





RUAN MINOR BUS STOP : NEW LOCATION

In March this year Cormac Consultancy contacted the Parish Council and our Cornwall Councillor about a proposed scheme to provide a relocated bus-stopping place in Ruan Minor. Funding to construct a new waiting area and to provide a new locally built shelter opposite the junction to Mundy's Field, has been made available. The proposed location is considered to be more appropriate than the current location where bus turning areas are restricted or impede on to private property. The new turning area will be in the junction with Glebe Place, which is where the school buses turn. The scheme is still at the consultation stage. ASSETS OF COMMUNITY VALUE - "RIGHT TO BID"

One of the many provisions of the Localism Act that came into force in 2012 requires Cornwall Council to keep a list of assets which have been nominated by the local community that play, or could play, a vital role in local life and that might, at some future time, be threatened with closure or sale. Examples might be community centres, libraries, swimming pools, village shops, markets or pubs.

If an asset on the list comes up for sale, local community groups have six weeks in which to decide whether or not they wish to make an offer and, if so, six months in which to raise the money to back up the offer. There is no obligation on the owner to sell to the community and normal open market rules apply.

The Parish Council has discussed this at its Monthly meetings since February 2013 and submitted a list in January 2014.





Rector's Ramblings

Why didn't the Romans and Jews see the risen Jesus?

esus said: "Whoever has my commands and obeys them, he is the one who loves me. He who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I too will love him and show myself to him" (*John 14:21*).

Following Easter, we may wonder – as one of Jesus' disciples did (*John 14:27*) - why the risen Lord was never seen by the outside world: by Pontius Pilate or Caiaphas the high priest; by those who had been responsible for his arrest and death. Surely that would have been a wonderful way of launching the new, despised Christian faith at a very public level? Surely the risen Jesus had only to announce "You thought you were rid of me? Well, here I am after all!"?

But the answer is that Christ reveals himself only to those who love him. Here, in John chapter 14, Jesus is giving words of assurance to the disciples shortly before his death, as he speaks of the love relationship between himself and those who follow him.

From time to time we meet with great lovers of Jesus. We know that they are, because we cannot imagine them doing or saying anything that would contravene or sway them from their discipleship. Sometimes, when we meet them, we almost feel that we are speaking with Jesus himself!

The practical obedience, generosity and purity of living that pour out of the lives of those who love Christ in no way resembles the grudging servitude that a slave would give to a feared tyrant, gang master or employer. For lovers of Jesus Christ, theirs is the grateful response of love that has been awakened by a yet greater love still – the love of God through Jesus.

Is there a reward for such obedience, generosity and purity of living? There is! The reward is more of Jesus; a greater awareness of His presence and companionship with us, by day and night. In fact, Jesus elaborates further when he adds, "My Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him" (*John 14:23*).

All the more reason to walk the way of our risen Lord and Saviour! Blessings Revd Deirdre



Gardening in May



Well I think spring has properly sprung, but hasn't the weather been very polarised. So far we have either had long spells of rough wet weather or settled spells of dry and sunny, and very little in between. Let's hope the settled dry spells predominate from now on and we get an odd shower or two of rain overnight!

As I say every year, May is the busiest month in the garden and I am sure I will not find enough time to do it all but here are some ideas of things to do this month. Firstly in the greenhouse: if you plan to grow tomatoes, it is time to get them planted out either in the soil border or in grow bags. Soil borders get fewer problems with the plants drying out but you can get a build-up of pests and diseases, so I do recommend that you change the soil every few years. Weeds can also be a problem but this is relatively easily overcome by planting through a weed suppressant membrane or black plastic sheeting. When planting the tomato plant I like to sink a large plastic flower pot beside it and it is here where the plant is watered each day. I like to use at least a 2 litre pot as this prevents water washing the soil away or running off. The water gets straight to the roots and you know how much you are giving them.


You can also plant out <u>cucum-</u> <u>bers, peppers</u> and <u>aubergines.</u> Many <u>chilli peppers</u> do just as well in a large pot. If your greenhouse is home to a <u>grape vine</u> then I am sure you will find that it is putting on massive amounts of growth now. As long as you have got a

good framework, this is a relatively easy job to sort. Trim off all the new growth one leaf joint beyond the little embryo bunch of grapes which should be forming by now. You will end up with a lot of prunings but the energy will go into the grapes and you will need to keep this up through the summer.

Planting out summer bedding is getting to be an earlier and earlier event. It used to be something that was never done until the end of the month, but now you often see tender hanging baskets and the like around for May Day. It is a risk but most seem to get away with it. Alas the days of people planting out beds of tender annuals for the summer have gone; the inclination is not there anymore and trends have changed. These types of plants get used in tubs around the house or in small pockets in the garden to fill gaps between shrubs and other perennials. They do benefit from preparing the ground well. Dig over, remove all weeds, add some fertiliser and some organic matter if possible. With tubs, change the soil as this will be spent. The thing to remember with tubs is that we plant far more in one than we do in an open border. The same is true of a hanging basket, so regular watering and feeding is essential - a bit of rain will not do!

You know that there is always some <u>pruning</u> job to do and this month it is the spring flowering shrubs. As these shrubs finish flowering now is the time to do some pruning. It is best is to remove a third of the oldest stems and tidy up the rest. But, if the shrub is completely out of

control, you can go in hard. The types of shrubs to have a go at are lilacs, weigelias, flowering currants and forsythias. As the <u>daffodil</u> leaves start to yellow off, you can take this as a sign that the leaves can be tidied away. Always allow 6 to 8 weeks after flowering before you do this so the energy can go back into the bulb to flower next year. This timing means that the earliest of the varieties can only be tidied up after Flora Day.

Work goes on at great pace in the vegetable patch at this time of year with planting out and the soil now warm enough for direct sowing of all the usual vegetables. May is the time to plant your main crop of Runner beans; they are thirsty hungry plants so dig a good trench and fill it with well-rotted organic stuff be it garden compost or farmyard manure, add some fertilizer and back fill the trench. Put up a strong framework for the beans to grow up, then sow the seed. Lay the seeds out on the surface of the soil at the recommended distance along the row, then push them into the ground with your forefinger to a depth of your second knuckle. Hopefully by July you will be harvesting succulent beans.

I like to sow marrows, courgettes, squashes and pumpkins in pots early this month, then plant them out later away from cold wind into ground rich with well-rotted manure. It can be good fun to have a go at growing a giant pumpkin. The variety to grow for this is called Atlantic giant but you can spend a fortune on special seed at tens of pounds each even. One household seed supplier sells some at £5 each - they came from a British record specimen. These plants do take a lot of space but children love them and they make great feature when Halloween comes around. My best results have come when I have

dug a large pit and filled it with a couple of barrowfuls of well rooted muck, then covered it up with a good layer of soil 8-9 inches deep then I would sink an old clay land drain into this mound with only the top couple of inches out of the ground. Cover the area in black plastic sheeting or weed membrane then plant through a hole on top of the mound. Always water down the drain pipe and the sheeting prevents weeds. The big boys use large glasshouses, drip-fed irrigation systems, giving food all the time, and electric blankets while the fruit is growing.

This year at the Autumn show the novice class is going to be a pair of <u>beetroots</u>. If you would like some seed to have a go, please contact me. There is nothing to stop you sowing some now but they will mature too early for the show and they will end up large and woody. Next month will be time enough and I will give you some tips then.

What else will I be up to this month? I anticipate that the sweet peas will need a lot of tying in, side shooting and removing of the tendrils. My Dahlias will get planted out towards the end of the month when the last chance of frost and cold winds has receded. All salads will continue to be sown at fortnightly intervals, hopefully! Therefore a continuous supply may well be achieved. I have not yet sown any of the annual herbs like Dill, Coriander, Basil and Chervil, so I may get round to that but it is not high on my priority list as I rarely use them.

I am looking forward to the smells and sights of May with Lily of the Valley, Wisteria, Lilacs and the heady scent of the deciduous azaleas. Make the most of the good days and enjoy your time in the garden.

The Herbal Medicine Cabinet by Deanne Greenwood BSc (Hons) Herb Med

I was very excited to find horsetail (*Equisetem arvense*) on The Lizard last month. It brought back a mixture of strong emotions for me. A couple of years ago my teenage son was in agony and could not walk. An MRI scan revealed he had lost all the cartilage in his hip joint. He was told this could not be repaired and that he needed

a hip replacement. However, after eight months of taking a herbal formula containing horsetail, my son was walking again and a scan showed that almost all the cartilage had regenerated. The doctors were mystified, but I wasn't. Horsetail is full of silica, which encourages cartilage regeneration. My son did, of course, have youth on his side, which counts for a lot, but I have found it very helpful for older patients with osteoarthritic complaints.

As well as my trip down memory lane, I've been wandering along the coast path gathering hawthorn blossom (*Crataegus spp*), which I made into a tincture to macerate the berries in later in the year. Hawthorn is packed with flavonoids and antioxidants, which help strengthen blood vessel walls, reduce blood pressure and the risk of heart disease.

The heart is, of course, part of the pulmonary system, as are the lungs. So it's probably no coincidence that a plant called lungwort (*Pulmonaria officinalis*) comes into bloom (flowers going from pink to lilac) around the same time as hawthorn. Lungwort leaves are dappled and look rather like a lung, and surprise, surprise... lungwort is a renowned herbal respiratory remedy useful for ailments including bronchitis and asthma!

Scurvy grass (Cochlearia officinalis) is another plant with a name indicating its medicinal use – and there is currently masses of it along the coast. Sailors used to drink the juice of the leaves, which is rich in vitamin C, to prevent scurvy. There's not much call for it these days, of course!

Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 10 March 2014 from 7.30pm

Present: Parish Councillors J Preston (Chair), N Green (Vice-Chair), P Collins, M Fleetwood, P Freeman, S Stephens, J Trewin, Cornwall Councillor C Rule, Clerk J Castle

and 14 Members of the Public (including Susan Needham, Nicky Jose, Victoria Harrison, Maggie Weaver, Martin Ellis, Miss R Stone, Miss M A Stone, D S Fleetwood, Sallyanna Ellis, Jeff Lee, Ian Cox, Marita Jones)

1. Absences and apologies: Parish Councillor C Cooper, PCSO Julia Berry

2. Declarations of interest: Councillor Fleetwood declared an interest in a Planning item.

3. Public time: Nicky Jose and Martin Ellis expressed support for the continuance of the shop at Long Loft, Cadgwith, with regard to the application for a retrospective change of use from office space to a shop. Ian Cox also stated that the shop was a good asset for Cadgwith and Maggie Weaver confirmed her support.

Two people put themselves forward for co-option as councillors. Marita Jones

- who had practised as a solicitor firstly in local government and then in private practice. She stated that she is keen to get involved in the local community which she has recently moved into. Jeff Lee also put himself forward. He is an ex-policeman and fraud enquiry officer in local government. He has lived in the area for many years and stated that he is passionate about local issues.

4. **Police report:** in the absence of PCSO Berry, the Chairman presented her report. During March, there had been 3 reported crimes (all drug related and 2 had resulted in cannabis warnings and 1 still under investigation). Police contact numbers were noted.

5. Cornwall Councillor's time: Councillor C Rule reported that the County Council had raised the flag for Commonwealth Day.

The Council is currently looking at the impact of the welfare funding review on the community and has several projects running, with a corporate team involved. There are a number of interim measures in place and the Council is able to supply help with budgeting, training etc. Councillor Rule stressed that if parishioners are aware of anyone experiencing difficulties, they should contact the Council.

With regard to the extreme weather conditions of the last few weeks, Councillor Rule wished to thank not only council workers but also the local communities. There have been over 250 incidents of damage caused by the weather over the last 2 months, with a cost already estimated at £21.45 million. The Council is fighting for funding from central government. People seeking financial help, should go through Councillor Rule. The Chairman thanked Councillor Rule for her update.

6. **Minutes for acceptance:** The minutes of the monthly meeting held in February had been circulated and a number of minor amendments were made. Councillor Green proposed the minutes of 10 February 2014 be accepted and Councillor Freeman seconded. Carried 7 votes to 0. The Chairman thanked Councillor Collins for taking the minutes at that meeting.

7. Planning:

<u>PA14/01234</u> - Councillor Fleetwood withdrew from the meeting as he had declared an interest in this item. This application concerns the retrospective change of use of office space to convenience shop, Long Loft, Cadgwith. An e-mail and a letter had been received objecting to this based on commercial competition. It was noted that the building is not listed. Councillor Collins proposed that the application be supported and Councillor Stephens seconded. Carried 5 votes to 1.

Councillor Fleetwood returned to the meeting.

<u>PA14/01547</u> – Re the proposed alterations to side and rear extension of Grade II listed building, Vine Cottage, Cadgwith. It was proposed by Councillor Green and seconded by Councillor Freeman that this application be supported subject to the proviso that any future sale of the property should be sold as one unit, as there were concerns that the property would comprise 2 letting units. Carried by 5 votes plus one abstention.

<u>PA14/01577</u> – tree reduction at Malahat. It was noted that this item was withdrawn as Cornwall Council has approved it.

<u>PA13/11532</u>– this is an outline application for the erection of a 2 storey, 4 bedroom residential building with attached garage at Myresyke, Kuggar. This

is a garden plot and the position is prominent in the landscape, involving a large building. Concerns were expressed about over-development, particularly as the site is in AONB landscape and visible from the coastal path and close to National Trust land and also about setting a precedent in an area where there are a number of potential plots.

It was originally proposed that the Council would object on the basis that the proposed development is too large in a prominent hill-top site in open AONB countryside visible from the coast path. However a substantive amendment was proposed by Councillor Green and seconded by Councillor Collins and this was carried by 6 votes to 1.

The revised proposal made by Councillor Green and seconded by Councillor Collins was to support a single storey development on the plot, with the proviso that the visibility splay for the proposed access and the adjoining property is sorted out so as to be acceptable to the Highways Department. Carried by 6 votes to 1.

<u>PA14/0988</u> – proposed biomass boiler and building at Mullion Holiday Park. It was confirmed that this is not visible from the main road and access for delivery is good. Councillor Preston proposed that this application be supported and Councillor Collins seconded. Carried 7 votes to 0.

Concerns were raised at the size of a chalet in the grounds of Bodrigy Lodge. It was queried what size requires planning permission and whether special rules apply in a conservation area. **ACTION : Clerk / Councillor Preston to seek guidance on this.**

- 8. Finance:
 - Financial Report the report was noted
 - Internet Banking Councillor Green reported that the Clerk was now able to log-in for internet banking and access for the Chairman is in progress. Other councillors needed to apply individually for access and he would re-send the e-mail on how to do this. **ACTION : Councillor Green**
 - Payments Schedule the approval of the payment schedule was proposed by Councillor Green and seconded by Councillor Freeman. Carried 7 votes to 0.

9. Matters arising from the minutes:

• <u>Former Church of Ruan Major St Rumonus</u> - the Chairman had re-contacted Adrian Browning, of the Church Commissioners, who

was willing to come down and meet with the Parish Council in the next 4 to 8 weeks. The Chairman had stressed the urgency of the short-term work. The priority is to save the tower falling down. The Chairman has sourced some grant funding but nothing can be put in motion without the support of the Church. **ACTION: Councillor Preston**

- <u>Play Area</u> no update at present. Still seeking grant funding. **ACTION: Councillor Collins**
- <u>Parish Councillor Vacancy</u> the Chairman welcomed Sheila Stephens, the new co-opted councillor to her first meeting. It was noted that there had been 2 further expressions of interest (4 vacancies remain) **ACTION: Candidates to be asked to write to the Clerk and Chairman**
- <u>Grass Cutting at Glebe Place</u> a response had been received from Coastline, stating that the matter would be considered at the next committee meeting. ACTION : Clerk
- <u>Right to Bid Applications</u> Councillor Freeman reported that the School had been rejected as schools are excluded from the Scheme and the Council had requested more time to consider the applications. Some boundary issues remain outstanding. ACTION: Councillor Freeman
- <u>Parish Online</u> Councillor Green reported that this was set up and running for all councillors to look at. Any councillor can annotate the map.
- <u>Community Network Panel</u> this is joint panel with Mullion and Lizard parishes. Councillor Green had attended the meeting on 11 February. There had been a presentation by Cornwall Council Library Services regarding plans to withdraw the mobile library vans and run the service from local venues, a possible move to online ordering and the use of Kindles (with help from WVRS). Parish Councils were requested to submit possible venues. ACTION: Councillor Preston

There was also a presentation by Cornwall Planning and Enforcement teams. Pre-applications were discussed, together with the meaning of various planning actions. Parish Councils were asked to advise Chantal McLennan (Link Advisor) if a determination date falls close to a parish meeting date.

The Emergency Management Plan had been passed to the Chairman for completion. The next meeting is Wednesday 4 June.

Parish Council Seal - it was proposed by Councillor Collins and cont.

seconded by Councillor Green that the revised design go ahead at a cost of £64 plus VAT. Carried 7 votes to 0.

10. Matters for consideration:

- <u>Ruan Minor Surgery</u> it was noted that the work on the consulting room floor had been done at a cost in excess of £1000. The surgery had asked the builder to look again at the quote for the alterations to the toilet which exceeds £7000. The Chairman reported that the Parish Council had not received a request for a contribution to this expenditure. The lease is a full repairing lease, but the Parish Council has to approve any alterations. When the revised quote is available, the Parish Council will need to decide whether to make a contribution as landlord.
- <u>Ruan Minor Bus Stop</u> it was noted that with the existing location the bus turning is dangerous or impinges on private property. Concern was expressed about the prominent position of the new proposed siting but it was agreed to proceed to formal consultation. **ACTION : Councillor Preston**
- <u>Waste Management</u> Councillors were asked to comment on the paper produced by Stithians Parish Council. **ACTION: Councillors**
- <u>Rural Sounding Board</u> consideration of joining this was deferred.
- <u>Invitation to join Cornwall CPRE</u> although the aim was to provide help with planning law, it was not considered appropriate to join.
- <u>Consultation re mobile library and one stop shop</u> already discussed.
- <u>Consultation re home to school transport</u> it was noted that the deadline had passed.
- <u>Affordable Housing Supplementary Planning Document</u> this asks for views by 14 March. Councillors were asked to comment on the document. Particular concern was expressed about restricting the time limit for the use of s.106 funds to 3 years before being passed to the County Council who have 7 years to use it. It is a very short time for a parish to get a scheme up and running. **ACTION : Clerk**
- **11. Correspondence:** nothing further to discuss.

12. Footpaths, environment and treewardens: it was noted that grants are available for flood /storm damage. There are a number of coastal erosion matters that need to be kept under review. It may be necessary to place more warning signs at Cadgwith. Councillors were asked to list any items that should be considered and pass them to the Clerk for forwarding to Councillor Rule. It was noted that Clare Banks at Helston should be contacted with

regard to drains and there is a pothole telephone line at Cornwall Council. **ACTION:Clerk**

The tree planting programme is underway.

Great concern was expressed about the passing place by the pub in Cadgwith being used for parking and also parking blocking the exit from the footpath onto the road. The Clerk was asked to explore possible action. **ACTION: Clerk**

There had been issues with the road in Cadgwith being blocked when the boats had to be hauled up during the storms and it was felt that this should form part of the emergency plan and the necessary procedures should be agreed with the County Council. The views of Councillor Rule should be sought. **ACTION: Clerk**

Following the cutting back of the hedges in New Road, it is now easier to check what work is required and it was agreed that Councillors Preston and Freeman would meet up and investigate further. **ACTION: Councillors Preston & Freeman.**

It was noted that Cornwall Council had cleared some ditches but not others, presumably due to funding.

The meeting closed at 10 pm.
