





"ALASKA" BY BLACK FISH



WHY NOT ENTER THE Spring Flower Show?

Everyone is encouraged to 'give it a go' especially if you've never tried before and even if you cook or garden professionally. We are hoping to improve on the high number of entries last year. There is a simple recipe for Spiced Easter Biscuits in the Spring Show Schedule which should be fun for any member of the family. For those who are feeling ambitious why not try a traditional Easter Simnel cake. Below is a sample recipe but we welcome any kind of Simnel Cake!



1. Preheat the oven to 150C/280F/Gas 2. Grease and line a 8in (20 cm) cake tin.

2. Cut the cherries into quarters, put in a sieve and rinse under running water. Drain well then dry thoroughly on kitchen paper.

3. Place the cherries in a bowl with the butter, sugar, eggs, self-raising flour, sultanas, currants, candied peel, lemon zest and mixed spice and beat well until thoroughly mixed. Pour half the mixture into the prepared tin.


4. Take a third of the marzipan and roll it into a circle the size of the tin and place it on top of the cake mixture. Spoon the remaining cake mixture on top and level the surface.

5. Bake in the pre-heated oven for about $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours, or until well risen, evenly brown and firm to the touch. Cover with tin foil after one hour if the top is browning too quickly. Leave to cool in the tin for 10 minutes then turn out, peel off the parchment and finish cooling on a wire rack.

6. When the cake is cool, brush the top with a little warmed apricot jam and roll out half the remaining marzipan to fit the top. Press firmly on the top and crimp the edges to decorate. Mark a criss-cross pattern on the marzipan with a sharp knife. Form the remaining marzipan into 11 balls (representing the 11 Apostles of Christ excluding Judas) 7. Brush the marzipan with beaten egg and arrange the marzipan balls around the edge of the cake. Brush the tops of the balls with beaten egg and then carefully place the cake under a hot grill until the top is lightly toasted.



MULLION SCHOOL

Mullion School has been visited by scientists from Exeter University, invited by EcoSco, a science club that runs every Friday lunchtime.

Mrs Royle in the recent edition of The Mullion Flyer said: "Last term we found out about the Albatross Project in Brazil, Turtle conservation in the Mediterranean, Parrots in London and other invasive species, how to run an expedition to Borneo and the development of intelligence in birds amongst many others.

Mullion EcoSoc started in January 2014 and has now developed a strong reputation amongst young research scientists at Exeter University.

This is because members of EcoSoc ask such unexpected but searching questions, they often give the researchers new ideas! Indeed it was after an EcoSoc session that we had the inspiration to put in a successful grant with The Royal Society to investigate bird intelligence. Research inspired by pupils, fantastic stuff! We now have a waiting list of research scientists keen to come and share their ideas with the group and see what the group come up with!

National Trust

As the days start to lengthen and the weather improves getting out and about again seems all the more appealing. If you find you have even just a few hours spare per month, and fancy trying something a little bit different this year, then why not consider volunteering

with us here on the Lizard. There are many ways to get involved, whether your interest is wildlife, heritage, or simply getting out and active, all of which will help in caring for, and helping people enjoy this part of Cornwall we're lucky enough to call home.

After a hugely successful first year, the wildlife watchpoint at Lizard Point is back for 2015. We are looking for enthusiastic people, with a love of wildlife, to join the watchpoint team and help inspire visitors at Lizard Point with stories and sightings of choughs, grey seals, porpoise, dolphins, thousands of seabirds and much more. You'd don't need to be a wildlife expert, so long as you have a friendly outlook and enjoy talking to people you can learn on the job. Shifts are typically 4 or 7 hours long, the watchpoint is open from 10-4pm every day from March until mid- Sept.

We are also looking for volunteers to help us protect the local choughs. The nest protection programme at Lizard Point was formerly run by the RSPB, but with more nests springing up out west they are going to focus their attention over there while we help out by looking after the Lizard choughs. Join the nest protection team to help protect Cornish choughs by monitoring their nest site and kindly asking visitors to look out for them, without getting too close. Give visitors great views and inspire them with the story of the return of Cornwall's magical crow. Shifts are typically 4 hours long in all weather conditions, March until July. We protect the nest round the clock so there are day and night time shifts available, offering plenty of flexibility.

If heritage is more your thing, they why not consider joining the enthusiastic band of volunteers who open Lizard Wireless Station to the public. This unassuming little wooden hut above Housel Bay, hosted some of Marconi's pioneering wireless experiments in the early 1900s. Most volunteers give 3 hours a fortnight Easter to October, and the role involves opening up the museum and providing a welcome to our visitors. You don't need to be a radio expert, just happy to chat!

For those of you who regularly stroll the cliffs, we'd love to have a few more folk we can call upon as part of a rota to help us check our conservation grazing ponies. The ponies need looking at daily, for a simple count and look over. Our herd of 5 is currently at Beagles Cliff, just this side of Black Head, and if you are prepared to take a drive/walk that way even just once or twice a month it helps a great deal.

And back in the Parish, we've a busy schedule of events, from school groups to Bushcraft club, with occasional specific requirements for ghouls, pixies or similar! Do get in touch if you think an education/events role might be for you. Or if you prefer a quieter life, and could offer to take on some routine tasks that make all the difference, like for example clearing beach litter from Carleon Cove, there's a role for you too! If you'd like to take part in a group beach clean, the Friends of Poldhu meet twice a month, once to clean Poldhu and once to clean Church cove, Gunwalloe.

To find out more about any of these opportunities please call by the Shepherd's Huts or contact us on the details below. Full training and support is available, plus mileage expenses for some roles outside the parish. Our volunteers (subject to minimum hours commitment) receive benefits including free admission to Trust properties, and discounts at Trust outlets. Plus of course plenty of 'job' satisfaction and fun!

Rector's Ramblings

t's Lent again, and there is no shortage of things to do: Lent Courses, Lent Books, 40 Day Action Guides, special services and many more. But what will it's purpose be, for you and me, what will be its lasting impact?

There is no doubt that we need something from Lent; if we look at the state of the Church it's clear that it is in need of something in the face of seemingly inexorable decline or disintegration; look at our world and the same is true, the old answers seem powerless in the face of the same forces.

Against this, God's word stands as a sign post; "rend your hearts and not your garments. Return to the LORD your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and he relents over disaster" (*Joel 2.13*), and "seek the LORD your God and you will find him, if you search after him with all your heart and with all your soul" (*Deuteronomy 4.29*).

It is not that I am against all the doing, but rather that I want (for myself first, as much as for all of us). To raise this word like a banner over all our plans and doing, to make this our overwhelming agenda and passion.

I use the word 'agenda' because I think that we (I) usually come to everything we do with an agenda: there are so many voices in the Church and the world calling us this way or that, and I know that my heart is doing the same thing – but Jesus stands before us saying 'I am the way, I am the Truth, I am the Life ... seek me, without me you all your desires and doing will be barren, only in My way, My truth and My life, will you know fruitfulness that lasts'.

I am not sure what you expect in these letters, I don't want them to be preachy or just another sermon, but there is an urgency in this season and being interesting or entertaining just doesn't seem to be right.

Life will go on in Lent, with all the other necessities and urgencies – including accounts and annual meetings, repairs and maintenance, lunch clubs, youth groups, visiting, baptisms, marriages and funerals. But in all this, may we recognise the season and hear God's call and make it all a returning, seeking, submitting, passionate hunger for God, for his ways and his work amongst us.

As companions for this season there are many that I can think of in God's word, but the two that stand out as I write this are the Rich Young Man *(Mark 10.17ff)* and Paul *(Philippians 3.4ff).* If we allow them to inspire us it will mean different things for each of us, but as we bring them together and share them, we may find a way forward both for our churches and communities.




THE KENNACK RANGERS MEN'S SUNDAY LEAGUE FOOTBALL TEAM

PAVILION FUNDING

We are still waiting to be told whether our project will be accepted for registration with the body that administers projects funded by land fill tax grants. We're hopeful of a positive outcome, as SITA has recommended us. We have to provide a bit more information on costs and so we're working on that.

Well, isn't nature wonderful, every year is different. Conditions differ wildly but things like snowdrops and daffodils still flower within a week or so of when they always flower. This is good because we have to plan well in advance for events such as the Spring Flower Show which will be with us once again on the 21st March in the Village Hall. I hope that you will all have a go and enter some of your prized blooms. Do not be put off by all of the different classes, there is information in the schedule to help you and there will be people to help on the day should you need it. Good daffodils in the main should be unblemished with faces looking up at you with broad, flat petals at right angles to the trumpet. Match your flowers for colour, age and size. Some types of daffodil differ slightly from this but this is explained in the schedule. Daffodils can be opened up indoors once the calyces begin to split and you can see colour begin to show in the petal. This helps to reduce weather and pest damage, stand the picked stems in buckets of water.

March is a really mad month lots going on everywhere in the garden. Days are lengthening and warming up and this means that the weed seedlings start to germinate with haste and without a remedy you will soon get your favourite plants overrun with weeds. Seedlings are easily managed with a hoe but perennial weeds will need digging out with a trowel or fork. This is the ideal time to tackle one of those weeds which is a bane to many of us around here, three cornered leek, wild onion, wild garlic are a few of the polite common names for it. Once you have got it you rarely get rid of it, it stinks of garlic when bruised and has white flowers around bluebell time. Now it spreads from bulbils underground and if left with the flowers on it will happily set seed around although they do not travel far. Spraying them with weed killer is generally ineffective as they grow strongly and seem not to absorb it plus they like to grow in amongst your more precious plants. The only real answer is to dig them up with a trowel or small fork. This can be done in the summer when all you have is the bulbils in the ground, but that is like

picking fleas off the proverbial elephant's b?. Plus it's easy to miss the odd stray bulbil, at this time of year before there is too much flower the stems are quite strong so handling them is easier and you get rid of the whole problem. Later on the stems are much weaker when the energy is put into seeds and more bulbils and the ground is harder so the bulbs do not come out so easily. Whatever you do, do not compost them as you are only going to transfer the problem, best job is a bonfire. The small first year seedlings which come up like grass can be controlled by hoeing but older ones are more persistent.

Lawns need work now. I have noticed a lot of moss in them this year. This keeps the lawn area looking green but it does build up and choke the grass out competing with it. The best option if the problem has not got so that the lawn is just moss is to apply a specific moss killer a few days after cutting the lawn. The moss generally goes black, when it looks dead it needs to be removed from the lawn. If you have a small area scratch it out with a spring tined rake but for bigger areas use a motorised scarifier or rake. If you do not have one I advise that you beg borrow or steal one. Once that you have done this job the lawn will look awful. More work is now needed to rectify the reason why there is moss there in the first place. Reasons for moss in the lawn are poor drainage, shade and lack of nutrients. Combat this by spiking with fork and brushing in sand, thinning and lifting the canopy of the surrounding trees and shrubs and giving regular dressings of balanced fertilizer. If the grass in the lawn is looking particularly sparse then it may well be a good idea to over sow some fresh grass seed into the lawn which will quickly germinate at this time of the year.

March is the month for hydrangea pruning. Remove a third of the old stems, these are the paler ones. Cut them out low down into the crown of the bush. Then go all around the bush removing the old flower heads take them back removing a couple of buds, once you have done this remove any straggly bits which spoil the shape. Lastly a handful of general

purpose fertiliser.

While you have the secateurs in your hand trim back your hardy Fuchsias and another job that may remain is the pruning of your raspberry canes and this is your last chance to complete it. The easiest types to care for are the autumn fruiting varieties such as Autumn Bliss, Autumn Gold and Joan J. These are Primo cane types and fruit on wood that has grown in the same year. Pruning here is dead simple, just cut the whole lot to the ground keep the runners in control with a spade and feed well. Then sit back and wait until late summer and start picking over what can be a long season. This can be from late July August through to October/ November. Standard raspberry varieties crop in June/July and crop on canes which grew the year before these should have been pruned by now but if not tidy them up now. Remove all the cane which fruited last year they will look much grever than the young golden brown canes. Often when you come to cut them with the secateurs you will find the old canes will be dead anyway. Next tie in the young canes to a wire frame work to stop them blowing in the wind and causing damage. If they are much taller than the top of your framework gently bend them over and tie in in a hoop like fashion. This will encourage them to fruit better as with young fruit trees and climbing roses.

When the ground is fit now is the time to start planting in the veg patch, March is the normal time to get your early potatoes in the ground if you have no extra protection, usually by the time the shoots poke through the ground the risk of frost has all but passed and regular earthing up of the rows will protect them from any frost which may occur. The end of the month is a good time to plant your onion sets and broad beans are good hardy vegetables which need little warmth to germinate. A row of peas is worthwhile also along with some salad leaves. I am a big fan of starting off some veg in plugs and small pots as this gives them a head start with warmth from the protection of a greenhouse or cold frame and when they are planted out they are much more advanced than the weed seedlings. I grow many things this way like salad leaves, beetroot, spring onions nearly all the brassicas including turnips and celery all of these can be sown now.

There are absolutely tons of seeds that can and should be sown now in the greenhouse but do not do it all at once as you will get a glut of crops and even more so, too much pricking out and potting on to do at one time. Sowing bedding plants starts in earnest now, these are generally half hardy annuals like Marigolds, Petunias, Lobelias, Antirrhinums to name a few. Growing from seed gives you far more choice of varieties but I can see many advantages of buying in plugs of seedlings and growing these on. This is especially useful for slow growing plants like Begonias and Busy Lizzies as to grow these they need to be sown earlier requiring a lot more expensive heating. You can get a large range mail order these days plus many supermarkets and DIY stores carry them and generally you are assured of better results. Those of you that have ordered some will find them begin to arrive this month along with any you buy, so get them home and pot them on into good fresh potting compost and keep them frost free in good light, they will then surely romp away.

Now is the time to start off begonias from tubers. These are great showy plants in bright colours ideal for pots and beds. Obtain some good firm tubers something like the nonstop series then decide which is the top and which is the bottom if the tuber this is easy if the buds are beginning to break generally they look like red pin heads beginning to swell this is the top of the tuber where the stems will come from. If you cannot see any buds the top has a scar mark where last year's stem was and it is often slightly dished. Put these tubers into pots a little larger than the diameter of the tuber leave the top of the tuber slightly raised above the surface of the compost. Soak the pots then place them in a warm light spot preferably with some bottom heat, make sure they do not dry out, spraying them occasionally with water helps. As they grow on they can be potted on or planted out.

What else will I be doing this month? Well there is potting on of the chrysanthemum cuttings and lifting the dahlia tuber and encouraging them to grow to produce material for cuttings next month. I may even lift some lily of the valley roots, pot them on to force for earlier blooms.

Whatever you do get out there and enjoy your gardening.

VERGE TRIMMING

We have all heard that Cornwall Council has to make really severe spending cuts in line with the reduced amount of funding it will be receiving from central government. They have done a complete review of all their spending and finally approved a much-reduced budget for the coming year. To help with their savings, they are keen for any services they currently provide to be taken over locally by parish or town councils. One thing our Parish Council has identified is to take over the trimming of all the roadside verges in the parish, because they will not get done by Cornwall Council in future except for little bits at road junctions and around road signs. We have managed to get a grant of up to £3000 to prepare plans for doing this, but in the long run it will mean that the cost will fall on the parish precept and have to be shared out between us as part of the Council Tax. But the advantages will be that we can have our roads kept tidy in the way and at the times we want, more cheaply than they are maintained at present, and providing a bit of work locally instead of to a Cornwall-wide contractor.

How do our parishioners feel about this? Are you willing to pay a bit more in Council Tax to have our roads kept tidy? Have you got any suggestions about the best way of doing it, or what most needs doing? Are there any other services that we currently get from Cornwall Council that we could do better for ourselves? Hay fever relief

The Herbal Medicine Cabinet

by Deanne Greenwood

BSc (Hons) Herb Med

First of all, I'd like to thank everyone who came along to my talk about herbal medicine in the National Trust Education Room in Poltesco last month. It was great to see so many local faces. Thanks for your support!

If you suffer from hay fever, March is a good time to take preventative action. There are many medicinal plants with anti-allergic, antihistamine, anti-inflammatory and anti-pruritic (anti-itching) properties that can help relieve the symptoms of hay fever, but treatment is more effective if started before you start experiencing symptoms. Plants can help desensitise your body to all sorts of substances, including pollen and mould – a common allergen in Cornwall!

Natural antihistamines

Nettle (*Urtica dioica*), broadleaf plantain (*Plantago major*), elderflower (*Sambucus nigra flos*) and eyebright (*Euphrasia officinalis*) are all herbs that can help relieve hay fever, and last year I harvested all four myself here on the Lizard, and prepared tinctures from them. In my experience, using plants that are harvested locally to treat local people is particularly effective – in the same way that eating local honey is known to help people with hay fever. It works a bit like a natural vaccine. Also, like most of the plants I gather on the Lizard, the plants tend to be particularly strong and vibrant, bursting with an almost tangible energy that translates into medicinal potency.

Time for tea

Nettles are packed with vitamins and minerals, such as vitamin C, iron and potassium, and make a great spring tonic and detoxifier. Nettle tea can also help relieve symptoms of hay fever, and is often more effective when combined with elderflower, which appears in early July. You can also add broadleaf plaintain, as this is a great anticatarrhal and antihistamine herb. To make nettle tea, use a handful of fresh young nettle tops per cup and leave to brew for 10-15 minutes before drinking. Good for gout and arthritis, too.

Eyebright flowers around July. An infusion (tea) made with about an ounce (30g) of the flowers and leaves to a pint (500ml) of water, and left to cool, can be used as a wonderfully soothing eyebath for sore, itchy, inflamed eyes.

Longterm relief

Other herbs which can be helpful include chamomile (*Chamomilla recutita*), Dandelion leaves (*Taraxacum officinale folia*), meadowsweet (*Filipendula ulmaria*) and yarrow (*Achillea millefolium*), all of which grow in abundance all over the Lizard. You can make tea with these herbs, too (fresh or dried). But it's important to remember that herbal medicine seeks to rectify the underlying cause of a health problem – which varies from person to person – not just treat the symptoms. Hence it's best to see a herbalist for longterm relief.

closely on the news, it was everywhere. Finally, that night when we got back to our hotel room in Disneyland, we saw on the news that



the terrorist had been captured. I was very relieved. I realised though that we would have to travel back into the centre of Paris in a few days time to catch the Eurostar back to the UK and the thought of that scared me.

We travelled back by taxi to the Gare du Nord and as we went through the city I saw saying, "Je Suis posters Charlie" and "R.I.P Charlie" everywhere. The Place de la Republique was full of TV crews in vans with satellite dishes on them and people climbina on the Libertv statue. It was a scary 15 minutes. When we set off on the train I saw some French policemen with machine guns walking down the aisle. Seeing them made me feel safe, I felt that we would be protected if anything were to happen on the train. When the train arrived in Ashford I felt relieved. I had a good holiday but it really wasn't the best time to be in Paris!

Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 12 January 2015 from 7.30pm

Present: Parish Councillors, J Preston (Chair), N Green (Vice-Chair), J Clifton, P Collins, M Fleetwood, P Freeman, J Lee, S Stephens, J Trewin, Cornwall Councillor C Rule, Clerk J Castle and 13 members of the public.

1. Absences and apologies:

Parish Councillor C Cooper; PCSO J Berry; (these apologies were accepted by the Council)

2. Declarations of interest:

Councillor Trewin declared an interest with regard to land at Penreenes and Councillor Collins declared an interest as a neighbour. Councillor Lee also reported that the applicant carried out work for him but did not consider that this would affect his views.

3. Public time:

- Mr Paul Bateman of Influence Planning spoke with regard to planning application PA14/10495, representing Mr & Mrs Lake. This regards two self-build dwellings on land south of Penreenes. Mr Bateman explained that it was Government policy for councils to bring forward self-build plots and although this scheme was only in its pilot stage and Cornwall Council was not involved, he felt it was appropriate for the parish council to take this into account. The criteria to be used included locations where there is other development, connection to sustainable elements of a settlement and with proximity to other dwellings. He considered that the proposal is within 200 metres of the main services of the village.
- Mrs Dunmall spoke with regard to the application to lift the holiday occupation restriction on the cottage property at Bodrigy Lodge (PA14/11619). She stated that she did not consider the objections raised by the Planning Department when looking at the pre-app were appropriate.
- Mrs Coad wished the Parish Council to note the objections she has made with regard to the resubmitted planning application re the erection of a dwelling at Glenelg (PA14/11827).

4. Police report:

In the absence of PCSO Berry, the Clerk read out the monthly report. Two burglaries (non-dwelling) had been reported in the Parish in December, which are currently under investigation. It was noted that there had been some damage to the Gents toilets in the village and Councillor Lee agreed to report this. Telephone 101 to report any crimes or 01326 555158 to leave a message for PCSO Berry.

5. Cornwall Councillor's time:

Councillor Rule reported that she had obtained information with regard to the net lofts and Chy An Deylek. She warned that the redundancy programme is now under way and certain officers will no longer be there.

does not endorse the carving up of gardens into smaller plots, it was proposed by Councillor Green and seconded by Councillor Stephens that this application be supported. Carried 5 votes in favour and 4 against.

- PA14/11898 felling of sycamore, National Trust car park, Cadgwith this had been supported by the Tree Officer with a replanting scheme put in place and therefore it was proposed by Councillor Preston and seconded by Councillor Lee that this application be supported. Carried 9 votes in favour.
- PA14/11619 removal of holiday occupancy condition, with regard to permission in 2012 concerning conversion of an annex and garage to provide holiday accommodation, Bodrigy Lodge. Cornwall Planning department had not been supportive when the Pre-App was submitted, but the applicants cannot understand what impact lifting of the condition will have on the community, particularly as they may occupy it themselves whist undertaking work on the main property. It was proposed by Councillor Trewin and seconded by Councillor Clifton that the application to lift the restriction be supported. The voting was 4 in favour and 4 against, with one abstention. The Chairman used his casting vote in favour and the motion was therefore carried.
- PA14/06078 Land off Ebenezer Road, retention of extension to agricultural building to use as a dwelling. A number of Parish Councillors had visited the site and photographs were provided to the meeting. The building sits on an island in the middle of a pond and has been crafted from natural/reclaimed materials. The occupiers who are making the application state that they are on site to look after livestock and this is supported by a letter from the landowner. However it was noted that there is a formal procedure to establish agricultural need and this has not been followed. It was proposed by Councillor Collins and seconded by Councillor Lee that this application should not be supported on the basis that this is a new dwelling in a rural setting with no proven agricultural need. Carried 8 votes in favour and 1 abstention.
- PA14/12157 to site a freestanding mobile shipping container to act as a kitchen, Ruan Major Cottage. This had been supported by Cornwall Planning department at the Pre-App stage as it was for the benefit of a local business. The Parish Council has received 3 letters of objection from neighbouring properties, particularly with regard to traffic problems in a single track lane, loss of residential amenity, impact of lighting and the proximity to a Grade I listed church and Grade II listed farmhouse. There were also concerns about the speed of vehicles down the lane. It was noted that this is expected to be a short-term solution whilst the business continues to get established at which point new premises would be sought. Councillor Green proposed and Councillor Preston seconded that the application should be opposed on the basis that, although the Parish Council is supportive of young and growing businesses, this was the wrong location for the business. Councillor Collins proposed an alternative resolution that the application is supported for a 12 month period and thereafter be subject to annual review. This was seconded by Councillor Lee. The vote to make this the substantive proposal was 5 in favour, 3 against and 1 abstention. This became the proposal and was carried 5 in favour, 3 against and 1 abstention.
- PA14/10495 2 self-build affordable dwellings on land south of Penreenes. Councillors Trewin and Collins withdrew from the meeting. It was noted that when a

Pre-App was submitted for a 3 bed-roomed house 12 months ago, the planning officer commented on the rural location outside of a town or village and that there were more appropriate sites located within the village. Concerns were expressed regarding a permanent location in a coastal and rural setting within an AONB. Although the Parish Councillors were sympathetic to the applicants need for affordable self-build housing, it was felt that this site was not appropriate for development. There is constrained access, it would lead to southern sprawl and harm the Cadgwith Conservation area. Councillor Lee pointed out that there are other areas in the village with potential for affordable housing. It was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Freeman that, although the Parish Council supports both self-build and affordable housing, in this particular instance the Council objects to this application on the basis that it would sit outside the village envelope, would harm the AONB and create a precedent. Carried 7 votes in favour.

Councillors Trewin and Collins returned to the meeting.

 PA14/12218 – Corgerrick Barn, Ruan Minor, conversion and re-use of agricultural building to a single storey dwelling. This is an application by the National Trust for the conversion of the barn, plus a new outbuilding and a new access onto the highway. This is a sustainable form of development, bringing a building back into use. A covenant will be placed on the development as to what further work would be allowed on the site, including tree retention. The funds raised will be used to refurbish / re-roof Poltesco Mill House. It was proposed by Councillor Trewin and seconded by Councillor Preston that this application be supported. Carried 9 votes in favour.
