reported that the committee is still continuing to maintain the grounds and the maintenance costs continue to be met by the committee's fundraising activities. Currently there is no adult football team but the committee are encouraging the setting up of a proper team with a full supporting structure, rather than just a set of players. Ruan Rascals, the children's football coaching scheme, meets every Sunday morning and is thriving.

Replacing the pavilion is the major project and the committee is hopeful about funding for a new pavilion. The committee cannot go public with any plans as the funding is not yet secure and also negotiations are underway with the owners of neighbouring properties to minimise the impact upon them.

Ruan Revellers: a report was not available.

**Tree Wardens update:** Councillor Preston reported that he and Jonathan Fletcher, assisted by Liam Williams, offer free advice to parishioners regarding planting, tree care, legalities, tree preservation areas and planning. This year over 200 trees and hedging shrubs had been supplied at a cost of £200 from the Parish Council's environmental tree budget of £500. This year they have approached some of the caravan sites and established areas that will benefit from tree planting. It is hoped that businesses will be encouraged to add to the planting schemes themselves using successful species introduced by the tree wardens. A second planting phase is planned for October this year.

**Grade Ruan CLT Limited**: this is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated on 6 November 2013 with the Parish Council as the custodian trustee. Its objects relate to the provision of social housing and other facilities and amenities to help house people with proven links to the Parish. The Board is currently in discussions with the planners regarding a possible scheme, although time if very short to utilise available s.106 funds. The Parish Council's nominees on the Board are Nigel Green and Peter Freeman.

#### Grade Ruan Community Trust:

Councillor Freeman reported that the Trust had continued its activities concerned with managing the Cadgwith car park and the 3 sets of public toilets in the Parish. The car park continues to be the main source of income and the next big project is the resurfacing of the entrance slope to the car park. A number of grants have been made over the last few years to support village activities and the Trust is always happy to consider requests for funding.

6. **Other community matters:** Annette Eatock from Lizard Adventure reported that they had introduced stand up paddle boarding and kayaking for the new season, which runs from Easter to October half-term. She asked that parishioners contact her if they had any concerns regarding Lizard Adventure. She reported that the issues in the past that had arisen regarding parking for the coasteering activity should have been alleviated as they now have a new parking provision on private property in Ruan Minor. A taster session for locals is being proposed.

The Annual Parish Meeting closed at 7.35 pm and was immediately followed by the April Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council

#### Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 13 April 2015 from 7.35pm

**Present:** Parish Councillors, J Preston (Chair), N Green (Vice-Chair), J Clifton, P Collins, M Fleetwood, P Freeman, J Lee, S Stephens, J Trewin, Clerk J Castle and 2 members of the public.

#### 1. Absences and apologies:

Cornwall Councillor C Rule; PCSO J Berry - these apologies were accepted by the Council.

#### 2. Declarations of interest:

There were no declarations of interest.

#### 3. Public time:

Miss Marita Jones, who wishes to apply for one of the casual vacancies for a Parish Councillor, spoke to the meeting. She moved to Kuggar 18 months ago having retired from legal practice in the South East. The majority of her time as a solicitor was spent in local government, specialising in planning and environmental law. She has also acted as a temporary parish clerk in Sussex.

- Mr Horace Stone of Karn An Megar, asked that it be recorded that Caroline Stone, who objected to planning application PA14/12157 regarding Ruan Major Cottage, is not related to his family and that he and his family remain neutral on this issue.
- Sarah Legge expressed concern about the pre-app that has been submitted in respect of the construction of affordable housing in the field beyond Crig A Tana at the end of Long Moor. She considers that the road access is completely unsuitable as the road through Long Moor is too narrow and there would be significant traffic noise due to road surface.

#### 4. Police report:

It was noted that the Clerk had read out the report from PCSO Berry at the preceding Parish meeting. It was queried whether an annual summary report could be made available for the next annual parish meeting. **Action: Clerk** 

#### 5. Cornwall Councillor's time:

In the absence of Cornwall Councillor Rule, there were no matters to report.

#### 6. Minutes for acceptance:

Having been previously circulated, it was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Fleetwood that the minutes of the meeting held on 9 March 2015 be accepted. Carried 9 votes in favour.

#### 7. Planning:

Planning Applications for consideration

- PA15/02091 Certificate of Lawfulness regarding existing use of land at Tresaddern House, Ruan Minor. It was proposed by Councillor Freeman and seconded by Councillor Lee that this application be supported. Carried 9 votes in favour.
- PA15/02555 formation of 2 utility sheds at Chycarne Caravan Park, Kuggar. It was proposed by Councillor Fleetwood and seconded by Councillor Lee that this application be supported. Carried 9 votes in favour.
- PA15/02667 Outline application for the demolition of existing dwelling and erection of new dwelling, 1 Gwendreath Cottages. The Clerk read out an e-mail from the owners of an adjacent property, Seaview Holiday Park, raising various concerns about the proposal. In view of the fact this is only an outline application, it was considered that any concerns should be considered when the full proposals are submitted and on this basis Councillor Green proposed and Councillor Lee seconded that this application be supported. Carried 9 votes in favour.

Planning applications decided by the planning authority since the last meeting

- PA14/06078 land off Ebenezer Road, Retention of Agricultural Dwelling [Refused]. This had been refused on the basis that there was no proven agricultural need and therefore should be viewed as additional housing in the countryside.
- PA15/0240 The Beach, Kuggar, discharge of condition 10.[Discharged]

Pre-applications ,consultations and appeals:

- PA15/00847/PREAPP Trenoweth, extensions & alterations
- PA15/00869/PREAPP- Land South Of Crig A Tana ,Long Moor ,Ruan Minor , advice for construction of affordable housing

#### <u>Other</u>

It was noted that the enforcement investigation regarding the alleged unauthorised use of Glebe land is still ongoing.

#### 8. Matters arising from the minutes:

<u>Verge trimming project</u> – it was noted that a great deal of work has been carried out on this project by Councillor Freeman. The relationship manager had visited and helped to fill out the various forms and the Parish's application for a locality grant had been sent off and accepted. The remaining £600 of the grant has since been received and no repayment will be required. Councillor Freeman had also gone to a meeting in London for those involved in the various projects that the grants were supporting but noted that we were the only parish considering taking over the trimming of verges. We are unable to progress to the next stage of the grant cont.

process as this requires a turnover in excess of £50,000 per annum. It was agreed that Councillor Freeman should submit a claim to the next meeting for the expenses he has incurred in respect of this project.

Councillor Freeman has a meeting with Maxine Hardy, Community Network manager, on 14 April to discuss devolution and our possible proposals to take over various other cutting contracts and he will report back after this meeting.

It was agreed that there should be a special meeting of an enhanced footpaths committee to look at this project prior to the next monthly Parish Council meeting.

The Councillors thanked Councillor Freeman for his hard work in obtaining this grant and in putting together outline proposals for discussion.

#### 9. Matters for consideration:

• <u>Survey re mobile mast: results</u> - Councillor Green reported that there had been 114 responses to the survey, which is a very encouraging response. The results were very extremely polarised – those really in favour of a mast and those actively opposed. Overall there was a very slim majority in favour of a mast.

Councillor Green was thanked for the hard work he had put in to organise the survey.

- <u>Casual Vacancy</u> it was noted that although the vacancy caused by the resignation of Councillor Cooper would need to be advertised, there are still 2 ongoing casual vacancies. It was proposed by Councillor Collins and seconded by Councillor Lee that Marita Jones be appointed to fill one of these vacancies. Carried 9 votes in favour.
- <u>Contribution to Community Trust reverge trimming in village</u> following the cut in funding for this from Cornwall Council, it was agreed that the Community Trust can approach the Parish Council for financial help if necessary.
- <u>Play Area</u> it was noted that grant applications had been submitted to SITA for £10,000 and to the Goonhilly Wind Farm Fund for £5,000 in respect of

replacement playground equipment. The outcome of the SITA application would not be known until late June although an earlier response is expected from the Goonhilly fund. Smaller funding sources are also being explored.

Committee members had removed more of the edging boards, checked over the equipment and strimmed the nettles around the boundary. It was noted that the maintenance budget will need to be reviewed to take in the surrounding hedge boundary and around each item of equipment. This additional work is carried out by Andrew Lewis (a likely increase in cost of 25-30%).

In view of the need to wait for the outcome of the grant applications, it was felt that the only area currently outside the plans submitted for funding would relate to the toddler area. Councillor Preston would contact Alastair Guy about possible time frames and costs. Action: **Councillor Preston** 

- <u>Dog Bins</u>- following the e-mail request form Sue Cadman, it was agreed that the Parish Council would respond to her that we are looking into the provision of additional bins. The Clerk was asked to contact Cornwall Council regarding the implications of the Parish Council supplying bins and allowing the bins to be emptied by a private individual. **Action: Clerk**
- <u>Administration</u>- it was agreed that the Clerk should take over the updating of the website and also the collating of documents to be displayed by projection at the monthly meeting. It was thought that this probably only needs to include documents relating to planning. **Action: Clerk**
- <u>Resignation of Councillor Cooper</u> it was agreed that the Clerk would write a formal letter acknowledging the resignation. **Action Clerk.** Councillor Preston would write a personal letter and also take round the gift from the Parish Council. **Action: Councillor Preston**
- <u>Abuse of Councillors</u>- it was felt that the need to protect individual councillors from verbal abuse by parishioners should be looked at. Action: Clerk

#### 10. Finance

- <u>Financial Report</u> the Financial Report was noted.
- <u>Payments Schedule</u> the schedule of payments, totalling £4,748.47, was presented to the meeting. This includes a grant of £150 to Helford River Children's Sailing Trust. It was proposed by Councillor Fleetwood and seconded by Councillor Clifton that the payment schedule be approved .Carried 7 votes in favour and 2 abstentions.
- <u>Reserves</u>- it was noted that the reserved funds approved in July 2014 needed to be adjusted to take account of the release of £2,000 for the School minibus but also the addition of £3,188 re funds held for purchase of 2 defibrillators and £2,400 re the locality grant, giving a revised total of £29,088.

#### 11. Correspondence:

- Adopt a BT Kiosk Councillor Preston agreed to look at this.
- <u>Election notice</u> this had been displayed.
- <u>Letter from May Kimpton</u>- the Clerk was asked to draft a response in respect of Mrs Kimpton's information request, pointing out that this is a matter for the Village Hall committee. **Action: Clerk**

#### 12. Footpaths, environment and treewardens:

• <u>Footpath</u>– 2, 6, and out to Huer's footpaths had been trimmed by Bob Sanders in March.

- <u>Grass cutting in Churchyard</u> Councillor Stephens reported that some increase in the funding would help to ensure that all the churchyard was kept mowed. Councillor Stephens would continue to liaise on this matter. The budget has been increased from £1,500 to £1,800.
- <u>Mundy's Field car park</u> Councillor Fleetwood had carried out the monthly inspection and had nothing to report.
- <u>Village Well sites</u> the sign for Kuggar had been produced and Councillor Preston would erect it. The area around the site will require some ongoing strimming but it was hoped this might be carried out by a neighbouring property. Councillor Preston was getting a quote for a replacement sign for the well at Ruan Minor. With regard to the Cadgwith well site, he had met Bev Wilson from Inclusion Cornwall who was working with PAROW. They are looking at clearance and footpath improvements around the site, but this work will not take place until after the summer season.
- <u>Bridleway/Footpath 24 (Friar's Lane)</u> –It was noted that weed killer had been used to clear on both sides of the track. Councillors considered that the use of a strimmer, mower or tractor would be more appropriate in this location.
- 13. In Committee: No items were discussed in committee

The meeting closed at 10.00pm.
