We will still have space for contributions from anyone who would like to write something for the magazine. If you have any news, views or photographs relevant to the Parish, please do let me have them.





Despite the grim winter weather we have had, we've been lucky with the rowing and seemed to have generally found the very rare gaps in the wind and rain.


Ladies and Men's Crews have been out, muscles re-discovered and a few crabs have been caught along the way.





The musical highlight is on Sunday night, when the "3 Daft Monkeys" will be playing from 9pm.



Rector's Ramblings Spring into Life

Sinto action; all those things that you've always intended to get on to, when the days are better. Time for spring cleaning. Nothing like a bit of sunshine to show up all the cobwebs that have grown in winter gloom. Time to throw off the gloom and solemnity of winter and live a bit. As I am writing this, the sun is shining and, even with a cold wind, people are out enjoying themselves.

All this is normal and common to us all. It's part of the cycle of the seasons, part of normal life. But, before we just leap into Spring and all it means for life renewed and released ... what about Easter? Easter, as I'm sure you have noticed, has been a bit early this year. It's come and gone and Lent seems a distant memory. So what now, has it made any difference to us and the life we may be eager to get on with, now Spring has come?

The May Festival will be your chance to have a sneak preview of the new pavilion before the official opening takes place later this year.





Firstly, I am sorry that I was forced to cancel the April beach clean due to illness. Many thanks to those that went along anyway and did some cleaning. Every bit of litter, or rubbish washed in by the tide, picked up is one less thing to harm the environment.

The big issue at Kennack is the County Council's decision to remove the rubbish and cease collection. Despite hins requests from all quarters, the Council will not budge. They gave us an extension of one month and will withdraw as of 1st May, the date of our next beach clean! Natural England, who lease the land will cover the cost of some of the rubbish removal, but their funds are limited. So, part of the approach for this year will be an extensive signage asking folk to take their rubbish home. The Cafes will be responsible for the wast they generate and they will arrange for the disposal of that.

I should like to extend the role of "Friends of Kennack" and to that end want to recruit committed folk to become "Kennack Rangers". This is a slightly extended version of the scheme running at Poldhu. There, the guys are "dog rangers", all National Trust volunteers, who wear labelled tabbards and "patrol" the public areas. They carry, as would we, a apray to mark dog poo that has been left and poo bags to hand out to visitors with dogs. The system there is working well and it is one that I wanted to set up at Kennack - encouraging responsible dog ownership and disposing of their dog's waste in an appropriate manner - not lobbed into the nearest hedge or gorse bush!

As we now have this situation with the rubbish removal at Kennack, I am starting a group of Kennack Rangers to not only look out for dog fouling, but also to encourage people to take their rubbish home. Being a Ranger is purely voluntary, but Natural England are looking to employ a beach cleaner (West beach only) during the summer months. This will be approximately 10 hours per week. To discuss this position, call Steve Townsend of Natural England on O1326 240808.

We are still discussing a longer term solution for rubbish collection, should the "take your litter home" fail.

As Spring gathers pace and the weather warms, we're limbering up for the massive task of trimming all our footpaths. There is plenty to keep us out of mischief, with the many miles of path in our care across the peninsula. The last few months have seen the Poltesco based Ranger

team busy preparing our most heavily used sites for the season ahead, including resurfacing at Lizard carpark, restoring the turf at Kynance, and the laying of a new boardwalk over the dunes at Poldhu. Luckily it's just been the usual wear and tear to tackle, as despite some storms, we haven't suffered too badly over the winter.

Closer to home, the renovations at Poltesco Mill House will be completed this month, and we will be advertising the house as available to rent as a main residence. This Grade II 3 bedroomed cottage comes with extensive gardens and a traditional orchard, so we'd like to find folk who will care for the grounds, and take an interest in the adjacent historic mill, which we are working to restore. Please check RightMove for details in due course if this property interests you.

Elsewhere in the parish, our ponies have been doing a good job this last 6 months grazing the cliffs between Poltesco and Cadgwith and we've followed up with some brushcutting around the outcrops to keep things in tip top conditions for rare plants like twin headed clover and dwarf rush. The ponies will be off in the coming months to their next site, before returning to the parish at the end of the year.

Please be aware that the sheep have returned to the fields at Bodriggy, so we're asking dog owners to ensure their pets are under control at all times, as unfortunately our farm tenants have had issues in recent years, with some mauled sheep having to be put down, and others aborting their lambs. Please be aware that your dog being out of sight, or chasing but not actually catching sheep, are never acceptable! If you witness any incidents of sheep worrying, or have any other things to report regarding the livestock there, please call Rosuick Farm on 07511 461532.

Congratulations to two of our residential volunteers Michael and Katie, who have found jobs with the National Trust in The Lake District and Peak District respectively, and sadly we've also had to say goodbye to Wild Lizard Education Ranger Claire as this project has come to an end. We wish Claire well with her new business venture. Welcome to new volunteers Gina, who is on placement from university with us and Rosie who is helping co-ordinate our Wildlife Watchpoint at Lizard Point. The watchpoint will be open right through to the end of September, every day 10am-4pm so do pop by to chat to our volunteers, and hear about the latest basking shark, chough and dolphin sightings. Keep heading south, the watchpoint is the very last building!

Gardening in May

Well I have decided that this will

be the longest spring ever, starting sometime last November and will go on deep into May/June. I saw the first of the daffodils flowering when the last of the Swallows disappeared on Bonfire night and the Swallows returned on the 1st of April and daffodils are still flowering at the end of April. Not having a proper winter has delayed the flowering of several things. Our coldest spell came just before Easter.

May is a month of madness with everything making a rush of growth, especially weeds. In the greenhouse many of you will be thinking about tomatoes. If you have not done so already, it should be safe enough to plant them out now. You will find the best flavoured and easiest to look after will be plants grown directly in the soil of the greenhouse border if it is disease free. I had a problem with some kind of root disease last year so changed all the soil in my greenhouse this spring a big job. I will let you know how it goes. But many of you will have no border in the greenhouse so large pots or grow bags are the answer. The biggest secret to tomatoes is water and feed and they like plenty of both, therefore I would recommend only planting two tomato plants per grow bag and ensure you get good quality bags. Before you open the grow bags, bash them around a bit so that the compost inside has more air in it and is not too compacted. Then water liberally and feed once they are established and have the first truss of fruit set.

You can also plant out cucumbers, peppers and aubergines. Many chilli peppers do just as well in a large pot. If by David Endean

your greenhouse is home to a grape vine then I am sure you will find that it is putting on massive amounts of growth now. As long as you have got a good framework, this is a relatively easy job to do. Trim off all the new growth one leaf joint beyond the little embryo bunch of grapes which should be forming by now. You will end up with a lot of prunings but the energy will go into the grapes and you will need to keep this up through the summer.

As the leaves on your daffodils yellow it will be safe enough to tidy them away. This may leave some gaps in your borders in which you could make some late sowings of hardy annuals Things like Candytuft, Love in the Mist, Cornflowers or Californian Poppies. They will happily germinate and grow from sowing in the open ground, but another convenient way is to sow some seed into modules; these then, when large enough, can be planted out and they are initially protected when young from pests and get a head start from the weeds. You could also plant half hardy bedding in those gaps later in the month.

In the Veg patch it is almost the case of if you have got it sow it. Now is the time to sow Runner beans and French Beans. A good deep trench filled with plenty of moisture retentive organic material is the order of the day, then a sturdy framework is required for them to grow up. Choose a sunny site which has some shelter from the worst of the winds as these beans are quick growing and so are quite tender and easily damaged. Keep sowing peas, lettuce, beetroot, carrots and cabbages to name a few things. Or have a go at growing a big pumpkin for a

Home: 01326 241960 Mobile: 07749 815358 bit of fun; they will need lots of space, and lots of feed and water. I would advise starting them off in pots, and then planting them out near the end of the month, but they can be direct sown. For a whopper try Atlantic Giant in one of its forms.

If you have any spare ground, keep it well hoed to stop the weed growth. Cropping the weeds this way will reduce future problems and keep the ground readily available for planting soon.

What else will I be doing this month? Well, there is the planting out of the Dahlias, potting up the exhibition Chrysanths, tying in of the sweet peas, mowing the lawns and enjoying other people's peonies as I do not have any myself. So you best get out there now and enjoy your gardening.

Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 14 March 2016 from 7.30pm

Present: Parish Councillors: J Preston (Chair), N Green (Vice-Chair), J Clifton, M Fleetwood, P Freeman, J Lee, G Pollard, S Stephens, J Trewin and Clerk J Castle

and 2 members of the public.

1. Absences and apologies: There were apologies from Councillor Collins. Councillor Jones was also absent.

2. Declarations of interest: There were no declarations of interest.

3. Public time:

Mr David Hawkins spoke with regard to local use of Ella's Field, which is adjacent to Bodrigy drive. He noted that the field, which is owned by his family, existed for the preservation of wildlife, the enjoyment of his family and for the enjoyment of members of the local parish. There is no legal right of way across the field. The family had not pursued a permissive path agreement as they only wish to provide low key access for locals. Mr & Mrs Hawkins are happy for the public to retain access but would ask them to keep to the established path line and to clear up after dogs. They are looking for anything the Parish Council can do to help achieve this. The Chairman stated that the availability of the path was much appreciated as it provides a lovely link to the coastal path and thanked Mr & Mrs Hawkins.

On another matter, the Parish Council asked for its thanks to be passed on to Grade Ruan Community Trust for organising the resurfacing of the car park at Cadgwith.

4. Police report:

It was noted that there will no longer be any police attendance at parish council meetings except in special circumstances. Crime statistics are available online but it was noted that these only provide a limited amount of information. The Clerk was asked to write to the Police and Crime Commissioner's Office asking for more detailed local information to be provided on the site. **Action: Clerk**.

5. Cornwall Councillor's time:

Cornwall Councillor Rule reported to the meeting:

- That the Lengthsmans scheme had been discussed at the recent Community Network meeting and it was noted that this is not being progressed at this time. Proposed regular meetings with Ben Dickinson of the Highways department will help in that the limited spend available can be prioritised at parish level.
- Emptying of bins at Kennack Sands it was noted that this is the responsibility of the landowner and Natural England had been notified in November 2015 that the collection of waste from these bins was too expensive for Cornwall Council to continue with. A limited extension of the collection had been granted to the end of April.
- One-off pot of money to be allocated at community network level approx. £35k (i.e. £5000 per Cornwall Councillor) – is to aid devolution projects or, if

not used, can be allocated to other projects. Processes to apply for this funding need to be put in place.

- The Local Government Boundary Commission for England (LGBCE) is carrying out an electoral review in Cornwall, which will include reviewing the number of Cornwall Councillors and the boundaries of electoral divisions. Work is to be carried out from May 2017 to 2021 to change the boundaries within the county. There is a meeting to discuss this at County Hall on Wednesday 30 March from 2–3.30 pm and a member of the Parish Council is invited to attend.
- Cornwall Councillor Rule agreed to look into a query from Councillor Lee as to the removal of the planning application in respect of Prazegooth Lane from the planning register.
- Councillor Lee also asked for the requested statistics to be provided regarding planning enforcements.
- Cornwall Councillor Rule responded to concerns expressed by Councillor Stephens regarding roadside litter collection and confirmed that there was no longer any funding to cover this.

6. Minutes for acceptance: Having been previously circulated, it was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Fleetwood that the minutes of the meeting held on 8 February 2016 be accepted. Carried 8 votes in favour and 1 abstention.

7. Planning:

8. Finance

- <u>Financial Report</u> the bank reconciliation was noted, together with the statement of Income & Expenditure for February 2016. It was noted that the grant regarding the new pavilion should be shown under projects rather than S.137. **Action: Clerk**
- <u>Payments Schedule</u> it was proposed by Councillor Clinton and seconded by Councillor Fleetwood that the payment schedule amounting to £669.32 be approved. Carried 9 votes in favour.
- <u>Grant applications</u> it was noted that Shelter had queried whether small grants are still available. The Clerk was asked to reply positively to this. There was also a grant request from the Grade Ruan Gazette for financial assistance in view of the increased number of parishioners and rising print costs. It

was proposed by Councillor Trewin and seconded by Councillor Clifton that the request be supported. Carried 9 votes in favour. The estimated amount is £350 but the funds are not required until a clearer picture of any likely shortfall is available in September. The Clerk was asked to write indicating the Parish Council's support. **Action: Clerk**

• <u>Asset Register2015/16</u> – it was agreed that the computer, peripherals and other office equipment should be written off as out of date and therefore scrapped and a note added to the Asset Register schedule to this effect. It was also agreed that the old play equipment should be written off and the cost of the new equipment supplied by Alastair Guy be added. **Action: Clerk**

9. Matters arising from the minutes:

- <u>Play Area update</u> Councillor Preston reported that Wendy Elliott had attended the grant meeting at Lizard and made a grant application of £3,000 to the 100 Club. An application has also been made to Goonhilly for £5,000 and to Coastline.
- Councillor Lee agreed to ask the picnic table supplier to store them until the roof of the new pavilion is finished and the scaffolding has come down as access will be a problem. The Village Hall committee is paying for these.
- Councillor Preston reported that he had not yet received more detailed information from the contractor regarding the additions to the zip wire structure, which is needed to put the proposals for Phase 2 out for public consideration.

- Councillor Fleetwood reported a piece of wood sticking out of the ground that needs removal and Councillor Preston agreed that a visit and clear up campaign is necessary in the next couple of weeks.
- With regard to fund-raising, Councillor Preston agreed to approach Moira Hurst regarding a summer barbecue. **Action: Chairman**
- <u>School Bus Turning</u> the Chairman had discussed the possibility of a virtual pavement being painted on the road surface on the approach to the school with Ben Dickinson from Cormac. He has asked Maxine Hardy whether any grant funding is available and was awaiting a response. The one parking space remains a problem for the turning of the bus but the driver also has concerns at the existing bus stop about holding up the traffic.
- Councillor Preston agreed to speak to the school regarding parking but also pointed out that the need for a second shelter should remain under review. Action: Chairman
- <u>Speed Survey</u> it was noted that there was a negative response from the Highways department regarding possible traffic calming measures in Kuggar, particularly as they did not have any logged incidents.
- Refuse collection, Kennack Sands it was noted that a meeting between the various stakeholders had taken place and it was proposed that an appeal is made to Cornwall Council to provide a subsidy to cover the cost of collecting refuse / recycling for the coming financial year, giving time for a plan to be put in place for the following year. Cornwall Councillor Rule said she would enquire but did not think that this was likely due to budget constraints, particularly when the legal liability falls on the landlord and there is no onus on Cornwall Council. Councillor Preston reported that an agent for the Tregothnan Estate which owns the beach is coming down for a site meeting on 21 March. It was suggested that all-year opening of the car park could be queried with the agent, if the café owner is made aware of this first. The problem with seeking contributions from the various involved parties is that it would appear that they are only prepared to contribute if all other parties do. There was also a suggestion that the Parish Council should contribute. It was noted that not keeping the beach free of litter would pose a serious threat to the local tourist trade.
- <u>Notice Board</u> it was noted that Councillor Collins had obtained a quote from Alligator Signs for a new board (to go on the existing posts) for £450. Councillor Preston agreed to check the construction to ensure that it is fully weatherproof and, if this is the case, it was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Fleetwood that this purchase should go ahead. Carried 9 votes in favour.

10. Matters for consideration:

- <u>AONB updates</u> it was noted that the draft management plan for the next 5 years is up for comment. With regard to the marker stones, the signs have been made up and the blocks dressed so it is likely they will be placed on the various roadside locations in April.
- <u>Community Network update, including verges</u> it was noted that the recent meeting had been well attended and the lack of funds for highways work was noted. However, it is anticipated that the spending on verges will be the same

for 2016/17 as for 2015/16. On this basis, it was agreed that the Parish Council should monitor the situation and only step in if something changes. The proposed meetings with Ben Dickinson will help this process. Councillor Lee was thanked for his attendance at the meeting.

• <u>Minibus Permit</u> – it was noted that this has been issued and needs lodging with the School. This means that the Parish Council can request use of the bus for village events.

11. Correspondence:

- <u>Dog Poop Bag stands</u> Sue Cadman has put in a request for stands (with bags). The Clerk was asked to get further information regarding this. Action: Clerk
- <u>Planting</u> a letter had been received from Simon Bradley regarding planting by a neighbour. It was agreed that this is a private issue and that Mr Bradley should be referred to information on the Cornwall Council website re invasive species and high hedges. **Action: Clerk**
- <u>Great Big Cornish Gig Row</u> it was noted that the gig will be coming in to Cadgwith on Monday 4 April as part of the Armed Forces community initiative and should be supported by the Parish. Councillor Preston agreed to request any available publicity materials and possibly include a note in the Gazette. **Action: Chairman**
- <u>Helston-Redruth Road</u> a letter was sent to Cornwall Councillor Biscoe in support of improvements to this road and he had forwarded it to Nigel Blackler, Head of Transport, Waste and Environment.
- <u>Village Green</u> it was noted that the Parish Council's request to register the Glebe Place Green as a village green has been refused because of an unsolvable legal technicality. The Council has been advised that the public already have access to it "by right" as a place of recreation and this statement in the deeds prevents it being registered as a village green.

12. Footpaths, environment and treewardens:

- Footpaths Contract it was noted the contract had been subject to a tendering process in Spring 2013. The contract covers both the SWCP and LMP plus extra work requested by the Parish Council. The funding from Cornwall Council for the SWCP /LMP contracts has been increased by 10%. The recommendation to the Parish Council is that the contract is renewed for one year with Bob Sanders, who carries out the work well, understands the parish and offers a reasonable price. This year can then be used to put together the tendering process for Spring 2017. The acceptance of this recommendation was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Green. Carried 9 votes in favour. The Clerk was asked to write to Bob Sanders. Action: Clerk
- <u>Footpath 2</u> Councillor Preston agreed to discuss drainage with the owner of the land regarding flooding on the section from Braeside to Sea View. Action: Chairman
- <u>Weed spraying quote from Cornwall Council</u> it was noted that this had been offered at the same cost as last year. The quote has been accepted
- Little Beach steps/ drain it was noted that this has now been concreted over.

- <u>Blocked drains</u>- it was noted that the recent weather has continued to cause problems in a number of areas (including in front of the Old Cellars and the Ice House) and is causing the road surface to break up in places. It was agreed that this should be discussed at the next meeting with Ben Dickinson, with any known problem areas marked on a plan. **Action: Chairman**
- St Ruan Well John Reeves, who lives in Helston, has e-mailed about the area of unsightly undergrowth around St Ruan Well preventing proper access. He visits the site frequently and provides candles and a visitors' book. It was noted that the maintenance regime has lapsed over recent years. Councillor Pollard agreed to help with the clearing work. Once the area had been cleared, it could be added to the cutting schedule as it provides access to the footpath. It was agreed that Councillor Pollard and Councillor Preston would meet on site to discuss the work required, which is basically to clear an area to walk round, providing a gap between the scrub and the structure. Action Councillors Pollard and Preston.
- <u>Erosion of footpath from Cadgwith car park</u> it was agreed to monitor this going forward.
- <u>Mundy's Field car park</u> no problems reported.

13. In Committee:

• No items were discussed in committee

Recipe of the Month Cadman Mess

(This is like an Eton Mess, but with a twist)

<u>lngredients:</u>

1 pint double cream

 $400\ grams\ strawberries,\ hulled\ and\ cut\ in\ halves$

2 heaped tablespoons icing sugar

Additional Ingredients:

4 small dogs, or 1 large may suffice

Method:

Whip cream until stiff. Carefully fold in icing sugar and strawberries.

Put this mixture into a large plastic bowl to refrigerate. Before, or as you put the bowl I the fridge, trip over four small dogs and drop the bowl. This will result in the desert covering an area of approximately 12ftx12ftx8ft, which will decorate the floor units (base and wall), blinds, cooker, hob, toaster, kettle and walls. There is also sufficient to cover four small dogs and yourself from top to toe/s.

If there is a gap between the cupboard doors and the units, you will find that you can also get a sizeable quantity in your cupboards. For greater effect, you can increase the quantity of cream and the number of dogs.

Done in this way, it will take approximately 90 minutes to clean up the "Cadman Mess", shower the dogs and yourself. ENJOY - the dogs of course, not you!!

Happy Flora Day!


I can't believe it's May and another Flora Day already. I hope by the time you read this we will have added a dragon to the window display!
