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

Farewell to Cadgwith from Jan Fry (née Prichard).

For those of you who remember my Grandmother, Mrs. Prichard and her daughter Gracie, and the generations of us who have been visiting the Cove since 1929, I am afraid Nigel and I will not be down to Cadgwith again. Ill health and 330 miles have finally defeated us both.

Since I was born in 1938, I have rarely missed a year of coming to Cadgwith and stayed with my Grannie as a toddler during the war (Jocelyn was my play-mate). Granny had Pennard built in 1929 – what a plot to buy! She would have been amused that a 'Jane' bought it from us (after Gracie died) as she was so fond of Henry and Rene.

She found Cadgwith, to retire from Bristol, quite by chance. My father, aged 6, had come to Cadgwith for a holiday with some friends – and their nursemaid (Annie) fell in love with Rambo. My father (Rev'd Tom) and Rambo died within 2 weeks of each other and I saw Rambo up at Ruan at the very end of his life, when I went to tell him that 'Mr. Tom' had passed away so suddenly. Gracie had been the eldest and Tom the youngest of my grandmother's six children.

Ever since 1930, my family has had a long and happy association with Cadwith, with many of us doing things that the youngsters (and adults!) do now. I am thrilled that my children feel the same about the Cove and Jonathan came down last year and spends much of his time emailing contacts. My daughter Sally will be down with her three teenagers in August and we live near Graham and Wendy in Kent – so we will get to know the gossip!

Sharkey – I missed our goodbye kiss in November – how sad! Your great friend, and my cousin, Jim Croom-Johnson's ashes were buried at sea with the help of Nigel Legge, in May. I didn't see Rodney and Anne in November either, but many of Hartley's paintings are around the Vicarage here to remind us of the wonderful character and rascal who was so good to my Grandmother and Aunt in their old age.

Many happy memories and love from us both to you all and your beautiful Cove.

We have recently been told that a bid we submitted to the Department for Education, now that we are an Academy, has been approved. This will mean that we will in the near future be able to replace the existing, dilapidated Elliot buildings. This is absolutely fantastic news, particularly as this funding is only available to Academies. Directors. Governors and staff will be working closely with a variety of agencies over the next few weeks to move this project forward and we will keep parents informed once we have concrete plans.

Hopefully many parents will have seen some new arrivals at our school namely the new solar panels on the roof. These have been very kindly DONATED by the local Solar Farm and will help, over time, to generate significant savings in our electricity



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bills - which will mean we will have more money to spend directly on the children.

And last but definitely not least the school said goodbye to Ali Russell. Ali has worked at Grade-Ruan for nearly twelve years and has done so much for the children and the school in addition to her wonderful work in the classroom including running a variety of clubs and activities and ensuring the school was involved in a range of interschool events and competitions. We wish her the best of luck in her new role.

Rector's Ramblings Life, when it's lumpy ... in Jesus

S ometimes life is like smooth silk – as I write this the sun is shining, people are barbecuing and enjoying the glories of this place we are privileged to live in – but often, it seems to me, life comes with lumps in, sometimes it seems so full of lumps that it is hard to swallow.

When life is like this many people begin to ask 'why?' I am sure that there are reasons, I could even suggest some, but knowing the reasons (even if that were possible) isn't really much help. We need something better than an answer to our 'why?'

Perhaps what we need, more than knowing the truth or the right answer, is to come to the Truthful One, Jesus.

When life makes you feel weary and heavy laden, the truth you really need is Jesus, who said "Come to me ... and I will refresh you." When life is disappointing and feels futile, the truth you really need is Jesus, who said "Abide in me, abide in my love, and you will bear fruit that remains." When the world and the Church are perplexing and upsetting, the truth we need is Jesus, who said "Don't be afraid ... I have overcome the world".

It is too easy to get everything right, all buttoned down, and to lose our first love. But, like the disciples, if we pursue loving and being with and following and listening to Jesus ... I believe that we can trust him to keep us, to persevere when we get it wrong, or take a long time to understand what he is saying. And I believe we owe the same patience, forbearance and love to my fellow disciples as we seek to speak the truth in love and discover together the unsearchable riches of Christ.

What else can we turn to when life is lumpy, when the Church is distressing and the world tragic. We have nothing else to offer our world or one another but Christ and him crucified: but in him is life; life that overcomes the lumps, the distress and the sorrows, life we can live and share.





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Gardening in June



Well the year is really racing through now and things are looking fresh and verdant, but it only seems like yesterday when we were being battered by the storms. You can still see the effects of those storms on many of the trees and shrubs, especially the evergreen types. Now is a good time to tidy up most of the shrubs that suffered wind burn. There has been a lot of die back but by now most shrubs will be making fresh growth and this guides you as to where to trim back to. Once all the dead is removed, you can shape as desired and most bushes will benefit from some feed to speed their recovery.

Now is the traditional time to be planting out your summer bedding, although many of you will have done this already as we are generally blessed with frost free conditions and the large retailers in DIY stores and garden centres have been selling them for months. These retailers are always afraid that they will miss the market - that is why Christmas starts in August for some of them. I think that it is nice to enjoy the spring flowers first like the wallflowers, primroses and bulbs. I suppose what I am saying is: do not feel that it is too late to fill any gaps that you may have in your beds, borders and tubs. In your borders, remove the old bulb tops, lightly work over the ground then add some well-rotted organic matter with a little general fertilizer. That space will be ideal for planting some Salvias, Begonias, Antirrhinums or whatever annual type plant you fancy. The next job is to water them in, otherwise they will soon dry out.

Whilst you are in the borders, get in there and provide some <u>support</u> for those taller lax plants before they flop under their own weight or due to wind and rain. This will help to maintain structure in your



borders. Many things can be used for staking, old twiggy material looks natural; canes and string have a place but be careful not to poke your eyes on the end of the canes. There are some really nice plastic coated wire hoops and supports which can also be used. The choice is yours, but if you get in there before you need to the plants will soon grow through and hide whatever you use. June really is the month when everything goes mad.

I always mention well-rotted garden compost but never say anything more about it. At this time of year there is a lot of soft growth that will readily rot down to make a useful product. Firstly you need to construct something to hold all the material together in. There are many products that can be bought and lots of people use plastic systems very similar to coal bins where you put the green waste in the top and dig out at the bottom. I do not find these ideal as I find the access awkward. Some systems claim that you can make usable compost in six weeks, I have never found this to be the case and twelve months is a much more realistic timescale. What to put on the heap? I expect the bulk of your green waste to be lawn trimmings, Be careful as this can turn into a slimy mess so, if can add some dryer more woody material like hedge clippings, this may help. Put them through a shredder or run over them with a mower first if you can. Some experts suggest adding straw to the heap for dry material but I think that it is defeating the object to buy in material to compost down. Any annual weeds from the garden can be used but nothing which is seeding, nor perennial weeds such as docks, bindweed or couch grass as you will only be spreading the problem around your garden. The same goes for diseased mate-

I would not add trimmings from conifer trees either. Text books might say that the heap will heat up and kill all the seeds and diseases and this may be true in a commercial scale, but at home it is rarely the case except in the very centre of the heap. Lastly you need plenty of air going through the material to help the natural flora and fauna to decompose the material. This means regularly turning the heap out and putting it back. This is why people often have several heaps together, one empty, one being added to and one rotting down. Turning the compost heap is hard work but think of the good that it will do to your waist line.

Keep looking after those tomatoes: water daily, feed regularly once the fruit has begun to set and keep them tied in or wound on depending on the support system that you are using. Keep up to date with the side shooting. This is where you remove the shoots which appear in the leaf joints of the plant, and it is called cordon growing. Not all varieties require it and if you do not do it they will still crop, but personally I would never grow a variety which you do not side-shoot because they get untidy and are difficult to control. Well grown cordon plants pick easily, ripen evenly and get less disease as they have better airflow around them.

Keep on <u>sowing</u> your salads. Many people sow their main crop carrots now to help reduce carrot root fly problems. Sow and plant out most brassicas like cabbage, turnips, swedes and Kohl Rabi I would strongly recommend with these to grow them under a frame cover in a fine net, as this will help to stop damage from caterpillars and pigeons. I use hoops made from strong plastic piping. To stop problems with cabbage root fly grubs you need to place collars made from old carpet tight around the stems from the minute that the plants are put into the ground.

Lift your early potatoes as required and earth up you main crop potatoes. I often plant leeks into the ground where I have cropped the early spuds, but this may be the ideal spot to sow some beetroot for the novice class at the Autumn Show. Beetroot take about 14 weeks to grow to maturity and I find that they are quite amenable to grow. The very top showmen use a small bar or dibbler to make a six inch deep hole which is filled with some potting compost into which a few seeds are sown. The aim of this is to get a single straight tap root. Holes are made at six inch spacings. But good results can be gained by preparing the ground well and adding some general fertilizer. Making a shallow drill with a hoe and thinly sow the seed in the bottom, lightly cover with soil. When they are large enough, thin them out to six inches apart. Just be wary of slugs, snails, birds pulling them out and cats digging in the fresh soil.

June is the traditional time to sow your biennials - just as they are beginning to bloom in your garden it's time to think about next year. These plants are the Wallflowers, Sweet Williams, Foxgloves and Canterbury bells. Tradition dictates that you find a patch in the vegetable garden, make sure that it is weed free and work the around down to a fine tilth, then sow the seed in shallow drills a foot apart. It is often good to water the bottom of the drill before sowing to aid germination. Once they have grown on, they can be lifted and spaced out so that they are six inches or so apart. They can grow on from there until they are required in late summer or autumn to bed out or fill gaps. But to be honest I tend to grow mine in trays, as I find sometimes my seedlings get lost in weeds.

What else will I be doing this month? The lawn will need regular mowing, sweet peas will need regular tying in and the Dahlias will get planted out as the risk of a late May frost will have passed! Get out there and enjoy your gardening.



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The Herbal Medicine Cabinet

My heart soared when I saw the first Foxglove (*Digitalis purpurea*) in bloom last month. This plant contains digoxin, which was synthesised to create the pharmaceutical heart drug of the same name – but it's the plant's statuesque beauty that captured my heart. They'll be popping up all over the Lizard right through the summer.

Another of my favourite plants is St John's wort (*Hypericum perforatum*), so-named because it's said to flower on June 24th – St John's Day. I associate the arrival of its bright yellow flowers with the Summer Solstice, which heralds the arrival of summer. Perhaps that's part of the reason why the plant is such a renowned, and scientifically proven, antidepressant. It's also an excellent remedy for anxiety, and has potent antiviral properties. I use it a lot in my practice.

Another wonderful plant for boosting the spirits is Lemon balm (*Melissa officinalis*), which is rampant in my garden and I'm sure many others in the area. You can make a refreshing tea from the leaves. In the summer I leave it to cool, put it in the fridge and sup through the day with ice and sprigs of mint. I also dry a good batch to use as a warming, uplifting tea through the winter months. Like St John's wort, Lemon



balm also has antiviral properties, and the tincture made from the aerial parts of the plant can be very effective when dabbed topically on cold sores.

There is likely to be a lot more interest in these two herbs, along with many others that have antibacterial, antifungal and antiparasitic (antimicrobial) properties, in the near future, following the recent World Health Organisation report stating that antimicrobial drug resistance is now a serious threat to our health. It said, "A future in which common infections and minor injuries can kill, far from being an apocalyptic fantasy, is instead a very real possibility for the 21st Century." It will indeed be a case of returning to the herbal medicine cabinet!

1. Apologies: Councillor C Cooper

2. **Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting 2013:** the Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting held on 8 April 2013 had been circulated and approved at the Parish Council Monthly Meeting held on 13 May 2013.

3. Matters Arising: there were no matters arising from the Minutes.

4. **Police Report:** Apologies were received from PCSO Berry but she had supplied a report that was read by the Clerk. There was one reported crime during March 2014 - criminal damage to a motor vehicle, currently under investigation. Contact telephone numbers: 101 or 01326 555158.

5. **Reports from local groups: Royal British Legion Appeal:** it was reported the wreath laying was well attended and fundraising had raised £1137, slightly less than last year but a credit to the parish. Thanks were expressed for all those who helped.

Grade Ruan Community Trust: the Trust continued its activities concerned with managing Cadgwith car park and the three sets of public toilets in the parish. The car park remains the main source of income and most of the surplus is spent on improvements to the toilets.

'Welcome to Cadgwith' leaflets have proved very popular. In the past year, surplus funds have been used to donate to local good causes including the Gig Club, under 5's group and pledged funds towards the repainting cost of St Mary's Church. There are other long-term pledges outstanding towards the costs of play equipment, new pavilion and school minibus. The Trust is happy to receive requests for funding.

Spring Flower Show: a good Spring Show had been held, with the biggest entry for many years. The event showed a small loss but was deemed a great success, bringing the

community together. Thanks were expressed to all those who participated in any capacity.

Autumn Show: a successful show had been held in October 2013, showing a small surplus and plans for the current year are well under way.

Ruan Minor Village Hall: it was reported there had been another successful year with good loyal support from the community and many events staged during the year. All expenditure on maintenance and improvements had been covered by fundraising and events throughout the year. The weekly market is a vital part of the hall's success. The AGM is on 9 May and new committee members are desperately needed.

Gig Club: it was reported the Club has received lots of interest from teenagers and the Junior section continues to excel. It was noted that the shed is in need of some attention.

Recreation Ground: it was reported that the committee is still carrying on works to keep the field in good order (and for this reason it was noted that horse-riding is not allowed). The existing pavilion continues to leak and the committee continue to look at a scheme for a new pavilion and explore fundraising avenues.

Ruan Revellers: the group was formed in October 2013 under the guidance of Angela Agutter, with the idea of presenting a village pantomime. With the help of sponsorship from Grade Ruan Parish Council, other sponsors and donations, this went ahead and was a great success. Over 40 people of all ages were involved in the production, which was sold out in advance. A video of the production will be shown in June. The group are currently

6. Other community matters: Claire Bollard, owner of the village shop in Ruan Minor, expressed great concern about the Parish Council's Right to Bid application concerning the village shop, the implications of which she had only just been made aware of. Councillor Freeman gave a general background to the process with regard to assets of community value. It was agreed that Councillor Freeman (and the Chairman if available) would meet with Claire to discuss the matter further. Mr Coates also expressed great concern that the Parish Council had not published details of the Right to Bid applications and it was agreed that a list would be included in the minutes of the next Parish Council meeting.

2. Declarations of interest: Councillors Collins, Freeman and Green declared an interest in a payment item.

3. Public time: no questions

4. Police report: The report had been presented at the earlier parish meeting. During March, there had been 1 reported crime concerning car vandalism, currently under investigation.

5. Cornwall Councillor's time: Councillor C Rule reported on the top-tier reduction at the Cornwall Council, with 3 corporate directors (instead of 6) plus the Chief Executive:

- Trevor Doughty Education, Health and Social Care
- Paul Masters Community and Organisational development, including finance.
- Michael Crich Economy, Enterprise & Environment (including planning, highways & transport).

Councillor Rule also asked the parish to promote the Council's new Apprenticeship Scheme initiative (funded by the European Social Fund) to encourage employers to take on apprentices. There is a poster to display on the Village Notice Board (info@cornwallapprenticeships.com).

With regard to funding for storm damage, Councillor Rule reported that Cornwall Council are fighting for funding from central government. The Parish Council were asked to submit its requests via her. The items where funding is being requested are with regard to : the steps down to Little Cove, concrete capping on the culvert down to the fishing beach and damage inside the Gig Shed (although this has insurance cover).

Councillor Rule also reported that she now has funds for this year in her community pot.

There was some detailed discussion regarding eligibility for affordable housing. Councillor Trewin emphasised that these were built for local people and there was concern that immediate need takes precedence over long-term locals. It was noted that both Cornwall Council and Coastline keep lists of applicants, who are assessed against the guidelines. Councillor Green agreed to refer a specific case to Councillor Rule for consideration.

6. Minutes for acceptance: The minutes of the monthly meeting held in March had been circulated and were amended for clarification as to why Councillor Fleetwood left the meeting and when he rejoined. Councillor Freeman proposed the minutes of 10 March 2014 be accepted and Councillor Green seconded. Carried 7 votes to 0.

7. Planning:

<u>PA14/02413</u> - Eglos Farm, Ruan Minor. The erection of a proposed parlour, handling area and dairy building. This proposal was supported with the proviso that the public right of way which runs through the middle of the premises (Footpath 33) is reinstated. The path has been obstructed for a number of years. Proposed by Councillor Green and seconded by Councillor Fleetwood. Carried 7 votes to 0.

PA14/02828 – Chy An Deylek, St Ruan. Request for the removal of condition 7 (Planning 4.1.1991)

- required occupant to be employed or last employed in fishing. The Parish Council are opposed to the lifting of the condition as a local need remains. However the Parish Council would be minded to support a widening of the condition to include local need, rather than just fishing, and the Clerk was asked to consult Cornwall Council with regard to this. The proposal not to support the application was put by Councillor Collins and seconded by Councillor Green. Carried by 6 votes plus one abstention.

Alleged Chalet at Bodrigy Lodge – it was noted that there had now been a formal Planning Enforcement Complaint made by a local resident. The Clerk had queried this build with the planning department but had yet to receive a detailed response. It was proposed by Councillor Green and seconded by Councillor Preston that this matter is referred to Enforcement for clarification via our contact point. Carried 6 votes with 1 abstention.

The re-design was aimed at dealing with the objections from neighbouring properties. It was noted that traffic concerns were an area of consideration for the Highways Department. 

- <u>Lizard Adventure</u> a request has been received from this organisation for the use of Mundy's Field Car Park. As the car park is for private vehicles only, it was felt that the car park at Cadgwith would be more appropriate for the parking of vans and trailers. The Clerk to draft a response for the Chairman.
