
Update on the Play Area

Funding has been secured to make a start on replacing and updating the Play equipment at Ruan Recreation ground. Work will commence in the Autumn to renew the Zip Wire and the Climbing Tower. The Parish Council committee will be meeting with the contractor, Alastair Guy, sometime in July to finalise design details, and anybody with an interest is welcome to attend. We will also need help preparing the site by pulling up the edging boards (useful planks if anyone wants them) and cutting back the 'wild flower meadow'. The project will be ongoing with a second phase next year, so there is plenty of time for feedback about what is wanted. 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

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

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JANET FRY (NEE PRICHARD) 1938 - 2015

Jan passed away peacefully at Maidstone hospital on 9th June 2015, aged 77, following a long illness. Beloved Wife of Nigel, loving and caring Mum of Jonathan and Sally and devoted Granny, she will be sadly missed by all who knew her. Her funeral was held at St Mary's Church, Lenham on 24th June.

The Prichard family have had a long association with Cadgwith since acquiring a plot of land to build Pennard in 1929, and Jan has visited almost every year since her birth in 1938.



During WWII, Jan was evacuated as a toddler to stay with

her Grandmother, Mrs Prichard, and her little Auntie Gracie at 'Pennard'. In subsequent years, Jan, and indeed the Prichard family, continued to visit Cadgwith, and built up many friendships that remain to this day. She often spoke fondly of all her friends in the Cove, the Cove itself and all the treasured memories.

Unfortunately, ill health meant that her last visit with Nigel was in 2014, but her home always held memories of the Cove, especially via paintings by Hartley and Graham Clarke.

have an old sweatshirt which is more hole than whole. The cuffs are frayed (actually, I've snipped off the left cuff because it was so 'holey' that my thumb would keep getting caught between sleeve and cuff). More than a quarter of the ribbed hem has come away from the body of the garment (and no, there's nothing to stitch it back to, because the whole thing is so threadbare). The logo on the top left-hand-side of the front has long since been washed out. And there are countless rips and holes where I have had 'arguments' with rose bushes, blackthorn, brambles, bonfires and the like. It's baggy and shapeless and covers up all sorts of imperfections. Yes, I know I should throw it out, consign it to the dustbin, replace it with another sweatshirt. But it's so comfortable!

Our lives can be like that: shapeless and without form or purpose; washed-out; frayed and threadbare so that when a challenge or crisis strikes we have nothing to 'stitch' back to, nothing to hold on to; a life full of 'holes' borne out of past arguments, hurts, resentments and bitterness; a life where our outer facade covers up a multitude of inner imperfections. Gardening in July



Well I was glad to see some <u>rain</u> in mid-June; it has not been too serious but it has been rather dry. Johno has been warning me about it - from the end of the winter, we have only really had enough to keep things ticking over and I believe that this has helped to delay the spring this year. As it has not been a particularly cold winter, things are about a fortnight behind where they usually are. I have also noticed some lawns have started to burn up already. The ideal situation would be a night's good rain once a week instead of the once a month which we have been having.

I am pleased to report those spotted flycatchers have stuck around and taken up residence in the artificial tree hole which is a gap and space behind the fascia. They are a very busy couple flitting in and out landing on the clothes line and diving into the apple tree and appearing once again with a beak full of flies.

July tends to mark a change in the garden when the mood moves from preparation to harvesting. That <u>soft fruit</u> which I got you to protect from the birds last month will be ready for harvesting now. These crops ripen fast so you need to harvest whatever is ready on a daily basis as most of the soft fruit does not keep for long on the bush. Therefore may I suggest you keep well stocked with cream or maybe sugar should you wish to make jam; alternatively many of the types of soft fruit will freeze well.

All those <u>biennials</u> that you have sown earlier in the year will need either pricking out if you sowed them in seed trays or spacing out in nursery rows if you sowed them in the open ground. The plants I am meaning are the Sweet Williams and by David Endean

Wallflowers. Make sure that they are well watered before you move them. They really do benefit from this, giving you more compact and robust plants. Pinching out the growing tip will also encourage them to bush up. Choose a spot of spare ground to grow them on ready to plant out in their final positions in the autumn. If you have not sown any of these biennials yet you can probably get away with sowing some if you are early this month.

As spaces develop in the veg patch, clear the ground and add a bit of general fertiliser and sow or plant some catch crops. It is still worthwhile sowing lettuce and other salads like radish, beetroot, kohl Rabi and finger carrots. Dwarf French beans are also guick to mature and so are worth a go use varieties like Safari and Ferrari. When sowing anything direct in the soil at this time of year it is worth watering the bottom of the drill before you sow the seed - you will find this will help. I regularly sow some runner beans early this month also. Now many of you will find this a waste of time, but my garden is sheltered and I get away from those equinox gales which burn off the tender shoots in the more exposed Ruan gardens. My garden is guite damp also which makes it a late garden, and this year we had a slight frost in the first week of June and it burnt a few plants especially some Busy Lizzies which had a piece of fleece over the top.

Your flower beds, borders, tubs and baskets will need you to regularly go through them with a secateurs or snips and <u>dead head</u> all the spent flowers and rotting and yellowing leaves. Often a finger and thumb will suffice and this job really does reap its rewards. Dead-heading reduces risks of diseases like botrytis, the plants look nicer, and by removing the spent flowers you encourage the plant to try and flower again as it is not able to set seed which is its only real aim. This has the biggest effect on annuals. After you have done this job stay there and water those tubs and baskets even if it has just rained because I am sure not enough water will have got to the compost to have made a difference. An inch of rain will only travel nine inches through worked soil and an inch of rain is a lot, it is important to keep the tubs and basket moist as if they dry out and the plants flag, apart from the damage it does to the plant it is really hard to get the compost fully loaded with water again. Also a regular liquid feed will reap rewards as well

July is the start of the summer shows and my <u>sweet peas</u> should be in full swing; I picked the first bunch in mid-June. Much time is spent tying in the plants and removing the tendrils. Unfortunately early on you can suffer badly with bud drop. This is where the flower buds never really develop on the stems and they go yellowy and drop off, often leaving you with the stalk and an odd bloom on it. There is very little you can do about this, as it is generally down to cold temperatures and large variances in them. Some years this can be devastating and when we had that really wet summer a couple of years ago I had the first blooms at Royal Cornwall Show time and did not cut another bloom for a month. Then when they did come, within ten days the quality of the blooms and stems reduced making them useless for exhibition. These are the joys of gardening.

Well whatever you do this month in the garden, be it giving the lawn a light cut, trimming your hedge, sitting on the garden bench or having a barbeque, get out there and enjoy your garden.



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The Herbal Medicine Cabinet

Herbal First Aid

As summer appears to have finally arrived, and the school holidays are imminent, I thought it might be helpful, and fun, to tell you about some of the medicinal plants you'll find growing on The Lizard at this time of year that make excellent first aid remedies. Please remember that these are for minor ailments such as stings, insect bites, cuts and bruises.

Nettle rash and insect bites

There are many plants that can provide relief from nettle rash and insect bites. Broad-leaf Plaintain (*Plantago major*) is, I think, the most effective for reducing pain and inflammation. You can also use Ribwort plaintain (*Plantago lanceolata*) though, which is easier to crush or chew up to release the healing mucilage inside – which you'll need to do before applying to the sting/bite. Cleavers, aka Goosegrass (*Galium aparine*) is another prolific plant with similar soothing and healing properties.

Minor cuts 'n' scratches

The appropriately named Self-heal (*Prunella vulgaris*) is a powerful astringent, and so helps to staunch bleeding. It also reduces inflammation. You can either apply a handful of crushed flowers and leaves to the wound, or make a strong infusion (tea) with them, allow to cool and use to bathe the wound. If you can't find Self-heal, look for the prolific, pretty, but not very pleasant-smelling Herb robert (*Geranium robertianum*), aka 'Stinking Bob', and use in the same way.

Sprains 'n' bruises

There are quite a few plants with broad leaves that make excellent poultices. A poultice can be used to help reduce the throbbing and swelling associated with sprains and bruises, and to draw out splinters, boils and abscesses. They include Burdock (*Arctium lappa*) and Common mallow (*Malva sylvestris*), both of which also have antiseptic properties. Simply steam the leaves to make them pliable and encourage the release of the active constituents, and then apply the whole leaf, as hot as the patient can bear, to the affected area. Leave to cool, then repeat. But the very best, and most effective, plant poultice is made from Comfrey root (*Symphytum officinale*). You'll need to dig these up, scrub clean and then chop/mash up in a blender with enough water to create a paste. Don't worry if it's lumpy, it just needs to be spreadable. Place onto a piece of muslin and bandage over the area to be treated to hold in place. Leave on for 2-3 hours, and repeat as many times as necessary. Comfrey can also speed up the healing process for broken bones, hence its traditional name of Knitbone. Only use on unbroken skin.

And finally, there are some wonderfully aromatic plants that can be used in a footbath to soothe, deodorise and refresh weary – and possibly whiffy – feet... Just put a few handfuls of fresh Lavender or Chamomile flowers, Pine or Rosemary needles, or Mint leaves into a bowl large enough for your feet, cover with boiling water, allow to cool sufficiently to immerse your feet, then sit back and soak up the joy! (Use Sage for an antiperspirant effect, Thyme as an antifungal, for Athlete's foot, for example.)

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
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Cadgwith Rocks by Brandon Holmes (age 14)

Cadgwith is not a surfers' beach due to all the rocks. However this does give Cadgwith an advantage on other beaches, you can go jumping or diving off the rocks. After children have swum in Cadgwith for a few summers, they are highly likely to want to progress to jumping off the rocks.

There are 2 beaches in Cadgwith which are split apart by a 30 foot high non-eroded piece of land called The Todden. There are 3 good spots to jump from in Cadgwith:

- The diving board a good spot for the younger children to jump off. This is because there is a smaller drop and no rocks below. The diving board is located on the second beach and used to be made out of concrete and iron, and had a wooden board. After many many years the wood and iron got rusty and was taken off the rocks. The name diving board is still prevalent today, with only the concrete being used today to jump off.
- 2. For the more daring jump, The Todden A lot higher than the diving board, a rock platform to jump. The Rock formation that the older children use to jump off is natural and has not been man made. However when it is low tide the water level of the area you jump into is only up to your waist which as you can imagine would be very dangerous to jump into. Quoted by Aaron Goddard, a local who has made this jump for many years, "To jump off the Todden the tide has to be high tide, no other tide is suitable". Simon Fletcher, a local man who jumped off the rocks many times during his childhood, said "when it is high tide it is definitely safe to jump off the Todden, but even just below high tide it can become unsafe and I would not recommend jumping off the Todden without being extremely experienced at jumping off the diving board first".
- 3. Whale Pool Whale pool is on the first beach, on the left hand side of the Todden. It is often where the seagulls are on the rocks. The only way to get to it is to swim and it can only be jumped at high tide. You have the option of jumping off half way, three quarters, or the full height of the rock namely, Whale pool. Not many local children dare to jump even half way off the rock, only the brave do! If you think that jumping the Todden is a breeze, then whale pool could be the jump for you!

As the summer is coming up I have pulled together some advice from local parents and children who have jumped it, thank you to everyone that contributed to the following tips:

- It must be high tide.
- Do not bend your legs until your about to hit the water, then tuck them in!
- If you have never jumped before, then watch an experienced local person do it first!
- Start your first jump off the Diving Board and once you feel confident move to the Todden.

After years of doing this jump you may think of jumping Whale Pool, but remember it is a lot higher than the Todden and requires a lot of skill. I wouldn't do it myself at this age anyway!

- 1. Absences and apologies: There were no apologies.
- 2. Declarations of interest: There were no declarations of interest.
- 3. Public time: There were no items for public time.
- 4. Police report: PCSO Berry reported that there were no crimes reported in the Parish in April. She had been asked to monitor the use of the school playground out of hours by young people playing ball games. She also referred to "My Red Thumb Day" which is a road safety campaign regarding the risks of using a mobile phone when driving. She also asked members of the public to take extra care as, in previous years, car crime has increased locally at the start of the summer months. The building incorporates changing facilities, a kitchen, Club room and bar. The funding to go ahead with the project is in place. Councillor Lee proposed and Councillor Stephens seconded that this application be supported. Carried 7 votes in favour and 3 abstentions. Councillor Trewin asked that congratulations be placed on record to all those who have worked hard over the last couple of years to put together the plans and funding to provide a splendid new recreational facility.

8. Finance

- <u>Financial Report</u> the Financial Report was noted. It was reported that the payment of £5000 in respect of AONB signage is only the first instalment and a final payment of £5000 is due at a later stage. The final payment of £600 in respect of the locality grant had been received.
- Payments Schedule the schedule of payments, totalling £2090.62, was presented to the meeting. It was requested that the renewal of the insurance policy be checked by the Finance Committee at its meeting next week but, if satisfied with the terms, this payment of £1227.78 included in the schedule was authorised for payment. It was proposed by Councillor Fleetwood and seconded by Councillor Clifton that the payment schedule be approved. Carried 9 votes in favour and 1 abstention. With regard to the insurance policy, the Clerk was asked to obtain an electronic version of the policy and also check whether the new defibrillators will be covered. Action: Clerk.
- <u>Internal Audit Report</u> it was noted that this will be considered by the Finance Committee, together with draft Annual Return and brought to the meeting in June for final approval.
- <u>Revised Financial Regulations</u>- in response to recommendations from the Internal Auditor, there are some proposed changes to the Financial Regulations. It was agreed that these should be reviewed by the Finance Committee and referred back to the meeting in June for adoption. With regard to the recommendation regarding payment authorisation, it was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Clifton that the internet banking authorisations are changed to allow the Clerk only to create payments which are then authorised by two of the Councillors.

9. Matters arising from the minutes:


- <u>Verge trimming project</u> Councillor Freeman had met with Maxine Hardy, Community Network manager, to discuss devolution and our possible proposals to take over various other cutting contracts. Cornwall Councillor Rule was asked to contact Walter Sanger regarding any progress made regarding similar proposals from St Keverne parish. Action: Cornwall Councillor Rule. Further discussions would take place at the Footpaths Committee meeting next week.
- <u>Play Area update</u> it was noted that matched funds of £10,000 need to be held against the outcome of the SITA grant application, which would leave £2000 available from the Parish Council funds designated for the play area, together with £5000 pledged by the Community Trust and a possible further £5000 from the Community Trust if an application to the Goonhilly Fund is successful. This sum of up to £12,000 is available for a second scheme. This project needs to be defined and costed and the impact considered against the initial project which forms the basis of the SITA grant application. The SITA meeting for consideration of grant applications is on 26 June. Action: Councillor Preston

- <u>Dog Bins</u>- Cornwall Council Environmental Health department have confirmed that there is no objection to the Parish Council obtaining and servicing its own dog bins and therefore Sue Cadman can have the go-ahead. In view of concerns regarding dog access to the Recreation Ground and any siting of a bin there, it was agreed that this should be referred to the Recreation committee. In the meantime, one bin should be bought by the Parish Council for Higher Moor. The Clerk was asked to liaise with Sue Cadman re design and the proposed bin should be considered at next week's meeting of the Footpaths Committee. The Parish Council are happy to provide help with the installation if needed. Action: Clerk
- <u>AONB Signage</u>- all parishes on the Lizard are being consulted for feedback on the design of the signs and a small steering group is being set up, which any Councillor is welcome to join.

10. Matters for consideration:

- <u>Grant Request Home-Start</u> it was agreed that details of the charity's website should be provided to the Gazette and the Parish Council would consider a possible grant at the meeting in June. **Action: Councillor Preston**
- <u>General Power of Competence</u> this would give the Parish Council greater powers including the same powers as an individual which might help in resolving land issues. It was agreed that this would be noted and the action of other town and parish councils monitored for the present.

• <u>Recording of names in Planning items Minutes</u> - in view of the verbal abuse/ intimidation to which some Councillors had been subjected, it was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Jones that no names are included under planning items, unless a Councillor specifically asks for their name to be minuted. Carried 10 votes in favour.

11. Correspondence:

- <u>Bus Stop</u> it was noted that a letter had been received from Cormac Solutions to say that, after considering all responses received from the consultation, it had been resolved to abandon the proposed relocation of the scheduled service bus stop in Ruan Minor, but to build up the kerb for the school bus service by Glebe Place. The Clerk was asked to query with Cormac as to whether an open shelter could be provided for the school children. **Action: Clerk**
- <u>Telephone call from May Kimpton</u>- the Clerk had been asked by Mrs Kimpton to
 provide details of the Village Hall's Scheme of Management. The Clerk had
 explained that this was not a document she held as the Village Hall is a separate
 registered charity. It was understood that Mrs Kimpton had now been supplied
 with a copy of the Scheme.
- <u>Kuggar Bus Stop bin</u> it was noted that this item remains on Cornwall Council's waiting list to be considered as and when existing bins become available for installation in alternative locations.
- 12. Footpaths, environment and treewardens:

- <u>Todden Erosion</u> Councillor Preston reported that he was re-visiting the advice he had received from Vertical Technology. The recommendation had been for a netted solution but details had also been provided of external consultants as it might be necessary to have a consultant's report for any grant application. The likely costs of netting are £5268 for galvanised and £6726 for stainless steel, so grant funding would be needed. Government agency funds re coastal erosion may be available.
- <u>Horse Riding on Footpath 44 (Gwendreath to Kennack)</u> Councillor Preston reported that he hoped to meet with any local riding groups concerned and explore suitable routes around the area. It was noted that there are problems with fallen trees on the path and the use of weed killer.
- <u>Mundy's Field car park</u> Councillor Freeman had carried out the monthly inspection and had nothing to report. It was noted that there is a particular need to check for overnight parking, which is not allowed.
- <u>Damage</u> it was noted that there had been further vandalism in the toilets on Duck's Lane.
- 13. In Committee: No items were discussed in committee
