

What's in a Name?

The new housing development has a sign stating that it is called "Roman's Rest". This has stirred up a bit of controversy in the parish for a number of reasons:

- a) It seems the Roman's never got further south than Wadebridge and certainly never set foot on the Lizard
- b) It sounds like a burial place
- c) No-one living in the area was consulted.

I've spoken to the Marketing Manager for the commercial side of the development, and he assures me that this is just a marketing name thought up by their Advertising Agency. Their website and marketing literature names it as Roman's Rest and apparently it is too late to change this. However, he assures me that the actual name will be chosen by Cornwall Council, with input from the Parish Council. This will happen around half way through the build when the road-names and post-codes are established. He said that we should make sure that our County Councillor (Carolyn Rule) and Parish Councillors are made aware of our preferences, so that these can be taken into account when names are established.

I will forward this to Carolyn Rule and the Chairman of the Parish Council and, hopefully, we'll hear no more of Roman's Rest once all the houses are sold.

Thank you to Ginny Sealey for first pointing out this stupid name and for following it up with the developers.

Community Land Trust

As a result of the planning application to knock down the Kennack Sands Inn and build eight flats, the Parish Council has received over £250,000 to be used for providing affordable housing in the parish. This money is held by Cornwall Council and will be used for housing in another part of the county if we don't soon come up with a plan to use it in the parish. So we must use it or lose it.

We are setting up a Community Land Trust, a new not-for-profit body that will ensure that money never finds its way into private pockets and will always be used to make affordable housing available for future generations. It's very democratic in that all residents in the parish can become members, provided they agree with the aims and are willing to pledge just £1. These members will meet at least once a year and will elect a Board of six people who will look after the day-to-day management of the Trust.

The first meeting will be in the **Village Hall** on **Tuesday 15th October** at **7.30pm** so please come along then, hear more about it, ask questions, make suggestions, become a member and help to elect the first Board.

Rector's Ramblings - Mission Accomplished?

By the time this letter is published, the Walk Cornwall Mission in this part of Cornwall will be almost over (if not already finished) and I hope most people reading this will at least have noticed it, if not benefited from and enjoyed it – mission accomplished?

In one sense, yes! A great deal will have been accomplished and the list of people involved, who deserve many thanks, is considerable. Some are even involved walking on other weeks or areas in the mission. More than this, I hope that there will be people who have responded to the mission and want to hear more, to come and worship with us, or join either the Alpha or Christian Basics courses which follow-up on the mission. But still, I don't think we can say 'mission accomplished'.

To be a church which does missions is better than one that does not ... but to be a missionary church is better still. To do mission we can plan, resource and commit ourselves to an activity and, for a while, drop other things. But it does not necessarily change the way we are in the normality of what it is for us to be and do 'church'.

Being a missionary church is a way of seeing that everything we are and do (day by day, week by week) is mission, or it is not church. It is what shapes our priorities and our character. And it is not just about outreach (going and telling people about Jesus), it is also about reaching in, in to ourselves as people and as a community. Both go together – we will have little success sharing the good news with others if that good news is not continuing to transform our own lives and community.

The image I have is of a Pilgrim People; responding to God's call and journeying into more and more of the new life and community that he is making, centred on his Son. And as this Pilgrim People journey into the promises of Christ they discover that this new life grows best when they share it with others. The Holy Spirit anoints us with a vision of God and as we give ourselves to God in praise, we find the same Spirit has led us out among the people – that's the Pentecost pattern.

Sometimes we may feel that Christianity and Church are under threat and there is a tendency to try to and maintain and protect it, but it is not a delicate plant that needs cosseting in a religious greenhouse. In reality it needs space to grow, reaching into new lives and drawing them in. If we try to shut it away in the privacy of our own lives or the confines of traditional church, we may merely end up stifling it until it withers away.

I am not sure what such a 'missionary' church looks like - and sometimes I might think it

a bit too uncomfortable to contemplate – but I am convinced that this is the sort of Church God lives in and I would like to find out what it might look like here in this place and time. Seeking his Kingdom.

Cornwall Council urges householders to Register Now

to Vote in European Parliamentary elections next year

Cornwall Council is calling on local people to register now to make sure they can have their say and vote in the European Parliamentary elections taking place in May 2014. The Council is required to produce a new and accurate list of voters each year which then stays in force for the following twelve months. This process usually takes place in the Autumn but is being held later than usual this year following a decision by the Government.

Electoral registration forms are being posted on 1 October to all 258,000 households in Cornwall. This list of voters will then be used as the basis for the European Parliamentary elections in May 2014. The new electoral register will be published on 17 February 2014 and only people who are on the register will be able to vote.

Gardening in October



Well I hope you enjoyed the summer and it's nice to say that we did actually have one this year. But this has changed now; as I write this the first of the equinoxial gales is blowing through along with the rain. I was told several moons ago that when growing those large bloom chrysanthemums in pots ready for autumn shows or just cut flowers they should be moved under cover from their summer outdoor standing ground by the 14th September. Not to do so would be foolish as untold damage would occur from the winds thereafter. When did the first gales come through this vear? Answer: 15th September. For some reason we always seem to have a storm around the week

of the equinox in the autumn. Why this should be I have yet to be told - perhaps the fishermen will know?

Another sign that autumn is here is that the annual Autumn Show is taking place once again on 12th October. I hope that you have all got some entries. I am a bit light this year as I spent so much time on those Sweet peas. This leads on nicely to your exhibition carrots, which you have been growing from the seed I gave away. On the day before the show, gently move away some of the soil from around the tops of the carrots, and select those which look most even in size for lifting. Use copious amounts of water poured around the carrot and gently grasp it around the top of the root and steadily pull it up trying to keep the fine tap root intact. Using a fork runs the risk of damaging the carrot.

The next job is to wash the carrot off in some warm water with a squirt of washing up liquid added. Gently remove all the dirt with the aid of a sponge and soft cloth. Pay particular attention around the shoulders of the carrot where the foliage meets the root. Then remove all the fine hair like roots, a short sharp upward tug tends to do the trick. Finally trim the foliage off three inches above the shoulders of the carrot. Select the best matched roots, wrap them in a clean damp cloth and you are ready for the show. This is true for anything that you enter in the show, aim for the entry to be as blemish free as possible but also match the items up so that they are as uniform as possible.

some time yet but you will see a marked slowdown in growth, especially with the colder nights. Keep mowing regularly but raise the blades on the mower a little; this will reduce the stress on the grass, keep the lawn green and help prevent moss growth. Mowing will pick up those fallen leaves also and this all will make good garden compost. You can feed your lawn at this time of year but use a specialist autumn feed which is low in nitrogen. This will promote root growth and harden the grass up for the rigours of winter.

The air is definitely much cooler now but the soil is still relatively warm. so conditions are still good to lift and divide herbaceous perennials. If you have large clumps, especially some where the centres are dying out, lifting and dividing may well rejuvenate the area. Lift the whole clump of whichever plant you have selected and put it on a sheet of some kind. Then dig the whole area where it came from thoroughly, and add some organic matter as well as liberal amounts of slow release fertiliser, such as bone meal. Now go to the clump that you dug up and split it up into several sections approximately the size that two hands would surround. Only keep the vigorous parts which seem healthy and discard the old central area. Cut the foliage right back as this will only lose moisture and possibly cause rot. The plants will not make top growth until the spring but, with warm soil, the roots will grow and get the plant established. You will most likely end up with more than you would sensibly put back so you can plant them elsewhere, pot them up or pass them on to friends.

If you have not done so already, give your <u>hedges</u> a final trim before winter is upon us. I know of several people who like this time of year because any work that they do in the garden to tidy it will last for many months and this is very satisfying.

Keep going with planting those <u>spring bulbs.</u> Daffodils are great and are essential for the spring show, but give some of the other bulbs a go. They are different and will spread the show over a longer period. We all like to have something that our neighbours have not got.

Some plants come into their own at this time of the year: Kaffir lilies start to flower in August and go through to at least November. They are good doers but you need to be ruthless with them as you could soon be over-run. Pampas grasses are looking good too, but they can also be brutes and are not for everyone. Autumn is the time of the chrvsanthemums and there are manv different types, with the superb show blooms of various forms. But for the garden you cannot beat the Garden mums and Koreans, which come in various shades of autumn colours and are relatively trouble free if you keep the slugs off in the spring and give them some support.

What are looking particularly good this year are the <u>Yuccas</u>, which have got lots of flower spikes a little earlier than many years. These are very architectural plants all year round, topped off now with the tall spikes of creamy white flowers. The downside of the Yucca is that it has an evil disposition and does its best to stab you with its bayonet-like leaves. I am not sure what triggers flowering in Yuccas - whether it is the wet weather from the year before or the very hot spell we had in early July. Whatever it is, they are good this year.

Well that's enough for now. See you at the show on the 12th and enjoy your gardening.

FROM RUAN MINOR TO TRELISKE IN SIX MINUTES BY STEVYN COLLINS

On Thursday the 1st August I had been helping erect the tents, flag poles and posts for the forthcoming Vintage Rally due on the following Sunday. We had a big and enthusiastic team of helpers and all went fast and smoothly. A friend and I decided to call it a day at 2 o'clock and we adjourned to the pub in Cadgwith. It was a hot day and we sat outside drinking cider.

On my second pint I suddenly began to feel the space around me moving. I told my friend I was not feeling very well - he made some joke about drinking cider instead of my usual whisky and water but when I came to pick up my glass with my right hand it felt as if it was full of lead and I had to put it down again. At that point my friend realised there was something wrong so called my wife Debbie. When she arrived it was decided to go straight to the doctor's surgery in Ruan Minor. When I tried to stand up to go to the car. I couldn't and had to be carried and put in the front passenger seat. Doctor Oliver came out almost immediately and carried out a quick examination with me still in the car. He then said the Air Ambulance would be here in ten minutes. This I found to be really worrying as I still had no idea that anything much was wrong. We waited in the car and the Air Ambulance arrived but couldn't land at Glebe Place Green. Next a road ambulance turned up, closely followed by Angela Thomas in her car with the medics from the Air Ambulance which had landed on the Recreation Ground.

Meanwhile Mike Fleetwood had brought the key to the Rec gate and the ambulance was able to take me right up to the helicopter. I was transferred to another

stretcher, put in a sitting position in the helicopter, fitted with a blood pressure cuff and given oxygen. As we flew on our way, the lady medic with me kept up a continuous monologue, pointing out land marks – Goonhilly, Helford River, Falmouth Harbour etc. – through headphones. In six minutes we were landing at Treliske. I was wheeled in to A&E and by now I could – thankfully - get off the stretcher and onto a bed.

The young doctor found that I had had a minor T.I.A. which had cleared itself. My wife arrived soon after, my daughter called from Liverpool and a friend working in Truro came to visit. I was given a lecture about my lifestyle and told to improve it. After more tests and the "all clear" I was told that I could go home. Next morning I felt fine. I had an appointment at Barncoose hospital *[Camborne Redruth Community Hospital, Ed]* where I had another discussion about my lifestyle. I am now endeavouring to make changes.

I would like to thank my many friends for their well wishes, Paul and Pam Penrose, Dave Rodgers for their prompt first aid, my wife and family, Angela Thomas for driving the medics from the Rec, Mike Fleetwood getting the keys for the Red, the Cornwall Air Ambulance Service and last but not least our amazing National Health Service, second to none in the world.

Post-script: The Rec gate has now been fitted with a combination lock. Cornwall Air Ambulance has procedures in place to advise their crew of the combination when they are due to land on the Rec. *Moira Hurst*

Minutes of the July Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 8 July 2013 at 7:30pm

Present: Parish Councillors N Green (Vice-Chair), J Trewin, P Freeman, M Alford, M Fleetwood, P Collins, Cornwall Councillor C Rule, PCSO J Berry and two Members of the Public.

1. Absences and Apologies: Parish Councillors J Preston (Chair) and C Cooper. The apologies were accepted by those present. In the Chair's absence, Councillor Green took the Chair.

2. Declarations of Interest: Councillor Green declared an interest in planning applications PA13/04710 and PA13/04708.

3. Public Time: no matters were brought up in Public Time.

4. **Police Report:** PCSO Berry reported there had been a theft from the Gig Shed in Cadgwith but it was not known when this had happened. There had been another report of children congregating in Ruan Minor. She had been trying to promote the Boatwatch scheme to help reduce boat related crime but no interest had been shown to date. Various questions were asked about the recent publicity at the possibility of Helston Police Station being reopened. Clerk to write to the Devon & Cornwall Police and Crime Commissioner to support the proposal of Helston Police Station being reopened.

5. Cornwall Councillor's Time: Cornwall Councillor C Rule reported all the Portfolio Committees are now operational. She is the Chair of the Devolution and Localism Committee.

A budget consultation is being conducted and can be accessed through Cornwall Council's website. There is an interactive section users can utilise to illustrate the impact of increases or decreases in specific budgets would have on the remaining budgets.

There is a new regime for applications to the Community Grant Fund. Previously the application form was available on Cornwall Council's website and Councillor Rule had circulated it to the Parishes. Applications now have to be made through Kerri Gendall.

Councillor Rule is now a member of the Devon and Cornwall Crime Panel.

The Standards Committee has considered the alleged inappropriate comments made by Cornwall Councillor Colin Brewer since his re-election. The Committee found he had breached the Code of Conduct but has no power to suspend or take any action against him. Early indications are that he may resign.

Concerns were expressed by the Parish Council by the recent increase in charges in the Cornwall Council owned car parks in Helston and asked this be fed back to Cornwall Council.

Councillor Rule was asked if she could follow up some of the various Highways matters the Parish Council had raised with Highways which did not seem to be progressing.

It was discussed whether the public engagement relating to the funds held under a s106 agreement was sufficient to retain the funds for the Parish. This needs to be clarified.

6. Minutes for acceptance: the Minutes having been circulated were proposed for acceptance subject to some amendments by Councillor Collins, seconded by Councillor Trewin – all in favour.

7. Planning: Councillor Green declared an interest in the first two planning applications to be considered and left the meeting. Councillor P Collins took the Chair.
