

### News from Bolenowe Horse Sanctuary

Bonaventure Farm, Ruan Minor

Work continued at the Sanctuary tidying up after such a cold, wet and windy winter. Fields have been waterlogged and horses have needed to be stabled due to the fact that we don't have sufficient field shelters to protect them from the cold winds and rain. Many of our horses are very elderly, some now well into their 30s and with lots of age related problems such as very few teeth, arthritis, cushings disease (a hormonal disorder affecting the older horses), laminitis in the feet and sight loss. Quite a few are on special diets because they can no longer eat hay or grass and this obviously increases the annual feed bill substantially. The Spring grass has certainly been a long time coming, which has meant that the horses have had to be kept in much longer than usual this year.

The Bolenowe Charity Shop in Horse & Jockey Lane, Helston is our main source of income and we are always really grateful for any donations of clothing, kitchen items, crockery, books and ornaments. Hopefully in the near future we will also be able to take items of furniture too so please do think of us when you are next having a clear out.

Open Sundays at the Sanctuary will continue every week throughout the summer. Please visit the Sanctuary and spend time with us, remember our Bolenowe Charity shop when you are clearing out, adopt one of our horses for £10 a year, or remember us in your Will. Any help you can give will be gratefully received by the Trustees, our Volunteers and of course all our lovely horses.

### Recredtion Ground News

The May Festival weekend came and went - the best weather we've had for it for years! The Vintage Rally kindly allowed us to use their marguees - much easier to manage than the usual big green marquee, and ideally sized with the small one perfect for the stage and the bigger one as an audience shelter (most useful as even though the days were sunny, it got cold fast in the evenings!) and the space between as a dance floor. Despite some initial misgivings, having the bar in the pavilion worked very well. The bands were great, and the impromptu relaying of the rugby over the PA was an inspired idea (though I say it myself!) - all that was missing was the people. Attendance for the weekend was considerably lower than previous years, particularly for the afternoons and early evening. This was probably down to a number of factors - the sunny weather meant that families were on the beach, the fun day at the school the week before and the lack of much publicity. We don't have the final figures yet (it will depend on being able to "sell on" any left-overs to other events), but it looks like we made a small profit of £200-300 towards the pavilion project. As they say "every little helps" but not much to show for all the hard work! I'd like to give a big THANK YOU to everyone who helped - helpers to erect and take down the marguees and all the bar staff, but also those behind the scenes - Martin Russell for helping get the bar organised, Tom Briggs from the Ducks for organising most of the bands and Steve Thompson from Merlins Rockit for helping me with the sound system and loaning various items that I didn't already have (especially his drum kit!).

This event is (usually!) a major contributor to our funds, so it is important that we continue to organise it every year. I have decided that I do not have time to organise it myself, but am more than happy to support and help someone else to do it. Some of the other committee members have agreed to take over planning next year's event, but they would, I'm sure, appreciate any other offers of help! Please make contact via Moira, if there is any way you would like to get involved.

We held our AGM on the 12th June, in the pavilion.

Nigel gave the Treasurer's Report – our funds increased by £401 last year, despite spending £1788 on fees associated with the pavilion project and other running expenses over the year, with a year-end balance of £21,091.

In addition to our own funds, we have pledged funds from the Parish Council, Tham Trust and Community Trust totalling about £12.000 towards the pavilion project. As reported earlier in the year, our applications from major funders to build a new pavilion were not successful. There are still two sources of funding potentially available – SITA and Sport England – when added to out existing and pledged funds, they add up to a possible total of just over £100,000. This is still well short of the amount needed to build the pavilion that we have planned. We have looked at various options to build a lower-cost building, including sectional buildings, log cabins and reducing the size of the building, but will struggle to build within the available budget. We have arrived at the conclusion that the best, possibly only, way forward if to refurbish and remodel the existing building.

Although unsightly, the basic structure of the existing pavilion is sound – the aluminium structure will probably last pretty much for ever! The roof leaks, due to missing rivets and the consequent ingress of water has led to damaged flooring (we keep replacing sections of it, but the fundamental problem remains) and general dilapidation of the interior wall finishes. We are proposing to build a new roof over

the existing structure. This will keep the rain out, preventing future damage. We intend to build a shallow pitched roof, surfaced with corrugated metal or similar material, which should last for many years. Also, we plan to clad the outer wall surfaces with wooden "shiplap" or similar. This will make a huge improvement to the appearance, covering up the present "patchwork" effect and hiding any redundant doors and windows left from the building's original function. All windows and doors will be replaced with modern upvc double-glazed units to further improve the weather resistance and enhance security.

We will strip out all the existing internal partitions, then divide the rear "unit" into two changing rooms of 15 square metres each, compliant with Football Association recommendations, cut two new access doors through the rear wall and extend the changing rooms through into where the current store room is, to allow space for new showers and toilets for the players. The current toilets will be rearranged slightly to give two "unisex" cubicles, one of which is suitable for wheelchair access in compliance with the DDA. There is also a small space set aside for the referee's changing and shower room. The kitchen is reduced in size slightly, and remodelled to use the space more efficiently. A new serving hatch will be cut through to the social room, and provision made to install the bar equipment when needed. All interior walls will be re-lined to improve appearance and suitable tile, or similar, finishes applied to the walls and floors of changing rooms and toilets, also either tiles or carpet to the floor of the social room.

Externally, we plan to install a new decking patio, covering a slightly larger area than




the existing patio, on the same level as the internal floor and a wheelchair access ramp. Also, steps to the new changing room entrances, with a wooden panel fence to screen the doors from neighbouring properties.


The only thing that we can't find room for in this new plan is the store room! New cupboards and shelves will be provided in the kitchen for storing cups, glasses and other catering supplies, and a new store shed built outside for the BBQ, and other large items.

Our next step is to find out how much this will all cost, then we can apply to the remaining funders for whatever we need. We would certainly welcome any feedback on the new plan, also any offers of practical help!

The Bournemouth musicians were joined by guest lan Jones on clarinet for an impressive performance of a Mozart clarinet quintet.



## **Rector's Ramblings**

#### **Liturgical Colours**

A this time of year our churches are full of colour, with flower festivals and weddings, exhibitions and feast weeks. But have you noticed how the Church colours change during the year – the colours of the altar hangings, the chasuble (the poncho-like garment worn by the priest in some churches) and the stole - the long, narrow 'scarf' worn by the priest? The bookmark on the lectern, the pulpit fall? No? Well, let's take a look at these rainbow colours ...

- **Purple:** the Church year begins on **Advent** Sunday when we wear purple (or in some churches, blue). This dark colour reminds us of the darkness in the world before the light of Christ comes at Christmas. In **Lent** it reminds us of our penitential observance in those weeks before Easter.
- White: is the colour for festivals, so is worn from Christmas Day (or usually Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve) up to and including Candlemas (the Presentation of Christ in the Temple). It's also worn from Easter Day until the Eve of Pentecost; for Trinity Sunday; for Festivals of Our Lord and the Blessed Virgin Mary; for All Saints' Day; for Corpus Christi (thanksgiving for Holy Communion); and for saints not venerated as martyrs. White signifies the light of Christ, his resurrection, and also purity.
- Red: is worn during Holy Week except for Holy Communion on Maundy Thursday (white); on the Feast of Pentecost, and may be worn for services which focus on the gift of the Holy Spirit, e.g. Baptism, Confirmation & Ordination; it's also worn for feast days of saints venerated as martyrs (signifying blood), for example.
- **Green:** is worn during '**Ordinary time**' (such a dull name!) which runs from the day after Candlemas until Shrove Tuesday; then from the day after Pentecost until the eve of All Saints Day; and may be used between All Saints' and the First Sunday of Advent (although some churches use red to mark 'The Kingdom' period celebrating Christ's reign in both heaven and on earth).

The use of different liturgical colours became a common practice in the Western Church in about the fourth century. By the 12<sup>th</sup> century Pope Innocent III systematised their use and practice that we see today.

So next time you are in a church – maybe just visiting, or perhaps worshipping on a Sunday – you will be able to impress your partner or friend by explaining just what the current church colour means!

# Gardening in July

Well everything in the garden should be reaching a crescendo now and with all the major jobs done I always think of it as a month to potter and enjoy.

Now things are coming together in the garden the aim is to keep it going as long as possible, so simple things are important - none more so than <u>dead heading</u>. Most plants will put on another flush of flowers if you quickly remove the faded flowers; this is because their genetics are programmed for them to set seed and that will only happen if they flower. This is most prevalent with annuals and least with the shrubs. If dead heading does nothing else it tidies everything up. Some plants can be dead headed by just using the finger and thumb like marigolds, others a pair of scissors are better like violas, petunias (because they are sticky and horrible) and sweet peas. Scissors are often better because you can get into the plant better to remove the stalks which may be a bit tougher. Then for the more woody plants like roses use a pair of secateurs. I tend with roses to use a technique of long stem pruning, instead of just removing the spent flowers, I take a length of stem with several pair of leaves down to a bud or shoot, this keeps the bush more compact and the foliage looking fresher.

Most of the cranesbills (hardy geraniums) will have flowered now and looked good; well .. be harsh and cut all the old foliage off leaving it looking like an hedgehog. Within a couple a weeks it will be a green cushion, then in late summer / early autumn they will hopefully have another flush.

I have nagged on about it before but be vigilant with the <u>watering</u>, especially the pots and tubs around the patio. They need watering daily, very rarely will enough rain fall and penetrate the foliage to get to the surface of the compost. Along with the watering, regular feeding is necessary to keep the plants healthy and flourishing. I have so often seen pots planted up and looking good but have been neglected because it had rained. They wilt and it is then so hard to get them back.

In the <u>veg patch</u>, keep hoeing and begin the harvest. As I write this, all I can think about is picking peas and eating them fresh off the plant. Salads are in full swing now and this is your last chance to sow lettuce to grow to maturity this season. Keep sowing the other salad crops like radish, carrots, beetroot and the like. I plan to make the first sowing of spring greens this month using something like Durham Early or Offenham Flowers of Spring you can sow them in drills out in the open ground, but I will use direct sowing into modules. Then grow them on to plant out later.

Now that the day length is shortening once again, most of the <u>Chinese vegeta-</u> bles can be sown with confidence. These veg grow fast and lush and are ideal for stir fries and the like. So if that's your thing, try Mooli, Mizuna, Mibuna and Pak Choi. The biggest problems are slugs and snails and root flies. So see what you can do about that.

Get on with <u>picking your soft fruit</u> and use them because there is little better use for clotted cream than to accompany some raspberries or strawberries. Pick them every other day at least when they are ripe. If you have some good strawberry plants and want a few more, they will start sending runners out this month. Get some small pots and fill them with compost, a new plant will form at the end of the runner. Push this into the

Often the runner will send out another extension with a plantlet, rather like a stone skimming off the water. Trim those off along with any extra runners that you do not need as they will only sap the strength from the mother plants. Do not bother to take runners off old and diseased plants as they will never be very productive.

Keep <u>trimming the lawns</u> but not too low if the weather does turn hot and dry - here's wishing. <u>Hedges</u> will need a trim now if you have not done so already. This will neaten them up, but you will need to carry out the operation again later in the year. Regularly trimming the hedge will keep it compact, green and bushy.

The best thing to do in the garden is to get out there and <u>enjoy it</u>, maybe have a barbeque and if that seems too much work, head down to the cove on a Wednesday evening and support them. Get out there and enjoy your gardening.

#### National Trust News: July 2013



Well there's been plenty to report since our last gazette piece in March. First off congratulations to no fewer than 3 of our residential volunteers who have recently secured paid jobs with the National Trust. Ed and Tony have moved on to seasonal ranger posts in south and mid Devon respectively, and Beth leaves us next week for Sussex for an education ranger role. We're really pleased for them and glad the experience and skills they have gained with us have stood them in good stead. Aimmie, Carl (recently transferred to Poltesco from Camp Bastion, Afghanistan!) and Nathaniel are our current volunteers, settled in now to their new abode, the farmhouse.

Welcome also to three new seasonal staff members, based out of Poltesco. Tom is our Access Ranger, and will be with us to the end of the year. His is the second of three posts kindly funded by a single donor. Tom and the volunteers have already got stuck in to making ongoing improvements to the footpath network, such as replacing the kissing gate and field gate at the end of Friar's Lane, and the stile on Kildown Point. Graham has joined us this summer to take on the unenviable task of strimming all our footpaths, a seemingly never ending job! Claire Scott is our 'Wild Lizard Education Ranger', a new partnership post funded by The National Trust, Natural England, and Helford Voluntary Marine Conservation Group. Claire previously spent 3 years as an outreach officer with Natural England on The Lizard, so brings lots of experience of working with local schools and organising all sorts of wildlife related fun. She will lead on our education work, and is planning a series of boredom busting summer holiday events, so keep your eyes peeled for details of those!

Our 4 days of family bushcraft at Poltesco over Easter were really popular, and attracted a mix of visiting and local families. On offer were shelter building, cooking bread on the campfire, mallet making, learning how to make rope out of leaves, lighting fire with strikers and tinder bundles, and nature art. Enough to keep everyone busy! We've also had a hectic time with school visits to Poltesco, including 100 German teenagers who were staying at Kuggar, and classes from Mullion and Landewednack Primaries, who were treated to tales of the serpentine factory and mermaids (unrelated we think!), courtesy of a professional storyteller. We've also recently hosted a rockpool discovery day at Carleon Cove with Cornwall Wildlife Trust, and we have given a licence to Lizard Adventure to run kayak trips from Poltesco. We've been working in partnership with Lizard Adventure for a couple of years, offering coasteering at Bass Point, and kayaking out of Mullion Cove, and extending this agreement to Carleon Cove means groups have the option of kayaking from east or west coasts depending on the wind and sea.

So what else is coming up? We've a second shepherd's hut on order, to give us more office space at Poltesco, but before it arrives we'll need to stabilise the bank behind following the landslip last Autumn. Also on the cards is a long overdue revamp of our education room upstairs in the barn at Poltesco, with new displays kindly funded by the Rural Development Programme for England, about the history of milling, fishing and the serpentine factory. The barn will be left open for people to pop in and browse during the day, and will also be much more cosy for visiting school groups once we've improved the insulation and added some heating.

If you are interested in local history you might want to join us for a guided walk around Poltesco on Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> July, meeting 1pm in the carpark, £2 per person, an event we run annually as part of the British Festival of Archaeology.

#### Blast from the Past: Hartley Tripconey

"Through the Letter-box" by Natalie Allen of Saltash, was published in 1988. The book was compiled from memories of Cornish postal workers and had a section on Cadgwith. The following is an extract covering peoples' memories of Hartley Tripconey which was printed in the May 1990 issue of the Gazette. Ed

Postman Hartley Tripconey, who died in 1978, is still remembered by locals as a real character. He was a postman for 18 years from 1953 - 1971 and, from what I have heard, delivering mail was only one of his daily tasks. Hartley Trip, as he was affectionately known, appears to have been a bit of a Jack-of-all-trades; not only was he an accomplished artist, he helped to run a tea shop, served petrol at the garage, was a waiter at the Rectory, worked and sometimes sang in the pub, and was a Special Constable during the Second World War. He was invariably accompanied by a large Labrador dog called Rufus.

He caused great confusion to visitors as he would cheerfully fill the petrol tank of their car at the local garage and a few minutes later when they decided to have a cup of tea at the tea shop or perhaps a pint at the bar, they would be served by a man of similar appearance. When strangers remarked about the likeness, Hartley

eness, Hartley would reply, "Ogh, yes, that was my brother" and a while later

the poor unwitting visitor would come across yet another look-alike, peacefully capturing the local scenes on canvas - Hartley was, by then, devoting a little time to his favourite hobby of painting. The visitor then went away convinced that identical twins or triplets worked in the village in various capacities! This appealed to Hartley Trip's sense of humour and he rushed around from job to job causing confusion wherever he went. He often sang with a group of men in the local Inn and singing came a close second to his first love, painting. He had a wonderful bass voice and was a member of both St. Keverne and Ruan Minor Choirs. He once discovered an

**Present:** Parish Councillors J Preston (Chairman), Councillor N Green (Vice-Chair), P Freeman, C Cooper, P Collins, M Alford, M Fleetwood and J Trewin.

1. Absences and Apologies there were no apologies.

2. Declarations of Interest – there were no declarations of interest.

**3. Public Time** – it was reported that at approximately 1:00am on Saturday 11 May 2013 some vandals had come through the village, banging on windows and frightening the residents, especially in Mundys Field. The Police were called and attended within 15 minutes.

It was also reported that Mundys Field Car Park had been used for transferring materials from one lorry to another and concerns were expressed it was being used as a commercial transfer area and it was asked residents be vigilant about this to prevent further deterioration of the surface in the Car Park.

**4. Police Report** – PCSO Berry sent her apologies but had supplied a report which the Clerk read to those present. The vandalism described in the previous item had occurred after the supply of the Police report. It was felt the Police presence at the Village Hall Thursday market was valuable as the Police were having difficulties attending the Parish Council meetings and this is to be welcomed.

**5. Cornwall Councillor's Time –** Cornwall Councillor Rule had been re-elected but sent her apologies to the meeting.

6. Minutes for acceptance: the Minutes having been circulated were signed by the Chair as a true and correct record. It was specifically requested that personal comments should not be made in meetings of the Parish Council

7. Planning: PA13/03260 – extensions and alterations to include construction of pitched roof over flat roof utility, raised decking to southeast and roof terrace to south at Malahat, Cadgwith, Ruan Minor by Mr and Mrs Mark Wild. Councillor Freeman proposed the application be supported, Councillor Fleetwood seconded – all in favour. **Resolved: Grade Ruan Parish Council supports this application** 

**PA/03168** – modification of a section 106 obligation attached to decision notice 90/00402/F at Chy an Delek, St Ruan, Ruan Minor by Mr A Dale. Councillor Fleetwood proposed the Parish Council decline to support this application as the land is located outside the village boundary and to support this could set a precedent. It is felt the reasons for the original imposition of the s106 conditions have not changed. Councillor Alford seconded. 6 in favour, 1 against, 1 abstention – the proposal was carried. **Resolved: Grade Ruan Parish Council does not support this application as the location of the development is outside the village boundary and the Council is concerned a precedent would be set if development was permitted. It is felt the reasons for the original imposition of the s106 agreement has not changed. Please note this planning application was received on the same day as the meeting when this was considered, so the Parish Council has not received any feedback from parish-ioners in respect of this application.**

approval subject to conditions. The development now appears to be complete and it would appear the screening condition has not been complied with. Clerk to raise with planning.

Unauthorised development at Treal – Councillor Rule had raised this with Enforcement and the development had stopped. There may be a planning application to be submitted in the future.

8. **Finance:** financial report and bank reconciliations were circulated.

Cheque to the Society of Local Council Clerks was still outstanding. This cheque to be cancelled and a replacement issued.

Requests for donations - no requests had been received.

Approval of payments as per schedule – Councillor Trewin proposed the payments as listed on the Schedule be paid, Councillor Collins seconded – all in favour.

Audit 2012-13 – the Internal Auditors draft report was been circulated to all Councillors however it had only been received shortly before the Meeting so it was felt it would be better to have a Finance Committee Meeting to consider the report fully prior to the next monthly meeting at 7:00pm

Insurance – the policy needs to be reviewed.

Council Tax Subsidy – concern was expressed that should the Subsidy be withdrawn unexpectedly in the following financial year it could leave a shortfall in the Parish Council's budget which would be difficult to recoup without exceeding the 2% cap applied to councils

**9. Matters arising from the Minutes:** Play Area: a report and specification had been provided by Proludic. Another estimate is now required. Councillor Collins to try and obtain electronic copies of the design and form prepared by Proludic for circulation.

Community right to Bid – an amended list was circulated. Councillor Green proposed the amended list be approved and submitted to Cornwall Council, Councillor Trewin seconded – all in favour.

Arrangement with Grade Ruan Community Trust re toilets – this is supposed to be reviewed annually. Councillors Collins and Freeman declared an interest. It was felt the current arrangement is working very well.

Community Land Trust – it was agreed initially to look for 2-3 representatives to lead on this. The Chair, Vice-Chair and Councillor Freeman to liaise.

Casual vacancies – there are 4 casual vacancies as a result of there being insufficient nominations in the recent Town and Parish Council elections. These are to be advertised in the Gazette.

#### SP124 BRITANNIA

While I was with working with Arch Leckie I had a lovely old boat. She was built of New Zealand kauri, an everlasting hardwood. She was about eighty years old and had been built with a centreboard, but had a fixed keel and a huge guntur rig when we had her. She had a petrol engine which we took out and sold before we even took her out sailing. Petrol and boats just do not mix. We kept BRITANNIA, her original name and we kept it, at the South Perth Yacht Club, mainly because we could become members there without having to wait years. This club had very well positioned pens for boats; these allowed the boats to be head to the sea breeze when berthed. Generally, in the Swan River there was either a sea breeze or no breeze. This meant we could leave the berth and return to it under sail very easily. 'BRIT' was heavily rigged. Her stays ran to chain plates that were continued round the inside of the hull to the keel bolts. The stays themselves were heavy galvanised wire. The jib luff was also heavy galvanised wire so that we could lower the mast on the jib luff as we sailed under the bridges and on to sea from Fremantle


