

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

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
The Grace Notes are back!





#### New National Trust Wildlife Watchpoint gets over 11,000 Visitors Closer to Nature

Since it opened this spring, a dedicated band of more than twenty volunteers have welcomed over 11,000 visitors to the new National Trust Wildlife Watchpoint at Lizard Point.

Sighted at Britain's Most Southerly Point, against a stunning backdrop, the Wildlife Watchpoint is a fantastic place to get closer to nature and see **wild** Cornish choughs, thousands of passing seabirds, Atlantic grey seals and other marine species including porpoise, dolphins and basking sharks.



As well as a wealth of marine life, the Southerly tip of Britain also boasts one of the National Trust's wildlife-friendly farms. Tregullas Farm, sensitively farmed by National Trust tenants Rona and Neville Amiss, supports an abundance of farmland birds, wildflowers and other wildlife. Grazing of the cliffs and rich grassland by the Amiss' cattle and sheep has helped with the continued success of Lizard Point's resident chough population, regularly seen from the Wildlife Watchpoint. These wild choughs are regularly seen to-ing and fro-ing from the fields with bill-fulls of sheep wool and foraging for insects and grubs amongst the close grazed fields.

The new watchpoint has been a huge success not only by inspiring over 11,000 visitors but also for developing an important new wildlife recording point in Cornwall. Working with the Cornwall Wildlife Trust, Cornwall Seal Group, British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) and RSPB, the watchpoint volunteers have been recording wildlife sightings daily, contributing to a wider recording network to ensure our local and passing wildlife is well recorded for future monitoring. So far this year they have recorded over 100 different species and submitted over 2000 wildlife records from the watchpoint, not including our botanical records. The Trust relies entirely on volunteer help to keep the watchpoint open from April until mid September and they are always looking for enthusiastic people to join the team.

# **Rector's Ramblings**

N ovember has become the season of Remembering. Although it is not a formal liturgical season, the coincidence of All Saints / All Souls with the Armistice Remembrance services has made it a natural time for us to remember together. Formal or not, I think that it is good for us to have a season of remembering.

Both All Saints and Remembrance Sunday naturally look back to think about the people that we have known and what previous generations have given to us, often at great cost. And we do need to take time to do this.

Living 'in the moment' can be a good thing, especially if it contracts with dwelling too much on what we have lost or worrying too much about what might happen to us in the future. It can stop us living as we should do in this moment. But 'living in the moment' can also mean a sort of thoughtless independence that fails to see how much of what we just assume as given comes from other people, and how much of what we do will affect others.

Remembering is not just about gratitude for all that has gone before us. It is also about living well. The more I have thought about it, the more I realise that it has as much to do with the present and the future as the past.

Just as you don't know what you have got until it's gone, so it's only when remembering really fails that you realise how important it is. Too many of us have experienced people suffering from dementia to need to spell it out. Remembering is fundamental to living well.

And for Christians it is central to the Holy Scriptures and to our worship. So, perhaps, three things for us to think about in this season of remembering:

**Remembering God** – the Bible is full of calls to remember who God is and all he has done, because we forget too easily. The life that we live is his creation and we live it before him, and one day we will give an account of it to him, before his presence. Yet we too easily live forgetful of him. And if we think of him we can too easily forget what he is truly like. Remembering takes effort and care ... and love.

**Remember Yourself** – the Bible also calls us to remember who we are ("you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvellous light."). But we too often forget and live as if we were just like everyone else, trying to fit in, letting the world squeeze us into its mould. Remembering takes effort and care ... and faith.

**Remembering Others** – and we are called to remember who people are; made in God's image, redeemed by his blood. We too quickly forget and treat others as less than they are. There are no *ordinary* people and every time we treat them as less than extraordinary (less than ourselves) we need to remember. Remembering takes effort and care ... and hope.

Let us remember well and live well in Christ in faith and hope and love

After a week which had seen the weather turn from a balmy summer to showers of heavy rain, thunder, lightning and gales, we were lucky as Saturday was warm sunny and benign once again for our annual autumn show. Once again the village turned out to view the vast array of flowers, vegetables, cookery and crafts on show. We had over 820 exhibits on view including a very colourful display from our school which included some paper stained glass windows craft work which were very bright and cheery with sunshine coming through them.

The show was opened by our very own Rev Deidre Mckrill and she praised the standard and vast array of produce on show; she also chose the best exhibit in show which was exhibited by young Lucy Green. It was a pen and ink design for the Autumn show schedule's next front cover. Lucy also took several other accolades including the cup for most points by an under 16.

The most points in show was won by Mr Clarence Thomas from Chacewater who is a regular supporter of the show. Some of you may have seen him in the press in recent weeks after his success at the National vegetable championships. 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### Gardening in November

Well October came in with a bang, a long dry warm September was just what we all wanted but just before the autumn show we got the thunder, lightning, rain and gales. It came as a bit of a shock nothing unusual but we have had it so good. What November will bring nobody knows, but I can guarantee the days will be shorter and darker with no time left in the evenings to do anything in the garden so that will have to be left until the weekend, unless you have the luxury of retirement. It is a good job that there is much less to do.

The garden can look a little dull at this time of year with short days and low light levels, so it is nice to plant up a tub with some colourful autumn/winter flowering bedding. Go to the garden centre and locate some plants like heathers, violas, cyclamen and the like, then get them home find a spare tub and fill it with compost. The compost does not need to be fresh, just refreshed with some fertilizer, as the plants will not need the energy as they will put on very little growth. But do make sure the compost has no vine weevil grubs in it as these pests will happily munch through whatever you plant. Finally site the tub somewhere with a little shelter where you can always see it, so as to get most value from it.

November is a traditional time to prune your bush roses. Use a good sharp pair of secateurs and cut the growth back by half. The aim of this is to reduce wind rock on the plants. Wind rock causes a hollow to form around the base of the bush which fills with water and in turn rots the roots of the bush. Pruning also reduces the damage from the wind, rubbing and breaking branches. Pruning also induces the plant to take a rest for the winter because as you know left untouched you will often find rose blooms out around Christmas down here with our mild climate.


Giving the plant a rest will aid in better blooming next year. If you follow this method of pruning you will have to prune again in early March back down to three or four buds. I must say that I tend to delay pruning until late November to early December and do it all in one, then give a very generous mulch of farmyard manure. This is because we often get a lot of growth early in the year and I don't like seeing the plant waste energy on this.

This is also the time to order new bare root rose bushes which will arrive from now on throughout the winter. These plants will readily move whilst they are dormant but it is best to grow them in ground which has not grown roses before as they tend to suffer rose sickness. They don't thrive and tend to die after a few years at the best. This can be overcome if you dig a large hole and completely replace the soil with fresh soil. It is also said that the problem can be overcome if at planting you add special mycorhizal fungi which can be obtained from large nurseries and mail order companies. It forms a symbiotic relationship with the rose, boosting the plant and it overcomes any sickness problems which may occur. When planting a new rose prepare the ground well, incorporating copious amounts of well-rotted organic matter and a liberal supply of fertiliser, this really cannot be done after the event.

Now and all through the winter is a good time to give your paths a good clean. There are many methods and products which can be used. The most low tech is the old fashioned broom but this is best used in conjunction with some kind of garden disinfectant or detergent product, Many people use bleach, this is important to lift and kill the slippery moss and algae. Be careful to make sure that there is no run off going into you flower beds or lawns as cont.

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it will kill the plants there. Using a pressure washer will induce less sweat but you must be careful that your paths are in sound order as these are powerful machines and will soon dislodge any loose masonry and even take the top surface off concrete paths and slabs, making them more porous.

If you want to have some bulbs flowering at Christmas, now is the time to think about potting them up and starting off those Amaryllis bulbs. They are really easy, put the bulb in a pot which is slightly larger than the bulb. Half the bulb should be above the soil surface. Use compost or bulb fibre. Soak the compost and bring the pot into a warm bright spot and growth should soon start, and flowering will occur in about 8 weeks. Narcissi like Paperwhites are even guicker and need less warmth - a sheltered spot will suffice. I often use an unheated greenhouse. These will be ready in four to six weeks so, if you have quite a few bulbs, spread out your planting over a

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few weeks. If you plant Soleil d'Or narcissi at the same time these will flower in succession after the Paperwhites.

November is the traditional time to plant Tulip bulbs. This is meant to stop the risk of the plants getting fire blight which disfigures the foliage and affects the flowering. Chose an open well drained site, work it well, add a little fertiliser and possibly some well-rotted organic matter. Plant the bulbs deep, covering them with at least twice the depth of soil compared to the height of the bulb itself. Doing this helps the plants stand up to the weather especially the wind. I think tulips lend themselves particularly well to growing in pots. These can be placed around in prominent positions when they are looking good and then moved away again. Most tulip varieties do not put on such a good show in following years so many people treat them like annual bedding. The choice is yours but do not be too disappointed if the display is not the same in subsequent years.

What else can you do this month? Well it is your last chance to sow some broad beans and peas to over-winter in the garden. Many people will make a sowing of sweet peas in pots now. These can be grown on in a cold frame or unheated greenhouse until next spring, but do protect them from mice and slugs.

Keep mowing your lawns on a high setting, mainly just to pick up the last of the autumn leaves, and keep digging over the vacant patches in the veg garden as the weather allows. Do not kill yourself with the digging, little and often will get the job done without too much stress on the body. After all there is no rush - you have got all winter.

I am going to cut the last of my chrysanthemums and give the greenhouse a really good clean out and try to solve the pest infestation that I have suffered this year. I could never get to grips with the whitefly and red spider mite.

Well enjoy your gardening



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
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## **Recreation Ground News**

### The Herbal Medicine Cabinet

The lush summer foliage may have all died back, but there is still plenty of plant life out there for herbalists to get excited about.

Late autumn and the start of winter is when we gather the roots and bark of many medicinal plants. These are carefully

harvested to ensure the plant isn't damaged or destroyed.

You'll find Bistort (*Polygonum bistorta*) growing all over the Lizard. It's one of the most powerful astringents in the plant world, and was traditionally used for staunching blood flow in wounds. It was, and still is, dried, powdered and made into a paste for this purpose. I tincture it and use in herbal mouthwashes and gargles, and for digestive problems where diarrhoea is a symptom. I've also recently been digging up Dandelion (*Taraxacum officinale*), Burdock (*Arctium lappa*) and Yellow Dock (*Rumex crispus*) roots, commonly used for both diarrhoea and constipation, but great remedies for allergies and skin disorders, too.

I planted Elecampane (*Inula helenium*) and Purple Coneflower (*Echinacea purpurea*) in my garden this year, and the roots from these plants will be ready to harvest next autumn. Echinacea is a well-known immune system stimulant; Elecampane a gentle but potent remedy for coughs and chest infections. Marshmallow root (*Althaea officinalis*, also



growing in my garden) is another one that works wonders for bronchial and digestive disorders as it's full of mucilage – a thick sticky substance that soothes and protects mucous membranes.

While we're on the subject of respiratory and digestive problems, the bark of the Wild Cherry (*Prunus serotina*) and Guelder Rose, aka Cramp Bark (*Viburnum opulus*), trees are also very useful. They're both astringent and antispasmodic. I pare and prune these trees carefully to encourage regrowth.

The plants I've written about here illustrate the fact that there are many plants that can help relieve what appear to be the same ailments. But herbal medicine is formulated around the individual person, and it's all about finding what works best for you. 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## Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 8 September 2014 from 7.30pm

**Present:** Parish Councillors, J Preston (Chair), N Green (Vice-Chair), J Clifton, M Fleetwood, P Freeman, J Lee, S Stephens, J Trewin, Cornwall Councillor C Rule, Clerk J Castle

and 10 Members of the Public (W. Elliott, A Eatock, J-P Eatock, J Dunmall, P Dunmall, B Watson, J Watson, S Partridge, D Gascoigne, J Gascoigne,)

### 1. Absences and apologies:

Parish Councillors P Collins, C Cooper, PCSO J Berry (all these apologies were accepted by the Council)

### 2. Declarations of interest:

Councillor Freeman declared an interest in a planning application regarding Carsilgy House as it is a neighbouring property.

### 3. Public time:

- Mr Dunmall of Bodrigy Lodge pointed out that the changes to his original planning application were minor.
- Mr Watson expressed concern about the granting of a planning permission for work at Bodrigy Lodge when he considered there were enforcement matters outstanding with regard to the property.
- Mrs Dunmall confirmed that in due course they would be seeking retrospective planning permission with regard to the garden shed and hobbies room, as previously indicated.
- Mr Eatock of Lizard Adventure provided information about the number of their clients who had used the car park at Mundy's Field during July and August. Mr Gascoigne disputed these figures and re-iterated the concerns he had voiced by e-mail regarding obstruction of entrances, people changing in the car park, door banging, shouting and littering and generally what he considered to be inappropriate use of the car park. Mr Eatock confirmed that they were looking for other sites and would shortly be in discussion again with the National Trust. Mrs Gascoigne and Mrs Partridge also expressed concerns about the allowed use of the car park.

### 4. Police report:

In the absence of PCSO Berry, the Clerk presented her report. There were 3 crimes reported during July and August – criminal damage to property, theft from a meter and a non-counting action fraud. There had also been reports of rogue traders working in the area offering to carry out gardening services and other work and residents were advised to be careful and if necessary ring 101.

### 5. Cornwall Councillor's time:

- Councillor Rule reported that she had reported the noxious smell from the sewer vent and was awaiting a response.
- With regard to weed spraying, Councillor Rule confirmed that as a result of cont.

budget cuts this will need to be dealt with by way of local initiatives.

- She also drew attention to the paper re the severe proposed budget cuts being
  proposed by Cornwall Council and the need for more work to be carried out
  locally. This will probably mean the loss of the community pot of funds that she
  currently holds.
- Councillor Rule stressed the importance of the community network going forward. There is a meeting (AGM) of the new Helston and south Kerrier Community Network on 28 October at 6pm at Helston Football Club where statistical information will be available and this meeting is open to all - councillors and individuals.
- Councillor Freeman thanked Councillor Rule for funding she had provided recently from her current community pot and also commended the thorough and transparent nature in which the budget review was being undertaken by Cornwall Council.

### 6. Minutes for acceptance:

• Councillor Clifton expressed some concerns regarding the minute about recycling in the Cove, which was contained within the minutes that had been circulated, and it was agreed that this minute would be amended. Subject to this, it was proposed by Councillor Clifton and seconded by Councillor Lee that the minutes of the meeting held on 14 July 2014 be accepted. Carried 6 votes

in favour and 2 abstentions.

• With regard to the minutes of the meeting held on 9 June, it was noted that there was an error regarding the funding of the work repairing storm damage to the concrete slip in Cadgwith in that £600 was provided by the fishermen <u>not</u> the Fishermen's Mission. The Parish Council apologises for this error and thanks the fishermen for their support.

### 7. Planning:


#### Planning Applications for consideration

- <u>PA14/006557</u> Grade Ruan School, Classroom Block replacement. It was proposed by Councillor Green and seconded by Councillor Lee that this application be supported. Carried 8 voted in favour. Councillor Fleetwood expressed some concern about the amount of circulation space taken up by the ramp for disabled access.
- <u>PA14/07700</u> St Rumon's Cottage, Ruan Minor replacement of conservatory. It was proposed by Councillor Freeman and seconded by Councillor Trewin that this application be supported. Carried 8 votes in favour.
- <u>PA14/08341</u> Bodrigy Lodge, Cadgwith revision to approved plans re extension. It was noted that this revised application involves only minor alterations to the previously approved plans. It was proposed by Councillor Fleetwood and seconded by Councillor Trewin that this application be supported. Carried 7

The Parish Council wishes it to be noted that it considers there are inconsistencies in the planning decisions made by the planning authority regarding recent applications.

### 8. Matters arising from the minutes:

- <u>Recycling bins in the Cove</u> it was felt that some form of recycling could be introduced by way of replacing existing bins incorporating a small recycling compartment and the Clerk was asked to approach the Recycling Officer at Cornwall Council regarding this. Consideration was given as to whether the Parish Council would pay for the installation of such bins if they were emptied by the Council on the normal recycling run. Action : Clerk
- <u>Kuggar Village Pump site</u>- the Chairman had spoken to the occupiers of the new house adjoining the site. It was agreed that Councillor Preston would get a quote for cleaning up the site and once cleared the Parish Council would explore registering the land. A sign would be installed specifying the historical significance of the site. **Action: Councillor Preston**
- <u>Weed Spraying</u> it was agreed that the Parish Council would look at other ways of dealing with this in the interim until the community network proposals are available for consideration.

### 9. Matters for consideration:

 Lizard Adventure / Mundy's Field car park – it was noted that Councillors Preston & Lee had met with Lizard Adventure to discuss the use of Mundy's Field car park. Whilst Enys Head is a popular and accessible site for coasteering, Cadgwith car park remains the most suitable site for parking. Councillor Preston has written to the National Trust and Councillors are happy to attend a meeting with Lizard Adventure and the National Trust to discuss alternative locations, as the use of parking in Ruan Minor is not a sustainable option. Councillor Trewin noted that we should be supportive of local businesses.

The use of Mundy's Field car park is restricted to private motor cars and users should note that it is situated in a residential area and show due deference. It was confirmed that temporary permission for contractors' vehicles had only been granted on the advice of the police for safety reasons.

It was agreed that there would be a rota drawn up for Councillors to monitor the use of the Mundy's Field car park over the next few months and that consideration would also be given to extra maintenance, flower planters and possibly tree planting.

 <u>Play Area Update</u> – Councillor Clifton reported that the playground committee is nearing the end of the consultation period, with posters in the shop and on the Facebook page showing the four proposals, giving ideas of what equipment should be included and where it should be sited. It was noted that the overall footprint of the area is the same as at present. Councillor Clifton is analysing the responses and an update would be provided in the Gazette. The sourcing of cont.



funding is now the main issue. Concerns had been expressed about proximity to the football pitch and it was confirmed that there would be 3 metre clearance. The land which includes the recreation field and playground was gifted to the Parish Council who is the registered legal owner and acts as custodian. It was noted that a request had been made by a user of the recreation ground for a storage shed and this would need to be referred to the recreation committee.

- <u>Alternative locations for bus stop</u> it was noted that the other side of the junction where the school bus stops is the only other possible location. Nothing further can be done until Cormac hear back from Coastline regarding use of the land.
- <u>De-listing of Community Assets</u> the Parish Council does not accept the arguments put forward by Cornwall Council's legal officer to de-list St Ruan Church and Churchyard and St Grade Church. The Clerk was asked to send a letter to Mr Mansell based on a draft prepared by Councillor Freeman with additional comments from Councillor Collins. Action : Clerk
- <u>Date for Staffing meeting</u> this was agreed to be held on Monday 15 September at 7.30pm in the Sunday School room of the Chapel.

### 10. Finance

- Financial Report the report was noted. It was agreed that Councillor Trewin would speak with Danny Meek regarding a proposal to incorporate cleaning the bus shelter with grass trimming by the notice board. Action: Councillor Trewin
- Payments Schedule –the Payments Schedule for September was proposed for approval by Councillor Clifton and seconded by Councillor Fleetwood. Carried 7 votes in favour and one abstention. The schedule includes a donation of £100 to the Poppy Appeal.
- Deposit Account with Cornwall Council it was noted that due to the small amount of funds that the Parish Council has to deposit and the cost of CHAPS transfers in & out

(with a minimum transaction amount of  $\pounds 25,000$ ), it was not worth pursuing this further.

### 11. Correspondence:

- <u>Traffic Gridlock Cadgwith –</u> it was noted that Sat Nav systems sending traffic through Ruan Minor to Cadgwith adds to the traffic problems.
- <u>Rural Payments Agency</u> Councillor Green reported that the RPA had written to advise the Council that an amendment had been made to the area registered for Cadgwith Car Park. It was noted that this makes no practical difference to the Council.

### 12. Footpaths, environment and treewardens:

- Double Hedges & White Feather Councillor Preston reported the grass cutting in these areas was being dealt with.
- It was noted that there is a potential site for a memorial bench by Long Loft, but the area would need some clearing.
- Hedge trimming it was noted the overhanging hedge opposite Pen-y-Craig on

New Road, had been dealt with. Councillor Preston had written to Neil Rowe re sections around Red Gates and trimming areas adjacent to his fields.

- Request to widen Pentilla Stile (i.e. the second stile from the car park towards Cadgwith). It was noted that the proposal is to provide a path to the side of the stile. The Parish Council has no objection to this work being carried out but noted that it would be up to the landowner to go ahead with this work. It was thought that the landowner is likely to be Maja Tham Trust. Cormac could bid to provide a design and costings. It was suggested that the ditch drainage be improved at the same time as it is known to be a longstanding issue at this stile. There was also no objection to concreting and improving the drainage further down the path.
- Tree Planting Councillor Preston had met with Moira Hurst re planting for the recreation ground and agreed that the blackthorn would be trimmed back hard to the boundary with softer planting in front.
- Polstangey Bridge the Clerk was asked to contact the Highways Department regarding vegetation encroaching on this. Action : Clerk
- Pothole at bottom of New Road the Clerk is to contact the highways Department re this. Action :Clerk
- 13. In Committee:

The meeting closed at 10.05pm.
