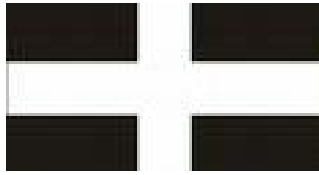

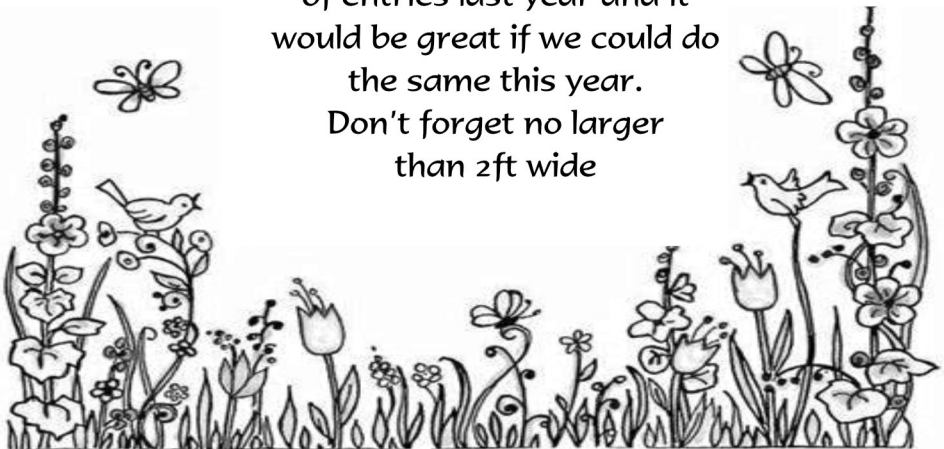

Eulogy for Christine

9th October 1938 - 30th November 2019

I'd like to begin by saying thank you on behalf of the family to all of you who have joined us here today to celebrate the life of Christine Jane and to say farewell to a unique and wonderful woman. It's humbling to see just how many lives she touched. We are also acutely aware that the last few months – and this week in particular – has been a very difficult time for our community, and we would like to extend our deepest condolences to all those who have suffered their own loss.

Where to begin? There are too many memories, too many stories to be told, and not enough time to even scratch the surface. Today we can only tell

a small part of the whole, but each one of us can forever treasure our own memories of Christine and keep our own stories of her close to our hearts.

Christine was born to Winnie and Herbert William Webster on the 9th of October 1938, in St. Mary's Hospital, Paddington, London. She was the eldest of four daughters and is survived by her three sisters: Linda, Rosemary and Josephine. Rosemary and Josephine are with us in the Chapel today. Linda is in New Zealand with her family, but sends her thoughts and prayers to all.

Christine remained in London until she was 12, when the Webster family moved to Cornwall. Even at that young age she had already lived through the bombing raids of World War II and the hard years of reconstruction that followed, so it's easy to imagine what a paradise Cornwall must have seemed to her in comparison, and to understand how she came to love the county so deeply.

Her family settled in Camborne, where she attended Bassett Road School. Christine left school at 15 and began her working life alongside her upholsterer father at the Mundy furniture factory at St. Ives. She contracted pleurisy when she was 17 and had to spend a year at home recovering. The silver lining was that the ordeal sparked her interest in becoming a nurse.

Christine returned to London to study nursing at Highlands General Hospital, then trained as a midwife at Freedom Fields Hospital in Plymouth. She moved back to Cornwall and joined the staff of Bolitho Maternity Home in Penzance as Sister-in-Charge, where she spent the next several years delivering literally hundreds of babies. It's a measure of how highly she was regarded that many of those same babies – now in their 50s – have sent messages of condolence and support to the family.

In 1963 Christine met a handsome young Helston boy by the name of Ronnie Jane at the Flamingo club in Camborne. An 18-month courtship followed, which included a great deal of dancing, romancing and some spectacularly unsuccessful driving lessons. Ronnie maintains to this day that the only reason Christine passed her driving test was because she was wearing her nurse's uniform when she took it!

Ronnie and Christine were married on the 5th December 1964 and began a journey together that would last 55 years. They set up home first in Marazion and then in Helston, where Christine became District Midwife. In quick succession, they produced 4 gorgeous children: Susan, Bruce, Katey and Steve. At which point Ronnie decided enough was enough and bought a television set.

In 1974, the Janer clan moved from Helston to Cadgwith, where Ronnie's family has roots stretching back generations. It's a testament to the strength of the family unit they built together that all four of their children and the majority of their grandchildren remain within walking distance of the family home to this day.

All these dates and these details are the simple facts of Christine's life, but they can't begin to describe the woman who lived it. If any life could be summed up in just two words, Christine's words would be "love" and "kindness". In her choice of a career, in the strength and longevity of her marriage, in the way she raised her children to be the fine and decent adults they are today, love and kindness defined everything she did.

Her devotion as a mother never faltered – Christine remained a constant source of comfort and wisdom for her children throughout their lives, and will continue to guide and protect them through the lessons she taught them and the memories she created with them.

When her children were very young, Ronnie and Christine would drive them to chapels and church halls across Cornwall, where the youngsters would entertain congregations with their beautiful singing. Some of the very funny rehearsal tapes from back then suggest that getting the four of them to sound so angelic was not always easy, but the legacy of her efforts is that she could be sung into the chapel today by the voices of her own children, and she would have loved that beyond words.

In later years, Christine took great pride and joy in her grandchildren. She loved baby-sitting them when they were younger, and as they grew she was always there with a smile and a word of advice and encouragement whenever it was needed. All you grandchildren are here today, and every one of you should know that you gave her many years of happiness. Your Grandma lives on in your memories of her.

Her love and her kindness showed in the care she provided for animals of all descriptions, too. Not many youngsters get to share their bathroom with a recovering gannet, or their kitchen with an assortment of guillemots and razorbills, but that was a privilege the Janer children enjoyed. And that was in addition to the endless procession of other animals that benefited from Christine's care: Sally Seaweed the dog, Polly the Parrot, Gertie and Baby the goats, Creamy the horse, the jackdaws, the terrapins, the badgers and many, many more besides.

Her love and her kindness were not confined to her own home. She was deeply involved in village life, helping to set up Ruan Minor Youth Club and acting as Secretary of the

Junior Football Club, putting on pantomimes and carnivals, organising day-trips for the village kids to Carn Brea leisure centre and setting up Wednesday Night BBQs in the Cove – the list goes on, and you can only marvel that one person could have had so much to give to so many. The number of messages we've received from people who were touched by her kindness when they were only children themselves has been both heart-warming and hugely appreciated.

So love and kindness, absolutely. But also humility, loyalty, courage and grace. Christine never sought the limelight, she never had an unkind word to say about anyone, and she dealt with the inevitable set-backs and tragedies of life with a quiet and uncomplaining dignity that should serve as an inspiration to us all. She leaves behind a legacy of precious memories that will live on forever in the hearts of her family and of all those who were fortunate enough to know her.

I began by thanking you for gathering here to celebrate Christine's life, and that is exactly what she would have wanted us all to do. Despite our inevitable sorrow, we should take comfort from and celebrate the fact that Christine lived a long, full and happy life in a village she adored, with her beloved husband by her side and her children and grandchildren close at hand. Her very nature meant that she would have hated to be (in her eyes) a burden on anyone, and though the shock of her sudden passing is so very hard for us to bear it also means that this profound wish was granted to her as one last gift for her to give.

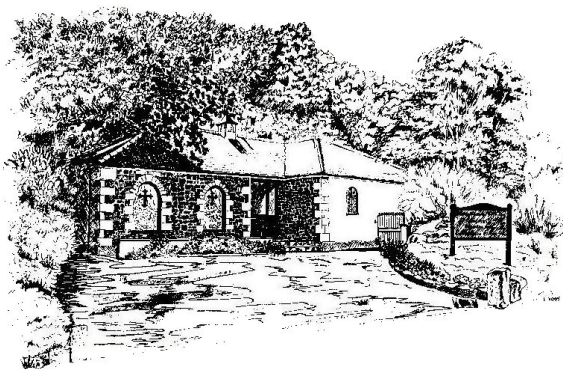
She loved deeply and was deeply loved in return. She will be missed forever.

Sally of course has been sharing the editing with me for years and long may she continue in the role. Welcome to Lizzie; we're lucky to have her on the team.

There's a great team involved in producing and distributing the magazine:

Peter Martin, Treasurer. Peter deals with the accounts most efficiently and ensures that the Gazette remains solvent. Peter has been instrumental in keeping costs down and steering the Gazette to calm financial waters.

David Gascoigne, Distribution Manager. David receives the Gazettes from the printer and then packs them up ready for the local distributors. He delivers packs to some of the distributors, and leaves packs in Ruan Stores for collection by others. He maintains accurate records of the distribution rounds so that a backup can do the round if necessary. He makes the job look easy but a lot of work goes into it. Janet Gascoigne helps David and takes on ad hoc jobs where she can.

Judith Green, Subscriptions Manager. Judith ensures that the Gazette reaches subscribers who receive their Gazette by post. Many of the subscribers have lived in the area in the past and like to keep in touch via the magazine.

Distributors. The Distributors are listed on page 4. They go out each month in all weathers to ensure that the Gazette is delivered to every address in Grade Ruan Parish, whether it's a private residence, holiday let or business.

Claire at Ruan Stores. Claire keeps the "magbox" in the Store. People can leave written items for the Editors or Treasurer in the box. Claire also makes space for David to leave bags of Gazettes to be collected by distributors.

Editing the Gazette is quite time consuming so generally the editors don't have time to write articles as well. There is a good backbone of regular contributions from local organisations and the Parish Council. Readers are always interested in more ad hoc contributions in the form of memories and photos of times past, as well as news of current events and residents' activities. Please help to provide variety by submitting articles and photographs for publication.

Events being hosted by non-commercial organisations based in Grade Ruan can be advertised in the "What's On" section of the Gazette free of charge.

When I started in 2011, the Gazette was all in black and white; then Peter arranged for colour covers to be introduced and now we have colour wherever appropriate.

The Gazette is available on-line (www.cadgwith.com/gazette) but at present there is no plan to move away from paper copies.

May I thank the Committee for presenting me with a lovely Christmas hamper as a good bye gift – your kindness and thoughtfulness are greatly appreciated. Thanks also to everyone who has helped me over the years. I'm not disappearing completely and will still be taking a great interest in the magazine and possibly contributing from time to time. Being involved with the Gazette has been most enjoyable and it's good to see it continuing to have a place in the community. Bye for now - here's to a long and interesting future for the Gazette!

More about Lizard Wireless Station: Although small in size this unassuming hut (situated near Bass Point) holds a wealth of history. In 1900, the Marconi Lizard Wireless Station started as a research station for Guglielmo Marconi – a pioneer in early wireless communication. Along with his team Marconi developed technology on this remote Cornish clifftop that paved the way for today's instant world-wide



communication. The station later became the first coastal station to handle a ship's distress call under the newly adopted SOS signal, saving the life of all of those on board. During WWI & II it served many purposes; listening to enemy transmissions; communicating with airships; and housing for staff from nearby RAF Pen Olver. After the wars, the building was privately owned and known locally as the Marconi Bungalow until 1995 when the National Trust acquired and restored the hut with the help of the Trevithick Trust; it opened to the public in 2001.

Lifeboats

THE LIZARD LIFEBOAT VISITOR CENTRE NEWS

On 9th February 1923, the last in a long line of large sailing ship wrecks in Lizard waters occurred when the German ship, 'Adolph Vinnen' sank in 12 meters of water in Green Lane Cove, just under the Bass Point Signal Station.

The 'Adolph Vinnen' was a five-masted 'barquentine' built in Kiel, Germany in 1922. She was 79.9 metres in length and was powered by sails and two 350 hp 4-cylinder diesel engines. She was designed for a crew of 45 and was on her maiden voyage from Kiel to Barry where she was due to be loaded with coal.

At approx 17.00, the vessel was driven by a vicious southerly gale and blinding rain into the cove where she lay battered by the storm with the heavy seas continuously breaking over her.

Called out by rocket, the Lizard Lifeboat, RNLB FREDERICK H. PILLEY, made her way to the scene in the most difficult of conditions under the guide of Coxswain Richard Stephens.

Unable to reach the lee side, the lifeboat anchored to the windward and flung a grapnel on board the stricken ship. She lay like this for over an hour with the storm continually lifting the Lizard boat as high as the 'Adolph Vinnen's' rail and twice nearly washing her over the rail and on to the ship's decking.

The 'Adolph Vinnen's' captain, Captain Muller, eventually called Coxswain Stephens to draw away as the rocket apparatus teams had established a line on board from the shore and rescue of the crew would be carried out by breeches buoy.

In the conditions, it was not possible for the lifeboat to recover to Polpeor and she was forced to make her way to Falmouth where she arrived at midnight, seven long hours after call out. Conditions had been so bad that Coxswain Stephens had to call the roll twice during the shout to ensure that no crew members had been washed overboard!

RNLB FREDERICK H. PILLEY was, in fact, called out to the wreck again the following morning to attend whilst the remaining crew were evacuated by breeches buoy and, with its work done, the boat had to make for Falmouth once more, as recovery to Polpeor was still too dangerous.

2019 was another busy and successful year for the Visitor Centre with over 8500 visitors enjoying a trip to Kilcobben Cove to discover the history of the Lizard Lifeboat and to see how a modern lifeboat station operates. People from all over the UK and, indeed, from all corners of the world come to visit the Station. Last year the Visitor Centre Team welcomed visitors from 30 different countries, including three countries which had not previously been represented. The flags of these countries are shown below – can you identify them?



The annual stock take was carried out over the first three days of the new year. The Centre Shop re-opened on the 4th January and the New Year Sale is now well and truly open with 'bargains for all'!!

Singing by candlelight



Local singers Angela Agutter Thomas, Alison Goldsack, Wendy Elliot, Sally Ellis, Mark Outten and Pat Palmer were part of An Lysardh Christmas Choir at the candlelit service of Nine Lessons and Carols held at St Keverne Parish Church. This was the fifth successive year that An Lysardh Christmas Choir, comprising singers from across The Lizard under the direction of Andrew Woods, has led the service.

With St Keverne Church being the largest church on the Lizard Peninsula it seemed appropriate that choir numbers on this occasion had swelled to over 40, with some of the sopranos providing descants for several of the carols. As well as the traditional congregational carols, An Lysardh also sang six separate pieces ranging from the quiet and contemplative *Lully, Lulla, Lullay* to the rhythmic West Indian carol *The Virgin Mary had a Baby Boy*. Landewednack Church organist Ann Bradbury accompanied the choir and congregation on the organ and keyboard and also played two flute solos. Members of the choir including Wendy and Pat read the Lessons, with the Reverend Peter Sharpe who also led the prayers, reading the final Lesson.

The service was a very special event for Lydia Massey as not only was it her 11th birthday, but she got her dearest wish of being invited to sing the first verse of *Once in Royal David's City* solo. Lydia, who is a member of Cornwall Girls' Choir, appeared to show no nerves and sang the well known words beautifully. She was the star of the evening but her mother Charlotte also provided some sublime moments with her rendition of *Jesus Christ the Apple Tree* and her soprano voice soared over the choir in the spellbinding final bars of the aforementioned *Lully, Lulla, Lullay*.

The church was full to capacity with extra seats being required, and there was a magical atmosphere with 460 candles and a variety of decorated Christmas trees placed around the church's interior. Local campanologists rang the bells before and following the service. Afterwards mulled wine, fruit juice and mince pies were served, and the sound of singing was replaced by that of happy chatter. The retiring collection raised £460.10 which is being split between St Keverne Church funds and Sowenna (Cornwall's first NHS mental health unit for adolescents.) Andrew Woods is hoping to hold a similar service in December 2020 with the location yet to be revealed!

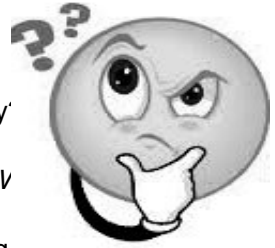

Rector's Ramblings

The Way of peace

It's a new year and new decade, whatever that means. Who knows where it will lead us? For my part, I realise that I have thrown a spanner into the works by announcing my retirement by August this year and Mike Britton will also be standing-down as our Lay Youth Minister in August.

I seriously do not know what this will lead to in the parishes which I look after. There will be a process, with the Diocese, to reflect on where we are and how we can shape our future. It will not be entirely in the hands of the parishes, because it will need to take into account the needs of the other parishes in our locality and the ability to match vision with resources – both within the parishes and within the Diocese.

It will be an opportunity to reflect on what we really are and what we really value. Usually it is a time when people pull together and discover that they can do more than they realised. But it is also a time to refrain, where possible, from major projects – reflection requires time, communication and prayer (lots of prayer).

Jan and I will be in the same place, as we face the practical challenges of moving and the deeper challenges of discovering what God is calling us to in this next stage of life.

Many scriptures come to mind at this time: words of encouragement (God is for us and with us), as well as words of challenge. But the words that have settled in my heart as I prayed about this letter come from Luke, where Zechariah speaks of God's calling on his son, John the Baptist, and the Saviour that he would announce ...

“... because of the tender mercy of our God, whereby the sunrise shall visit us from on high to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace.” (Luke 1:78-79)

The changes and challenges of the coming year may sometimes seem narrow and restrictive. But in God's tender mercy they can be a real blessing if we discover the gift of walking together in the way of peace. There may be times when we want to go off in our own way, but in Jesus there is a way of peace for us together. Its boundaries are marked out by Truth and Love ... and the presence of Jesus himself in his Spirit.

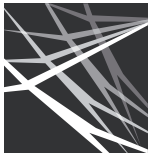

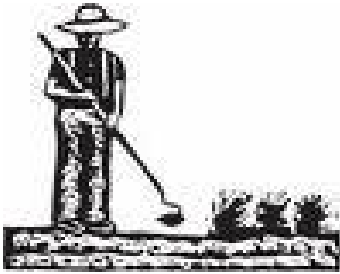

Gardening in February

by David Endean



Well we have turned the corner now the days are lengthening fast and I am getting that urge to start sowing seeds and taking some cuttings. The snow drops have dripped and the fields are being descended upon by armies of daffodil pickers. But one thing which has not changed is that it is still raining day upon day interspersed with the odd decent one to get a few jobs done. At this time of year you need a spell of weather from the north to dry things up but that will mean that it is much colder.

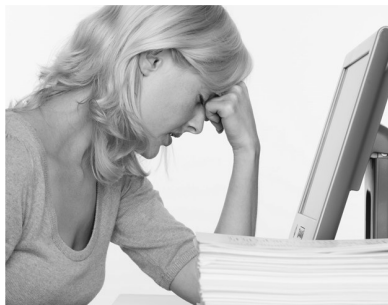
I have got several jobs to do this month, one of the greenhouses still needs a thorough clean down ready for the next growing season. This will be a case of emptying it out entirely. Then washing all the glass with a soft broom and cloth using warm water and Jeyes Fluid, this is then rinsed off as otherwise it leaves a foggy film on the glass. Those crevices where the glass overlaps can be a real pain to clean. I find the best thing is a piece of thin plastic, I use a piece from a washing up liquid bottle or shampoo bottle, there is something just right about them as they are pliant and strong, margarine tubs tend to snap! There you go - the voice of experience!

Next I move on to the staging using a scrubbing brush and cloth using the same liquid concoction. Once the major items are in the greenhouse I shut it all up and light a sulphur candle then leave it for the night(do not use a sulphur candle if you have any plants in the greenhouse). Nothing goes back into the greenhouse unless it has been washed. I do not recommend you do this job if you are going out in the evening as even if you strip off all your clothes and have a shower you will still smell the the Jeyes around you and I am sure your company will also, I fear it's not the best cologne in the world.

I also have a path which is suffering from a lot of weed and algal growth so that will need to be treated with soft garden disinfectant /cleaner. Mix this in a watering can and apply using a rose to get a finer dispersal of droplets then let it do its magic. Be very careful of any run off and overspill as this will kill the grass in the lawn. This is why you use a rose on the watering can rather than the sprayer as you would be much more likely to get drift with the sprayer.

My sweet peas are sown now but there are lots of other things I am getting ready to sow. I have decided this year to vastly reduce the number of bedding plants that I will grow. Finding homes for the excess is becoming increasingly difficult and for many things like fibrous begonias, busy lizzies and the like it is cheaper to buy them, often from a supermarket, than you can produce them yourself. The downside is that you have no choice in the variety which is available.

I still have some seeds to purchase but have a lot left over from last year as I got some very good deals, but in the end I did not find time to grow everything and most of them should still be fine they are kept in air tight tins.

It is far too early to be sowing directly into the soil outside, remember February is our coldest month, it is when the sea is at its coldest and we are governed so much by the sea around here. I am itching to get on with a bit of sowing and the first things I will sow are lettuce, pointed cabbage, broad beans, spring onions and peas, these all need little to no heat so the cold greenhouse will be fine. The peas and beans will go directly into small pots of fresh potting compost, the cabbage and lettuce will go into seed trays and will later be pricked out into modules and the spring onion will either be sown direct into modules or a large pot or tub.

I will also start off a batch of hardy annuals in modules as well, things like cornflowers, pot marigolds, Nigella (love in the mist) and Godetia they are all easy and fill gaps.

Well there are some ideas for February best get out there and enjoy your gardening.
