

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

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

Well so far winter 2014/15 has been kinder to us than 2013/14, but perhaps I'm speaking too soon! Not that we've finished repairs from last winter just yet, with work ongoing when weather allows at Kynance and Mullion Cove. At Kynance we lost the main access route to the beach in

February 2014, as waves smashed the stone steps. A temporary repair by our Ranger team got us open for the summer season, but the cracks are still growing. A permanent (or at least we hope it will be!) rebuild will be undertaken in February 2015, necessitating transporting concrete over the beach at low tide. Please bear with us during the works, as the steps will be closed, so the beach will only be accessible from the café side.

The same 2014 storms caused extensive damage to Mullion Harbour. Although dramatic, most of the damage to the western breakwater was cosmetic, and was put right relatively rapidly. This included salvaging and replacing over 5000 granite setts that pave the top of the breakwater, which had been stripped off and dumped in the harbour by the waves. The southern breakwater has proved more problematic to put right as the damage is structural. We have agreed with English Heritage and Cornwall Council that the inner visible face will be rebuilt in stone, but the outer wall will be repaired with reinforced concrete for strength. This work began in September and is ongoing whenever conditions allow. Although bad, the events of last winter weren't quite the catastrophic storm that will almost inevitably put the harbour beyond repair one day in the future, so for the time being the walls are being repaired and it will hopefully be in better shape than ever to withstand whatever nature throws at it.

Moving back to Grade-Ruan, we have some news regarding Corgerrick, between Polstangev and Kuggar. When the NT took on the land at Poltesco from Margaret Ironside we agreed with the family that not all the land would be held by the Trust forever and that the land on the inland side of the Kuggar to Ruan road would be sold at an opportune moment to help fund work on the remaining area of coastal land and buildings. In 2012 we sold the land to the existing farm tenants and income from this has been used to replace the roof on the Mill and make improvements to our Ranger base and education facilities at Poltesco. The next stage is to realise the potential for the redundant barns at Corgerrick and we have recently submitted a planning application to convert these barns to residential use. We employed architects to draw up a scheme that has met with the approval of the Trust's own Architectural panel and has strong environmental elements to ensure that the impact on the environment, both visually and in future energy use has been minimised. Once a scheme has been approved the barns will be sold on the open market and, along with the land, will be subject to National Trust covenants to help protect from future unsuitable developments. Funds arising from this work will be used to refurbish and re-roof Poltesco mill house. The plans for the barns can be viewed at the Cornwall Council online planning register ref. PA14/12218 or at the Poltesco Ranger base.

Our Christmas events were a great success, and looking forward towards spring, we've got lots more fun planned locally. For families, at half-term we have a bird box

and feeder making event (17th February Poltesco) and our popular Easter bushcraft days at Poltesco are back (31st March, 1st April). Adults and families alike are welcome at our Seashore Foraging event on 21st March at Poltesco, where we'll attempt to cook lunch from nature's bounty over the campfire! Come along to learn what's edible and what's not. For all these events small charges apply, and booking is essential, on the number below.

Rector's Ramblings

G lobally, 2014 saw some of the most savage, brutal acts of violence and persecution in living memory: 200 schoolgirls in Nigeria kidnapped and forced to convert to Islam; a passenger jet shot down over Ukraine, killing everyone on board; innocent hostages beheaded with a sickening video of those barbaric acts being posted on the Internet; the gruesome massacre of 132 children and nine members of staff in a school in Peshawar, Pakistan. And with the recent terrorist attacks in Paris, it seems that 2015 has started off in the same vein.

Where can we find a glimmer of hope, when humankind seems to have lost all sense of compassion, moral values and respect, when the world seems plunged in darkness?

The answer, of course, is in the tiny, newborn baby, born in a stable in the bustling, busy town of Bethlehem – Jesus, whose birth we celebrated at Christmas. Jesus our Saviour, sent by God into the world - not because of any good things we had done, but because of God's great love that He pours out so generously upon us.

Yet Jesus is more than a mere glimmer: he is the Light of the World! Jesus is Life and 'the Life is the Light of all people. **'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it.'** (John 1:4-5). That's an important statement, and one to hold on to in our troubled times.

Sadly, as we know only too well, there are many people today who choose not to see the light of Jesus Christ. They know it's there but they choose to ignore it; they live by misguided ideologies, their minds blinded by sin and unbelief, preferring to live in darkness. They would rather carry on in their own way – a way that is evil and against all the precepts of the one, true God. Perhaps this is because to follow in Jesus' light actually means making some kind of sacrifice on their part, changing their old ways.

It was always God's plan to send that part of Himself, Jesus - 'the Word made flesh to live here on earth amongst us' (*John 1:14*) - to teach us how to live out our lives: putting aside anger; war; revenge; injustice; oppression and violence and embracing instead love for others. And as we prepare to set out on the Lenten road to Good Friday, we are reminded of just how deep God's love for us is in sending his Son to be an atonement for all our wrongdoings.

The 'Light of all people' will *not* be overcome by the darkness of sin and evil – even on the Cross. One day God's Kingdom *will* come and those who have chosen to live in the Light will become children of God.

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

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


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Recreation Ground News



Pavilion Funding

After our presentation before Christmas to SITA Cornwall Trust (expertly done by Peter Freeman), we were selected to go forward for approval by the organization that vets projects receiving money under the landfill tax scheme. So the suspense isn't over yet, but we were pleased with the positive response to our presentation.

If the SITA application is successful, then Sport England will provide additional funds. We also have our own funds from all those years of fund raising, as well as pledges from the Parish Council and the Grade Ruan Community Trust.



Pavilion Design

Gardening in February



Happy New Year to you all. The endless gardening year continues and my mind has already turned to the spring, and seed sowing. Last year seemed to end mild and meek and we have yet to see much in the way of any cold white weather, be it frost or snow. The only white stuff there has been is the foam from the stormy seas being blown inland - and hasn't it blown again! The mild time has led many people to comment on out of season blossoms, be it Daffodils and Narcissi which I have seen odd ones since the end of November, early Camellias and Rhododendrons, or the spikes of clear summer blue Agapanthus gracing us on Christmas day. These are just a few of the blooms - others of the more usual types are primroses, violets and daisies. I even spotted a hawthorn bush with a few sprigs of blossom on before Christmas but I have noted that this tree has done that feat in three of the last four years.

Back to seed sowing. I have already sown my exhibition onions and by the time you read this I hope to have started my Sweetpeas. There is still time for you to have a go at these, along with seeds of Lobelia, Antirrhinum and Begonias, You can also have a go at some lettuce and leafy cabbage like Hispi or Greyhound. For all of these you will need protection, ideally a greenhouse with some form of heating. The basics of sowing all of these are the same: start with clean seed trays and fill with good quality seed compost, this generally has less nutrients and more sand in it to improve drainage. Too much nutrient can inhibit germination of some seeds. When filling the trays I tend to riddle the compost to remove any large lumps. I then level the surface and gently flatten it with a board. At this point, I soak the seed tray in a shallow tray of water and let it draw the water up through the compost. Once the compost is evenly

soaked, I let the tray drain for a short while before sowing onto the damp surface. At this point, read the seed packet as to what depth to cover the seeds; many of the finer dust-like seeds need no covering as light activelv aids germination, whereas brassicas need much more depth - quarter of an inch or more - otherwise the plants tend to be more spindly and flop. I gently sift more seed compost to the required depth and flatten off once more lightly with a board. The tray is then placed in a heated propagator or heated pad at the required temperature until germination.

Out in the garden, when conditions allow get out there and look at your Rhubarb. Dig out any weeds that are around the crown, paying particular attention to the perennial weeds such as buttercup, bindweed and couch grass. Then give it a handful general fertiliser, then a good mulch of well-rotted farmyard manure. Hopefully you will be rewarded with some tasty thick stems in a few weeks' time. Many people like to force some rhubarb by covering the crown with an old bin or deep bucket. If your pockets are deep enough you can get some very good looking terracotta specialist versions. They all do the same job in excluding the light and protecting the stalks, producing long pink succulent stems. But the drawback with this method is that it takes a lot of energy from the plant and it will take a couple of years to recover. The only job to do after this is to pull the stalks, trim, cook and add some cream.

You will see the weed seeds start to germinate this month so get weeding on a dry day and keep up the digging in the veg patch, maybe even covering an area of prepared ground with some spare plastic sheeting. This will keep the worst of the weather off the soil and help to warm it so that you could sow some early crops at the end of the month or in March. Maybe some shallots, peas, broad beans or early potatoes will be destined for that patch.

During this mild winter so far, the grass really has not stopped growing but I have resisted mowing, my thoughts being that the extra growth will protect the lawn from the salt laden gales and persistent rains of winter. I do expected to start giving the lawns a trim this month, but I'll raise the blades as we are still likely to have bad weather. I would recommend giving your lawn a spiking with a fork to aid drainage, get air into the soil and roots, and reduce compaction. Use a sturdy garden fork and push it in 4 or 5 inches with your foot and repeat this every 5 or 6 inches all over the lawn. This is a very boring and time consuming job, so I suggest doing it little and often - 15 to 30 minutes a day - and consider it as part of your fitness regime. It is cheaper than the gvm or even a second hand Jane Fonda video. It will do wonders for your muscle tone and tummy.

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I noticed the first snowdrops in the first week of January. You should still be enjoying them through February, especially if it does get cold. If you wish to spread them around your garden, my advice is to enjoy them whilst in flower but as soon as those flowers fade lift up some clumps with a small fork and split them down into small clumps of three or four bulbs. If you plant single bulbs it takes a long time for them to bulk up and have an effect, plus if you lose a bulb through damage, mouse attack or any other problem you will not have a gap in your planting scheme. Snowdrops have a much higher success rate when transplanted in the green rather than dry bulbs in the autumn.

Pruning jobs are to cut back shrubs which are grown for their coloured stems on young growth like Dogwoods (Cornus alba) and some of those willows with yellow and orange bark. These can be cut back hardtop within in a bud or two of the stool (where they have been regularly cut back to). This encourages lots of fresh growth in the case of dogwoods I would do it every other year as they can lose vigour. Once pruned give the shrub a handful of slow release fertiliser.

What else have I got planned for this There is some nice material month? growing for chrysanthemum cuttings, dahlia tubers will need potting up and starting off for cuttings. The storms have brought down some large limbs off the trees which will need cutting up, ideal for firewood. I have recently removed a badly diseased Escallonia hedge which is par for this area. The plan is to dig the hedge line over and add some organic matter then replant with Grisselinia. Next month sees the spring flower shows, so I will be making sure that the daffodils are not getting damaged and progressing at the right pace. I grow a lot in pots so these get moved around into different places either to slow flowering of enhance it a little .

Well, keep warm, keep safe and enjoy your gardening.



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The Herbal Medicine Cabinet

Like all gardeners at this time of year, I am currently planning what to grow, preparing the beds and sowing the seeds. I tend to focus on herbs and medicinal plants, leaving the vegetable plot to my husband. But there is a crossover. Some of the active constituents in medicinal plants that give them

their healing properties, also prevent them from being attacked by insects, bacterial and fungal infections. These are secreted through the roots and leaves. And when strategically placed, my herbs help protect the plants in the vegetable plot, too. For example, the pungent, musky odours of white horehound (*Marrubium vulgare*), marigold (*Calendula officinalis*) and yarrow (*Achillea millefolium*) are excellent for keeping aphid and beetles at bay. Other aromatic medicinal plants such as fennel (*Foeniculum vulgare*), sage (*Salvia officinalis*), thyme (*Thymus vulgaris*), mint (*Mentha piperita*), chamomile (*Chamomilla recutita*), lavender (*Lavandula angustifolia*), angelica (Angelica archangelica) and lemon balm (*Melissa officinalis*) attract beneficial insects like ladybirds, which feed on aphids, and bees.

I add marigold leaves to my home-made herbal insect spray concocted from another natural insecticide, garlic (*Allium sativum*). I pulp a small bulb of garlic, cover it with a litre of water, leave overnight then strain. Slugs, snails, caterpillars and aphids really don't like it. A similar spray made with a tablespoon of fresh or dried chilli (*Curcuma longa*), instead of garlic, deters mice and rabbits.

Lemon balm (*Melissa officinalis*) is good for killing red spider mite, which attacks plants such as tomatoes, cucumbers, aubergines and peppers. You need to make an infusion (tea) with the lemon balm, let it go cold and then pour it around the roots of infected plants. No need to strain.

A chamomile tea spray (prepared the same way but strained) will protect vulnerable plants like courgettes against mould. To treat plants that develop fungal infection, add pulped garlic and a few drops of antifungal essential oil of tea tree (*Melaleuca alternifolia*) or neem (*Azadirachta indica*) to the chamomile tea.

Gardeners keen to avoid chemical fertilisers probably know that comfrey (*Symphytum officinale*) is an effective natural alternative. Lemon balm is another one. These plants need steeping in rainwater for two weeks in a sealed container to create a nutritious sludge.

When I have a large enough crop of a herb, I dry and/or tincture it for use in my practice. Home-grown and prepared herbal medicines always seem to be the most efficacious.

If you'd like to find out more about herbal medicine, I'm doing a talk in Poltesco on Saturday February 14th, explaining what herbal medicine is, how it works and ailments it is commonly used for. I'll also be talking about the wealth of medicinal plants growing on the Lizard and, as it's Valentine's Day, aphrodisiac herbs!

There'll be time for questions and discussion. You'll find me in the Education Barn in the National Trust car park in Poltesco. Starts 2pm.

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CLIVE MCNAIR 1928 - 2014

[This is an edited version of the Tribute written by Roger McNair and read by him at Clive's funeral. Ed]

Dad was a very special man, dearly loved by Mum, his four children and four grandchildren. Dad's character made him special; first and foremost he was a gentleman; he was hard working, tolerant, intelligent and humble and strong, his character shaped by a remarkable life.



Dad was born into a life of gentile impoverishment. His parents managed to educate him at Blundell's School, and holidays were spent messing around in boats, caravanning and developing his skills as a marine artist.

In 1944, aged 16, Dad joined the British India Steam Navigation Company (BI) and spent the next two decades circumnavigating the world, having plenty of adventures along the way.

In 1960, he visited his sister in Ilfracombe, where he met my mother. He proposed five weeks later and they married the following year. In 1966, by now the father of two small children, Dad wanted to spend more time ashore, and he took up a new post as Personnel Manager of a major Liverpool stevedoring company. The family grew when Dad and Mum adopted two babies the following year. Holidays for the much expanded McNair family were now taken in our new touring caravan, nicknamed the "snail house".

The stevedoring company collapsed during the industrial strife of the early seventies, and Dad won a job as a Personnel Manager with Sandoz, a Swiss pharmaceutical company.

Dad was ingenious, a master at modifying perfectly useable items from houses to caravans to make them better. For several years, Dad experimented with home brewing - starting with easy to use home wine kits and graduating to making wine from a range of ingredients including quinces from the back garden. None would challenge those from the Camel Valley - in fact most were barely drinkable! The ginger beer escapade during the hot summer of 1976 produced a concoction so explosive it had to be opened in the garden - our cat went adrift for several days after one of the bottles exploded over the utility room! Dad was also a skilled woodworker and later built his grandchildren a superb rocking horse.

In summer 1988 aged 60, Dad retired early from Sandoz and Phase 3 of Mum and Dad's life began at Trevaze House, Ruan Minor. The Master Mariner and Senior Manager became the B&B Proprietor, local artist and Warden of this church. The constants of his life endured: love for his wife and family, his ingenuity in building and modifying things and delight in travelling. After retirement, Dad and Mum travelled widely through Eruope and Turkey, across Canada twice, Korea, Japan, and cruised through Suez and the Red Sea.

Twelve years ago Dad and Mum built Mermaid Cottage and Dad designed the mermaid stained glass window, which was beautifully built by my cousin Anthea, and remains as a lovely tribute to him. Soon after, Dad illustrated Mum's book, which was successfully published. In late August Dad accompanied Mum to a garden party at Buckingham Palace.

So that was Dad's journey - it was long, unhurried, full of adventure and rich with experience.



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A little more from the *Itinerant Seafarer* ...

Arch Leckie and I were called to a ship aground incident near Esperance. The ship was firmly planted on some rocks near the port and, after an initial inspection, it was decided that if she was to be salvaged, a lot of the cargo of bagged fertiliser would have to be discharged. Esperance is a long way from anywhere and only one barge was available. The ship was still functioning to some extent and her gear (cargo derricks) were working so about a thousand tons of the bags were sent ashore at a time and the wet ones were thrown into the sea. A tug came round from Fremantle and she was towed off and taken to Fremantle for repair but was considered a CTL (constructive total loss) and she went on to India for scrapping. There is nothing too remarkable about any of this and it is the trip to the ship that I remember most. Arch and I arranged an Air Taxi and we turned up at the Airport to be met by the pilot, a woman! Arch nearly turned round and said we'd drive; but this was not practical, Esperance was about seven hundred miles away and we needed to be there that afternoon.

On the four hour flight we ran into a headwind and the pilot said that we would run out of fuel before we got to Esperance. Arch's reaction was not printable but was centred on the gender of the poor pilot. She said 'No worries!' the way Australians usually do when there is a good reason to worry. On this occasion she meant it though. A lot of the road to Esperance is absolutely dead straight – about a hundred and fifty miles of it! She buzzed the road and the drivers obviously knew the drill; two of them blocked the road, about a mile apart, stopping what traffic there was, and we landed, pulled off to the side and the traffic resumed. The pilot got out and took some Jerrycans out of a cargo space. She suggested we sat in the shade under the wings while she thumbed a lift to get some fuel. She did this, to a farm with an airstrip, and was back in about half an hour. The plane was refuelled; the flight was resumed and was completed successfully. Instead of being impressed Arch swore that we would drive back; this we did and it took two days in a hire car.

Marco Sambrialo featured a fair bit in my life while I was Arch Leckie's Associate. He is a Croatian immigrant and the *de facto* leader of the Yugoslav community in Western Australia. It was he who declared and ensured that the post-Tito Yogoslav civil war was not carried over to WA in the way that it was into NSW and Victoria where there were bombings and shootings between the various Yugoslav factions. Marko said that that war should be left in Europe and such was the respect for him that it was.

Marko and a gang of his people often came with us, under contract, when we were asked to organise any salvage of fishing boats on the WA Coast.

The children had a playhouse in the garden in Claremont, it was the wheehhouse of a scrapped fishing boat which Marco brought us one day.

Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 10 November 2014 from 7.30pm

Present: Parish Councillors, J Preston (Chair), N Green (Vice-Chair), J Clifton, P Collins, P Freeman, J Lee, S Stephens, J Trewin, Clerk J Castle, and 1 Member of the Public (C Brown)

1. Absences and apologies:

Parish Councillors C Cooper, M Fleetwood; Cornwall Councillor C Rule & PCSO J Berry (these apologies were accepted by the Council).

2. Declarations of interest:

Councillor Preston declared an interest regarding Glebe land and Councillor Green declared an interest with regard to the proposed mast on Treleague Farm.

3. Public time:

Cathy Brown expressed concern that the consultation regarding the siting for a new bus stop had been restricted to neighbouring residents and had not been carried out on a widespread basis, yet it affects the village as a whole. Councillor Preston explained that this was not a Parish Council-led project but a Cormac initiative and Coastline Housing is involved as owner of the land. Coastline had conducted the survey and the results have not yet been released. Cormac had proposed a re-siting as a result of concerns about the bus turning and as Cormac had funds available for such a project. It was suggested that the proposed plan be included in the Gazette to enable wider comment.

4. Police report:

In the absence of PCSO Berry, the Clerk read out the monthly report. There were no reported crimes in October and Halloween passed with no logs for anti-social behaviour.

5. Cornwall Councillor's time:

In the absence of County Councillor Rule, there were no items to discuss.

6. Minutes for acceptance:

Carried 7 votes in favour and 1 abstention. - <u>Pre-application consultation request Proposed installation of 30m High Lattice</u> <u>Tower Mobile Phone Base at Treleague Farm, Ruan Minor</u>

(Councillor Green left the meeting) - the Parish Council had received details of a potential project site from Harlequin Group, telecom consultants. The project forms part of the wider Broadband Delivery UK project for the Department for Culture Media and Sport aiming to reduce the digital divide and provide mobile coverage to not spots. After some discussion and considering some comments already received from parishioners, it was agreed that a short comment in response be prepared by the Clerk in conjunction with the Chairman explaining that the Parish Council does not comment in advance of formal applications, but that it is aware of adverse public reaction in the Parish. (Councillor Green re-joined the meeting) **Action: Clerk**

• <u>Enforcement query</u> – Councillor Collins raised a potential enforcement / retrospective planning application query. It was agreed that this would be considered at the next meeting

- <u>Glebe land, Poltesco Lane</u> (Councillor Green took the Chair. Councillor Preston's non-pecuniary interest was noted and he took no part in the discussions) it was noted that the alleged encroachment had been reported to Planning Enforcement and the Clerk is waiting for the outcome of this to be reported to her. With regard to any future extension to the graveyard, it was proposed by Councillor Clifton and seconded by Councillor Collins that the Glebe land is the current preference of the Parish Council for any future graveyard. 7 votes in favour and 1 abstention. The Clerk was asked to draft a letter to the land agents (with a copy to the diocese) confirming this. (Councillor Preston returned to the Chair) Action: Clerk
- <u>Bus stop</u> Coastline Housing has yet to release the survey results or agree any land transfer. It was agreed that Councillor Preston would ask Cormac to attend

a Parish Council meeting to answer questions from the public once the land availability is confirmed. Action: Councillor Preston

• <u>Defibrillator</u> – it was noted that the Community Trust has pledged £1,000 towards the purchase of a defibrillator for Ruan Minor to be situated in the porch of the Surgery. It was proposed by Councillor Lee and seconded by Councillor Preston that the Parish Council pledge £500. Carried 8 votes in favour. The Clerk was asked to notify Judith Green of this. **Action: Clerk**

9. Matters for consideration:

- <u>Recycling bins in the Cove</u> it was agreed that this matter should be kept under review and that owners of let properties should be encouraged to make appropriate provision for recycling.
- <u>Play Area Update</u> Councillor Preston reported that an update committee meeting will be held shortly. He had seen the apparatus provided by one of the proposed contractors at a site in Bude and had been impressed by the quality. He did explain that he considers a project of £60,000 to be too ambitious to achieve in the short term and felt that with the readily available funds of approximately £20,000 it would be better to get started and then build on this going forward. Councillor Lee referred to the new playground in Lizard but had no information as to how it had been funded. It was noted that grant applications were still being pursued.
- <u>CLT/ s.106 funds</u> it was noted that Cornwall Councillor Rule had attended a meeting of the Community Land Trust (CLT) on 3 November and had provided useful support to aid future decision-making. Councillor Rule was party to the discussions as to how CLT selects an appropriate site and negotiations with any landowners concerned. It was noted that the availability of s.106 money ends on 1 July 2016, at which point any unspent funds will go back to the property developers. The money can only be spent on affordable housing and work on site must realistically be started by December 2015 to ensure the funds are utilised in time. The CLT is not yet aware of what the criteria will be for drawing down the money.
- Housing Needs Survey the results of this survey, which was a joint operation between the CLT and Cornwall Council, have recently been published. The survey ran for 6 weeks from 16 July to 31 August 2014. Cornwall Council has confirmed to the CLT that this survey has identified sufficient housing need within our parish to support a small housing scheme. Total need is for 11 dwellings and the CLT proposes to build an initial scheme in the region of 5 8 dwellings. The survey has also outlined classes of people who did not qualify for Higher Moor, these being single people, elderly people or those in need of sheltered accommodation. It is important that the CLT get the housing policy correct so that those local people who did not qualify for Higher Moor get a fair chance to obtain housing from our CLT.
- <u>20mph zone</u> some concern had been expressed in the Gazette about vehicles speeding past the school. The Clerk was asked to contact the Highways Department to ask if they would explore the various options available to slow traffic. Action: Clerk

10. Finance

- <u>Financial Report</u> the report was noted. Councillor Preston expressed the wish that the £200 received in respect of filming at Cadgwith be ring-fenced to finance work on erosion / safety aspects on the Todden.
- <u>Payments Schedule</u> the Payments Schedule for November, subject to the removal of the payment to Mr Carter, was proposed for approval by Councillor Clifton and seconded by Councillor Collins. Carried 8 votes in favour. It was agreed that the schedule would in future be e-mailed to Councillor Green for display at the meeting. It was also agreed that in future the Clerk's salary would be paid by standing order.
- It was noted that a Finance Committee meeting would be arranged for late November. Councillors were asked to inform the Clerk of any future spend (outside of normal annual activity) that they considered should be taken into account when setting the precept.
- <u>Payment out of Reserves</u> Councillor Freeman asked if the Parish Council was
 prepared to contribute towards the funding for a new pavilion. It was noted that a

Action: Clerk.

12. Footpaths, environment and treewardens:

- Councillor Preston reported that there had been a useful meeting with Chris Fry of PAROW and they would carry out work to improve the surface and drainage of the footpath in Cadgwith from the car park down to the harbour. They are not able to carry out any major capital works.
- Kuggar Pump site Councillor Preston reported that Mr Lewis had carried out the initial clearance of the site. It was agreed that Councillor Green would explore registering the site as common land. Action: Councillor Green.
- Mundy's Field car park Councillor Preston confirmed he was checking the car park this month and would report to the next meeting.

13. In Committee:

• It was agreed that the next part of the meeting be held in 'closed' session.

Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of the Grade Ruan Parish Council held in the Sunday School Room of the Ruan Minor Methodist Chapel on Monday 8 December 2014 from 7.30pm

Present: Parish Councillors, J Preston (Chair), N Green (Vice-Chair), J Clifton, P Collins, M Fleetwood, P Freeman, J Lee, S Stephens, J Trewin, Cornwall Councillor C Rule.

1. Absences and apologies:

Parish Councillor C Cooper; PCSO J Berry; Clerk J Castle (these apologies were accepted by the Council).

2. Declarations of interest:

Councillor Fleetwood declared an interest with regard to Cadgwith net lofts and Glebe land in Ruan Minor. Councillor Preston declared an interest as tenant of Glebe land in Ruan Minor.

3. Public time:

There were no members of the public present.

4. **Police report:**

In the absence of PCSO Berry, the Chairman read out the monthly report. Two crimes had been reported in the Parish in the past month, one about production of cannabis, the other theft of granite mushrooms from a garden. Police urge owners to mark all valuables with postcode or other identifier.

5. Cornwall Councillor's time:

Councillor Rule reported that she is now chairman of the local Community Network and hopes to make it more open to input from parish councils. The next meeting will be in January or February. She has protested against the council's plan to confine road gritting to only A roads, and has requested that all B class roads be included also. Councillor Collins suggested that Cornwall Council should review which roads are essential to keep clear to ensure no communities are isolated, regardless of A, B or no classification. Councillor Fleetwood asked whether grit would continue to be supplied to roadside bins. Cadgwith has two bins which are needed to keep both steep approach roads clear. Councillor Rule will investigate. Action: Councillor Rule.

Councillor Rule reported that due to budget cuts, drain clearing and verge trimming will be severely reduced. In the future, Cornwall Council will only work on areas where traffic safety is an issue.

It was widely reported in the media that there was an average wait of 20 minutes for calls to the non-urgent police 101 service. Councillor Green suggested that in light of the closure of police station front desks and the reliance on the phone to contact the police that a wait of this length is unacceptable. Councillor Rule reported that the Police & Crime Panel will be holding the Commissioner and Chief Constable to account over this, but indicated that they were looking into whether the phone outside every police station can be made to jump the queue.

• PA14/010952 Extension and alteration of shower block and re-siting of LPG tank at Silver Sands Holiday Park. Councillor Preston reported he has visited the site and raised no objections to the proposed work, which is well screened by woodland. He proposed support for this application and was seconded by Councillor Lee. Carried 9 votes in favour.

- PA14/08876 Chy An Deylek, St Ruan, Ruan Minor occupancy certificate of lawfulness [Granted] This has been granted but it is unclear whether it just applies to the present owner or whether it lifts the restriction for any future owners. The Clerk was asked to clarify this with Cornwall Council. Action: Clerk.
- PA14/09277 Kernyk, St Ruan pruning of sycamore [Approved]
- PA14/09013 Sea Acres Park extended opening [Approved]
- PA14/09122 3, Council Houses, Kuggar external insulation [Approved]
- PA14/09068 10c Trevelyan Holiday Homes reduced opening [Withdrawn]
- PA14/10698 Bodrigy, Cadgwith Change colour of windows to grey [Approved]

Pre-applications and consultations:

- PA14/03917/PREAPP: Pre-application consultation request Proposed installation of 30m High Lattice Tower Mobile Phone Base at Treleague Farm, Ruan Minor. It was noted that the pre-app for a communications tower at Treleague Farm has now been validated and registered with Cornwall Planning. Details can be viewed on Cornwall Council online planning website. The Parish Council had discussed this case at November's meeting.
- Amended proposal re new dwelling at Glenelg, prior to re-submission to planning

(PA14/04058 previously withdrawn). Agents for Glenelg had supplied a revised site plan and asked for the Parish Council's comments, but it was agreed that no opinion could be formed until more information was available. It was noted that the revised plan avoids removal of the large tree that was previously of concern.

 Net lofts conversion, Cadgwith [Councillor Fleetwood left the meeting]. It has been brought to the Parish Council's attention that there had been renovation work on net lofts within the Cadgwith conservation area. Although individual Councillors have been approached and asked for opinions, no approach has been made to the Council and no firm information supplied. The Parish Council looks forward to receiving a formal application for planning approval for any work being completed beyond permitted development. Further information will be sought to clarify the Council's understanding of the work being carried out. [Councillor Fleetwood rejoined the meeting]

Development in field, Ebenezer Road. It was noted that there have been two
enforcement visits to this site - in June 2011 and March 2013 - and that a formal
planning application, PA14/06078 for 'retention of extension to an agricultural
building for use as a dwelling' has been submitted but has not yet been validated.

8. Matters arising from the minutes:

- <u>Glebe land, Poltesco Lane</u> Councillor Lee reported that some Councillors had met on site with church representatives.
- <u>Recycling</u> it was noted that Cornwall Council would not collect recycled material if bins were put in public places in Cadgwith. It was suggested that the company which collects glass weekly from the pub might be willing to empty a glass recycling bin in the cove, if one were provided, at a small extra cost to the Parish Council. Councillor Clifton will talk to the pub landlord about this. **Action: Councillor Clifton**

9. Matters for consideration:

- <u>Revised Standing Orders and Financial Regulations</u> these had been precirculated and no comments were raised. Adoption was proposed by Councillor Freeman, seconded by Councillor Collins and carried 9 votes in favour.
- <u>Glebe Place Village Green</u> it was noted that it is not legally possible to register the land as a village green as the covenant on it already gives the public right

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Penvounder, Manaccan, Helston. TR12 6HR of access and enjoyment, so no further action can be taken.

• <u>Weed spraying quotation</u> - a quotation has been received from Cormac for bi-annual spraying of roadside weeds. It was agreed that the length of pathways covered could be considerably reduced and Councillor Preston agreed to negotiate a new price with Cormac. **Action: Councillor Preston.**

10. Finance

• <u>Financial Report</u> – the minutes of the Finance Committee were taken as the finance report for the month. It was agreed that the Parish Council should resume paying Len Carter for cleaning the bus shelter and maintaining the area around the parish notice board, since the work was being done on his behalf while he recuperates.

• <u>Donation to Chapel for room hire</u> - it was agreed to make a donation to the Methodist church of £250 in lieu of rent for use of the Sunday School room over the past two years. Proposed by Councillor Lee, seconded by Councillor Stevens and carried 8 votes in favour with one abstention.

- <u>Donation to Cornwall Blind Association</u> A letter had been received requesting a donation. It was thought that several parishioners had benefitted from the work of the Association. A donation of £100 was proposed by Councillor Freeman, seconded by Councillor Collins and carried 9 votes in favour.
- <u>Payments Schedule</u> Approval of the schedule of payments, totalling £494.85, was proposed by Councillor Clifton, seconded by Councillor Stevens and carried 9 votes in favour.
- <u>Budget for 2015/16 and setting of Precept</u>- the Finance Committee had recommended an increase to the parish precept from £13,500 to £13,770, an increase of 2%, the first for three years. Acceptance of this recommendation was proposed by Councillor Trewin, seconded by Councillor Lee and carried 9 votes in favour.
- <u>Risk Assessment</u> an updated risk assessment had been produced by the Clerk, which was amended by the last meeting of the Finance Committee and recommended for approval by the Council. Councillor Collins queried whether the measures taken to backup the Council's computer data online were sufficient to protect against loss at the Clerk's residence. The Council felt that login details to the online data should be shared with the Chairman and Vice Chairman in case anything happened to the Clerk. Councillor Green will discuss the online backup arrangements with the Clerk. Action: Councillor Green. Adoption of the updated Risk Assessment was proposed by Councillor Lee, seconded by Councillor Fleetwood and carried 9 votes in favour.

11. Correspondence:

- <u>Bus Stop</u> Councillor Preston reported Coastline's refusal to allow the bus stop to be on the proposed green area at the turning into Glebe Place and Cormac's intention to propose re-siting it on the road opposite the entrance to Mundy's Field. It was felt this would be unpopular with parishioners and Councillor Preston agreed to discuss the issues with Cormac and Coastline. **Action: Councillor Preston.**
- <u>Steamer's House and Fort York</u> Councillor Freeman reported that Cornwall Council have again refused our nomination of these as assets of community value as they are currently used only by members of the fishing community. It was agreed that it is not worth pursuing the matter further as both properties already carry covenants requiring community use, but the possibility of their being owned by the Parish Council should be discussed at the next meeting.

12. Footpaths, environment and treewardens:

• <u>Footpath 43 (Gwendreath to Kuggar)</u> - Councillor Preston reported that a stretch of about 100 metres needs cutting back. He will ask the owner of the adjoining land if he is about to cut it back. If not, he will ask our contractor to do so as an extra job at a cost less than £50. Action: Councillor Preston.

<u>Footpath 1 ("Five fields")</u> - a blackthorn hedge is growing over the path at one of the stiles and will be cut back.

- <u>Todden erosion</u> Councillor Preston has asked a contractor to look at the site with a view to possibly reinforcing the bank with caged netting as at the lifeboat house. Councillor Lee reported that a sign "Surfers against Sewage" has appeared on the Todden without prior consultation. He agreed to contact the organisation and request removal. **Action: Councillor Lee.**
- <u>Fly tipping at Thorny Cliff</u> Councillor Preston reported fly tipping of electronic equipment at Thorny Cliff, Kuggar. He will try to remove it. **Action: Councillor Preston.**
- <u>Kuggar pump site</u> the site has been cleared and swept, in consultation with local residents. Councillor Green was asked to investigate whether the site can be registered as common land and if this is the case, to commence the registration process. Action: Councillor Green.
- <u>Mundy's Field car park</u> Councillor Preston reported at the end of his month's inspection duty. There have been one or two instances of overnight parking but no serious breaches of rules.

13. In Committee:

• No items were discussed in committee.

The meeting closed at 9.40pm.
