

GRADE RUAN PARISH COUNCIL Dog Fouling

Dog Fouling continues to be a problem. Grade Ruan Parish Council is keen to work with the community to introduce Dog Awareness to the village.

Members of the public should report witnessed dog fouling offences to the Dog Warden at Cornwall Council. The report can be submitted anonymously online at:

https://www.cornwall.gov.uk/default.aspx?page=22017

This will result in a letter being sent to the offending owner. If a member of the public submits a signed statement, then Cornwall Council will issue a fixed penalty immediately. Cornwall Council say that they will investigate all complaints that are received and offer the following advice:-

You should be able to provide a full description of what happened, including date, time, location, what you witnessed, description of the dog, its owner and as much information as possible about the incident – also any information regarding the offender which could include name / address (if known), vehicle registration number of any other identifying feature.

For the Saturday entertainment, I will be booking a couple of bands for the evening, but I would like anyone who is interested in performing a couple of songs between the main acts to contact me. I know we have a lot of musical talent in the village – it would be nice to use this event to showcase it! Sunday will probably include jazz of some sort (still working on that!). As with previous years, we will arrange for hot food to be available.

As with previous years, we will be operating under a "Temporary Events Notice", which will permit and control the sale and consumption of alcohol on the Recreation Ground. The bar staff will be under instruction not to serve alcoholic drink to anyone who might be under the age of 18 – if there is any uncertainty, they will ask to see a suitable ID as proof of age and refuse to serve anyone without ID. It is important that everyone knows that the age restriction for drinking applies to the whole of the Recreation Ground, and not only to drinks purchased from our bar – *any* under-age drinkers will be politely asked to leave. Parents, please do not allow your children to drink at this event! All we need now is some good weather!

Readers will remember that last month I appealed for a volunteer to come forward to act as Secretary for our management committee – so far no-one has contacted Moira or myself! Please talk to us if you are interested in helping to manage this vital village resource.

You will notice that I haven't said anything about the new pavilion yet – from the small amount of feedback I've had, the preferred plan seems to be for the reduced size pavilion, with some support for re-furbishing the existing building. Over the next couple of months, I will see if I can work out some costs for both these schemes, so an informed decision can be made. In the meantime, we would like to hear from anyone with comments and opinions on the plans, or offers to help in any capacity!

Minutes of an Extraordinary Meeting of Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Wednesday 6th February 2013 at 7:30pm.

Present: Parish Councillors P Collins (Chairman), J Preston (Vice-Chair), M Alford, C Cooper, W Elliot, M Fleetwood, N Green and J Trewin

- 1. Apologies and Absence Councillors P Freeman and A Humby
- 2. **Declarations of Interest –** there were no declarations of interest
- **3. Precept 2013-14** The Chairman opened the meeting by explaining why it had become necessary to call an extraordinary meeting to reconsider a decision that had been made only one month previously.

The Council was reminded that it had previously voted on 10 December 2012 to set a precept of £13,500 for the financial year 2013-2014.

The Chairman explained that a letter dated 29 January 2013 had been received from Cornwall Council informing us that if we kept our precept at the same level as last year it would result in an 11.6% increase in the Council Tax paid by our parishioners. This is due to a change in the way that the Council Tax paid by each household is calculated. We were invited to reconsider our precept and respond to Cornwall Council by 6th February 2013 if we wished to make any change.

As there was not a monthly meeting in the week between the receipt of the letter and the deadline set by Cornwall Council, an extraordinary meeting had to be called. Having taken external advice, the Clerk informed the Chairman that only a meeting of the full Council could make such a decision.

The Chairman invited Councillor Green to provide a summary of the paperwork received from Cornwall Council and explain what it means for our Council.

The Council was advised that due to the introduction of the Council Tax Support Scheme by the Government, the tax base had been reduced from 427 to 383 households paying Council Tax in the parish. This means that if the precept is kept the same as the previous year the result would be that each household would pay a greater share of the precept in their Council Tax, amounting to a rise of 11.6% over the previous year.

The Council was also advised that a new transitional payment of £1,618.69 would be paid to the Council by the Government to assist in making up the shortfall in the Council's income.

There was general consensus in the meeting that our parishioners should not suffer an increase in their Council Tax bills from this Parish Council and that we wished to adjust the precept to ensure this was the case.

It was calculated that if the Council's precept were reduced to £12,095 then there would be no increase in Council Tax for our parishioners and that the transitional payment would make up the shortfall in the Council's income.

The Chairman proposed the following resolution which was seconded by Councillor Cooper:

Resolved:

It is proposed to rescind the resolution made by the Grade Ruan Parish Council at a meeting on 10 December 2012 as recorded under Minute No. 8e and to amend the precept request for the year 2013-2014 from £13,500 to £12,095.

The resolution was carried unanimously.

There being no further business to discuss, the meeting closed at 7:50pm

National Trust News March 2013

As spring approaches, we're hoping we're through the worst of the wet weather. This winter has been memorable for its floods and landslips, all stemming from a particularly wet November. We're still working our way through all the storm repairs, from filling in gullies on footpaths, to regrading the bank that has slid down behind the Shepherd's Hut at Poltesco. Luckily the axles weren't buried too deep! Poltesco River at one point was flowing over the bridge beside the mill, which is a rare event

indeed. In many ways we've got away with it fairly lightly in Grade-Ruan, as although there have been lots of cliff slips all the way along from Poltesco to Landewednack Church Cove, none have put the coastpath or any other structures in imminent danger.

If you've been out and about recently, you may have noticed that we have been cutting back the scrub along the coastpath, as you walk from Poltesco up the hill towards Friars Lane. This is in preparation for some path drainage and surface improvements over the summer, to be funded by a wider project celebrating 40 years of the South West Coast Path National Trail.



Also happening very soon (March) will be the installation of our new footbridge, to replace the old wooden one within Carleon Cove. The bridge is currently under construction, and will be brought in and put together piece by piece. We're looking forward to seeing it complete. As you can see, we've gone with an interesting curved design, by local architect and timber framer Matt Robinson. We will need to close the crossing for up to 10 days as we take out the old and install the new bridge, so please bear with us as we do this. There will be a short diversion via the yard at

Poltesco. Once complete that will mean we've replaced both Poltesco bridges within a year, so we should be able to breathe easy on that front for a good few decades!

Also well underway are the renovations of both Carleon House and Poltesco Farmhouse. Our residential volunteers will be moving into the farmhouse in March, and Carleon House will be advertised to let as a home. Please ask if you'd like a copy of the particulars, or check RightMove for the listing.

Our Seasonal Access Ranger, Darren, secured a permanent job with a tree surgery company in January, and we wish him well as he moves to pastures (or woods) new. We're currently recruiting for a new 9 month Access Ranger role and also a part-time Education Ranger, who will help support National Trust and Natural England's work with local schools. We will welcome both new people to their posts in early April.

Over the Easter holidays we will be repeating the hugely popular family bushcraft days at Poltesco. We were oversubscribed last year, so have increased the number of sessions to 4 this time, daily 2nd - 5th April 10am - 2pm. Learn how to light a fire without matches, twist rope from nothing but leaves, build a shelter in the wild, and make natural paints. These days are for families and accompanied children, £3 per child, their adults go free! Booking essential on number below.

What does the Church mean to you? Somewhere to be married or baptize your children, or to go at the end of it all, to rest in the churchyard, close to relatives. Somewhere quiet to sit and think when we have a problem, maybe it is just simply a beautiful building that enhances our village. The fact is that at some point in our lives most of us like to have the comforting thought that it is there when we need it. To some of us, it means much more: a focal point for our faith and a place of great fellowship and friendship - almost like an extended family.

For all these reasons, we want to preserve the Church for the next generation.

Some people have asked me: Doesn't the Government pay for the upkeep? British Heritage? The National Trust? The Bishop, for heaven's sake? Well, no. the Diocese (the ruling body at Truro) does pay the salary of our stipendiary paid priest, Rev. Peter Sharpe. The Rev. Deirdre Mackrill, who God sent to us when Rev. Bill Cole was retired, gives her considerable time and talent entirely free. Apart from that, we are on our own.

We, as a Parish, have to pay to the Diocese approximately £16,000 a year, which, from the collections of a congregation of twenty or so people, mean that we fall short of that amount usually and it is rolled over to the next year. None of this goes to repairs so,

### Rector's Ramblings

Ithough there are now better universal indicator papers for testing whether something is acid or alkaline, I still tend to think in terms of the older litmus paper. As we move through Lent to approach Holy Week and Easter, litmus paper came to mind when I read the following verse: "For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." (1 Corinthians 1:18).

In many respects the message, or 'word', of the Cross is like litmus paper for the heart. I am writing this just after Candlemas and hearing Simeon say; "This Jesus will reveal the secrets of many hearts, a sign that will be spoken against and a cause of many falling or rising." Here, the truth of his crucifixion penetrates our hearts and indicates either 'folly' or 'the power of God'.

Jesus' parables had a similar effect: words thrown down before us; some heard interesting stories; some found them meaningless; but some heard God speaking life-changing truth. The same word tested hearts and revealed their real state before God.

There is something about the cross that is very revealing of the state of your heart. Each Sunday we may stand together to recite the Creed and, understanding these things, we may truly say that we believe them. But it is another thing to ask whether they are changing your life. Understanding is important – truth matters – but the heat is also important. Like a nuclear explosion, the elements of head and heart must come together if life-changing fusion is to take place.

Using another metaphor: the remedy necessary can often indicate the seriousness of the problem. If you go to your doctor with a painful toe and he says you need immediate surgery to amputate your foot, you know it's serious. When we realise that the only remedy to our predicament is the death of the Son of God, we know it is serious; how great must our sin and guilt be; how helpless must we be that we can do nothing but trust in him – it cuts to the root of our independence and pride.

So what does your heart indicate as we come to Holy Week and face the Cross; perhaps it does not indicate 'folly', but if it is at all 'neutral' – if it does not light up as 'power of God' – then you know you have some 'heart' work to do. Prayer is needed ("Lord, incline my heart to fear you"), and meditation on his word (spend time reading, thinking and praying), and give yourself to worship (you can stir up your own heart). It is amazing how our hearts can grow cold before such a glorious God.

Let the word of the Cross litmus-test your heart.

### Gardening in March

by David Endean

Well what a time of it we have had since the last article. I think that I am developing webbed feet - if I ever see them again as I think my Wellies have become welded on. I am sure it will eventually sort itself out but I am now concerned because February is most often our coldest month. Plants in general survive the cold better if they are on the dry side; there is nothing worse than wet cold periods for plants. They really do hate their roots frozen solid in saturated airless soil.

I have noticed throughout January that growth is coming on at a pace and some lawns are nearing needing a trim. Hold off until it drains away a bit and firms up; this will stop soil compaction and root damage, also do not be tempted if it is frosty as this will do your lawn no favours either. Some extra grass on the lawn at this time of year will help reduce any damage that may occur from necessary foot traffic. I would highly recommend spiking your lawn if you have not done so already; this will aid drainage and get air into the roots of the turf. You can get special hollow tined tools for this job plus many other gadgets, but often the simplest is best, this being a standard garden fork then tread on it as deeply as it will go without jumping on it with the ground being so soft at the moment it could be the full nine inches. Once the fork is in, push it back and forth a little and then remove it. Step back four or five inches and repeat the process. This is a very laborious job not to say time consuming so, like digging in the veg garden, do a little regularly and this will help to remove the festive excesses. You could brush in some sand.

We can only look forward and hope that this will be a year to remember for all the right horticultural reasons. With the best will in the world I think this <u>spring</u> will be a slow late one in the veg garden especially. This is not because it has been cold to the contrary really, but because it has been so wet for so long that the sun will need some real strength

in it to firstly dry the ground out then warm it up to make it fit for planting into. The ground will only begin to dry out once the plants start to actively grow, drawing up the moisture and transpiring it. This is especially the case with the trees which I believe will make the biggest difference due to the massive amounts of water which they translocate, and their roots go so deep and wide. Many established plants have coped really well and spring has come a little earlier in some cases I feel.

March is a time of madness in the garden. Even if the soil is too wet to work or sow seed into, there is always the greenhouse. There are absolutely tons of seeds that can and should be sown now, but do not do it all at once as you will get a glut of crops and even more so, too much pricking out and potting on to do at one time. Sowing bedding plants starts in earnest now. These are generally half hardy annuals like marigolds. petunias, lobelias and antirrhinums, to name a few. Growing from seed gives you far more choice of varieties but I can see many advantages of buying in plugs of seedlings and growing these on. This is especially useful for slow growing plants like Begonias and Busy Lizzies, as to grow these they need to be sown earlier requiring a lot more expensive heating. You can get a large range of seeds by mail order these days, plus many supermarkets and DIY stores carry them and generally you are assured of better results. If you have ordered seeds, you will find some of them will begin to arrive this month along with any you buy, so get them home and pot them on into good fresh potting compost and keep them frost free in good light, they will then surely romp away.

I think that it is worth sowing many types of <u>vegetables</u> in small pots and plug trays at this time of year. It will give you a head start in the veg patch and they do not generally require so much heat as the half hardy flowers. I think vegetables such as

cabbage, beetroot, spring onions and lettuce all work well if done in this way.

I expect that you are all like me - well behind with the <u>digging in the veg garden</u> so any opportunity which lends itself with a dry period means out with the shovel or fork. I think it may well be a case of working off boards to stop things from getting too claggy (messy to the uninitiated). Lifting the soil and turning it over will help to get air into it, help it drain and so warm up quicker and things will start to grow, of course first will come the weeds. If the ground allows, now is the time for planting early potatoes and onion sets all directly into the soil.

Every month I can always find you a job for the secateurs, and March is no different. As a matter of course <u>camellias</u> do not need <u>pruning</u> as they look after themselves pretty well but if yours has become a little unruly or out of shape, once it has finished flowering you can use your trusty secateurs to tame it. This way it has the maximum time to recover and flower once again next year. Near the end of the month is the time to trim off the old hydrangea flowers. Most of the frost will have passed and I find that the wind does more damage than the frost down here so the old flowers help to break up the wind and reduce salt burn.

This will also be the last chance to prune your <u>soft fruit bushes</u> before they get too much leaf on them and you cannot see what you are doing. I would not be too hard now just remove damaged, dead, diseased and crossing branches aiming to get a nice open bush so plenty of light and air can get in around. This will help to reduce fungal diseases, aid ripening and make picking easier. Then next autumn go in and look again at pruning for fruit production by developing spurs on the gooseberries, red and white currants.

This is the ideal time to tackle one of those weeds which is a bane to many of us around here, three cornered leek, wild onion, wild garlic are a few of the polite common names for it. Once you have got it you rarely get rid of it, it stinks of garlic when bruised

and has white flowers around bluebell time. Now it spreads from bulbils underground and if left with the flowers on it will happily set seed around although they do not travel far. Spraying them with weed killer is generally ineffective as they grow strongly and seem not to absorb it, plus they like to grow in amongst your more precious plants. The only real answer is to dig them up with a trowel or small fork. This can be done in the summer when all you have is the bulbils in the ground, but that is like picking fleas off the proverbial elephant's b?. Plus it's easy to miss the odd stray bulbil. At this time of year, before there is too much flower, the stems are quite strong so handling them is easier and you get rid of the whole problem. Later on, the stems are much weaker when the energy is put into seeds and more bulbils. Do not, whatever you do, compost them as you are only going to transfer the problem. Best job is a bonfire. The small first year seedlings which come up like grass can be controlled by hoeing but older ones are more persistent.

The novice class this year at the Autumn Show is planned to be carrots, so I hope to guide you to grow some prize winners through this column this summer. Those of you who would like to have a go with some exhibition varieties, I have once again got some free seed that people can have. If you would like to try some please contact me on Tel 241178. It is a huge fallacy that show veg is not good to eat and this variety has been bred for commercial carrot production so that must say something for it. Next month I will tell you how to get started.

What else will I be doing this month? Well lawns will need another trim by then, but do not cut them too tightly, and things will be moving more, so a bit of fertiliser will not go amiss - it will help it green and thicken up. Daffodils will want a feed as well so that they put the energy back in to the bulbs to develop good blooms for next year. The Rhubarb needs weeding and giving some fertiliser and a top dressing of farm yard manure. Then you have the spring shows.

All I can say is do your best and enjoy your gardening.

#### Blast from the Past: Naming of Socoa

Previously printed in the Grade Ruan Gazette in June 1990 Written by the late John Bourne

On April 29, Cadqwith's new Pilot Gig, the Socoa, was named in the Cove. The star of the ceremony was Annie Moor, the mother of John, the builder of the boat. She sprinkled the champagne and gave the traditional blessing. Later, the Gig club was very touched by Annie's gifts - not only of £25 for the boat, but of a cake stand bearing Socoa's name as "a trophy to be awarded for gig racing". The porcelain stand came from the original Socoa and was given to Annie by her grandfather, Henry Jane. He received it for helping to float the French ship off the shoal where she grounded just north of the Cove in 1906.



Many visitors, and even a few locals, have asked why the new gig should be named after the ship Socoa. Socoa was the most popular

choice when the vote was taken at a general meeting of the Club. The reason is the link between the ship and the late Buller Arthur, who inspired the renaissance of gig rowing by Cadgwith men at Newquay races after the Second World War.



When Harry Arthur, Buller's older brother, was a young man, he painted a picture of the Socoa on the central window embrasure of the Arthur family's home, which is still called Ship Cottage. Harry was killed in the First World War, when he was in the Navy and his anti-submarine netting boat was shelled by an Austrian cruiser in the Adriatic. Afterwards, Buller faithfully re-touched the painting whenever

the weather got to it, until his death in 1982. The picture was then covered over. The present picture of the Socoa in the embrasure was painted by [the late] Tony Culmer, a great nephew of Buller, who used to do a bit of coxing for the Gig club. Steve Collins, the Club's chairman, is another great nephew.

He has identified several places mentioned in the book that he thinks bear a resemblance to local landmarks. He's convinced that the treasure from Treasure Island is still buried somewhere in the vicinity. See if you agree......

#### Treasure Island

Penzance's Admiral Benbow pub does not have a cove, high cliff, small fishing boats or a small bridge down the hill from the Inn. But **Cadgwith Cove Inn** has, and the configuration of how it fits in with all of the places described in Treasure Island aligns with that part of the book.

Cadgwith had a Revenue House for their gig which is now the Watch House. Before the RNLI built the Lifeboat house, there would have been an open river and the bridge over that river would have had to have been low and the banks either side around 4ft high. From the place below the position where the bridge would have been, one can still see the pub or inn. So the ending of the first part Treasure Island when Banes dies, Revenue

men kill Pew and Jim's Mum has been hidden under a bridge ..... it all fits in with Cadqwith.

When Jim Hawkins leaves in a gig from the place where the treasure had been found by Ben Gunn and re-buried, the direction is opposite to the quarry in which Ben Gunn had been found. This in my imagination was leaving the second beach at **Kennack** and heading for **Lankidden**. You may not have been down to Lankidden yourself, but if you did you would have noticed that from the top of the cliff there is a zig-zag to the top of the very steep cliff that goes the last distance of 80ft at a 75° angle. It has a deep path cut into its side, wide enough for donkeys to walk easily. At the bottom is a sandy beach with cont.

the width to beach a big schooner because the sand goes a long way out and is never stony after gales. The high sides would easily conceal the masts of ships in close and after half tide around the right hand side there is a smugglers cave. At the very top of the cliff on a 1880 chart, there is a watch house which had been a revenue station in those days (called Borgwitha). This I reckon was the B—— in Treasure Island.

Local legend has it that a Revenue Man was killed outside of the pub in Cadgwith. I think



that Pew's death was probably be put down to the death of a Revenue Man. I reckon **Ruan Minor** would have been the little hamlet mentioned in that scene, as it was in the direction of Kennack Sands from where the men who had been working on the land had seen the pirates with Pew.

The stockade in the book is close to the place where they land on the beach. Next time you are at **Kennack**, keep the story line with you and wander into the woods at the top of the beach. There you will find a square house in ruins with no front door. This I think was the house that the Revenue had built in front of a trader's post or stockade.

**Falmouth** is within walking distance from Kennack. Cadgwith is only a slow hour and the coach Bones came in was from the Royal Garage the day before, which also fits in with Falmouth or Penryn.

The story of Treasure Island has all the hallmarks of a real story, I believe, because it is based on real places that would have been known to people at the time. Stevenson once stayed up at Coverack and could well have visited Cadgiwth and Kennack Sands.
