



RECIPE SPOT - EGGS NEPTUNE

GRADE RUAN PARISH COUNCIL

Traffic speed survey, December 2015

The Parish Council receives frequent complaints that traffic drives too fast through Ruan Minor and Kuggar, exceeding the 30mph speed limit and creating danger.

The Council recently commissioned Cormac to carry out radar speed surveys in both places. These were done between 10th and 17th December using unobtrusive speed detectors that were unlikely to have caused drivers to change from their usual habits. The interesting results are summarised here.

Cormac have provided more detailed figures looking at the two directions of traffic separately and potential differences between weekday and weekend traffic, but they all give similar results.

There seems to be no speed problem in Kuggar at all, only one vehicle per day exceeding the limit. In Ruan Minor the proportion exceeding the limit is still very small by national standards but if a speed camera were to be installed, strictly set to 30mph, it would issue about 25 tickets per day, until drivers learned to slow down. But in practice, cameras are usually set to allow anything up to 33mph, so tickets would be noticeably fewer.



The Herbal Medicine Cabinet

Spring Detox

March signifies not only the beginnings of Spring, for me, but also months of happy foraging for medicinal plants to make herbal remedies. I'm either on foot with my dogs, or astride my trusty little cob replete with saddlebags for collection of goodies.

Cleavers: Cleavers (*Galium aparine*) is one of the most important springtime medicinal plants for detoxification purposes and boosting the immune system. It can help clear lingering coughs and phlegm, but also has much deeper and far-reaching effects. It is renowned for cleansing the lymphatic system, which is an integral part of our immune system, and can help resolve a wide range of health problems. As Master Herbalist Nicholas Culpeper (1616-1654) said: 'It is a good remedy in the Spring, eaten (being first chopped small, and boiled well) in water-gruel, to cleanse the blood and strengthen the liver, thereby to keep the body in health, and fitting it for that change of season that is coming.'

You'll find this plant all over The Lizard, its incredible stickiness enabling it to attach itself to anything, including you. It's also known as goose grass, and sticky willy! Herbalists use it as a tonic for people with cancer, but it makes an effective home detox remedy. Eat the young shoots chopped in salads, or juice them and add to smoothies. I find it particularly helpful for skin disorders such as eczema and psoriasis, and urinary problems as it's a great diuretic.

Nettles: Stinging nettle (*Urtica dioica*) is another ubiquitous plant that, like cleavers, makes a great detoxifying tonic, helping with skin disorders and urinary problems, arthritis and anaemia. It's packed with vitamins and minerals. including iron and vitamin C. The body needs vitamin C to absorb iron, by the way, so this is a very clever plant. Nettles also have an antihistamine effect, so often feature in herbal remedies for allergies such as hay fever and asthma. Use fresh young nettle tops to make a soup or tea. Chop finely and use about a tablespoon per mug, leaving to infuse for 10-15 minutes before straining and drinking. You can add cleavers to this, or dandelion leaves, for one of the most cleansing and fortifying spring tonics ever!

Dandelion: Fresh young dandelion (*Taraxacum officinale*) leaves, just like nettle, are a naturally balanced herbal remedy. As well as being a potent diuretic, they are packed with potassium – which is handy, as strong diuretics can leach the body of this vital mineral that is essential for proper functioning of our organs, including the heart. The potassium that is flushed out in the urine is simply replaced by the plant's own supply. How simple, and brilliant, is that? Mother Nature always knows best.

Sadly, this is the last of my regular columns on foraging and herbal medicine, although I hope to contribute to the Gazette on an occasional basis. Rector's Ramblings Lent - Be Reconciled

n nearly every church I have come to in my ministry there have been people who come back to church having left under the previous vicar because of something he/she did or did not do. That doesn't make me perfect - I am aware that some will stop coming to church in *my* time because of something in me (although I may never know as people rarely take up their issues directly with the vicar). How many people like this are in our parish; hurt, un-reconciled, perhaps still grieving?

Not all leave in these circumstances, and it's not all about the vicar. Other things happen in church: things are said, or not said, sometimes it's hard to remember what happened, but relationships are broken. Sometimes people leave because of this. Sometimes they may stay, but withdraw a bit from the life of the church. Sometimes they may remain active, but there is some distance, some lack of trust.

And yet we know, or ought to know, that Christ came to reconcile each of us to God (Rom 9.10; 2 Cor 5.18) and to one another (Eph 2.14-18). It would not be taking it too far to say that the essence of being a Christian is the renewal of relationship – Reconciliation. The heart of that renewal is in our relationship with God. But that relationship cannot be renewed without our relationships with others being changed; especially with our brothers and sisters who have been redeemed with us by the same blood (1 John 4.20-21; Acts 20.28).

Surely this brokenness grieves our Lord's heart. It grieves mine, though I am aware that reconciliation is not easy and can be very costly; and there are always 'reasons' why we hold back from it, yet God's call to us all remains – Be Reconciled (2 Cor 5.20).

This Lent, I want to offer an opportunity to hear this call. It was the theme of our Ash Wednesday services and some of our Lent Courses. On Maundy Thursday there will be a special joint Service at St Keverne, to reflect upon our need to seek a real reconciliation with those who have hurt and, most importantly, with those we have hurt. Please pray about how you can be part of this, even if you do not immediately think that you need reconciling; as a Church we do.

For some, this may stir up difficult memories. For some, it will require honest reflection on relationships that are not broken but out of joint. For some, the thought of crossing the church threshold may seem daunting. It may also require the church offering its penitence and seeking forgiveness.

I am not suggesting that one Lent will sort things out - reconciliation is a process (a way of life); it will be costly - but we must take a step into this with Jesus who has borne the greatest weight of that cost. Jesus will guide our steps and perfect our hopes as we trust in him. As St Paul said:

"All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ, God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, BE RECONCILED to God." (2 Cor 5.18-20).

If you would like to speak to me about any issues that have affected you and separated you from the church, I should love to hear from you. I do want to be serious about reconciliation - because Jesus is.

Gardening in March

by David Endean

Glug, glug, glug, gurgle, gurgle... well it now seems to be a regular occurrence of long wet periods, here we have had another sodden winter. There is little I can say other than wait for the ground to dry out a little before you attempt to do too much on it.

I have had to resist the urge to go ahead with sowing lots of seeds in the greenhouse as it has been just too early. But with March here now sowing will happen in earnest and the plug plants that I have ordered will arrive at the end of the month. I mainly order plugs of plants that require a long growing season and plenty of heat. which is expensive even though fuel prices are 40% down on last year. Even if the weather is poor there will be plenty to do in the greenhouse, so much so that I will struggle to do it all even with the lengthening days and the time altering at the end of the month.

I seem to rely on the spell we get this month when the ground opens up and drains whilst we have a spell of drying north wind; then I can prepare the ground well incorporating lots of garden compost and dung ready to plant my onion sets directly into the soil. This year I am sticking to my trusted varieties of Sturon and Red Baron. I have lots of seed onions to plant out at a later time these are Kelsae and some more Red Baron. I

seem to find if you do not take advantage of that spell you will wait another month until things become fit once again. Follow the planting instructions on the packs but bear in mind, within reason, the more space you give the onion the bigger it will get. Whilst you are in the veg patch plant a few broad beans, peas and get a row of early potatoes in. If you have a spare piece of clear plastic about, cover your newly planted potato rows with it, do not worry if it only covers half of your potato patch as this will bring those plants on remarkably quicker than the uncovered ones. Who knows you may be able to draw your first potatoes for Flora Day.

The warmer days will encourage the weed seed to arise from their slumber all around the garden so as time and the weather allows get out there with the hoe and desist their efforts. For the larger brutes a fork will be a useful ally, especially a neat little border fork to work around those perennials in your flower beds. Docks, Buttercups and Nettles are beasts but are easily tamed but you have more work to control the Bindweed, Creeping Thistle and Ground Elder. The ground is soft so you will be able to manage the job.

One job I have to do this month is to plant a new Yew hedge. This is to replace an old diseased



Escallonia. This is the latest really to do it using bare root plants, but the spot which is planned is a little shady and near the cliff tops so early planting tends to mean that the plants are not well rooted and drawing up enough moisture to prevent severe or catastrophic wind burn when we have those winter gales, like we suffered once again this February. All the remnants of the Escallonia will be dug out and the soil will be well prepared with extra organic matter and fertilizer. They will need to be kept well-watered throughout the next year to ensure their survival.

Do not plant yew trees anywhere near where browsing animals are liable to chew, like your boundary hedge against a field. This is because they are poisonous when

eaten and are not good for the farmer's cattle or sheep.

March will mean the sowing of some hardy annuals outside as well as the half hardy ones in the greenhouse. Tomatoes will also be sown along with some cabbage and salads. Chrysanthemum cuttings will need potting on and dahlias sorting out. Then there are all the daffodils to enjoy and try to sort the best out for the Spring Flower Show which takes place once again in Ruan Minor Village Hall on 19th March. Schedules can be obtained from the village shop and around, all those involved would love to see you there especially with some exhibits. Do not be worried or confused by the schedule as there will be people on hand to help you on the day. Well keep dry and enjoy your gardening.



Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 11 January 2016 from 7.30pm

Present: Parish Councillors: J Preston (Chair), N Green (Vice-Chair), J Clifton, P Collins, P Freeman, J Lee, G Pollard, S Stephens and Clerk J Castle and 2 members of the public.

1. Absences and apologies:

There were apologies from Councillors M Fleetwood, M Jones and J Trewin, Cornwall Councillor C Rule and PCSO Berry. These apologies were accepted.

2. **Declarations of interest**: None

3. Public time:

Sophie Bennetts, the applicant regarding the Equestrian Barn and Arena application, spoke to the meeting. She noted that Councillors Preston, Green and Stephens had made a site visit and invited any other Councillor who wished to do so. She understood that there were concerns from the Councillors regarding the visual impact. In response to questions, she reported that the business involves the training and rehabilitation of horses using specialist skills in a holistic approach. It was noted that St Ruan Farm is a separate farm to Worvas Farm and the site chosen has good drainage and does not use land with more agricultural potential.

4. Police report:

In her absence, PCSO Berry had sent her report. 3 crimes had been reported to the police in December: a theft from dwelling and a criminal damage which had been investigated as far as possible. There had also been a report of a burglary that is currently under investigation.

5. Cornwall Councillor's time:

In the absence of Cornwall Councillor Rule, there were no matters to discuss. It was noted that she is in e-mail contact as necessary.

6. Minutes for acceptance:

Having been previously circulated, it was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Freeman that the minutes of the meeting held on 14 December 2015 be accepted. Carried 8 votes in favour.

7. Planning:

Planning Applications for consideration

 PA15/10880 - Removal of condition 1 of decision notice 2/10/77/00336/ FR03 dated 24/07/86 and condition 3 of decision notice 2/77/0336/GRA dated 15/06/77, Gwendreath Farm Holiday Park Ruan Minor TR12 7LZ. It was noted that this was an extension of the opening period for the park to year-round. It was proposed and seconded that this application be supported. Carried 8 votes in favour.

- PA15/11831- Proposed Conversion of Conservatory and Internal Alterations, 19 Mundys Field Ruan Minor TR12 7LF. It was proposed and seconded that this application be supported. Carried 8 votes in favour.
- PA15/07655 Equestrian Barn, Worvas Farm, Ruan Minor. Following the site visit by 3 Councillors, it was noted that the site will be well screened from the roadside and by scrub from the fields. The green-colour cladding will help the building to not look out of place. There is a wish to support local business and the bringing of work to the area. A thorough business plan had been received and it is the location and impact on the AONB which remains the major issue of concern. A query was raised concerning signage and it was confirmed by Miss Bennetts that this would be kept to the minimum.

It was proposed and seconded that, taking into account new information received and discussion with the applicant, Grade Ruan Parish Council supports this application with the provisos that sufficient screening is put in place to protect the AONB, that a porous surface is used for the hard-standing area to reduce run-off and that Highways Department approval is given, confirming suitable highway access, particularly with regard to emerging visibility. Carried 6 votes in favour and 2 abstentions.
