NATIONAL TRUST NEWS NOVEMBER 2013

As October draws to a close we've lots to report. It's been a hectic period for project work. This month sees the winding up of a large project across Cornwall, that has seen much grant funding National directed to improvements to the coastpath. This Rural Development Project for England funding has allowed us to improve Trust drainage and the surface of the coastpath, and tackle some problem sections. The hill down to Poltesco from Friar's Lane has been an ongoing headache for many years, with the surface suffering gulleying most winters after heavy rain. Hopefully no more! Larger culverts have been installed and beefier cross drains should mean it will survive the next monsoon. Also tackled were a couple of muddy hollows up at Kildown Point and Gwavas, and a rocky section at Carn Barrow was made easier to negotiate If you've been out recently you may have noticed we have re-routed the coastpath slightly at Gwavas. This is because the old route was in a gulley, with no easy way for us to solve the winter mud, so we've moved the path to higher ground. The view is better as a bonus! Our final RDPE path project will make the narrow section of coastpath between the sheep fields at Bodriggy and Cadgwith lookout easier to negotiate. In a neat bit of recycling, the aggregate we're using has come from the landslip at Polpeor, Lizard Point, where pinning of the rockface, so the beach access can be reopened, is another of our projects currently on the go.

In non-footpath news, if you've walked down the hill to Poltesco from Ruan recently you can't have failed to notice that Poltesco Mill is carefully wrapped up in a protective tent of tarps and scaffolding. This impressive temporary structure

is to provide protection from the elements as necessary building work is undertaken to remedy roof troubles. The mill's slate roof is beina completely stripped and relaid and timbers repaired where rotten. As always with such jobs. more rot than we initially thought! Traditional techniques and materials are being used, and the temporary roof will be helpful



in controlling the drying of the lime mortar, which is key to the process. The repairs should give this historic water mill, with origins in the Mediaeval period, many cont.

This was a living history day up at Dry Tree on Goonhilly and involved all sorts of adventures with highwaymen and Stone Age hunters, although in an old fur coat our huntress looked more like a dishevelled film star! Great fun was had by all.

In the last few months we've welcomed Cat Lee to our Poltesco based team, in a part-time office support role. Many of you may know Cat from either the lifeboat or her work with the Cornwall Chough Project, and it's good to have her onboard. Talking of choughs, you may be aware of the sad news that the original Lizard pair perished over the summer, the male ousted by his grandson, and the female disappearing days later. In a strange twist, the new male adopted the original pair's 2 chicks, and did a good job of rearing them to independence. He has found himself a female, so there may be choughs nesting once more at Lizard Point. Choughs are still seen regularly along Gwavas, over Cadgwith and towards Poltesco, so these iconic birds are very much a part of Grade-Ruan's coastline too.

Rector's Ramblings - Remember, remember

T HE month of November is a time for remembering. The most obvious occasion is, of course, Remembrance Sunday when up and down the country – and places across the world – we remember those who have given their lives for their country and for the freedom that we enjoy today. These are not only men and women of the First and Second World Wars, but of the many conflicts that have occurred since and those that continue even now. May we always take time to remember the huge sacrifice that those brave people made and continue to make for us.

But there are other 'remembering' times during this month. Right at the beginning of November we have All Saints and All Souls, when we remember not just well-known saints (All Saints), but those whom we have loved but see no longer (All Souls). In many churches All Souls is marked with a special memorial service, during which candles are lit for each of those whom we want to remember.

Then there's Bonfire Night ('Remember, remember, the fifth of November, Gunpowder, treason and plot...), remembering the night when a certain Guido Fawkes and his band of men (terrorists or freedom-fighters?) tried to blow up the Houses of Parliament, and celebrating the fact that he did not do so and that he was burnt at the stake. Perhaps for us today the remembering is more about family fireworks in the back garden - complete with Jacket Potatoes (wrapped in foil and cooked in the bonfire), baked beans, hot chocolate, sparklers, stories and a later-than-usual bedtime.

There are many references to 'remembering' in the Bible, for example: God said, "I will remember my covenant between me and all living creatures" (*Genesis* 9:15); "Remember the Sabbath day" (*Exodus 20:8*); and Jesus, at the Last Supper said, "Do this in remembrance of me" (*Luke 22:19*), as he gave the disciples the bread and wine – symbolising his body and his blood – and something which we continue to do in our Holy Communion.

The opposite of remembering is, of course, forgetting. It's so easy to be drawn to the often misguided values of today's society, with its emphasis on possessions and status, that we forget God; that instead of Him being at the centre of our lives He is sidelined – except for a brief time perhaps on a Sunday (or maybe only once or twice a year), instead of praising Him '... from whom all blessings flow.'

So ... 'Remember, remember' - our Creator, Redeemer and Life-giving God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The National Seafarers service has been held at St Paul's Cathedral since April 1905, when a British shipmaster suggested that the centenary of the death of Nelson would be a fitting occasion for the inauguration of an annual seamen's service in St Pauls Cathedral. The service has been held annually since, except for some gaps during the first and second World Wars.

Many seafaring organisations are represented at the service; this includes the Royal and Merchant Navies, the commercial world, shipping companies, mission and philanthropic societies, schools and museums, veterans' associations, labour unions and youth and leisure organisations. The service is sponsored by a number of different organisations, with office facilities and staff required to organise the event provided by the Mission to Seafarers.

Andrew Putt said 'It was a privilege to represent the RNLI and carry the RNLI Standard. There were several hundred people at the service and a number of organisations' Standards were marched into St Paul's at the start of the service. It is really great to think that the work of the lifeboat crews is recognised in this way'.

Well the <u>seasons</u> have certainly changed since my last article. We were fogged in for three weeks, often with no more than 100 yards visibility; not properly wet, but nothing really drying out. Sometime during all that, around the week before the show, all the swallows disappeared for warmer climes - do we really blame them? The winter migrants are on their way and the first frosts must be just around the corner. Where did autumn go?

My column this month will be short, as you will see plenty about the Autumn show elsewhere in the Gazette, but I am going to start off on a moan. People often ask me about cutting their hydrangeas back. They want to cut them back hard, giving them a neat hair cut to within a foot or so of the ground. This will just result in a green mound next summer and very few flowers. But, they say, the bushes are getting just too big. Hydrangeas flower properly at a certain size for the variety. If the bush is too big when pruned properly, by taking a third out at a time, then it will always be too big, so dig it out and replace it with a different type they are not all the same. Every year an elderly lady got me to cut her hydrangeas down to the ground because she could not see out of her kitchen window and by the end of the summer they were there once again blocking the window. They were mature bushes with large root systems to give vigour and put on the fresh growth.

Now the <u>trees</u> are dropping their leaves, you can think about major surgery to them. Cutting large branches can cause stress to the tree, so doing it when

the tree is dormant the stress is much reduced. When doing heavy pruning, try to rid the bush of diseased wood first then crossing branches, then prune to shape. This job can be carried out from now through to the end of February avoiding icy times.

The garden can look a little dull at this time of year with short days and low light levels, so it is nice to plant up a tub with some colourful autumn / winter flowering bedding. Go to the garden centre and locate plants like heathers, violas, cyclamen and the like, then get them home, find a spare tub and fill it with compost. It does not need to be fresh compost, just refreshed with some fertilizer as the plants will not need the energy as theywill put on very little growth. But do make sure the compost has no vine weevil grubs in it as these pests will happily munch through whatever you plant. Finally site the tub somewhere with a little shelter where you can always see it, so as to get most value from it.

In the <u>veg garden</u> there is little to do as I would not recommend sowing or planting anything - just keep harvesting anything you have ready like leeks and brassicas. When the weather allows, dig over any spare patches to reduce work in the spring. Allow the winter to work on the soil, clear a crop of weeds and the birds can have a go at the pests. If you can get hold of it, digging in some bulky organic matter is a great idea also, a good healthy soil structure is the key to good crops. Keep off the soil when it is soggy or icy as this will compact the ground.

Clear your <u>greenhouse</u> of tomatoes. If you have fruit which are still green,

This is due to the ethylene which the ripening banana gives off. Once the tomatoes are cleared you can clean the house down with disinfectant ready for next year.

I expect that your <u>lawns</u> will slow down now but I do anticipate another couple of mowings before Christmas. Keep the blades quite high as you will only encourage moss otherwise.

What will I be doing <u>this month</u>? Less than I should or at least hope to do, but the last of the bloom chrysanthemums will be cut, then all the plants will be pruned back to near ground level ready for cutting production in the spring. The dahlias will get a similar treatment. Begonia tubers will be lifted and dried a little, then stored somewhere frost and mouse free. Finally the last of the spring bulbs will be planted; November is the

ideal time to plant tulips as I have written before.

Not too many of the carrots I have been leading you through made it to the show bench. Congratulations to Charlie Coates for winning that class. Most of the excuses seem to have been pest related. It is not easy to grow all those wonderful exhibits that you see at the show, but it is well worth a go. Now I have to decide what to lead you through next year. There were several classes in the show especially flowers in which I was the only entrant. If you fancy a go at something like the chrysanthemums or dahlias anything really - contact me and I will try to set you on the right road and may be come up with some odd plants if you are serious.

Well there is something for you to do for another month, enjoy your gardening.

William Henry Legg

is named on the Ruan Minor War Memorial, having fought and died in the 1914-18 war. Michael Legge, one of William's many descendants still living locally (who somehow acquired an 'e' on their name), provided photographs and documentation relating to his Grandfather's war service. This supplements the research that Ginny Sealey did on the men named on the War Memorial, for an article published in the Gazette in November 2008.

William Henry Legg (known as Billy) was born in 1893 in Bovey Tracey, Devon. In 1915, aged 21, he married Rose Agnes Jane of Cadgwith. They





had three children, William Henry A Legg (b. 1915), Dorothy K Legg (b. 1916) and Maurice Charles Legg, known as Bunny, who was born in 1917, the year that William was killed in Belgium.

William seems to have been in a member of various regiments: he was a Private in the 2nd Battalion, 7th Devonshires, and was awarded medals by the Northumberland Fusiliers. He was killed, aged 23, in the Battle of Passchendaele in Flanders on 24 August 1917 while serving with the King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry. The

Passchendaele ridge near Ypres was the objective of a costly unsuccessful British offensive from July to November 1917. Private Legg was killed in a German counterattack. River banks and dykes were so badly damaged in the heavy shelling that the whole area was a sea of mud. Those who were killed

Who Remembers?

Walking down Duck Lane to the shop (by the way, "Welcome and best wishes to the new incumbent!), my trip-down-memory-lane, is of the last house, now called "Mallards", which, in the 30s, 40s and early 50s (and probably the 20s) was a thriving farm, with rich, lush land, which is now Mundy's Fields. This extended to, and bordered that of the Hendys at White House. There was a meandering boggy area, possibly marking a boundary of sorts.



This picture is taken from the Spar end of Duck Lane, and shows the substantial Rutter Farm house, which was knocked down sometime in the 50s, as it had become derelict. *Picture courtesy of Jan Morgan.*

Mr and Mrs Rutter ran this farm. During the war years, we would sometimes, not often, walk across Mr Nicholls' five fields (with one or two rather hairy stone stiles for an eight year old to clamber over) to buy Butter - in a beautiful "pat" with an imprint of cattle on it..... This was in the days of acute rationing did they have Ministry conditions and restrictions, or was it "on-the-side"? My sister and I would make the rather obvious joke of "buying Butter from Mrs Rutter". My memory of this kind and friendly lady was that she was always in Wellingtons; her work-a-day coat secured with string; an old beret on her rather wild grey hair, AND a chipped front false tooth, which fascinated me.

Mr Rutter was friendly, tall burly with receding hari, and seeing him with his cattle, one knew he loved each and every one. What was their fate in those day? - A short shap exit in the field behind, probably at the hands of Mr Copeland, who lived where Martin

Fletcher is now. Surely better than a long frightening journey as now, to distant abattoirs.

I also recall, or does my memory serve me wrong?, their only son Barnett, and admiring him from afar, as he cut a dashing figure, with his white open sports car, and his lovely far haired wife and their two very pretty daughters: Where are they now?

Jan Morgan, who provided the photo of Rutters Farm says:

I fondly remember the milk lorry arriving each day and loading up the milk churns at the bottom of Ducks Lane from a raised platform which was level with the bed of the lorry. It had about 50 churns on it from the local farms as I recall. It was also my wake up call to catch the bus to school!
